FLOATING SPECIALTY MAY 25, 2013.

PUPPY SWEEPSTAKES JUDGE'S CRITIQUE

May 29, 2013

To: Airedale Terrier Club of Canada Members

Re: Airedale Terrier Club of Canada Specialty: May 25, 2013

I wanted to thank the membership for inviting me to judge the Sweepstakes for your Floating National Specialty in Victoria a few days ago. And, I wanted to thank the exhibitors for entering and showing to me. I was very excited about the assignment and very much honored to participate both as the Sweepstakes Judge as well as the Ring Steward for your Regular Classes at the Specialty under Margaret Jones.

First of all, I love your breed and have spent time ringside at many shows watching your breed and spending time with exhibitors over the years at many of the top shows across the US where many beautiful examples have been presented – recently having attended a seminar that Susan Rodgers (Stirling) put on at Montgomery and then in March, watched the US Floating National with a ring mentor.

After those recent experiences, I am confident in saying that the overall quality exhibited at your specialty was wonderful! Your breed is clearly in a very good position.

Coat & Condition:

Having a hard coated breed myself, I know the effort that is needed to put your breed into proper condition. Every Airedale presented to me (and when I watched the regular classes as your ring steward), was in very good condition. Some a bit better than others, but all of them were in very good coat condition. Clearly a lot of hard work has gone into getting these Airedales ready for your show last weekend. All exhibits presented to me had a correct coat.

Heads:

I did not have any presented to me that had heads that were objectionable. In fact, I found the heads to be lovely – clean cheeks, fill in the muzzle (no snippiness), good lengths without exaggeration and acceptable planes. Ears and eyes on my winners were beautiful – finishing up the expression well.

Fronts:

Very good fronts overall. I did not find any steep shoulders nor wide. In fact, while this is a challenge for many breeds, from what I observed last weekend, it seems to me like this is a strength of your breed here. My best in Sweeps winner had a very nice length of neck, with a look of power which flowed well into his topline – he used this well on his go-around.

Toplines and backs:

Again, of the dogs presented to me, all of them had very good topline – level and strong. My winners had nice short and strong backs, again without exaggeration.

Tail sets and Rears:

All of the dogs presented had good to above good rear angulation – moderate which is called for the breed. I did not see exaggeration which is creeping into the generic show dog. However, when it came to tail sets, I would like to see a few more with the tail set on slightly higher and carried a bit higher, both standing and on the move.

Temperament:

I am very cognizant that I was judging juvenile sweepstakes and also cognizant that some of the dogs presented do not have much experience in the show ring. I tried hard to make the experience a pleasant one for each exhibit presented to me. When I did the ring-side mentoring at the US National Specialty, it was mentioned to me multiple times that you do not want to see soft or shy temperaments in the ring in your breed. From what I experienced, I do believe that a bit more work and exposure and experience for some of the puppies shown to me will be important for future shows. However, I did not see anything that would concern me – as a breeder myself, what I saw is something that I believe that more experience for these young dogs would address.

Overall, again, I thought the quality of the exhibits and the conditioning was very good to excellent with the top winner excelling in their overall picture that was presented. I was torn between 2 girls and liked both of the finalists very much but went with the younger one based on the overall picture that was presented.

My only challenge of the day was that it was unclear as to separating the males vs. females in the age classes as they were put together on my judging sheet, also a bit unclear as to what specific prizes were to be provided to which winners.

Again, I had an awesome time with the sweeps assignment, enjoyed ring stewarding for your regular specialty classes and LOVED the Silent Auction and Pot Luck Dinner!

Thank you again for inviting me! What an honour!

Judges Critique for the Airedale Terrier Club of Canada National Floating Specialty Saturday May 25th
2013.

I would like to thank the members of the Airedale Club of Canada for giving me the honour of Judging their National Specialty.

15 Airedale Terriers were in Competition for the regular conformation classes. I am very pleased to say I felt the overall quality of the classes was excellent. The numbers may be small but the quality of the entry was high. In general all entries were well muscled and coats were of correct texture. Most were in good working condition. Some of the puppies were a little soft in temperament but the Specialty was being held on the 3rd day of the All Breed show so perhaps they were just a little tired. Most tails were well set on but a couple were set a little far back and lower than I would prefer to see.

Best of Breed was awarded to #17 Can Ch Indus George of Victoria. In my opinion this young male exemplifies breed type. He was confident, correct in size, well muscled, in hard condition and balanced. His head was balanced with strong teeth and good ear carriage. His jacket was hard and straight.

A strong, short and level back coupled with free movement and strong power from his muscular hindquarters completed the picture.

Best of Opposite Sex #12 Monterra Calling All Angels came from the Bred By Exhibitor Class. This young female who was also Winner Female caught my eye in the classes. She showed feminine characteristics and was of correct size. She was very balanced in body and head. I was very impressed with her long flat skull and keen expression.

She moved freely with good power from her hindquarters. Coat was of good texture.

Winners Male, Best of Winners and Best Puppy were awarded to #7 Shawndee Mutiny On The Bounty. This handsome young dog gave the Best of Breed dog a challenge for the top award. He was short backed and muscular. His temperament was confident and outgoing. His head was balanced with strong teeth, large nose and good ear set. His jacket was dense and hard.

Select Male was awarded to # 16 Can Ch Indus Money Talks. This young male exhibited masculine qualities with good musculature and correct texture coat. Today, he did not exhibit the terrier spirit or confidence.

Select Female was awarded to #18 Can Ch Winsea's Firework. This young female was very balanced with good proportions to head. She had a lovely top line, short back and moved well. She was a strong contender in the Best of Breed competition.

Thank you again to the Club for the opportunity to judge the Airedale Roving Specialty.

Hello Airedale Club of Canada Breeders and Membership:

My name is Matt and I wanted to pass on a story that I am currently faced with.

I had bought an Airedale Terrier from a Calgary breeder a little over 8 years ago, they had even come to Edmonton to visit friends and family and brought the dog to us, but I can't remember the name of them as it was that long ago. Their story was they were selling a purebred Airedale without papers (on Kijiji possibly, and despite having CKC registered parents, the pups weren't for show and thus they thought the associated registration fees were not called for, and not passed on to the prospective owner. I now believe that this is not the case.

For the last 6 months, my dog has been plagued with Canine Degenerative Myelopathy. The animal's immune system attacks the sheath protecting the nerve centres in the spine, causing a loss in communication between the brain and the lower body. They lose feeling and control over their hind end, resulting in difficulties standing/walking/movement in general, incontinence, etc. This disease is genetic, irreversible, incurable and a game of odds when bred. The breeding risks are as follows;

- . If both parents are clear (N/N) then all of the puppies will be clear
- . If one parent is a carrier (N/A) and one is clear (N/N) then roughly 50% of the puppies will be clear and 50% will be carriers
- . If both parents are carriers (N/A) then roughly 25% will be clear (N/N), 50% will be carriers (N/A), and 25% will be affected (A/A)
- . If one parent is clear (N/N) and one parent is affected (A/A) then all puppies will be carriers (N/A)
- . If one parent is a carrier (N/A) and one is affected (A/A) then roughly 50% of the puppies will be carriers (N/A) and 50% will be affected (A/A)
- . If both parents are affected (A/A) then all puppies will be affected (A/A)

It is possible to test for the disease with a blood or saliva sample for a little over a hundred dollars.

I wanted to share this story to attempt to identify the breeders who may be ignoring the risks of breeding carrier or infected dogs - for the purpose to prevent the continuation of the genetic disease, and maybe educate potential pet owners for something to look in to prior to adopting the pet. I hope this message finds its way to you, and you are able to share it amongst your community.

Doug was euthanized today and the University of Michigan that had tested him positive. Doug had become an organ donor to assist with additional research for the disease. Doug donated sections of his spine that was affected with the disease. The U of M had asked for a donation as this was the first time they had ever tested an Airedale positive for the disease.

My intent is not to criticize breeding practices, but advertise the new found complication in the local gene pool.

PROTEIN LOSING NEPHROPATHY

PLN - there is an ongoing study in the US. Reprinted (with permission) as info.

THE NEXT STAGE OF RESEARCH: It is important to note that we now know that our statistics are VERY similar to what the Wheaten breeders are experiencing in that our Airedales do carry the deviant allele in significant numbers – almost half of the Airedales sampled carry the deviant allele. But it is equally important to note what we do NOT yet know:

In Airedales, does the presence of the deviant allele correspond to a clinical (disease) state?

Dr. Littman describes her goals for the next stage of research with Airedales: “We would like to characterize the phenotype (what the dog shows as an observable health problem) of any Airedale with kidney disease by studying the dogs genetic test results AND the presence of kidney disease as documented by the dogs medical records. This will allow us to study the relationship of the PLN-associated variant alleles to disease in Airedales.

Our (University of Pennsylvania) DNA test is associated with PLN, not necessarily RD (renal dysplasia), at least in SCWTs. In SCWT it is well worked out that homozygous positive dogs for these PLN-associated vari-ant alleles are at high risk for PLN, heterozygous dogs are at intermediate risk, and homozygous negative dogs are at low risk of developing PLN in their lifetimes.

But there may be multiple genes involved that modify the expression of the phenotype, environmental triggers, etc, and we won't know if Airedales are exactly like SCWT or not until we study their case files more. “ WHAT YOU CAN DO TO HELP : The University of Pennsylvania will continue to offer FREE PLN testing for dogs that the veterinarian believes are having kidney problems.

To qualify for the FREE test, sample submission MUST have copies of medical records (lab results/ultrasound reports/necropsy report) sent in with the sample, pedigree information should also be sent. If you have a dog that has died from kidney failure and you can't get a DNA sample, copies of the medical record and pedigree would still be helpful and should be sent to Dr Littman. When sending pedigree's, remember that all pedigree information is kept STRICTLY confidential!

People can send paperwork (test results, pedigrees, necropsy results, etc.) by FAX or email attachment, but if the file is large or more than 1MB, they should just send copies by snail mail

We been extremely blessed with Logan, he is likely a once in a lifetime dog and is a dream to show. He truly enjoys the ring, as evidenced when we have long breaks and he is looking to be up on the table for grooming. He is a great dog to live with also, loves to stretch out on the couch, watching passerby's to ensure none trespass, and at the end of the day ensuring his favorite spot on the bed for his cuddle. He embodies the essence of the breed, the King of Terriers up on his toes in the ring, to being the big goof at home. None can do an eye roll, the way he can when he is not amused.

We should have known it was going to be a whirlwind, when as a puppy he was garnering attention in the ring, with numerous BPIG's, 3 BPIS and 5 Group 1st, with very limited showing.

He has the honour of being Canada's # 1 Airedale from 2009 thru to 2012, being the first to do so. As well, he is ranked in the top 10 Ten Terriers each year (2009 - # 9 & 2010 - # 4 & 2011 - # 10 and 2012 - # 4). And except for his trip to the Kitchener shows in 2012, he acquired all his points at shows in Atlantic Canada. While the numbers in the Terrier group are declining nationally, there is a depth to the quality in Atlantic Canada which keeps one on their toes. As in 2011 when the # 1 Terrier that year, (the lovely Skye) was frequently in the same ring with Logan .

In his career to date, he has accumulated 19 Best s In Show, 8 Reserve Bests In Show, 97 Group 1st and 90 other group placements. In addition he has 2 Specialty wins at the Bi-Annual Atlantic Terrier Specialty; he is the only terrier to win it back to back. Logan attained his Grand Championship in 2012, upon passing his CGN. All of Logan's wins have been breeder- owner / handled exclusively.

We are still working on his American championship, as with limited time to venture south, it impacts accessibility. Nonetheless, he is major pointed from our first venture to the US to Ladies Dog Club, in Wrentham, MA –wherein the first day he won Winners Dog at the Airedale Terrier Club of New England Specialty, and the following day Best of Breed. We are hoping to finish the US title this year.

And now, his young offspring in the States are making their presence known with Sweepstake wins, and various Winner's placings. We will see what the future holds there.

And none of this would have been possible without all the patience and support from Ken & Lee throughout it all, Thank you is not enough!

Since this article, Logan has garnered two more Best in Shows, four more Group 1st's, and finished his US championship from BBE class.

ATCC Breeder Guidelines of Responsibility

All members of the ATCC Breeders' Referral List have agreed to the following Guidelines of Responsibility.

1. As a member of the Breeders' Referral List, I understand that my primary responsibility is to provide information on the characteristics and properties of the breed to interested individuals. I understand further, that I am a representative of the Airedale Terrier Club of Canada and that the image I present reflects on the organization as a whole. I agree to act in a responsible and courteous manner when dealing with those seeking information or puppies.
2. I will provide CKC registered Airedale Terriers for sale. I will strive to breed only those dogs that possess the qualities described by the CKC Standard of the Breed, attempting to prevent genetic diseases that may cause a dog to become crippled, blind, allergic, or otherwise disabled.
3. As a member of the Breeders' Referral List, I specifically agree to the following:
 - a. I will not make misleading or untruthful statements in selling or advertising.
 - b. I will not sell or donate individual dogs or litter lots to commercial dog wholesalers, retailers pet shops, for resale or "give-away" to the public.
 - c. I will not knowingly allow any dog I have bred or caused to be bred to be placed at auction, raffle, chance or placed by any means other than direct sale to the person or family who intends to keep the dog for their own.
 - d. I will not deliberately degrade any fancier, their dogs, or their kennel.
 - e. I will not sell any puppy or allow it to be placed in a new home before the age of 49 days.
 - f. I will maintain high standards in the care and breeding of my dogs.
 - g. I will help educate the purchaser in the standard care, grooming and other areas in which I am qualified.
 - h. I will provide each buyer basic diet and care information.
4. As a member of the Breeders' Referral List, I agree to be a resource for buyers of puppies or older dogs that I have sold for the life of the dog. Being a resource includes, but is not necessarily limited to providing information, answering questions, and making suggestions as to where buyers may obtain additional information.
5. As a member of the Breeders' Referral List, I acknowledge that when dealing with persons, whether or not they were referred to me by this list, involving the sale or exchange of puppies or adult dogs, I will comply with the following requirements. I understand that documented proof of failure to comply with the provisions of this paragraph can result in my removal from the Breeders' Referral List:
 - a. At time of sale, I will register the dog with the CKC.
 - b. I will process the dog's registration with a Non-Breeding contract for pet homes to prevent the dog being used at a later date for breeding purposes. A written statement or written explanation is provided that makes the new owner aware of when and under what conditions, the non-breeding contract may be waived. A written certification is provided that identifies the exact date of birth, and the registration numbers of the Sire and Dam.
 - c. At time of sale, I will provide the buyer with a written, three-generation (minimum) pedigree.
 - d. At the time of sale, I will provide the buyer with a health record that identifies any vaccinations delivered up to the date of sale. If no vaccinations have been administered, then a written statement to that effect must be provided.
6. ATCC strongly recommends that breeders provide each buyer with a specific window of opportunity during which to have the puppy or dog to be examined by a licensed veterinarian, at the buyer's expense, and then, upon written recommendation of the veterinarian for specific reasons, return the puppy or dog to the seller for a full refund of all money paid. One of the following two conditions must be met:
 - I. If you offer such a period of time, the period must not be shorter than 48 hours (72-96 hours recommended) and must include at least two full, normal, eight-hour business days, or
 - II. If no such period of time is provided, then a written statement to that effect must be provided.

* The above rules concerning CKC registration and pedigrees do not apply to Airedales that are rescued and prepared for adoption through AireCanada.
