



## INTRODUCTION TO FIRST CORINTHIANS -Paul founded the church in Corinth on his 2nd missionary journey in AD 51-52, Acts 18:1-18



# Paul wrote his first letter to Corinth on his 3<sup>rd</sup> missionary journey during his 3 year ministry in Ephesus, AD 55, Acts 19 – 20:1 and 31.




### THE OCCASION OF PAUL'S WRITING HIS FIRST LETTER TO CORINTH

- Corinth was a <u>seaport</u> & major trade centre.
- Half of the population were <u>slaves</u>.
- On the 600 meter hill above the city sat the temple of Aphrodite with 1,000 priestess-prostitutes who catered to the citizens and the sailors passing through.
- To "live like a Corinthian" came to mean gross immorality and drunken debauchery.
- Paul ministered <u>18 months</u> in Corinth before returning to Jerusalem.
- While on his 3rd missionary journey in Ephesus, he heard of the many <u>problems</u> plaguing the church in Corinth, so he wrote First Corinthians.

#### **The Corinth Canal**


At the isthmus to the Pelopponese, looking west to the Corinthian Gulf. The canal is 6.4 kms long.


Nero wanted to cut this channel 1950 years ago, but it was finally begun in 1882, and finished in 1893. It is 6 kms long from the Corinthian Gulf east to the Saronic Gulf.

In Paul's day 1,000s of slaves unloaded the ships, dragged ship and cargo overland and reloaded.



# Paul wrote his second letter to Corinth on his 3<sup>rd</sup> missionary journey while in Macedonia, about 56 AD, Acts 20:1 - 4.



- After founding the church in Corinth, Paul heard a report about <u>immorality</u> in the church, so he wrote a letter (since lost) to confront sin (I Co 5:9).
- In Ephesus he heard further reports of trouble so he wrote 1st Corinthians. Paul sent <u>Timothy</u> to Corinth (I Cor. 4:17, 16:10-11) probably to deliver the letter, but also to <u>minister</u> to the Corinthian church for a while and then report back to Paul.
- Paul learned that <u>false</u> apostles (11:13) had arrived assaulting Paul's character and message.
- Paul went immediately to Corinth on a painful visit (2:1), returned to Ephesus and wrote a <u>severe</u> letter (2:4, now lost) and sent it with Titus to Corinth (7:5-16).

- A <u>riot</u> in Ephesus (Acts 19:21 20:1) forced Paul to leave and go to Troas, hoping for word from Titus. Not finding him, he went on to Macedonia to look for him (2:12-13).
- To Paul's great joy, Titus met him with good news that the majority of the Christians in Corinth had repented of their rebellion against Paul (7:7-16).
- Paul wrote 2<sup>nd</sup> Corinthians from Philippi:
  - to <u>settle</u> some still smoldering attitudes that could erupt again
  - to <u>defend</u> his apostleship (chapters 1-7)
  - to exhort them to give to the poor in Jerusalem (ch 8-9)
- Paul visited them the 3<sup>rd</sup> time (12:14, 13:1-2) and received their <u>offering</u> for the poor (Rom. 15:26).

#### INTRODUCTION TO GALATIANS

- Galatia is a region in central <u>Turkey</u>.
- -Paul planted churches there during his <u>first</u> missionary journey (46 48 AD, Acts 13:4 to 14:28) in cities like lconium, Lystra and Derbe.
- Sometime before the Jerusalem Council of Acts 15 in 50 AD, Paul learned that his converts in the Galatian churches were being drawn away from the Gospel he preached by <u>Judaizers</u>.
- -Judaizers believed that besides faith in Jesus Christ, one must become a Jew and observe the old Mosaic law in order to be truly saved.
- So Paul wrote the letter to the Galatians to strongly oppose this false teaching and to bring the Christians in Galatia back to the truth of the Gospel he had preached to them.
- Paul evidently wrote Galatians about 49 AD, or he would have told them in his letter about the 50 AD <u>decision</u> the Jerusalem Council had made about this same issue.

# Galatians was written after Paul's 1st Missionary Journey AD 46-48. Acts 13:4 – 14:28



#### **OVERVIEW OF GALATIANS**

  - Paul <u>preached</u> the only true Gospel chap 1
  - Paul <u>defended</u> the Gospel chap 2
- 2. Superiority of the Gospel Chapters 3 4
  - Salvation is by faith, not works chap 3
  - Salvation gives sonship, not <u>slavery</u> chap 4
- 3. Freedom of the Gospel Chapters 5 6
  - Christ gives freedom over <u>sin</u> chap 5
  - Christ gives freedom to do good chap 6
