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

Head Shots

Performer Portraits from Daguerreotype to Digital

NOW THROUGH DECEMBER 30

What is a "head shot" and what would the performing arts be without them? As long as there has been photography, performers have used portraits to represent themselves for casting and promotion. The Library for the Performing Arts holds over 1,000,000 head shots in historical, modern, and digital formats. Unique archival collections from casting agencies, production offices, and publicists reveal the process of finding the right performer for each role. Visitors will see how images are posed, taken, and selected and understand how every step contributes to the very pragmatic aims of employment and publicity.

Learn how a performer selects outfits and poses, what casting directors see in a print or digital portrait, how souvenir programs for dance, theater, and music are edited, and how performers selected prints to autograph. Investigate how color, digital photography, and internet portals have radically changed making and distributing head shots.

Alice Live!

OCTOBER 2, 2015 THROUGH JANUARY 16, 2016

To commemorate the 150th anniversary of the publication of *Alice's Adventures in* Wonderland, The New York Public Library for the Performing Arts, Dorothy and Lewis B. Cullman Center at Lincoln Center presents the free multimedia exhibition Alice Live! The exhibition will trace the history of Lewis Carroll's beloved Alice stories in live performance from their first professional staging to the present day. Alice Live! will be on display from October 2, 2015 through January 16, 2016 in the Donald and Mary Oenslager Gallery, Shelby Cullom Davis Museum.

The exhibition is curated by Charlie Lovett, a collector of Carroll materials for over 30 years, author of Alice on Stage and other studies of Carroll, and the bestselling author of the novels The Bookman's Tale and First Impressions. The exhibition will include items drawn from Lovett's own collection, as well as from The Library for the Performing Arts and other institutional and private collections. Alice Live! will begin with an examination of Lewis Carroll's own enthusiasm for entertaining and theatergoing and document the first professional stage production of *Alice* in London in 1886. Early productions will be illustrated with playbills, advertisements, and photographs, and New York productions will feature prominently in the exhibition. Posters, photos, audio, and video from *Alice* productions through the years will show developments in costumes, composing, scenic design, acting style, and theatrical marketing. Alice Live! will cover not just theatre but ballet, opera, music, and even versions of the stories performed on ice and underwater. The exhibit, which is designed to appeal to all ages, will also include special elements just for children and younger visitors.

Alice's Adventures in Wonderland began as a performance. On a "golden afternoon" in 1862 Lewis Carroll improvised the story aloud, as he looked after and entertained the three daughters of Henry Liddell, including, most importantly, the precocious Alice Liddell. Charlie Lovett, author, scholar. and curator of the Library's current exhibition, shares the details of Carroll's love for performing and his invention of Alice in Wonderland, See artifacts from Carroll's world up close. Participate in a reading from a facsimile of Carroll's own handwritten early draft of Alice's Adventures in Wonderland, and enjoy a morning of storytelling, wordplay, and interactive Wonderland fun.

Symphony Space A Cultural Town Square

OCTOBER 14, 2015 THROUGH JANUARY 30, 2016



For almost four decades, Symphony Space has defied easy categorization, carving out an identity all of its own — yet one that also embodies the spirit of the surrounding Upper West Side. Dubbed "a cultural town square" by founder and longtime Artistic Director Isaiah Sheffer, Symphony Space has always been a gathering place for artists and audiences, a place that embraces a glorious multiplicity of cultural activities. At no other theatre in town is one likely to encounter back-to-back performances ranging from James Joyce to world music, from children's theatre to Selected Shorts, the literary series for which the theatre is widely known.

The exhibition, Symphony Space: A Cultural Town Square, celebrates this beloved New York institution, as it also marks the 100th birthday of the building that has housed Symphony Space since its founding in 1978. The exhibition will explore the early years of the building — as a food market (1915-1917), an ice skating rink (1917-1918), and later as the legendary Symphony and Thalia movie theatres (1918-1978) — as well as trace the extraordinary success of Symphony Space, from its first Wall to Wall Bach in 1978 to the prominent institution it is today.

Symphony Space: A Cultural Town Square is part of Project Fifteen, a two-week seasonopening celebration at Symphony Space that features music, film, literature, talks, and more. The exhibition is supported by the Isaiah Sheffer Fund for New Initiatives.
