# U3A Networks for Leicestershire and Rutland offer Joint Study Days

It has been agreed that U3As in Leicestershire and Rutland should join together for specific workshops and more general study days. The following is now on offer:

"Below Stairs in the Country House" - Monday 3rd October 2016 at Calke Abbey, the National Trust property near Ticknall, Derbyshire. Leader for the day will be Professor Marilyn Palmer whose book on the subject will be published later this year. Marilyn says: 'You will be encouraged to look rather differently at country houses when you visit them, with illustrated talks on the ways in which houses were lived in including heating and lighting, feeding the household, kitchens and dining rooms, water supply, bathrooms and Wcs, bells and telephones.'

# Other Study Day Suggestions under consideration:

- 1. Charnwood Forest. Geology, archaeology, landscape use, social history, visiting patterns etc. This could involve staff from the Victoria County History Project, known as Charnwood Roots Project, as well as the dig taking place in Bradgate Park.
- **2. Beginner's Guide to Astronomy.** To take advantage of public interest in Tim Peake. Perhaps in conjunction with the Space Centre and the University's departments of space science and astronomy.
- 3. The Changing Face of Leicester and Leicestershire.

A look at its manufacturing past and future. Topics could include the growth of industry in the city and county; its resources; particular stories such as the rise and decline of Corah's British Shoe etc; its manufacturing future.

### **Workshop Suggestions:**

1. Modern technology for committee members and others. Topics could include: storage of documents on the Cloud; using iPads and Tablets for meetings; using mobile phones; email communication - contact lists

for group leaders and how to do emails to large groups with undisclosed email addresses; data protection; technology for the visually impaired.

2. Group participation in special interest groups for group leaders and group coordinators, based on 'More Time to Learn', copies of which would be available to all delegates. Short presentations on ideas for group participation in various sizes of group, from the small to the large, as well as different areas of learning from academic subjects e.g. history or science and technology, to practical skills e.g. photography. Feedback using flip charts.

# 3. Responsibilities of Trustees for new committee members.

National workshops are provided but this could be a more informal session, making use of the recent Committee Reference File and online resources for Trustees, including those from the Charity Commission.

**4.** The Beacon Management System. Various U3As, such as Sleaford, have experimented with online management systems. We would find someone who has used this to explain the advantages and disadvantages.

**Birdwatching** 



Here we are - our first outing, to Swithland Woods, on Friday 13th May! It was rather cold, grey and overcast above, and a quagmire in parts below, but we all managed to stay on our feet and glide relatively silently through the forest with great expectations of seeing everything on our list. We were incredibly fortunate to be led by Robin Perry, who has volunteered to share his knowledge and expertise with us on our monthly visits. Robin, who admits that he is rather aptly named, has selected a number of venues for maximum interest throughout the year, and had already prepared book lists, advice on clothes and equipment, and sheets for us to keep records of our sightings. To help us gain the most from our visits, he has invited two colleagues with other wildlife expertise to join us - Sue and Stuart. Sue accompanied us to Swithland, and was charged with keeping an eye out for anything else of interest such as badger and fox trails, and woodland flowers. Without their help we would still be there, trying to identify the birds from their songs. While Robin managed to identify 25 different species of bird, either by sight or sound, the highlights for us were the woodpeckers, (green, lesser and great spotted) which we either saw, or heard drumming on tree trunks, or calling; three treecreepers scuttling up and down the tree trunks like mice, and a nuthatch flying from branch to branch. He also identified another 7 species at nearby Cropston Reservoir, including a Sandpiper and 3 Great Crested Grebes. The forest was also home to bluebells, wood anemone, stitchwort, honeysuckle, violets and red and white campion, and when the sun came out, it shone like emeralds through the newly emerging leaves on the huge, ancient oak trees. Quite magical!

We take blank pieces of translucent parchment vellum and trace designs on to them, which are then embossed using special tools and/or coloured, if preferred. # The magic of WD40
