The students taught the school board members many of the apps and activities they had learned in school. The apps ranged from Skitch, Spelling City, Reading Eggs, Math Fight, Rocket Math, Pizza Fractions, Pic Collage, etc. The school board members and students were
 engaged for over 10 minutes. This was a wonderful opportunity for not only the students but the School Board members. On February 10, 2016, Amy and Robby along with their parents, Mr. Jerome, and Mr. Warne attended the Section 8A Triple "A" Banquet in Mahnomen, MN. From the school nominations, the committee selects one male and one female sub-section winner for each of the four subsections in section 8A. This unit is a fun way for students to begin to understand the aver age salaries adults earn based on level of education, how much colleges cost, and how attaining a postsecondary credential or degree will be beneficial to them in the long run. Sixth grade students will also be experiencing the PREP (Personal Readiness Evaluation for Postsecondary) assessment for the first time.
WORKSHOP: Ways to Pay for College
GRADE 7: One element of a student seeing himself or herself as college going material is a belief in his or her own abilities. This unit encourages students to identify their individual strengths in terms of knowledge and skills needed for college so they can further create an understanding and belief in themselves as successful college students. Also, students will be preparing for a panel of college students to ask questions of what college has been like for them.
WORKSHOP: Guest Speakers on College
GRADE 8: Budgeting for teenagers unit will give students an idea about their own spending and savings habits. The 8th Grade Budget Worksheet will be a useful conversation starter for parents at home. Students will also be learning more about the costs of college, whether it is a two-year or four-year school, private or public. A good link for parents to investigate is bigfuture.collegeboard.org/compare-colleges to find out more about colleges and financial aid packages.

GRADE 9: Students will learn the five phases of decision making: Clarification, Brainstorming, Evaluation, Decision, and Double Checking. These phases can be applied to all sorts of decisions. Ninth graders will also focus on learning about the 21 st century skills needed to adapt to an ever changing world.
WORKSHOP: Reality Check Tool
GRADE 10: Sophomores will be investigating college entrance exams and how to prepare for them. Students will look at general numbers on two and four year graduation rates in Minnesota. Students will also identify what "sparks" their interest when considering career and postsecondary options.
WORKSHOP: Admissions Process Overview

GRADE 11: Juniors will be studying a unit designed to help them decide where to apply to college. Students will decide on what is a Match, Safe, or Reach college option. They will receive general information on a range of colleges, including where it located, size, cost, and the average GPA and ACT needed for admission.
WORKSHOP: Postsecondary Exploration
GRADE 12: Seniors will prepare for a panel of current college students discussing what the reality of college is like. Students will look at an interesting survey of first year college students that reveals aspects of the college experience they may not have been anticipated and the challenges they face.
WORKSHOP: Reality of Postsecondary Experience

## Ingredients:

1 tube (18 ounces) refrigerated chocolate-chip cookie dough
$1 / 2$ cup raspberry preserves
$1 / 4$ cup multicolored candy coated chocolate pieces
2 tablespoons peanuts, chopped
2 tablespoons shredded flake coconut

- Heat oven to 350 degrees $F$.
- Coat nonstick 12-inch pizza pan with nonstick cooking spray.
- Spread cookie dough out evenly in prepared pan, pressing with fingers to flatten.
- Bake for about 17 minutes or until the cookie dough is light browned.
- Let cookie pizza cool completely in pizza pan on a wire rack.

To Decorate:

- Spread raspberry preserves evenly over cookie pizza to within 1 inch of edge of pizza.
- Sprinkle chocolate pieces, peanuts, and flake coconut evenly over the preserves.
- Cut the cookie pizza into 12 pizza shaped slices.


## Ground Beef Tacos

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## Ingredients:

1 lb . lean ground beef
1 medium onion, chopped
1 teaspoon chili powder
$1 / 2$ teaspoon salt
$1 / 2$ teaspoon garlic powder
1 (8-oz.) can tomato sauce
12 taco shells
6 oz. ( $11 / 2$ cups) shredded American or Cheddar cheese
2 cups shredded lettuce
2 tomatoes, chopped
$3 / 4$ cup salsa
$3 / 4$ cup sour cream, if desired

## Directions:

1. Heat oven to $250^{\circ} \mathrm{F}$. In medium skillet, brown ground beef and onion over medium heat for 8 to 10 minutes or until beef is thoroughly cooked, stirring frequently. Drain.
2. Stir in chili powder, salt, garlic powder and tomato sauce. Reduce heat to low; cover and simmer 10 minutes.
3. Meanwhile, place taco shells on ungreased cookie sheet. Heat at $250^{\circ} \mathrm{F}$. for 5 minutes.
4. To assemble tacos, layer beef mixture, cheese, lettuce and tomatoes in each taco shell. Serve with salsa; top with sour cream.
