Along the way, we will confront the sin of racism, renew our faith, and remember the promise of Easter - that redemption, reconciliation and liberation is possible.

In 2020, the Council of Bishops of The United Methodist Church vowed to focus intently on dismantling racism in the church and the world. This Lenten devotional series is another step in the journey of repentance, reconciliation and action in which we invite the whole church to participate.

“Holy Vessels/ Carrying Change”

Some changes will prompt an urgency for study, prayerful support, fundraising and action that fosters equity and justice for some and our own deep need to grow.

Change can be invigorating as well as unsettling and I am praying for our church universal and local, our expanded virtual campus community, our neighbors and each of you as we bear witness to the power of the Holy Spirit in this season of recovery – that will open us to creativity and will bring change to the fabric and landscape of our lives as God’s people.

Please make plans to pick up (or have delivered) your Lenten Packet. This bag has a wonderful study guide for Lent and another that begins Holy Week. It has a guide to activities and supplies to enhance your 40 days with creativity and symbolism.

Our God is a God of New Life – not of the tomb. We are being called out, like Lazarus, to come out of the pandemic tumult with a joy and a hope for living more fully, serving ALL of God’s creation. Join me, holy vessels, in carrying out God’s vision for the days ahead.

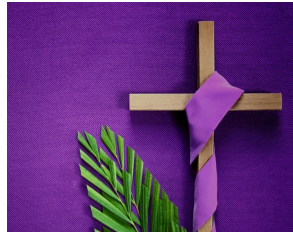

UMW News



UMW Reading Program

I hope you have been able to pass these snowy winter months with some good reading. Of course, the UMW reading Program has some good suggestions. In February, I read two books that were very different from my usual book choices and were thought provoking, at least for me: ***Rise! From Caged Bird to Poet of the***

People (Leadership Development category) and ***Sleep, Heal, Pray*** (Spiritual Growth category).

Available in the New Berlin library through the Waukesha County CAFÉ System, the first, by Bethany Hegedus, is the biography of Maya Angelou in picture book format. Looking at the book, you would think it was just for children, but the words give an enlightening overview of Ms. Angelou's life. The illustrations give life to the words. Reading this book is an easy way to learn more about this woman who rose from being a caged bird to becoming the poet of the people.

The second book, ***Sleep, Heal, Pray*** by Donna Fado Ivery, is another biography, setting out the life of the author after an accident causes a severe brain injury and how she works to recover from it. Before the accident, the author had just been appointed as the senior pastor at a UM church in California and her African-American husband, the associate pastor. After the accident, she had to learn how to live with her pain and resulting physical disabilities.

Her therapist suggests she tries her painting again as a way to get through her pain and to help with her recovery. Her first painting is of her pain. She describes her painting materials (oils donated by her sister-in-law and Masonite panels cut to size and donated by a member of the congregation) and how she visualizes her pain – its look, shape, and colors. When the painting is finished, she writes down a prayer about her pain. She follows the same process for many paintings – Healing Headache, Beautiful Mess, and others illustrated in the book and accompanied by her prayers. It was interesting to read how she developed her paintings and seeing the results, reading her prayers, and how these activities helped her to recover to some extent and return occasionally to the pulpit.

When our church reopens, this book will be available in the church library.

Curious how two verses in scripture could lead to five weeks of discussion? You are not alone! In Luke 4 we learn that Jesus was at the beginning of his ministry when he quoted the beginning of Isaiah 61 to those attending temple in his hometown of Nazareth:

The Spirit of the Lord God is upon me,

Because the Lord has anointed me

To bring good news to the afflicted;

He has sent me to bind up the brokenhearted,

To proclaim liberty to captives

And freedom to prisoners...

Jesus didn't end there, and the listeners that day didn't receive the message well which of course leads to loads of questions: What would I have done that day if I was in that temple audience? Who were these people who were afflicted, brokenhearted, captive, and who are they today? Do I **see** these people or do I turn away?

If these questions tug at your heart and spirit, please consider joining a time of sharing, questioning, and thinking aloud. Participants will receive weekly links to short videos and 1-2 discussion questions to consider well ahead of the Wednesday sharing time.

Reaching Out to Those in Need

Knitters and Crocheters Needed !!

WATER WITH BLESSINGS, INC has sent us a message. First, the address has changed for receipt of water filter socks. Their new address is:

Their oversupply of filter socks is nearly used up and they could use more donations. If you have any socks made for these water filters, please leave them in the brown donation box outside the church north entrance and label them for Pat Garrigues, how many socks are included, and who is donating them. Pat Garrigues (262-298-9097) will pick them up and send the lot together. You may leave any yarn you wish to donate in the brown box as well. Let Pat know also if you need more yarn, or if you need patterns and a sample mock filter to test the size of your product. Use up all your old odd scraps of worsted weight cotton or acrylic yarns for a good cause! A colorful variety of stripes or designs or contrasting ties cheer up the users in bad situations.

These filter socks protect the glass filters from breakage, both during shipment and during use. These glass filters let folks in poor countries, or who have had disasters that damaged their water supply, turn muddy creek water into drinkable water with no viruses or bacteria and save the need for plastic single-use water bottles. While the filters are the same as those used in hospital dialysis units with 0.1 micron filters, they don't remove salt or dissolved minerals. Be of Good Courage

All of us need some kind of courage to live in today's world. Where can we find protection these days? What source can we gather our courage? In the Bible, the Psalmist tells us to "Wait on the Lord, be of good courage, and He shall strengthen your heart; wait, I say, on the Lord." (Psalm 27:14). The Psalmist also says, "The Lord is the strength of my life; of whom shall I fear? The Lord is the strength of my life; of whom shall I be afraid?" (Psalm 27:1). These words are not just our protection, but should be so built into our consciousness that their truth becomes a part of us.

One of the strongest statements of courage was from Moses when he told the Israelites and Joshua, their new leader, "Be strong and of good courage; fear not, nor be afraid of them: for the Lord thy God will go with you, He will not fail you, nor forsake you." (Deuteronomy 31:6). In the face of an approaching enemy, Hezekiah restored the courage of his army when he said: "Be strong and courageous, be not afraid nor dismayed; for with them is an arm of flesh, but with us is the Lord our God." (2 Chronicles 32:7&8).

The patriarchs of the Old Testament possessed a strong sense of personal relationship with their God. They talked to Him, and even more, they listened to Him. Courage was a natural outcome of their relationship. Jesus, the Nazarene, carried it a bit farther. For He said, "I and My Father are one. The Father that dwells in me, does the work." (John 10:30).

Courage is a spiritual quality, the power of which we have forgotten. In our technical and computerized world, we have turned away from the Spirit. We laugh at the simple faith of our Fathers. Yet each day brings a greater need for courage. It takes courage to live in today's world, for we have never known greater chaos.

In Mark, (Mark 9:7), God speaks plainly, declaring that Jesus, "is His beloved Son", and adds "listen to Him". In today's time, we need this reminder to turn to Jesus more in prayer and listen to His guidance in our lives. If we would like to live in safety, then let us never forget that courage and God go hand in hand.

With my family, our morning prayer is: "Father in heaven, I give you today, all that I think and do and say, through Jesus Your Son. Amen." May you find ways to listen and follow in His guidance, each day during this Easter season and always. Take Courage!
