FROM THE PRESIDENT

Cilla and I recently decided to join a Chavurah/Friendship Group. I was like a lot of our members. "I don't need a Chavurah." "I'm too busy." "I'm away a lot." "I have enough friends." "I have my family – what else do I need?" But, after speaking with several shul friends about their Chavurah experiences, I'm eager to give it a try.

It sounds interesting to have Shul friends to have brunch with on a Sunday morning, or to go on a walking tour of DC, or enjoy a movie, concert or theater experience. It will be nice to have a Shul group to meet for a quiet Friday or Saturday night dinner or to be together at a Shaare Tefila lecture or event like Comedy Night. I encourage you to consider forming or joining a Chavurah at Shaare Tefila.

A Chavurah consists of small groups of members who come together to share Jewish experiences—whether they are purely social, learning, community building, life cycle events, holiday celebrations, social action and tikkun olam/repairing the world. Chavurah means "fellowship." It comes from the word "chaver," the Hebrew term for friend. "Chevra" is a group of friends. The term is mentioned in The Talmud, to denote a group of people registered to sponsor a single Passover sacrifice and who held a Seder together. At Shaare Tefila, we sponsored Chaverot to keep our congregation together, or membership retention, when we were "wandering." So what differentiates Shaare Tefila from other synagogues? Our goal is for everyone to feel connected and to know each other like "family."

Chaverot can be groups of people who live in the same neighborhood, or groups with children of similar ages. They can be empty nesters, or multigenerational groups, or merely a combination of people who want to enjoy one another's company.

We have tried to be inclusive and our Chaverot diverse, including men's and women's discussion groups, families with young children, Leisure World group, empty nesters, and young adults. Currently, we have 13 active Chaverot and growing. We realize that all members have different levels of participation. We will help you find and/or form a Chavurah that will meet your needs.

Each Chavurah is different. Each meets on its own self-defined schedule and determines its own activities. Some Chaverot could focus on book discussions or studies, and some might want to concentrate on outdoor activities. Most vary their events to include the multiple interests of the group.

Because of ever-widening interest among congregation members, the Membership Committee is encouraging the formation of more Chaverot. 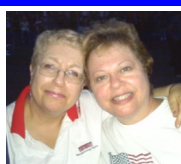

GATES OF DISCOVERY ROSE AND GEORGE TELLER Preschool Observational Drawing

One of our two-year old classes has been studying water all year. At first, this was very much a sensory exploration. We felt, transported, poured, evaporated, absorbed and colored water. We melted ice, explored steam and saw how oil and water don't mix. It was a wonderful, rich experience.

However, recently we have begun asking the children to think about water more conceptually. We started by asking them, "Where does water come from?" We got many different answers, but they fell into two categories – pipes and nature. So we have been exploring both of these hypotheses simultaneously.

As the children have been thinking about pipes, they have begun to realize how ubiquitous they are. They go into the bathroom – the sink and the toilet both have pipes. In the cabinet under the sink in their classroom – pipes! Even outside, there are pipes coming out of our building and a giant pipe on the playground. Parents are sharing that the children are pointing out pipes everywhere they go.

But do they really see the pipes? Do they take time to notice the small details?

To encourage this type of detailed observation, we have the children create observational drawings. As the children draw, they are encouraged to touch the pipes, listen to hear if there is any water running through, to use not just one sense, but many. The children talk about their drawings with each other, enriching their vocabulary and sharing knowledge. They are thoughtful in their renderings. They take their time and think about the pipes and what is happening with the water inside.

From the very first days of our 2-year old classes, observational drawing is an integral part of our school. "Draw what you see" is a phrase that is heard many times over. It invites children to be careful observers of the world around them and to take notice of details that can lead to important learning. Children naturally look at everything with fresh eyes. Taking advantage of this predisposition has multiple advantages.

Through the focus required in drawing, children learn to concentrate on an activity. By extending the amount of time that the children are observing different objects, we extend their concentration. This expanded attention span carries over to other activities we do with the children.

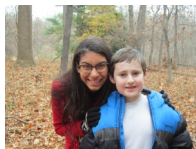
Drawing 3-dimensional objects has many advantages over copying another picture. By creating a representation of a 3-dimensional object in a 2-dimensional form, children must deal with concepts of perspective, depth and proportion, among others. They also begin to understand that what they see on a page is a symbolic representation of real things – an important precursor to decoding writing. And the need to control and manipulate the writing implement to make (Cont. on P 4, Preschool)



CHAVAYA:

The one aspect of Chavaya that elicits more questions than any other is the on-line Hebrew component of our program. Our step by step approach to teaching Hebrew guides students from the most basic familiarization with Hebrew letters to having the ability and confidence to lead sections of the service. The formal process begins in third grade when each student is paired with a tutor for weekly 30 minute sessions. The primary focus of this time is prayer Hebrew. Comprehending the meaning of the prayers undoubtedly leads to a richer and more fulfilling prayer experience. This year, several older students supplemented with a Modern Hebrew book as well. This provided a learning opportunity to further our goal of increasing the level of Modern Hebrew in our school.

We begin the online component with Behrman House's Aleph Bet Quest book. Upon completion of third grade, our students are conversant with all the letters and vowels, as well as basic words. In fourth grade, we shift to the Kol Yisrael three part series. We supplement with other components such as Megillah reading, when appropriate. In seventh grade, our students transition to the Sim Shalom siddur, which is used for weekly Shabbat services.



Through one-on-one sessions we are capable of meeting the needs of our diverse learners. Every effort is made to match students to tutors with similar schedules. However, more important than finding a compatible time slot, is finding a tutor with individual strengths that complement our student's needs. At this point, our tutors specialize in beginning reading, bar/bat mitzvah preparations, high musical interest, and a subset of other areas. We utilize a relatively large number of tutors precisely so that we can align in personality as well as skillset. A parent recently mentioned that although their son switched to a different tutor months ago, their family kept in contact with the previous tutor. Recently, this family arranged to visit their child's former skype tutor when they were at the University of Maryland campus for Maryland Day. Forming and maintaining student to tutor relationships can be particularly beneficial to students with few Jewish role models or neighbors. Next year, we will all have the chance to keep in contact with one of our tutors, Rani, who is leaving us to follow her dream of joining the Israeli army. We are so proud of Rani and we'll send her care packages and letters over the course of next year.

At this point, skype tutoring and regular classes ended several weeks ago. I wish all our Chavaya families a relaxing and fun summer. I look forward to seeing everyone on our first day of class - September 13, Erev Rosh Hashana.

(Preschool, Cont. from P. 3)marks on a page is another pre-writing skill.

There are many math concepts that are reinforced as well. Organizing, analyzing, synthesizing and representing information are key concepts. Putting the right number of items – if there are 6 pipes, for example, having 6 pipes in their drawing – shows competence in one to one correspondence, a basic math concept. Understanding spatial relationships and synthesizing these relationships is another valuable skill.

For teachers, seeing the observational drawing and documenting the conversations that occur as they draw are valuable insights into the understanding that the children have of the subject and often give critical clues for how to move forward. And leaving the drawings available to the children, for them to refer back to, helps our explorations move forward.

So the next time you want to see something – really see it – think about drawing what you see!
