

USC "Tin Can Sailor" is an Award-Winning Novelist

When John "Jack" Gobbell was an NROTC midshipman at USC (1960), he could have hardly imagined that years later he would be writing exciting novels about the Navy!

Jack was born in San Diego, but grew up in the San Fernando Valley, graduating from Van Nuys High School. Jack's father had been in the Navy, and his older brother, Bill, was a USC NROTC grad in 1955, so it was natural for Jack to go to USC and join the NROTC program. An English major, Jack was a member of

the Phi Delta Theta fraternity and had a great time as a member of the Trojan battalion – Charlie Company. As a midshipman, he took advantage of many of the unit's outside activities. When offered, he took rides with instructor-pilots in military aircraft, including an 'E' ticket ride in a Lockheed T2V jet trainer. Between semesters, he spent a week at sea on the submarine USS RASHER (SSR 269), and his midshipman summer cruise aboard a "Tin Can," a revered Fletcher class, USS PRITCHETT (DD 561). The peak of Jack's USC-NROTC career was as one of many "Roman soldier" extras in the Academy Award-winning movie *Spartacus* that was filmed at Universal Studios in 1959. Universal hired the entire NROTC units from USC and UCLA along with their football teams. They needed men who could march, and men - the football players - who looked rough and tumble to play praetorian guards. And they got both. The movie soared, but Jack complains there were no residuals for his role as a 150-pound legionnaire stuck behind sword and shield, twenty-two ranks back.

Jack's dad had served on four-stack destroyers in the peace-time Navy before World War II. With that and everything he learned as a midshipman, Jack chose destroyers. The Navy was good to him, and after graduation in

Another academic year has come to a close in mid-May, and another graduating class of NROTC midshipmen has been commissioned as new Navy and Marine Corps officers. Graduation was held on Friday, 11 May, and Commissioning was held the following day, Saturday, 12 May. Graduation day has gotten so crammed with the main commencement followed by many individual school events and ceremonies. Last year, the ROTC units decided to move commissioning to the next day when things are calmer. The commissioning is now held in Bovard Auditorium as a joint Army, Navy, Air Force event. So, our new Navy and Marine Corps officers will be heading to the fleet to carry on the proud tradition of USC NROTC graduates that has been ongoing for 78 years! The NROTC Drill Team traveled once again to the University of Colorado in Boulder for the annual competition, and the Alumni League assisted with covering some of their travel costs. Of the 10 schools competing, USC finished 2nd place in Platoon Drill, 2nd place in Endurance Team, 3rd place in Pistol Shooting and 3rd place overall.

As we do each semester, we awarded \$1000 scholarships to five deserving midshipmen of the Trojan battalion. I can tell you that they really appreciate getting the extra financial assistance, and always thank us profusely for these scholarships! And that is all because of you and your generosity – so keep those checks coming!

At the NROTC Spring Ball in April, the Senior Class was honored prior to graduating. The Alumni League presented officer swords to the Drill Team



Commander and an outstanding First Class midshipman. Additionally, we presented a scholarship award in memory of our USC Medal of Honor recipient – CAPT William McGonagle, USN.

Next year (2019), the Navy will be doing something new and different for incoming NROTC scholarship students. Before they travel to their college or university, they will go to Recruit Training Command at Great Lakes, Illinois for a two-week "Mini-Boot Camp," to prepare them for their service as NROTC midshipmen. Currently, schools like USC put on their own one-week indoctrination and orientation, prior to the beginning of the student's first semester. This new approach will provide a nationwide, consistent orientation and evaluation of incoming midshipmen. This will be interesting...

Commanding Officer's Update

It has been another outstanding year for the Trojan Battalion! I cannot believe how fast it went by. Let me provide you a current situation report, a brief look forward at the 2018-2019 school year, and a look back at the 2017-2018 school year.

We commissioned two Marine Corps 2ndLt and six Navy ENS on Saturday, 12 May 2018. The event was well attended. Our commissioning officer was LtGen Osterman (Deputy Commander, USSOCOM and father to newly commissioned 2ndLt Osterman). These young Officers are physically fit, solid leaders with tremendous academic credentials, and morally grounded with the virtues and ethical reasoning required to face a dynamic, chaotic, and sometimes ethically ambiguous decision-making environment. They will make a positive and lasting impact on the Navy and Marine Corps for years to come. Our nation is in good hands. Both 2ndLt will be Student Naval Aviators. One ENS was assigned to Naval Reactors, one Submarines, three for Surface Warfare, and one for Aviation. We have one additional MIDN 1/C who will commission in late June 2018 following completion of his first class cruise. He was assigned Surface Warfare.

Following graduation, we have 59 active Midshipmen and Marines. 39 of them are scheduled for summer cruise. New this summer is a pilot Battle Station cruise where Midshipmen have an intense "crucible-like" experience. We are sending three MIDN 3/C. MIDN 1/C Hoyohoy is the Commanding Officer, Trojan Battalion through December 2018. He has already built his team

and shortly will have his final plan for New Student Orientation (NSO) as well as a 2018-2019 calendar, budget, and fundraising plan.

We currently have 14 students committed to joining the Trojan Battalion in the Fall, with several additional students considering enrollment in the College Program. New this summer is a pilot New Student Indoctrination program aboard Naval Station Great Lakes, IL. All of our new scholarship MIDN 4/C are required to attend. Intent is to increase the intensity of program and standardize the indoctrination of new Midshipmen.

MIDN 1/C Petroy (Fall) and now ENS Lazzeroni (Spring) were tremendous Commanding Officers and led, enabled, and guided their staff through the planning and execution of the battalion's battle rhythm, including weekly Naval Science Laboratory, physical training, drill, Color Guard, team-building events, and support to NJROTC.

The Trojan Battalion did a marvelous job implementing structure to their calendar through the use of a Concept of Operations Brief, Letter of Instruction, Confirmation Brief, and After Action Report for all events. These skills will serve them well on active duty.

LT Schultz left us after two years as our Submarine Officer Instructor. He departs for the private sector in Silicon Valley after meritorious service as a junior officer. He left a lasting impact on the battalion, training, mentoring, and preparing the Midshipmen for Navy Nuclear Power interviews. He and his wife Sabrina will be missed. Fair winds and following seas! We lose Capt Barnes, our MOI

Author Jack Gobbell

1960, sent orders to the USS TINGEY (DD-539), another Fletcher class Tin Can, homeported in San Diego. He served as First Lieutenant, Fire Control Officer and ASW officer during his two years of active duty, and then was, for six years in the Navy Reserve, stationed aboard USS COLAHAN (DD-658) as the Gunnery and ASW Officer. During the Vietnam War, Jack was aboard the TINGEY when she bored holes in the South China Sea on YANKEE STATION, and due to night-time in-shore activity, also became a member of the Tonkin Gulf Yacht Club.

In civilian life, Jack had a busy career, working in consulting and executive recruiting at KPMG Peat Marwick, Shareholders Capital, and as a VP at Boyden Associates, an international executive recruiting firm headquartered in New York City.

In 1983, Jack started his own executive recruiting firm – The Gobbell Company in Newport Beach. He continued for twenty-five years until his final two-year assignment as the Director of Development for the USC Caruso Catholic Center, raising money for the new Our Savior Church and the Catholic Center at 32nd and Hoover.


While in the Navy he began to get the bug for writing. He came up with the idea of a series of novels, starting with WWII in the Pacific, built around a fictitious Navy officer – **LT Todd Ingram**. Published by four of the nation's largest publishing houses, he has written eight novels of historical fiction, and the ninth is in the works! In 2015, Jack was honored with the Gold Medal by the Military Writers Society of America for his novel **Edge of Valor**. His latest novel – **Dead Man Launch** – takes place in 1968, and is based on the sinking of the Soviet Union's submarine K 129 which was partially salvaged by Howard Hughes' Glomar Explorer in 1974. His novels are available from Amazon and on Kindle.

Jack is a proud USC NROTC graduate, lifelong loyal Trojan, and member of the NROTC Alumni League. He and his wife Janine (a USC Kappa Alpha Theta)


live in Newport Beach, have 2 grown children (both USC alumni), 9 grandchildren, and have been married for 58 fun-filled years!



USS TINGEY (DD 539) 1962 Deployment

Tingey deployed to WESTPAC in early 1962 and was thrown into DESRON 15 with six of the nation's newest destroyers. These included USS MAHAN (DLG 11), USS PREBLE (DLG 5), USS KING (DLG 10), USS HENRY B. WILSON (DDG 7), USS TOWERS (DDG 9) and USS LYNDE McCORMICK (DDG 8). She shared this ominous assignment with another old Fletcher, USS BROWN (DD 546). These brand-new ships were much larger than the hapless Fletchers. They were the pride of the Navy and were festooned with blue guided terrier missiles and giant radar antennae which spun in glory for all to see.


Right away, the two, ungainly and unwelcomed Fletchers seemed to get the short end. For example, in Pearl Harbor for underway training, these two hapless destroyers were nested four and four with TINGEY and BROWN occupying outboard spots. This meant the crews had to cross over three ships to get to the pier. En route, they encountered eye rolls and cat-calls. Worse was bringing aboard stores and crates over three ships with no help whatsoever.

Our sailors aboard TINGEY got their backs up when our brightwork and fancy trimming on the fo'c'sle was stolen one night. The next night, there were fights ashore. In retaliation, our boatswain's mates put out ratguards, the ultimate insult to a neighboring ship.

There were more fights. The Commodore got involved. He had to. He ordered our bright work returned to us and that we strike the rat-guards. This was done, but feelings still ran high when we finally shoved off for Yokosuka, Japan.

Our sailors were still resentful. So, without telling the wardroom on the way to Japan, our machinists mates fashioned from sheet metal, a dummy guided missile with fins, painted it blue, and stuck a toilet plunger on the nose. This completed "Terrier" missile fit perfectly over the barrel of mount 55, our after five-inch mount, and stood in glory for all to see.

The other ships loved it. When steaming in close quarters or at replenishment, the other sailors laughed and hooted and gave us thumbs up. Unfortunately, the Commodore didn't approve. He ordered our Terrier removed – permanently. And thus, faded into the history books, the saga of one ship's valiant struggle to stand tall with the next generation. Some things never change.

FINANCIAL REPORT

The balance in the NROTC Alumni Fund (22-5506) as of 12 April 2018 was \$32,078. Since the beginning of the University's fiscal year (1 July 2017), the League received \$10,030 in donations to the Alumni Fund, including 63 personal checks and 21 on-line donations. We incurred \$4627 in expenses, the largest being \$4000 for Drill Team travel.

The Alumni Fund (22-5506) allows the Board of Directors the most flexibility in directing donations to programs in support of USC Midshipmen. We pay a 15% service charge to the University when using 22-5506 funds. This service charge is assessed to cover administrative expenses, including check and on-line donation processing.

The NROTC Alumni Scholarship Fund Spendable Account (28-4296) has a balance of \$24,332. Each semester, through a competitive application process, we award five \$1000 scholarships. Midshipmen use the money to offset University education and living expenses.

The Scholarship Fund Spendable Account (28-4296) is funded each year through a percentage payout of approximately 5% applied to the League's share of the multi-billion dollar USC Endowment. The payout for the last fiscal year was \$13,477 and was added to the Spendable Account in July 2017.

Donations designated as "Scholarship" are placed in the NROTC Alumni League Scholarship Endowment (98-4296) account. This account is the League's share of the USC Endowment described above and currently totals \$257,168. Since July 2017, the Scholarship Endowment received 53 checks and 4 on-line donations totaling \$2770. Again, we access approximately 5% of your Scholarship donation each year to spend on Midshipmen programs.

Money from the Parker Endowment Spendable Account (22-7416) is used to offset costs related to the printing and mailing of The Log. The current balance is \$456. This account is also funded yearly with the approximate 5% payout historically declared by the University applied to the Parker \$25,000 endowment.

Open enrollment is 12 Nov - 10 Dec 2018. All TRICARE beneficiaries desiring coverage must make a specific choice during open enrollment. There will be NO automatic transition for current TRDP enrollees. FEDVIP offers 10 Dental Plans and 4 Vision Plans to choose from.


