Program Notes

Russian Sailors' Dance

The Russian Sailors' Dance is the best known excerpt from Glière's landmark ballet, *The Red Poppy* (1926-1927). The scene depicts an uprising on a Chinese ship and the successful intervention of the Russian Sailors. This energetic dance music is based upon Yablochka (Little Angel), a popular Russian Folk Tune, and is very dramatic. It opens with a short introduction of rapid music, followed by a slow, declarative theme in minor. This then leads to a series of variations and a dramatic coda.

Sussex Mummer's Christmas Carol

Performances of folk plays by Mummer have a strong history and presence in the region of Sussex, England, even today. The word "Mummer" is derived from the Greek Word Mommo, meaning a mask. The wearing of masks became fashionable in the 14th century court, with the eventual migration to all night revelers wearing them to protect their identity. Masks were also common in the plays. The plays would end with the singing of songs, most popularly a carol. The Christmas Carol was often associated with a performance of "St. George, the Turk, and the Seven Champions of Christendom." The people of the day were not bothered by the incongruity of the solemnity of the carol juxtaposed against the costumes of colored calico, chimney pot hats trimmed with shreds of ribbons, and wooden swords. In 1880-1881, Miss Lucy E. Broadwood captured words and music from several variations of the carol, which were aggregated into the following first two verses:

When righteous Joseph wedded was Unto a virtuous [virgin] maid A glorious angel from Heaven came Unto that virtuous [virgin] maid.

O mortal man, remember well When Christ our Lord was born; 'Twas for our sins and wicked ways And crowned with the thorn.

L'Arlesienne Suite No. 1, I. Allegro Deciso

Georges Bizet

The incidental music to Alphonse Daudet's play *L'Arlésienne* (The Girl from Arles) was composed in 1872. The play was a failure with critics complaining that there were "too many overtures". In other words, Bizet's music overpowered the drama. Fortunately, Bizet rescued some of the best music, and from it, Bizet assembled two suites. In the Prelude of *L'Arlésienne Suite No.* 1., Bizet borrows "The March of the Kings" from the French Christmas Carol and offers it in several ways: the strings, woodwinds and horns open with a vigorous rendition; then the woodwinds alone play it as a quiet chorale. The full orchestra with percussion and brass follow, presenting the melody as a storm at sea, with rising and falling dynamics and a rolling chromatic underpinning. Cello, horn and bassoon then offer the theme with gently loping rhythms, and the final variant is a return to the full orchestra with military flourish.

Shenandoah Daniel Walter

A Traditional American Folk Song whose origin and meaning are lost in the mist of the river, "Shenandoah" was likely first a sea shanty, and then was taken up by riverboat crews. American Folklorist Alan Lomax suggested that "Shenandoah's" composers were French Canadian Voyagers and that perhaps they used the song to coordinate the rowing of their huge canoes. The word 'Shenandoah' is part of a puzzle. It may refer to a Native American Tribal Chief of that name or to the Shenandoah River Valley in Virginia. The singer longs for a faraway home in the Shenandoah Valley in the same way that a suitor asks for the hand of Chief Shenandoah's daughter, whom he wishes to carry away across the water. In yet another interpretation, the singer is an indentured servant longing to return to his sweetheart in the Shenandoah Valley, but unable to because he is "bound away cross the wide Missouri" by the "seven long years," the typical seven year term of indenture during colonial days.

Finlandia Jean Sibelius

By around 1900, after nearly a century of Russian rule, nationalism had become a strong force in Finland and the resentment of Russian overlords was strong. Russia forced conscription of Finnish youth into its military and censored the Finnish press. Today, Finland refers to this period as the "years of passive resistance". During this politically charged environment, Sibelius composed *Finlandia* in 1899 as one of six *Scènes Historiques* ("Historic Scenes" or "Tableaux from the Past"). Raw emotionalism dominates this music. Sibelius's decisive musical gestures contribute greatly to *Finlandia*'s dramatic impact. From the threatening low brass chords that open, through the rich hymn introduced by woodwinds and taken up by the strings, to the triumphant finale, *Finlandia* grabs both your heart and soul, compelling the listener with its crisp fanfares and convincing musical rhetoric.

lan Schwindt is in his fourteenth year of teaching instrumental music at Titusville High School. During his tenure, the program has doubled in size and significantly expanded its musical offerings including a full orchestra, AP music theory, and an active chamber ensemble program. Mr. Schwindt is currently in his third year as conductor of the Brevard Symphony Youth Orchestra. He currently serves in several leadership positions including Department Chair of Fine Arts at Titusville High School, Brevard County Music Leadership Team and the Brevard County Music Advisory Board. He was elected to serve two terms as FBA District Chairman, is currently serving as the FBA All-State Chairman and is on the FMEA Convention Board, Mr. Schwindt remains active as a clinician and adjudicator for both FBA and FOA across the state. He regularly conducts many select ensembles including The Florida State University Summer Music Camps and All-County



groups statewide. He is still active as a freelance trombone player throughout the Central Florida area. His awards include being named a FMEA Emerging Leader, a National Band Asso-

ciation Citation for Excellence, the First Annual FBA Tom Bishop Award, and Titusville High School's Teacher of the Year. His professional affiliations include FMEA, FBA, FOA and Phi Beta Mu. **Jennifer Zahn** is in her eleventh year of teaching instrumental music at

Titusville High School. During her tenure, the orchestra program has tripled in size and has expanded its musical offerings by creating a chamber orchestra of



the most elite string players. Ms. Zahn remains active with conducting the concert bands and marching band in addition to conducting the THS Spring Musical each year. During her teaching career, Ms. Zahn has held numerous leadership positions including two terms as the FOA District Chairman, and is currently serving as the FBA District Chairman, on the Brevard County Music Leadership Team, and on the School Advisory Council at Titusville High School. She has also been named a FMEA Emerging Leader, as well as receiving a National Band Association Citation for her work with the Titusville Wind Orchestra. She remains active through her private lesson studio as well as serving as a clinician for both orchestras and bands throughout the Central Florida area. Ms. Zahn continues to play professionally on both the clarinet and the violin while remaining an active member of FMEA, FOA and FBA.

Marcey Sperr is in her eleventh year of teaching and her sixth with Brevard County Public Schools. She is the Itinerant Strings Teacher for the Titusville High School feeder chain, where she serves five different schools. Mrs. Sperr is a cellist and bassoonist who graduated from The University of South Florida and she was one of the Inaugural Drum Majors for the Herd of Thunder Marching Band. She began her teaching career in Hillsborough County as an Elementary Music Specialist. She taught High School Band in Connecticut Public Schools for four years and taught cello through the Community Music School in Essex, CT. In



addition to her work with Brevard Public Schools, Mrs. Sperr teaches privately and is very active with her church worship team. She grew up in the Brevard County School System

and is proud to be serving in the Titusville schools. She lives in Titusville with her husband, a fellow Brevard Music Teacher, and their two children, Aiden and Ava.

Jim Matthews has been teaching at Andrew Jackson Middle School in Titusville for the past twenty-eight years. He authored <u>The Achievement System</u>, published by Alfred Publishing Co., Inc. and created the teaching website: www.effectivemusicteaching.com which is a resource of materials for music directors. Mr. Matthews mentors band directors.

Titusville High School Music Program

Every successful music program is dependent upon the quality of and commitment to music in the younger schools that feed into that said program. Titusville High School is no exception to this and is fortunate to have Apollo, Coquina, and Imperial Estates Elementary Schools feeding directly into Andrew Jackson Middle School, which in turn is a direct feeder into Titusville High School. In the elementary schools, all students, Kindergarten through Sixth Grade, have a general music class at least once a week. Elementary students begin orchestra in the Fifth Grade with the support of the Brevard County Strings Consultant Program. During their two years at Andrew Jackson, students may choose from three orchestra, three chorus and five band classes.

Titusville High School has an enrollment of approximately 1255 students that utilize the block scheduling format. This allows students to enroll in four classes in the fall semester and four classes in the spring semester. The music department boasts three music teachers and an itinerant strings consultant who conduct three concert choruses, three concert orchestras, three concert bands, one jazz band, and a multitude of smaller ensembles. The Titusville Music Department also offers an AP Music Theory course and produces a full musical each Spring. In 2004, Titusville High School was named a Music Demonstration School by the State of Florida Department of Education, which was renewed again in 2007.





The Titusville High School Symphony Orchestra is under the combined direction of Jennifer Zahn and Ian Schwindt, with Strings Consultant Marcey Sperr. This 79 member ensemble has consistently performed at the highest levels for both District and State Music Performance Assessments, as well as for the many other concerts they perform. Multiple smaller ensembles make up the Symphony Orchestra, including the THS Jazz Band, String Orchestra, and Pit Orchestra, along with various other chamber groups. All of these smaller groups maintain an active performance schedule, in addition to supporting various community events. All members of the Symphony Orchestra also perform at their respective Solo and Ensemble MPA each year.


