







Saint Domingue in 1789



A Profitable Colony

2/5 of France's total colonial profits

Saint Domingue alone exports one-third more than all the British West Indies combined

French re-exports of goods processed from Saint Domingue raw material rose from 15 Million *livres* in 1715 to 152 million in 1789

Of 424 million *livres* exported to Europe, Americas, and the Near East in 1788, 152 million originated in Saint Domingue



The Creation of a Black Nation: The Haitian Constitution, 1805

Article 2: Slavery is abolished forever.

Article 12: No white man, regardless of nationality, may set foot in this territory as a master or landowner, nor will he ever be able to acquire property

Article 14: Because all distinctions of color among children of the same family must necessarily stop, Haitians will henceforth only be known generically as Blacks.
