### Program Preview: From Ann Wall

Nothing new to report but I am working on a couple programs for 2015. Hope to have them finalized for you next month.

**FEBRUARY 2015**. **Lola McCracken** will be sharing her knowledge of Molas with us and will bring her collection that she has brought back from Panama where she has a residence. Molas are handcrafted, decorative reverse appliqués made by the Kuna Indigenous peoples in the San Blas Islands of Panama. Molas appear in museums around the world, including the Smithsonian. American Quilter magazine published an article Lola wrote in their Fall 2007 issue of AQS. Lola will also bring the wall hanging she created using Molas. Members will have an opportunity to make a reverse appliqué design. **Bring with you embroidery scissors, thread and needles if you want to try your hand at a simple reverse appliqué.** Some of the "Nimble Thimbles" Bee members will be teaching a mini-class.



Volunteers for the positions should contact her; voting will take place in May, and the member will start their duties in June 2015. Gifts of appreciation for the current members were handed out to those members present.
- December's program was given by **Bev Toole** on applying a **double-sided binding.** Kits were available and she walked us through the assembly. She had several examples of the technique that she has applied to both quilts and garments.

March's program will be a community service session with **Dominique Bell.**

## From Pam Traynham GIRL SCOUT PROJECT "SQUARES & BEARS" Sewing For Children Event



We had 17 sewing mentors, several parent volunteers and over 70 Girl Scouts at the Squares

and Bears, Sewing for Children event.
The scouts were divided into 2 sessions.
Each mentor worked with 1-2 scouts at a time.

The younger scouts learned to use a sewing machine, to sew straight lines, to press and topstitch. The older scouts learned trace a pattern, to sew and clip curves and to stuff bears.

We made 300 squares and 22 Bears.
One of the doctors from CHKD came to personally pick up the items. She also shared that each new mom is given 7 of the squares, one for each day. The special care units are able to care for 70 babies at a time. At any given time, 490 of these squares are in use and the hospital can go through a few thousand in a year. The 300 made in this session.

Thank you to all TQG members and friends who have donated their time and talents to our efforts. We don't often get to see the results of our donated time, but this project is already showing results. These girls are eager to learn. Looking at the big picture - The sessions fill up and there is always a waiting list to participate. As a direct result of this activity, there are plans being made

for a sewing group to carry on the learning throughout the year.

This was shared with me by one of our members. A scout who participated in the last event learned to sew the squares. Shortly after the event, her n eighbor gave birth prematurely. There were no squares available for this mom and baby. This scout knew exactly what to do. She made a set of squares herself using the information she learned at the event.

Children are pulled in many directions these days, but if we can teach them to sew they will have a skill to last a lifetime. We are indeed touching lives and influencing the next generation and the future members of our guild.

#### **Purple Heart Quilts**

Recently, we received a letter from the mother of young Navy man who was given one of our Purple Heart quilts as he fought for his life in the ICU at LRMC in Germany last month. He had contracted a deadly strain of malaria while on duty "in Africa". His parents had rushed to his side as he was not expected to live.

As soon as they arrived, a nurse brought in a quilt made by Mary Lynn Slough and her sister, Nancy Wines. His dad used it for the next three days and nights at his son's bedside while the incredible staff worked tirelessly to save the young man's life, pulling him back from death's door. From Germany, he was sent to Walter Reed, and then home to the mid-west where he continues to recover.

His mother wanted us all to know how much they appreciated the quilt and the work we do to ease the stress and pain of the sick and wounded and their families, and to tell us how much they and their son treasure the quilt, not just for the memory of the comfort it gave during his crisis, but for all that it represented -- a tangible symbol of unconditional love. It is a lovely, thoughtful letter, the kind that is proof that what we do is worthwhile, and also a reminder that the men and

women who put themselves between us and harm's way must contend not only with bombs and bullets,

but deadly diseases as well. We're grateful to and for them, and for the letter! You may have noticed the heading and reference to "Purple Heart Quilts". When we started making guilts for our wounded over 12 years ago, that's what we called the project. Later, when Quilts of Valor Foundation was formed, we aligned ourselves with Catherine Roberts' mission -- to provide guilts for the wounded of this war so that what happened to the Viet-Nam Vets never happens again. Since Catherine retired, there have been many changes in the way the Foundation operates. Recent changes now required of participants, which primarily have to do with mandatory funding, management of funds, and autonomy, have caused us to reconsider our alignment with the Foundation. We still consider it to be a worthy organization with an admirable mission, but believe we can continue our work on our own. To that end, we are reverting to our original name. Only the name has changed, not our mission to comfort the wounded of this war and, whenever possible, our veterans of earlier conflicts.

And just to let you know, all those little block kits you all have been taking home, making and returning are already being made into quilts! Seven, so far, and counting! They shortly will be added to six more waiting to be quilted. Currently, we have six already in the hands of our wonderful long arm quilters! Not bad, Ladies! We're not yet back up to our old average of 15 quilts a month, but we're on our way! Thank you for your continued support. You are doing your best work!
