She has also served as Chief Reader for NAEP, and as an ETS Test Development Committee member and as a table leader for Pacesetter Culminating Assessments. SpringBoard® is intentionally designed to provide college and career readiness for ALL students. The 2014© Edition of SpringBoard was designed from the start to meet the needs of the Common Core State Standards. Built on current research on best instructional practices and pedagogy, SpringBoard is designed to make the rigor of the Common Core accessible to all students.

SpringBoard is a highly integrated program of reading, writing, speaking and listening that aims to address the whole child as he builds toward mastery of complex literacy skills. Text centered learning is sequenced, scaffolded and supported to advance students toward independent reading of complex texts. The close reading of texts also prepares SpringBoard students for continuous practice in evidence based writing. The design of SpringBoard rests on the research-based work of Grant Wiggins and Jay McTighe in Understanding by Design, an approach that "begins with the end in mind," creating standards based authentic assessments, and then creating the learning activities that deliberately and carefully scaffold learning to ensure student mastery of the skills and knowledge detailed in the grade level ELA CCSS. Each grade level of SpringBoard is divided into thematically focused instructional units organized around a pair of Embedded Assessments that represent targeted assessments of grade level skills and knowledge. Successful completion of these standards based, performance



assessments is supported by purposefully designed scaffolded activities that provide students with engaging and targeted learning they will need to be successful on the assessments. In addition, every unit contains multiple and varied modes of formative and summative assessment opportunities – from multiple choice Unit Assessments accessed online, to formative Writing Prompts, Check for Understanding assignments, and Key Ideas and Details questions that ask students to demonstrate evidence of understanding of texts and the independent ability to apply new learning. This emphasis on scaffolded instruction and formative assessment allows teachers and students to monitor learning and also facilitates differentiation both to support and extend learning. Digital Student Edition

The SpringBoard digital student edition is an interactive online program that provides all content online. SpringBoard's digital program uses responsive web design to discern the device being used and adjusts content to fit screens—from desktops to laptops to tablets. The Springboard digital student edition provides engaging tools such as text marking (highlight, underline, circle, and so on), a digital notebook that notes and tracks text interactions, and uploading of student papers. The glossary is



available in English and Spanish. In the Student Editions, students see Learning Targets for each activity – these are the Common Core standards in student-friendly language.

Digital Teacher Edition

The SpringBoard digital teacher edition is an interactive online program that provides all teacher and student content. The teacher edition is highly customizable, allowing teachers to edit lesson plans and personalize by adding their own notes, links, and comments about lessons or notes to a substitute teacher. The SpringBoard digital teacher edition includes online student and teacher resources such as graphic organizers, blackline masters, mini-lessons, and other content to support instruction and intervention. The Teacher's Edition is organized according to the same model as the AP redesign; using the Plan, Teach, Assess, Adapt instructional cycle.

SpringBoard ELA, Grades 6, 7 and 8, our middle school instructional program, consists of four instructional units, each of which has a suggested pacing guide detailing a six to eight week instructional pathway. Individual activities take anywhere from one 50 minute class period to three 50 minute class periods and can be easily adapted to different class time configurations. Detailed teacher guides help facilitate an efficient use of instructional time. This schedule fits well within a school calendar giving sufficient time to add to or alter a pacing schedule. SpringBoard ELA, Grades 9 – 12, the high school instructional program, consists of five instructional units, to accommodate a high school calendar of 180 days or less. Each unit of instruction has a suggested pacing guide to help teachers progress through the units in a timely fashion. Units take approximately five to seven weeks of instructional time. In both middle school and high school programs, the instructional sequence and



activities can be adapted to meet the demands of an individual school or district schedule.
