

CES at FSU Presents 'From the Mixed-Up Files of Mrs. Basil E. Frankweiler'



CES at FSU will present the renowned New York City-based theatre company ArtsPower in "From the Mixed-Up Files of Mrs. Basil E. Frankweiler" on **Wednesday, Nov. 8**, at 4:30 p.m. in Pealer Recital Hall.

Based on the beloved Newbery Medal-winning children's book by E.L. Konigsburg, this enchanting musical follows Claudia Kincaid and her brother Jamie up the stone steps of the Metropolitan Museum of Art and right into the middle of an adventure surrounding a mysterious statue that may or may not be the work of Italian Renaissance artist Michelangelo.

Since 1985, ArtsPower has presented literature-based musicals for young people across the country. Working closely with some of America's most beloved authors, including Judy Blume, Lois Lowry and Paula Danziger, the group creates one-hour, one-act productions based on classic children's books.

Student Ensembles and Faculty Jazz Ensemble to Perform 'Jazz Portrait'

FSU's Department of Music will present an Evening of Jazz, "Jazz Portrait," on **Saturday, Oct. 28**, at 7:30 p.m. The program will feature the Jazz Combo, Jazz Guitar Combo, Vocal Jazz Ensemble and Jazz Orchestra, all student ensembles. FSU's Faculty Jazz Ensemble will also perform.

The program will open with the FSU Jazz Combo, led by director *Tom Harrison*. The group will perform classic and contemporary jazz standards by Wayne Shorter, Lee Morgan and Herbie Hancock. Members of the Jazz Combo include *Mirto Dorcil* on piano, *Robert Brosh* on bass, *Corey Snowden* and *Grant Stryckning* on guitars, *Hanna Livingston* on the trumpet, *Wesley Mason* on the violin and *Matt Heverly* and *Nathan Kopit* on drums and mallets.

The FSU Jazz Guitar Combo, directed by *Anthony Ambroso*, will present selections arranged by Grant Green, Pee Wee Ellis and Miles Davis. Songs will include "It's Your Thing," "Hey Western Union Man," "The Chicken" and "All Blues." The Jazz Guitar Combo is made up of Stryckning, Snowden, *Marshall Borleis* and *Dylan Lynch* on guitars; *Garrett Spence* on bass; and *Ryan Barber* on drums.

Under the direction of *Dr. James Reddan*, the FSU Vocal Jazz Ensemble will play tunes by Count Basie, including "Voice Dance," "Shiny Stockings," "Until I Met You" and "Splanky."

FSU's Jazz Orchestra, directed by *Dr. Brent Weber*, will perform songs by Charles Mingus. The program will include "Caravan," "Moanin'," "Haitian Fight Song" and "Self-Portrait in Three Colors."

The Jazz Faculty Ensemble will present "Actual Proof" by Herbie Hancock, "Mac Tough" by Pat Martino and "One-Note Samba" by Antonio Carlos Jobim. This ensemble consists of Weber on the saxophone, Harrison on piano, *Jim Roderick* on bass and *Marc Lawrence* on drums.

Saxophonist Brandon Quarles in Guest Artist Series Concert



The FSU Department of Music will present saxophonist Brandon Quarles in a Guest Artist Series concert on **Sunday, Oct. 29**, at 3 p.m. He will be accompanied by **Joseph Yungen** on the piano.

Quarles will play compositions by Fernande Decruck, Georg Philipp Telemann, Gabriel Erkoreka, Jacob ter Veldhuis and Jacques Ibert.

French composer Decruck composed more than 40 works for the saxophone, but her music fell into obscurity soon after her death. In recent years, the "Sonate en ut# pour saxophone alto (ou alto) et orchestra" has been rediscovered. The work was composed in 1943 in a traditional four-movement setting. It incorporates trends of

Impressionism through its harmonic vocabulary, chordal planing and pentatonic scales, and it demonstrates a sophisticated application of polytonal techniques in several passages.

Telemann was a leading German composer of the Baroque period. A multi-instumentalist and almost entirely self-taught, he was also one of the most prolific composers in history. His music includes several national styles (French, Italian and, at times, Polish) and is an important link between the late Baroque and early Classical styles. "Fantasia No. 6 in D Minor" is one of Telemann's "12 Fantasias for Solo Flute," published in 1732-33, which are alone in the entire Baroque repertoire to include movements seemingly impossible on the flute: fugues (Fantasias 2, 6 and 8 through 11), a French overture (Fantasia 7) and a passacaglia (Fantasia 5).

Set for solo soprano saxophone, "Duduk I," composed in 2000 by Spanish composter Erkoreka, is based on the traditional modes and scales of Armenia. Duduk is the name of the Armenian oboe that is normally accompanied by drones. Erkoreka cleverly creates the illusion of the drone's presence and uses techniques to match the saxophone's timbre as closely as possible to that of the mellow and mournful duduk.

"Billie" was composed in the spring of 2003 by Dutch avant-garde classical composer Veldhuis. The piece is a combination of interviews with Billie Holiday that occurred throughout her career and synthesized sounds.

"Concertino da Camera" was written by French composer Ibert in 1935. The work is in three movements; the first, "Allegro con moto," is lively and technically challenging and the second, "Larghetto," begins with a hauntingly lyrical passage. A short cadenza links to the third movement, "Animato molto." The concerto is distinctive for its large range requiring the use of saxophone altissimo.

Quarles is a saxophonist dedicated to the creation and performance of new music. He is active as a soloist and chamber musician in the Chicago area, where he works with composers to realize new and progressive works. Since 2013, he has premiered more than 15 works by emerging composers. In 2016, Quarles was selected as a semi-finalist at the North American Saxophone Alliance Biennial Solo Competition. He made his orchestral debut in 2015 with the University of Georgia Symphony Orchestra as a winner of its annual concerto competition. Quarles has also performed with Chamber Cartel, the Zafa Collective and the Elgin Symphony Orchestra. He is the

soprano saxophonist of \sim Nois, a saxophone quartet committed to the music of today. Quarles also serves as the doctoral assistant for the saxophone studio and as the instructor of non-major saxophone lessons at Northwestern University.

FSU Student MiQuella Mollon to Present Senior Conducting Recital

FSU student MiQuella "Zee" Mollon will present her senior conducting recital on Sunday, Nov. 5, at 3 p.m.

The performance will feature the FSU student vocal ensemble Belle Voci and the saxophone ensemble The Saxafriends. Mollon will be accompanied by student *Susan Zoller* on the piano.

Mollon will begin the recital with "Cantate Domino" by Hans Leo Hassler, a German composer and organist of the late Renaissance and early Baroque eras and one of the first composers to innovate Venetian style. His dance music style shines through his music, especially in the classic sacred chant, "Cantate Domino."

"Il Est Bel et Bon" by Pierre Passereau is next on the program. Passereau was one of the most popular composers of Parisian chansons in France in the 1530s. He liked to use nonsense syllables, often in imitation of animals, as in "Il est bel et bon," his most popular piece, which imitates the clucking of chickens as it relates the gossipy conversation of a pair of French housewives.

Mortan Lauidsen's "Sure, on This Shining Night" captures all of the beauty and wonder of James Agee's poem from his book, "Permit Me Voyage." The push and pull of the tempo and rhythm enhance the emotion that the words and chords of this piece provide.

"Ave Verum Corpus" ("Hail, True Body") by Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart is a motet (a mainly vocal musical composition of highly varied form and style) in D major composed in 1791, less than six months before his death.

In "The Battle of Jericho" by Moses Hogan, the timbre of the bass/tenor voices with their fast-paced moving line creates a sense of tension throughout the piece.

After intermission, Mollon will conduct the raqtime piece "Encore Raq" by Tad Fischer, written in 1912.

"Water Music Suite No. 1 in F Major, HWV 348" by George Frederic Handel is from a collection of magnificent orchestral movements he composed in 1717 for King George's famous barge party on the River Thames.

The final composition on the program is "Jupiter, the Bringer of Jollity" from "The Planets, Op. 32" by Gustav Holst, an English composer, arranger and teacher. Each suite of "The Planets" is named after a planet of the solar system, and the ideas in the piece represent each planet's astrological character. "Jupiter" represents a lively and cheerful activity or celebration.

Mollon will be joined for the first half of the program by Belle Voci – sopranos *Marsé Romero, Hannah Miller* and *Samantha Donaldson*; altos *Danielle Garratt, Jaqueline Wiley, Jenna Blosser* and *Hannah Howard*; tenors *Jordan Ackerman* and Zoller; baritones *Raymond Sorenson* and *Anthony Dyson*; and bass *Tharen Rice* and *Sebastien Couvreur*. The Saxafriends will appear during the second half of the show. The group consists of *Ed Cameron* on soprillo sax; *Dakota Fearon* and Weber on soprano sax; *Eric Foreman* and *Caitlyn Rund* on alto sax; *Tanika Henry, Amy Cook* and *Johnathan Kidwell* on tenor sax; and *Noah Spradlin* and Weber on baritone sax.

Animal Rights Activist Jenny Brown to Speak on 'More Than Meats the Eye'



FSU's Department of Sociology will host an appearance by Jenny Brown, a long-time animal rights activist and Founder of Woodstock Farm Sanctuary in New York, on **Wednesday, Nov. 1**, at 5 p.m. in Dunkle 218. Her talk on factory farming, "More Than Meats the Eye," will be followed by a discussion moderated by *Dr. Daniel Moorehead*, an associate professor in the department. The event is free and open to the public.

Nowhere on earth is the disregard for life as stark as in the U.S. food system. Pulling back the curtain on animal agriculture reveals a morally bankrupt industry that treats sentient and

emotional animals as mere commodities. Drawing on her personal experiences with animals who escaped their fates, Brown will look at the impact of our food choices and discuss why a growing number of people are leaving animals off their plates.

Brown, who has a degree in film and video, previously worked in film and television, until she went undercover in Texas to document farm animal abuse. That experience led her to dedicate her life to helping farm animals. Twelve years after founding Woodstock Farm Sanctuary, one the country's most recognized and respected sanctuaries for farmed animals, Brown left the sanctuary to focus on a full-time national lecture tour, raising awareness about the plight of animals used and abused in food production. Her story and the work of the sanctuary have been featured in The New York Times, Rolling Stone and New York Magazine, as well as on CNN, "The Diane Rehm Show" and more. Dr. Jesse Ayivor to Speak on 'Small-Scale Gold Mining in Ghana' as Part of Dept. of Geography Lecture Series



As part of the Sodexho Lecture Series on Environmental Studies, the Department of Geography will host Dr. Jesse Ayivor on **Tuesday**, **Oct. 24**, for a lecture titled "Small-Scale Gold Mining (Galamsey) in Ghana: Economic Opportunity or Environmental Menace?" The lecture will take place from 7 to 8.30 p.m. in the Lane Atkinson Room (232). The event is free and open to the public.

While small-scale gold mining (galamsey) accounts for 35 to 50 percent of Ghana's gold output, the activity is having debilitating impacts on the environment at a level many have described as a "threat to national security." The impacts include forest resource degradation, diversion of stream flow and extensive pollution of rivers.

Ayivor is a senior research fellow at the Institute for Environment and Sanitation Studies at the University of Ghana. He has more than 15 years of teaching and research experience in environmental management, climate change adaptation, sustainable agriculture, food security and disaster management, and has had more than 30 articles published.

His other recent works include "Arming Slaves: From Classical Times to the Modern Age" (2006), "Atlantic Diasporas: Jews, Conversos and Crypto-Jews in the Age of Mercantilism, 1500-1800" (2009), "Atlantic History: A Critical Appraisal" (2009) and "African-American Life in the Georgia Lowcountry: The Atlantic World and the Gullah Geechee" (2010). Morgan's primary research focus at present is early Caribbean history, set within a broad Atlantic context.

Gov. Hogan Announces Funding for FSU Office of Regional Development and Engagement

Maryland Gov. Larry Hogan announced a state investment of \$300,000 to establish a new Office of Regional Development and Engagement at FSU, one of a series of state investments in Western Maryland outlined in a speech in Downtown Cumberland Friday, Oct. 13.

"To further encourage economic development in Western Maryland, today I'm pleased to announce that, in next year's budget, we will invest \$300,000 to establish a new economic development office at Frostburg State University to help capitalize on the research of

their faculty and to partner with local businesses to grow the Western Maryland economy," Hogan told the crowd gathered at Cumberland's Historic City Center.

The Office of Regional Development and Engagement will integrate University resources with regional partners in Western Maryland to help communities and companies be competitive and meet the challenges of economic and community development.

"As the state's only comprehensive higher education institution in Western Maryland, Frostburg State University is uniquely positioned and staffed to serve as a catalyst for economic growth throughout the region," said FSU President Ronald Nowaczyk. "The Office of Regional Development and Engagement will serve as the primary contact point for regional organizations and companies to utilize the intellectual capital of Frostburg State to address regional opportunities and challenges."

The office will have three main priorities.

The first priority will be to sharpen and support the regional focus on industry clusters identified for their potential in the region. Those clusters include back-office operations for larger businesses such as financial, business and information technology services; life sciences and health care, especially in the testing and development field; light "lifestyle" manufacturing operations, such as for recreation; and regional opportunities in energy and farm-to-table food production.

The second focus will be regional entrepreneurship. The office will leverage the resources of the University and the Small Business Development Center to support entrepreneurs. A particular effort will be made to encourage FSU alumni, including recent graduates, to bring their businesses to Western Maryland or create new ones in the region.

The third priority will be in education, done in collaboration with the region's community colleges. This may include the creation of "just-in-time" certificates, micro-credentials or badges in knowledge areas best suited to the needs of regional industries. Efforts will also increase the awareness of best practices in rural economic development.

Additional details regarding the office, including location and staffing, will be determined at a later date.

FSU Recognized in Princeton Review's Latest Green Colleges Guide

FSU has once again been included in the The Princeton Review's "Guide to 375 Green Colleges: 2017 Edition," the education services company's annual listing of the nation's most environmentally responsible "green" colleges.

The Princeton Review selects those institutions "... with the most exceptional commitments to sustainability based on their academic offerings and career preparation for students, campus policies, initiatives and activities."

FSU has appeared in the company's "Green Guides" numerous times since 2010, when the quide was first published.

Under President *Ronald Nowaczyk*, FSU has reiterated its decade-long commitment to ACUPCC – the American College & University Presidents Climate Commitment, for which it is a charter signatory.

"I am proud to see Frostburg State recognized again for our longstanding commitment to sustainability. We continually explore ways to reduce energy consumption, limit waste and encourage sustainable lifestyle choices," Nowaczyk said. "Learning and living green has become the standard in Frostburg, so much so that our Student Government Association instituted its own Student Sustainability Fee to fund even more green projects and initiatives."

FSU's Student Sustainability Fee funds are administered by members of the Learning Green, Living Green Sustainability Initiative, which studies proposals from FSU students, faculty and staff, and issues grants to support projects with the greatest impact on student learning and campus sustainability.

Princeton Review selected colleges for the guide based on "Green Rating" scores (from 60 to 99), which the company tallied in summer 2017, based on its 2016-17 survey of school administrators. That survey asked for reports on schools' sustainability-related policies, practices and programs. Princeton Review weighted 25-plus data points in its latest assessment of 629 institutions of higher education.

Schools with Green Ratings of 80 or higher earned a place in the 2017 Guide to Green Colleges. FSU's Green Rating was 87.

Important Message From Brady Health Center

This is an important message for any new or transfer student who has not provided the required immunization records or completed the Tuberculosis Risk Assessment form for Brady Health Center.

Health Holds will be placed on your student account later this week if the following minimum health information is not on your health record at FSU:

- Two doses of MMR vaccine (measles/mumps/rubella)
- TD or Tdap vaccine (tetanus/diphtheria/pertussis) within 10 years
- Completed Tuberculosis Risk Assessment form

The immunization record can be obtained from your health care provider or high school; you will need to fill out the Tuberculosis Risk Assessment form yourself. More information can be found at Brady Health New Student Information. The required records can be faxed to the health center at 301-687-7050, scanned and emailed to bradyhealth@frostburg.edu or dropped off in the office located next to Allen and Sowers residence halls.

You can log in to the Patient Portal using your FSU username and password to determine if you have submitted all the required health information. Click on "Immunizations" and "Forms" on the left. Anything that says "Status Non-compliant" needs to be completed.
