Wilbur Sampson was a reliable composer in the nineteen fifties, who worked with Lee Robinson and Chips Rafferty on a number of films, including 1954's *King of the Coral Sea* and 1958's *Dust in the Sun*:

The more interesting story perhaps concerns the theme song and its origins, as *Smiley Gets A Gun* featured the song (*A Little Boy Called*) *Smiley* by Clyde Collins.

This tune was written in time for the promotion of the first film, which sometimes leads it to be confused with the song *Smiley*, sung by Shirley Abicair for the first film.

The confusion is compounded by alternating titles (A little boy) Smiley, and (That Little Boy Called Smiley), and Johnny Young's later song Smiley, which was based on Normie Rowe's experiences in Vietnam, and has nothing to do with either the original film or its sequel, but was also a hit.

Collins was a popular composer always willing to cash in on trends - he also wrote a tribute song to *Robbery Under Arms*.

In the case of *Smiley,* he hit gold, with the song released in time to be used to publicise the first film. It upstaged the track written for the film, and was then recycled by the producers for the sequel.

The Ray Dickson version reached #9 in Sydney, #2 in Melbourne and #1 in Brisbane, charting in Brisbane and Sydney November-December 1957, and in Melbourne in November 1957.

Clyde Collins (below, left) was a prolific Queensland composer:



He also wrote *The Sunshine State* for the centenary of Queensland in 1959, and it is still performed by bands and choirs on Queensland Day, 6th June:





The song was released in time to promote the original *Smiley*, as well as appearing in the sequel, as the sheet music release makes clear:






The Leslie Ross Singers version turned up in 1992 on the ABC CD called *Macca's Classics*, some of Macca's favourites from *Australia All Over*.





The theme song has also been collected and covered on a number of LPs by a number of artists, including Clive Wayne and by Slim Dusty, who recorded the song on *Another Aussie Sing Song*, first released in September 1963 and now on CD.
