

















Introduction

This guide was compiled to help educators select grade-appropriate nonfiction and biographies to use across the curriculum. The guide has two parts:

- An annotated bibliography organizing titles by historical period and providing links to activities and lessons; and
- An appendix with a table of books by grade levels, curriculum levels and formats (hardcover, paperback, e-book).

This document includes diverse children's and young adult books that center African American heritage, heroes and culture. The titles span more than 400 years of African American history--from slavery, segregation and civil rights to the 21st century. The listed books sometimes blend the genres of poetry, nonfiction, biography and historical fiction.

The award-winning author of more than 50 books for children and young adults, I am a professor of English at Fayetteville State University in North Carolina. In addition to training future and current educators and writing children's books, I coach other creatives. I often collaborate and tour with my son, award-winning illustrator Jeffery Weatherford.


