## Board Update: NABC Schedule of Events

In two separate actions at the Atlanta board meetings, the Board of Directors voted to eliminate the Marsha May Sternberg Women's Board A Match and the Baze Senior Knockout from the Fall NABC schedule starting in 2019. Both events have dropped below the 30 -team benchmark established by the Board years ago. Attendance has been below this level for more than four years. It is the hope of both management and the BOD that teams that might have otherwise participated in the Sternberg or Baze opt to play in the Soloway KO with the Swiss qualifying that commences in the Fall of 2019.

In another action, the Conditions of Contest for the Spring 0-10,000 Knockout have been modified, effective Jan. 1, 2019. The event will be a fixed, three-day event with half-day, 28 -board matches being played until such time as the field can play 56 boards (presumably in the final but it could occur in the semfinal with 16 teams or fewer).

## Electronic device policy

The electronic device policy at NABCs allows players to bring electronic devices such as cell phones into the playing area provided that such devices are turned off. Further, any such equipment must not be visible during the session.

A violation of the policy
will result in an automatic disciplinary penalty of one full board (or 12 IMPs at that form of scoring) for the first offense. A second offense will result in disqualification from the event

## Appealing a ruling

Players in NABC+ events who want to appeal a director's ruling initiate the process by speaking with the director who delivered the original ruling. The table director will fill out paperwork regarding the appeal, and the appellants will explain what they believe to be wrong with the initial ruling. From there, the case may be handled by a variety of means. When the appeals reviewer receives the case, the circumstances of that particular case wil determine whether the case can be resolved by the original staff (in the case of misapplication of Law or regulation, for instance), a panel of directors, or even a committee-type hearing which could include bridge experts.

## Player Memos

Player memos allow participants to file incident reports alleging inappropriate behavior by other contestants. Two player memo stations have been set up outside the playing areas on the Marquis Level and the Atrium Level for your convenience Players are encouraged to file Player Memos when appropriate.

## Membership Required

A valid ACBL player number is required to play in all events at the NABC. Along with one-year and three-year memberships, 30-day trial memberships are available to new members for $\$ 7.99$.

The Educational Foundation approved a $\$ 50,000$ grant to Betty Starzec, president of the American Bridge Teachers' Association, for a series of projects suggested by ABTA members. Among these are teacher start-up kits - sets of boards, cards, bidding boxes and travel bags - that many new teachers often find expensive. The grant will allow any teacher completing any ACBL-accredited teaching program to apply for a kit.

Other parts of the grant will provide a supplement to the existing Cooperative Advertising Program, and a revision of the ACBL Bridge Series (Bridge in the 21st Century).

Heller also revealed that Board of Trustees had decided to expand the ways in which it supports the game by promoting bridge projects in a wider variety of settings than they have previously considered.
"Our goal is to promote bridge of all sorts throughout the world. We are looking at best practices used by various groups and to partner with these organizations, whether it's the ACBL, local clubs, tournament sponsors, teacher groups or online platforms, even organizations outside of North America," said Heller.

West led the A and East encouraged the suit. West pressed on with two more rounds of diamonds, making Soulet suspect strongly that spades were divided 4-0. Soulet pitched a club from dummy, East winning the $Q$ and returning the $\mathbf{Q}$, taken by Soulet with the ace.

Backing his reading of the position, Soulet led the $\leqslant \mathrm{J}$, encouraging West to discard his last heart. Soulet pitched dummy's $\quad \mathrm{J}$ and advanced the 10 , covered by West with the jack. Soulet now crossed to the Q and finessed again in trumps This was the ending:

When the last trump was played, East - holding three hearts and the guarded K - was squeezed. If he pitched a club, declarer would cash the $\& \mathrm{~A}$, dropping the king. He could ruff a heart to his hand, which would be good. If East discarded a heart, Soulet could cash the $\mathbf{V}$ and ruff a heart. Dummy, with the as an entry, would be high.

For the record, at trick five, whether declarer leads a low trump or the $\leqslant \mathbf{J}$, West must ruff in with the 9 to defeat the game. The full deal:

## Be Scent-sitive!

Some people have an extreme sensitivity to fragrances (colognes or perfumes). Many ACBL clubs, units and districts have adopted policies that prohibit players from wearing fragrances. The ACBL has not issued an official policy on the matter, preferring instead to appeal to the goodwill of its members to refrain from using fragrances.

Because duplicate bridge requires players to be in close proximity to each other, individuals who suffer from fragrance-related reactions cannot avoid those who are wearing them. Among the commonly reported symptoms are intense headaches (indeed, fragrances can frequently be a trigger for migraine sufferers) or breathing-related problems. For these individuals, the issue is much more serious than simply disliking a particular smell - it's a real health problem.
The ACBL asks everyone to give this issue serious consideration. If you're going to play in a club or a tournament, please don't wear cologne, perfume or scented lotions.

When Hurd led the deceptive $\boldsymbol{s} \mathbf{J}$, Rogoff gave serious thought to letting it run to his king. Eventually, he decided against risking the embarrassment of going down in a laydown grand slam at trick one.

So he ruffed the club, played the $\Delta \mathrm{A}$ and $\boldsymbol{\mathrm { K }}$ and ruffed a spade high, then crossed to a top trump and ruffed the fourth spade high. That let him draw the trumps, reaching this ending:


The play of the last spade squeezed Wooldridge in hearts and clubs.

in late 1998, departing for Denver CO in 2004 to go into the real estate business.

When that proved unsatisfactory, Bress acquired a teaching license. At a job fair for teachers about seven years ago, he noticed a strong presence of recruiters from Alaska. The idea of moving again, especially to the destination he was considering, "seemed really exciting."

That led to his decision that same year to take a teaching job in McGrath AK, about 200 miles west of Fairbanks.

McGrath, an isolated community of 350 residents, sometimes features weather meant for only the hardiest of souls. Bress recalls waking up one morning after moving to McGrath to discover that the temperature outside was 55 degrees (Fahrenheit) below zero. He went online to do some research and confirmed that at that moment, he was in the coldest place on earth.

He notes that he wasn't really surprised. "I didn't really expect anything," he says, adding, "I knew things could be kind of rustic."

At the school in McGrath, Bress was the only person qualified to teach science and math, so he did double duty. "It was a lot of work," he says.

While he was there, Bress used his knowledge of bridge to teach the game to his students. He has traveled with some of them to two other Youth NABCs. Bress has also taught bridge for credit in Nome (at a community college) and in McGrath.

Later this year, he will move to the city in northern Alaska formerly known as Barrow but now officially Utqiagvik, the native Alaskan name.

Whether Bress will stay in Alaska is an unanswered question. "It's kind of year to year," he says. As for bridge, it's also iffy unless and until he moves. "If I play at all," he says, "it's all online."

## In Tuesday's Daily

 Bulletin, an upset was reported in the first round of the Spingold. The Yiting (\#42) team was beaten in the four-way matches by Kolesnik (\#68), composed of Kelley Hwang and five talented Juniors: Finn Kolesnik, Jacob Freeman, Daniel Sonner, Bo Han Zhu and John Dong. Finn, the youngest of the squad at 14 , is the son of Alex Kolesnik, captain of the \#51 team. But I digress.

Flashback to the Riverside CA regional in 2015. I was playing with Mark Leonard and our teammates were Aaron Jones and Rick Roeder. Going into the fifth match, we were leading the event and playing one of the better local teams. Mark and I have a fair set, but a few soft results. Aaron and Rick were waiting in the hallway to compare and after scoreup, I was a bit dejected to hear that we had lost by 22 and were likely out of the event. Rick then flashed his trademark smile and laughed, reached into his back pocket and said, "OK, let's score it up using the REAL card." After going over the real scores, we instead won by 40 .

Some of you may have heard of the "fake card." In a team match, after having a very good set, certain comedians will prepare an alternate set of scores. For example, if you made $4 \stackrel{\rightharpoonup}{ }$ when your opponent could have made 4a, you would give the enemy the making game.

## Youth NABC starts today <br> On the 10th

 anniversary of the first Youth NABC, the 11th edition of the popular tournament kicks off this morning with expectations of a record turnout. Stephanie Threlkeld, manager of the ACBL's EducationPatty Tucker Department, under which the tournament operates, said that as of Aug. 1,240 players were pre-registered. If all of them show up, the tournament will top last year's record attendance figure of 237, recorded in Toronto.

Each participant in the Youth NABC must be 19 years old or younger and have fewer than 5000 masterpoints. The three-day tournament, which debuted in 2008, was organized by Patty Tucker, founder of Atlanta Junior Bridge and a strong advocate of involving young players in her favorite game. Tucker persevered with her dream tournament despite predictions that the Youth NABC would never work. She has been involved directly or peripherally since the first YNABC took place. "It's Patty's baby," said Threlkeld, "and it's grown."

Threlkeld said the pre-registered players are from five countries: Bermuda (16 players), Canada (21), China (23), Mexico (8) and the United States (172).

Players must be ACBL members. Nonmembers can join for $\$ 5$ at registration. There is no charge for participants. All play is on the Atrium level of the hotel in Room A707.

Each player receives a T shirt and a book bag, and there is lunch every day. The closing reception, which includes drawings for prizes, is scheduled for Saturday at 5:30 p.m.

Scholarships will be awarded to the winners of the Baron Barclay National Youth Open Pairs ( $\$ 1,000$ each) and to the winners of the National Youth Swiss Teams ( $\$ 4,000$ total). Each Youth NABC gives participants a chance to vote for the player who best exemplifies the ideals of sportsmanship and fair play (tournament directors

also have votes). The winner receives the Master Point Press Sportsmanship Award of $\$ 1,000$.

Threlkeld has been ably assisted in preparing for the Youth NABC by Education Coordinator Shaneka Cunningham. "There are a lot of moving parts to this," she said. "Shaneka is super organized and does a great job making sure all we need is here."

The tournament, she added, has gained momentum, aided in part by the ACBL's provision of material supporting about 4,000 young players in school bridge programs across North America. "There are some really strong programs," she said. Commenting on the growth of the Youth NABC, Tucker recalled the famous line from the Kevin Costner baseball film "Field of Dreams": "If you build it, they will come." The young players, she said, "want the same things we want: Good competition, mental stimulation, the chance to travel and make new friends and see old ones. Forty years from now, I hope they'll be the same way I am."

## Please be scent-sitive!

Some people have an extreme sensitivity to fragrances (colognes or perfumes). Many ACBL clubs, units and districts have adopted policies that prohibit players from wearing fragrances. The ACBL has not issued an official policy on the matter, preferring instead to appeal to the goodwill of its members to refrain from using fragrances.

Because duplicate bridge requires players to be in close proximity to each other, individuals who suffer from fragrance-related reactions cannot avoid those who are wearing them. Among the commonly reported symptoms are intense headaches (indeed, fragrances can frequently be a trigger for migraine sufferers) or breathing-related problems. For these individuals, the issue is much more serious than simply disliking a particular smell - it's a real health problem.

Please, if you're going to play in a club or a tournament, don't wear cologne, perfume or scented lotions.

# Spingold Round of 64: Shen vs. Fireman 

This match pitted the No. 22 seed Shen (Yuxiong Shen, Zijian Shao, Bin Shi, Dawei Chen, Jack Zhao) against the No. 43 seed Fireman (Phyllis Fireman, Jenny Wolpert, Marion Michielsen, Ola Rimstedt, Mikael Rimstedt, Per-Ola Cullin).

Shen started the thrid quarter with a small but comforting lead (53-37). By the time the quarter ended, their lead dropped a little, only plus 9 , when Fireman got the better of the third quarter (Fireman 35 , Shen 28 ).

These two boards were the only double-digit swings of the third quarter.

You hold:

With your side vulnerable, your right-hand opponent deals and opens $1 \uparrow$ (Precision). Do you overcall 2e? Over an amorphous opening, it's good to take away their space, but RHO is more likely to have club length than after a standard $1 \star$ opening.

Michielsen did, and found herself doubled.

Zhao's double was for takeout, left in by Shen. When dummy graced the baize, it was a disappointment. There were 17 HCP between the North-South hands, and no eight-card fits.

The defense started with K and another, ruffed by East. Then West got in with the A to play another heart for East to ruff. Top tricks in spades and diamonds were taken, to leave South with just 5 \& tricks, going for 800 .

In the other room, East, Mikael Rimstedt, opened 1* (showing two or more clubs), and South, Chen, was silent throughout. East-West contracted 2NT from the East seat, with their combined 23 count. The contract was made, and Fireman lost 12 IMPs on the board.

Those 12 IMPs came back almost immediately a few boards later. This time, Michielsen's overcall steered the opponents into a non-making $5 \boldsymbol{*}$, after Cullin, sitting North, dutifully led the $\boldsymbol{\$} 10$.

At the other table, Ola Rimstedt treated the West hand as balanced and played in 4 after a transfer auction. Chen, South, had been able to double $3 \boldsymbol{v}$ for the lead, but with spades $3-3$, the contract could not be beaten.

In the fourth quarter, Fireman triumphed, gaining on 10 of the 16 boards. Most were small gains, but these two deals helped them to snatch victory for their team, eventually winning by 125-88.

Zhao led the $\uparrow$, the suit his partner bid. Setting up a side suit for the defense before declarer can set up her long club suit seemed eminently sensible. Was there any reason to lead the A? Only one small hint: Partner, first in hand, did not preempt, suggesting either a poor suit - unlikely - or a side four-card major (spades in this case). If Zhao can read partner for 4-7 in the pointed suits, he might be inspired to start with A. But if it turned out wrong, he would bury himself under a blanket in the postmortem event in the heat of Atlanta.

The slam made 12 tricks.
In the other room, things took a different turn:

Michielsen-Cullin bid uncontested to 4a from the North seat. East led the 6 . The vugraph commentators were predicting that Zhao might overcall $1 \boldsymbol{\vee}$ after Michielson's $1 *$ opening, but that was not to be.

The contract, on modest values, went two down.
In the other room, Ola Rimstedt did overcall with the West hand. This helped Mikael Rimstedt to express an opinion with a red card later in the auction. Double dummy, the contract is booked for two down, minus 300. But something else happened, and Mikael Rimstedt crafted a winner with his 9 .

Here's how the play went: Mikael led the $\mathbf{\Psi}$ K, not best in theory. Declarer won in hand with the A and led a trump to dummy's king then a diamond towards the king in hand. West rose with the $\uparrow A$, continued with the $\mathbf{V}$, and played a third round which was ruffed high by Shao, East discarding the 7. Declarer played another trump and Mikael took his ace and exited with the 6 . At this point, declarer has nine tricks by winning the ace and drawing the last trump, and can take a club guess for his contract. But he tried finessing dummy's queen. West won and persevered with hearts, ruffed with the 10 (leaving declarer with no spades in hand higher than East's 49).

Declarer, in hand for the last time, cashed the $\varangle \mathrm{K}$
then tried to minimize his losses by taking a second club finesse. If it worked, he could then draw West's outstanding trump and escape for one down.

Since the J was, in fact, with West, this meant the contract went three down on a club ruff, for minus 500. This time, 9 IMPs to the Fireman team.

Would Ola have overcalled $1 \vee$ and then bid 3 with just a poor heart suit headed by the V , the - A, and the $\boldsymbol{4}$ ? Perhaps not. Would Mikael double without the K ? Hard to work it out.

Kovachev led the Q , ducked in dummy. Rosenbaum made the inspired play to rise with the A so that she could immediately fire back the $\mathbf{~} \mathbf{J}$. The queen was covered with the king, and the $\mathbf{\varphi} 2$ return went to the 10 and ace.

Shireson then played a low spade to dummy's king, discovering the 6-0 break when North discarded a low heart. Next came the $\checkmark \mathrm{K}$ and a low spade to the ace in the closed hand, North parting with another low heart. Figuring that North was $0=6=4=3$, declarer tried the $\$ 10$ next, effectively pinning the 9 in the South hand if North covered But when North ducked, declarer let it ride. This was the position with West on lead:

When a spade was played to the queen, Kovachev was forced to part with a heart, but his choice of the $\mathbf{~}$ proved to be costly when Shireson then cashed the Q and the K before exiting with a club. North could cash a club and a heart, but was forced to play a diamond to declarer's otherwise stranded ace at trick 13. Had Kovachev pitched the -9 earlier, he would have been able to safely exit with the $\mathbf{v}$ to South's 8 to avoid the endplay.

Marjorie Michelin was steered into the Daily Bulletin by her husband, Ellis Feigenbaum, to report that she's surpassed the 20,000-MP mark. Marjorie, of Laguna Woods CA, is a teacher, and is known as "the secret partnership desk" for her bridge matchmaking prowess. She has arranged 22 partnerships for the Atlanta NABC, "many of which are doing better than we are!" Marjorie topped 20,000 playing in the $\mathrm{A} / \mathrm{X}$ Swiss with Steve Cohen, Pam Wittes and Ed Piken. She and Ellis won the Educational Foundation Knockouts that opened the NABC.

Ed White of Grand
 Blanc MI topped 15,000 masterpoints in Atlanta. A Platinum LM, White had a second-place finish in the 2013 Truscott/USPC Senior Swiss Teams.

GS Jade Barrett of Elk Point SD eaned his 30,000th masterpoint playing in the Daylight A/X/Y Swiss Teams on Tuesday in Atlanta with partner Dr. Donna Lombardini.

Barrett, who has been a full-time player, organizer and teacher, says, "I love the game. I'm the guy who goes out and plays everyday, and I'll play in anything from club games to world championships. I enjoy being a mentor to players who want to improve, and I feel like I'm skilled at taking those players and turning them into competitors."

## Use of the bidding box Alerts and Announcements

When using bidding boxes, the ACBL requires that players tap the Alert strip and say "Alert" at the same time.

When making an Announcement, use the Announcement word (such as "transfer") and tap the Alert strip at the same time. A player who Alerts or Announces a bid must make sure his opponents are aware that an Alert or Announcement has been made.

The No. 26 seed Rosenberg (Kevin Rosenberg, Ben Kristensen, Michael Rosenberg, Roger Lee) faced the No. 39 seed "Indonesia Men" (Henky Lasut, Eddy Manoppo, Agus Kustrijanto, Sie Santoso, Ronny Eltanto, Youberth Sumarauw).

The action started with both tables playing a thin $4 \vee$ contract.

Michael Rosenberg upgraded his hand slightly into a $14+$ to 171 NT opening. 2 NT was puppet Stayman, finding the heart fit. Manoppo led the $\leqslant$ and switched to the 10 . Rosenberg won that, cashed the A dropping Lasut's $\mathbf{1}$, then the Q before leading the $\downarrow$ J. When South played low, declarer realised he couldn't make with hearts $4-1$, so he rose with dummy's king hoping to drop the queen, ending two off.

Eltanto and Sumarauw use transfer responses to their 10 opening. East jumped to show four hearts, and West chose to bid game. Kevin Rosenberg led a spade at trick one. Declarer cashed his spade honors in hand, crossed to the $\uparrow \mathrm{K}$, and discarded a diamond on the $A$. Then, rather than discard his remaining diamond loser, he chose to run the 10 . Rosenberg didn't like that, since he had no exit cards. He tried the effect of winning the ace, deceptively, cashing the A , then leading a low club. Declarer had little choice but to run that to hand. Then he ruffed a club and crossed to the A . When North discarded, declarer must have been pleasantly surprised to find he could cash the $\boldsymbol{*} \mathrm{K}$ and ruff his fifth club, making 10 tricks and gaining 11 IMPs.

Winning the A was an interesting shot, but South would then have done better to switch to a trump after taking the A . This defense might have made declarer suspicious, but the winning play of running clubs through South would have been very tough to find.

Michael Rosenberg chose to make a semiforcing 1NT response, then showed an invitational hand with three spades. Lee, of course, accepted the invitation, playing 4 on the lead of the 9 . This is
an easy contract looking at all the cards - the reader might enjoy working out how to make 12 tricks at double dummy - but much harder at the table. Declarer put in dummy's 10 at trick one and beat South's queen with the king. If he'd guessed to ruff diamonds in dummy, he would probably have made 11, but on a different lie that might have run into a red-suit cross-ruff. Meanwhile, there were 10 sure tricks by drawing two rounds of trumps whenever they split 3-2, so declarer tried that. When South discarded a club on the second spade, declarer tried his best shot of finessing in diamonds, intending to take a diamond ruff if the jack held. But North won the queen and cashed his spades and the A, after which declarer played a squeeze in the red suits to salvage one off.

Eltanto responded 2NT showing an invitational hand with spade support, and the same contract was reached. This time North led the A. Whether or not South's card here is suit-preference - he knows North is switching, but North doesn't know he knows - South had no clear preference to give and played the 6 . North guessed to switch to a diamond, which declarer won with the 9 . Now declarer knew he had at most one more side-suit loser, so he tried the safety play of the $\$ \mathrm{~A}$ and another trump, catering to four trumps with South. North won and surprisingly switched to a heart to the jack, queen and king. Declarer crossed to the $A$ and ruffed a club to hand, planning to ruff his diamond. North was able to overruff and take out dummy's trump, but now the red-suit squeeze was for the 10th trick and a 12-IMP gain.

At the end of the first set, Indonesia led 36 IMPs to 15 . The rest of the match was closely contested, Indonesia holding their lead at the end to win by 16 IMPs.

## **International Fund

In NABC+ events, $\$ 1.50$ (per person, per session) of each entry fee will be allocated to the ACBL International Fund. These funds are used to underwrite part of the expenses of ACBL players who participate in international competition.

## Convention card reminder

Each player is required to have a convention card filled out legibly and on the table throughout a session. The convention card must include the first and last name of each member of the partnership, and the cards must be identical.

If a director determines that neither player has a substantially completed card, the partnership may play only the Standard American Yellow Card and may use only standard carding. This restriction may be lifted only at the beginning of a subsequent round after convention cards have been properly prepared and approved by the director. Further, the partnership will receive a $1 / 6$-board matchpoint
penalty for each board played, commencing with the next round and continuing until the restriction is lifted. In IMP team games, penalties shall be at the discretion of the director.

If the director determines the partnership has at least one substantially completed convention card but has not fully complied with ACBL regulations, the director may give warnings or assign such penalties as he deems to be appropriate under the circumstances.

The objective of these warnings and penalties is the encouragement of full compliance with ACBL regulations.

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## Slow Play

Slow play, especially habitual slow play, is a violation of law and subject to penalty. When a pair has fallen behind it is incumbent on them to make up the time lost as quickly as possible whether at fault or not. All players are expected to make a concerted effort to catch up when they have fallen behind, regardless of the reason for their lateness.

In the absence of compelling evidence to the contrary, the director should presume that a pair finishing a round late by more than two or three minutes on more than one occasion during a session is responsible for the lateness. There is a strong expectation that the director will penalize such a pair. The size of a penalty will tend to increase for
subsequent instances of slow play and for chronic or egregious slow play.

While warnings typically will be given before a penalty is assessed, failure to do so in no way limits the director's authority to issue a penalty.

Players are expected to be aware, in a general sense, of time used and remaining in a segment in which they are playing regardless of whether a clock is in use or a time announcement has been made. An excuse of "no announcement" or "no clock immediately visible" will not be considered persuasive.

In consultation with the DIC of the tournament, the TD may require that a particular pair not play in a specified segment, not play against a specified pair or not play together as a pair. The foregoing is expected to be applied only due to egregious circumstances or to unduly repetitious offenders.

An appeal of an action taken by a TD with regard
to time may be taken to the Director in Charge of the tournament, and no further. For NABC+ KO events, the TD is charged with the responsibility to ensure that each KO match segment finishes within the allotted time. While a time monitor may be employed, the lack of a monitor in no way limits the TD's authority to apply one or more of the remedies listed below.

The TD may choose to ignore an occasional minor late finish. The TD may remove one or more boards from a segment. The TD may award no score (when neither team is more at fault), an assigned score (when a result already exists at one table which the TD wishes to preserve) or an artificial score in IMPs. Every effort should be made to remove boards before they can be played at either table, but not having done so does not preclude removing one or more later.
