# Unique Collaborative Creates Stadium Employment Opportunities

Summit Academy OIC students who successfully complete 20 weeks of preapprentice construction training at Summit Academy OIC (Summit) will be well-positioned for construction employment opportunities. Louis King, Summit's President and CEO, has negotiated a contract with the Minnesota Ballpark Authority to hire a minimum of 50 graduates annually to meet minority hiring

goals that include 15% unskilled minority; 10% skilled minority; 5% women; and 1% disabled workers.

Summit, working in collaboration with Dunwoody College of Technology and Veit Companies, is preparing students for work as pre-apprentice carpenters, electricians, plumbers, painters, and heavy construction laborers. Summit has laid the foundation to help meet these goals. The initiative is well positioned to provide opportunities for Northside residents to achieve some measure of parity by sharing a portion of the economic pie created by the stadium construction.

"There is tremendous potential for



millions of dollars to flow into North Minneapolis due to the construction of the new Twins and TCF stadiums," said King. "Summit Academy's strategy is to position itself in a manner that ensures equity for people who normally do not have access to economic opportunities. With the stadium being built right in the Northside's back yard, it is only fair that Northside residents are able to earn a portion of the money used for building the facility."

# After Twenty Years of Service, Geneva Smith Retires

After teaching keyboarding and document processing as a career and technology instructor at Summit Academy OIC for the past 20 years, Geneva Smith will retire in September. The "power words" written on the board in her classroom illuminate her teaching philosophy and moral conviction: proficiency, excellence, commitment, courage, and positive attitude.

Smith started at Summit in 1987 after a brief period of teaching junior high school students in the Minneapolis Public Schools. She began what she terms "her missionary work" as an employee of Twin Cities OIC (now Summit Academy OIC). Teaching at Summit has provided her a vehicle and venue to pursue a personal mission of sharing with others.

"I always try to encourage and motivate my students. It is rewarding to me to know that I had some small part in igniting a flame of growth and self-esteem in a student," she explained. "I tell them in order to get to where they need to be in life, they should always maintain a positive attitude and have integrity."

# Summit Helps Bridge The Gap

Summit Academy OIC and Bridging have joined forces to build 100 dressers per month for Bridging's clients. Bridging's mission is to provide the economically disadvantaged in transition with quality furniture and household items. They serve families in desperate need, including the homeless, refugees, immigrants, and victims of family violence and natural disasters. With the opening of Bridging's Roseville facility, there has been an increased demand for dressers that Bridging cannot meet through donated items alone.

"Our goal is for each of the 5,200 families we will serve this year to receive a Bridging dresser," explained Ron Osterbauer, Bridging's Executive Director.

Thrivent Financial for Lutherans provided a \$100,000 grant to fund this partnership, which is named "Thrivent Furnishes Futures." Donaldson Company is donating a sizeable central vacuum system to remove sawdust from the woodshop. Their significant in-kind contribution is valued at over \$7,000.

"We definitely can see the direct benefit of our donation," said Rod Kunkel of Donaldson Company. "If we can help pave the way for an individual to make a positive contribution to the community, our company is happy to do so."

The dressers will be produced on-site at Summit by a volunteer workforce coordinated by Rae Carter. Summit staff, Aubrey Knox, will provide project oversight. There will be work-study opportunities for Summit's students.

"We are honored by this opportunity to serve the community," said Gary Courtney, Summit's carpentry coordinator. "Many of our students have used Bridging's services in the past. This partnership allows us to give something back."

# Summit Completes Paint Lab Renovation

With the renovation of a formerly vacant building on Summit's property complete, students and staff now have a new 1,700 square foot paint lab/training space. In addition to classroom space, the newly refurbished building includes two ADA approved, handicap-accessible restrooms, an office, and a shop area. Summit pre-apprentice construction students utilized their skills to complete the framing, sheetrock, concrete, stucco, painting, electrical, and plumbing work. The new area will be used by students learning paint skills.

"The students and I are excited about the new paint lab," said Bob Ahlberg, carpentry instructor. "In the past, the classroom we used was cramped, and tools and equipment were stored all over the building. The move to the new building will make teaching and learning much more efficient and effective."

Summit is grateful for the generosity of its corporate partners. In addition to providing painting curriculum along with an instructor for a period of time, Sherwin-Williams donated paint, paint brushes, pans, ladders, and power

equipment. In addition to a \$100,000 grant for capital, Graco also donated an airless sprayer for painting and texturing. Wells Fargo gave a grant of \$10,000 for equipment such as ladders, paint sprayers, and pressure washers.

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
