## Tombstone's Copper Queen Clinic to Open Soon

It took three years to finally strike a deal, but Duff Chambers of Healthy Tombstone and Mayor Dusty Escapule are happy to announce that our new Copper Queen Community Hospital -- Tombstone Primary Care Clinic is close to being a reality. CQCH people were moving in medical office furniture and fittings this week, everything you need for a very well-equipped rural health facility. The new Clinic is right next to the Fire Station, just a little past Camino San Rafael Road on the left side of the highway as you are going south out of town.

The Clinic will open with an expert staff of highly experienced professionals, like Dr. Erik Arellano, MD. "We're well-trained to deal with just about everything that comes along," he says. "We can do minor surgeries, dermatology, sports

medicine, and even psychiatric care." Dr. Arellano is experienced in women's care and obstetrics, and hormone replacement for men and women. He is also skilled in molecular biology, cell culture, polymerase chain reaction (PCR), flow cytometry, and life sciences. Dr. Erik is a strong healthcare services professional with a Doctor of Medicine (MD) degree from

the University of Colorado Anschutz Medical Campus. It was National Nurses Day this week, the perfect time for Shannon Manning, the new Clinic Manager, to introduce Laura Lane, RN, Copper Queen's CNO Chief Nursing Officer, who handles all outpatient services. "You're getting really good people," said Laura. "Duff and Dusty really went after us for a full

service clinic." Shannon nods in agreement. "Come over here," she says. "Meet Jennifer Chambliss, FNP, ENP, your new Nurse Practitioner who has a Masters degree in Nursing. She's dual-certified in Family Practice and Emergency Trauma -- like car crashes, heart attacks, and strokes. And basic medicine -- she'll keep you alive in an emergency... and your 24/7

Fire Department is right next door to help."

Shannon continues. "And this is Paula Smith, CQCH's Laboratory Manager. Once we are up and running, she'll make sure the lab samples we draw and collect here are rapidly analyzed for Dr. Arellano and Nurse Practitioner Chambliss. Paula also has a Masters degree, and is licensed

by the American Society of Clinical Pathologists."

"Covid-19 testing?" says Smith. "Yes, you'll have that here. Copper Queen is working very hard right now with the University of Arizona to come up with the protocols for accurate, dependable lab results. And you'll be served here in Tombstone every bit as fast as people at our other Primary Care Clinics -- and at our main hospital in Bisbee."

When will the new CQCH clinic open? "As soon as possible," says Clinic Manager Manning. "Because of the virus, our various licensing applications are taking a little longer to approve. But we will be open soon... and we'll make sure to invite everyone around town for a Grand Opening party."

"I am really looking forward to the clinic opening and serving the Citizens of Tombstone," said Mayor Escapule.

## Governor Ducey Issues Updated Guidance For Restaurants, Coffee Shops, Barbers And Cosmetologists

Following continued positive data trends, Governor Doug Ducey announced the next steps Arizona will take to gradually reenergize the economy. The Governor issued an Executive Order allowing cosmetologists and barber shops to resume appointment-based services Friday, May 8 and restaurants and coffee shops to resume dine-in services with physical distancing measures on Monday, May 11. The Governor's Office also released additional guidelines to keep customers and employees safe.

In addition, the Governor issued an Executive Order

requiring expanded reporting of COVID-19 related information to residents of long-term care facilities, as well as their next of kin and guardians and prospective residents.

"Arizona continues to focus on protecting public health, supporting those in need and ensuring we're taking the necessary steps to return stronger," said Governor Ducey. "Our efforts to slow the spread of COVID-19 are working -- and Arizonans are still encouraged to limit time away from home. Arizona will continue to take a steady approach and work with the Arizona Department of Health Services as

we breathe life back into our businesses and provide guidance on reopening. More to come."

Under the order, barbers and cosmetologists can resume operations on Friday, May 8 as long as they establish and implement safety protocols and best practices, including using face coverings for employees and customers, operating by appointment only and following protocols as directed by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the United States Department of Labor Division of Occupational Safety and Health Services (ADHS).

Additionally, restaurants and coffee shops can resume dine-in services on Monday, May 11. The operators must establish and implement safety protocols and best practices, including enacting physical distancing policies, limiting the number of diners and following protocols as directed by the CDC, the United States Department of Labor Division of Occupational Safety and Health Services (ADHS).

Background

The Governor last week announced retail businesses can resume partial operations, including curbside delivery. Retail businesses that implement social distancing

and sanitation measures can resume partial in-person operations on Friday, May 8. The Governor's Office continues to work with restaurants and businesses throughout the state to determine best practices on protecting public health while gradually reopening businesses. The Governor announced he will provide updated guidance for gyms and pools in the days ahead.

Arizona's gradual reopening to return stronger: Friday, May 8, 2020: Retail Businesses can resume partial in-person operations. Friday, May 8, 2020: Cosmetologists and barber shops can resume appointment-based services.

Monday, May 11, 2020: Restaurants and coffee shops can resume dine-in services, with safety measures. For full details on the guidance for reopening, visit [www.azgovernor.gov](http://www.azgovernor.gov).

The Governor's Executive Order expanding reporting of COVID-19 related information requires long-term care facilities to report the number of COVID-19 cases and deaths to current residents, next of kin, guardians and prospective residents. The information provided is to be used for decision-making purposes for residents, potential residents and their families.

## Forty Confirmed Cases of COVID-19 in Cochise County

As of press time, there has been 40 confirmed cases of COVID-19 in Cochise County. The first confirmed case was on March 20th.

The Arizona Department of Health Services has released a map on their webpage where you can see how many cases there are in your zipcode. To view the map, visit [www.azdhs.gov](http://www.azdhs.gov). As of press time, there are ZERO cases reported in Tombstone.

According to the Cochise County Coronavirus Response Hub, there has been 909 tests completed in Cochise County, with 28

people released from isolation. As of press time there is 9,707 confirmed cases across Arizona, resulting in a total of 426 deaths. There has been no information reported on how many infected people have recovered from the virus in Arizona.

The first confirmed case of COVID-19 in Arizona was announced by the Arizona Department of Health Services on January 26, 2020. A 20-year-old male student of Arizona State University had traveled to Wuhan, China, the point of origin of the outbreak. The student was diagnosed with the virus and placed into isolation. Twenty-six days after the initial diag-

nosis and subsequent isolation and after repeated negative tests for the coronavirus, the student was released from isolation and has since made a full recovery. This case was the fifth reported coronavirus case overall in the United States at the time of the confirmation.

The virus is thought to spread mainly from person-to-person and between people who are in close contact with one another (within about 6 feet) through respiratory droplets produced when an infected person coughs, sneezes or talks. These droplets can land in the mouths or noses of people who are nearby or possibly be inhaled

into the lungs. Some recent studies have suggested that COVID-19 may be spread by people who are not showing symptoms.

The CDC recommends that you wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds especially after you have been in a public place, or after blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing. If soap and water are not readily available, use a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol. Cover all surfaces of your hands and rub them together until they feel dry.

Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands. Avoid close contact with people who are sick and stay home as much as possible. Remember that

some people without symptoms may be able to spread virus, keeping distance from others is especially important for people who are at higher risk of getting very sick.

Everyone should wear a cloth face cover when they have to go out in public, for example to the grocery store or to pick up other necessities. Cloth face coverings should not be placed on young children under age 2, anyone who has trouble breathing, or is unconscious, incapacitated or otherwise unable to remove the mask without assistance. The cloth face cover is meant to protect other people in case you are infected.

## AZ Attorney General Urges Investigation of Meat Packing Industry Practices

PHOENIX – Arizona Attorney General Mark Brnovich and ten other state Attorneys General are urging the Department of Justice (DOJ) to pursue an investigation in collaboration with the States into suspected national price fixing by meat packers in the cattle industry.

In a letter sent to U.S. Attorney General William Barr on Tuesday, the Attorneys General expressed concern over the likelihood of manipulation in the market for processed beef. The four largest meat packing companies control more than 80% of the beef processing in the United States. Recent pricing margins have shown that cattle prices are low and continue to decline, whereas current shelf prices for packaged beef are

exceptionally high.

“In this current environment of food insecurity, rising unemployment, and reduced income, it is more important than ever to ensure competition to protect food prices,” said Attorney General Brnovich. “We ask DOJ to collaborate with the States and pool our collective resources towards promoting competition in the meat packing industry and protecting consumers.”

The concern over market manipulation has increased with beef prices reaching record levels as consumers purchase meat during the COVID-19 pandemic, but cattle prices remain low and are decreasing. The Attorneys General note that antitrust concerns about the

cattle market are not new and that competition issues arising from agricultural markets existed before the COVID-19 pandemic and will persist long after.

The letter states: “Given the concentrated market structure of the beef industry, it may be particularly susceptible to market manipulation, particularly during times of food insecurity, such as the current COVID-19 crisis. During an economic downturn, such as that caused by the current pandemic, firms’ ability to harm American consumers through market manipulation and coordinated behavior exacts a greater toll, providing an additional reason for conducting a careful inquiry into this industry.”

The Attorneys General say the disparity between the price of live weight cattle and the retail cost of boxed beef sold to consumers is a sign of a market that lacks full and fair competition, potentially violating state and federal antitrust law. In addition to harming cattle producers, this potentially illegal practice hurts consumers nationwide, many of whom are struggling because of reduced or lost incomes.

Attorney General Brnovich and the other Attorneys General believe the situation warrants a full federal investigation because the alleged anticompetitive conduct harms consumers and cattle ranchers across the United States.

Arizona joined Colorado, Idaho, Iowa, Minnesota, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, North Dakota, South Dakota, and Wyoming in the letter to DOJ.

## AZ Attorney General Successfully Defends Arizona Election Integrity Law

Attorney General Mark Brnovich announced the dismissal of a lawsuit challenging a commonsense election integrity law that ensures accountability in Arizona’s voter initiative process. The lawsuit was dismissed by the plaintiffs after the Attorney General’s Office prevailed at the Ninth Circuit Court last Friday.

On Monday afternoon, plaintiffs (Jessica Miracle, a group of petition signers, circulators, sponsors, and initiative proponents) dropped their lawsuit against the State of Arizona.

“Once again, out-of-state special interest groups are trying to interfere with the integrity of Arizona elections,” said Attorney General Mark Brnovich. “Arizonans will not stand for it. As long as I’m Attorney General, our election laws will be vigorously defended.”

The lawsuit *Miracle v Hobbs*, challenged Arizona’s law that requires paid and out-of-state circulators to make court appearances when subpoenaed, if the signatures collected are challenged. On Friday, the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals denied the plaintiffs’ request to suspend the law and kicked the case back down to U.S.

Federal District Court. The plaintiffs saw the writing on the wall and withdrew their entire lawsuit Monday afternoon, which has the effect of granting complete victory to the State.

Attorney General Brnovich intervened on behalf of the State after the Secretary of State declined to defend the statute. This is one of four times so far in 2020 where the Secretary has declined to defend state election laws.

General Brnovich is dedicated to upholding the integrity of elections in Arizona. Last week, the AGO filed a brief with the Supreme Court of the United States to defend Arizona’s restrictions on ballot harvesting. Currently, the AGO is defending a state law that restricts the use of the E-Qual online signature system in the initiative process. In March 2020, the AGO obtained a restraining order to stop Maricopa County Recorder Adrian Fontes from illegally mailing ballots to ineligible voters for the Presidential Preference Election.

Deputy Solicitor General Drew C. Ensign, for the Arizona Attorney General’s Office, argued the case before the Ninth Circuit on April 17.

## Grants Help Fund Public Safety Programs

Grants amounting to more than \$230,000 will help Cochise County to continue services enhancing public safety and emergency preparedness, while reducing costs to the taxpayer.

At its regular meeting on May 5, the Board of Supervisors approved a grant agreement with the City of Tucson, allowing the County Attorney’s Office to accept \$151,702 to fund a drug crime attorney and an administrative assistant.

The annual federal grant is funded through the High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA) program and the City of Tucson acts as the pass-through fiscal agent for

southern Arizona, explained County Attorney Brian McIntyre. The monies will help the County Attorney’s Office retain an experienced prosecutor and an administrative assistant, he added.

“The HIDTA grant will allow the HIDTA prosecutor to prosecute drug crimes,” said McIntyre. “If the County were to pay for these personnel out of the general fund, taxpayers will assume the added expense. We are happy to be able to retain this grant, especially during tough budget times.”

The Board also approved a \$78,398.88 grant to pay for gas detecting equipment for the Countywide Hazardous

Materials Response Team. The County’s Office of Emergency Services (OES) applied for unspent funds through the State’s 2019 Hazardous Materials Emergency Preparedness Grant and the County will act as the pass-through fiscal agent, explained OES Deputy Director Judy Lynn.

The Countywide Hazardous Materials Response Team is a multi-jurisdictional/multi-agency organization that responds to regional HAZMAT emergencies. The new equipment will help improve training events and future responses.

Supervisor Ann English noted this was the second grant in two weeks that the County’s OES staff had managed to secure through unspent funds, which in turn helps with budget challenges.

“They have been very active with this,” she said. “I want to thank them for helping everyone who needs these emergency services.”

## Attorney General’s Office Warns of Spike in “Sextortion” Email Scam Attempts

Attorney General Mark Brnovich is warning the public about an increase in email extortion scam attempts across the country. The Attorney General’s Office recently has received a spike in complaints from members of the public being targeted by this scam.

In particular, “sextortion” emails are being sent that threaten to release sexually explicit photos or videos of the recipient to contact lists, social media contacts, and the general public. Other emails threaten to release the recipient’s browser history or a supposedly recorded webcam video of the recipient taken while they “looked at ‘adult’ websites.”

“Extortion emails like these are designed to cause fear and anxiety. Do not panic and

certainly do not respond or engage with the fraudster or send any sort of payment,” said Attorney General Mark Brnovich. “Change your passwords frequently and do not use the same username and password for all of your logins or accounts.”

In these extortion emails, the scammer will typically demand a payment, usually in the form of a digital currency like Bitcoin, but does not provide proof of any photos or videos. To further scare and intimidate the potential victim, the scammer includes a legitimate username and/or password the victim is currently using or has used previously in the title/subject of the email.

Cybercriminals are acquiring large batches of information (often on the Dark Web)

such as email addresses, usernames, and passwords that have been illegally obtained from data breaches. They then incorporate that information into their extortion email to make it appear more “realistic” and create a sense of panic and urgency.

In one email, the sender signed off with: “If you do not fulfill it within 24 hours, I’ll create your life a nightmare by sending that video clip to Everybody you know. Your time starts now.”

The FBI has identified commonalities of sextortion email scams:

-The email comes from an unknown party and often contains broken English and grammatical errors.

-The recipient’s username or password is provided at the beginning of the email to add a higher degree of intimidation.

-The recipient is accused of visiting pornographic websites, cheating on a spouse, or

being involved in other compromising situations.

-The email includes a statement such as, “I had a serious spyware and adware infect your computer” or “I have a recorded video of you” as an explanation of how the information was allegedly gathered.

-The email threatens to send a video or other compromising information to family, friends, coworkers, or social network contacts if a ransom is not paid.

-The email provides a short window to pay, typically 48 hours.


-The recipient is instructed to pay the ransom in Bitcoin, a virtual currency that provides a high degree of anonymity to the transactions.

The FBI does not condone the payment of extortion demands as the funds will facilitate continued criminal activity, including potential organized crime activity and associated violent crimes.

## Pishlaki-The Lost Silver of the Navajo

This story of the Navajo silver of Pishlaki goes back for over a century. It became public knowledge because many of the Navajo were seen wearing jewelry hammered from pure silver.

When white traders looked at this jewelry, they were astonished to discover that it was native silver, so rich that it could be worked just as it was found.

Jack Merrick, a Colorado miner, had heard numerous tales of a rich Navajo silver mine, hidden somewhere deep in the wildest part of the Navajo country. He decided that he would go and search for this mine. When he had accumulated the necessary funds and provisions, he set out for Navajo country.

This was in the year 1879. Much of his travel time was spent in avoiding hostile Indians. Evidently, he found time to do some prospecting, because he turned up some months later, in Durango, Colorado with silver ore that assayed over one thousand dollars to the ton.

Merrick could not pack

out a large amount of his ore alone, so he hired a young man named Mitchell to help him. They left for the mine in the Spring of 1880.

They reached Merrick's mine and dug out several large bags of high-grade ore.

Their way out led thru Monument Valley and there, they were attacked by Indians. Both men were killed.

When word of these deaths reached the Rico mines near Blanding, Utah, twenty heavily-armed men rode out to investigate. This party of white men rode straight to the old Navajo chief of the reservation Indians, Hoskininni.

The chief knew about the two murders in Monument Valley, but denied that the Indians had been any of his Navajos.

Hoskininni insisted that there was a large number of Utes in and around Monument Valley and that they were the ones who had killed Merrick and Mitchell. He claimed that a band of Utes, led by a renegade, called No-Neck, had killed them because they wouldn't give them any tobacco.

The Utes had then tak-

en the dead men's horses, saddles, guns, and supplies, but had left the sacks of ore where they fell.

The old Navajo led the white men to the scene of the murders and they say that it was just the way he said. By this time the coyotes and the vultures had been at the bodies and only the bones were left. All their possessions were gone, but several bags of heavy, high-grade silver ore lay nearby.

Many-years later, the Navajos told the story of the two murders. It had been the Utes and they had attacked at night. Mitchell had been killed immediately and Merrick wounded. The latter managed to escape in the darkness, but the Utes found him at daybreak and killed him. Merrick's and Mitchell's bones were buried at the bases of the buttes where they were killed and the buttes were named for them.

The next man to come and try his luck was Cass Hite. Cass had been born to pioneer parents in Missouri. He had left there and come west at the age of sixteen.

In its heyday, it was the ultimate maximum security prison.

Located on a lonely island in the middle of San Francisco Bay, Alcatraz—aka "The Rock"—had held captives since the Civil War. But it was in 1934, the highpoint of a major war on crime, that Alcatraz was re-fortified into the world's most secure prison. Its eventual inmates included dangerous public enemies like Al Capone, criminals who had a history of escapes, and the occasional odd character like the infamous "Birdman of Alcatraz."

In the 1930s, Alcatraz was already a forbidding place, surrounded by the cold, rough waters of the Pacific. The redesign included tougher iron bars, a series of strategically positioned guard towers, and strict rules, including a dozen checks a day of the prisoners. Escape seemed near impossible.

Despite the odds, from 1934 until the prison was closed in 1963, 36 men tried 14 separate escapes. Nearly all were caught or didn't survive the attempt.

The fate of three particular inmates, however, remains a mystery to this day. Here is their story.

Missing. On June 12, 1962, the routine early morning bed check turned out to be anything but. Three convicts were not in their cells: John Anglin, his brother Clarence, and Frank Morris. In their beds were cleverly built dummy heads made of plaster, flesh-tone paint, and real human hair that apparently fooled the night guards. The prison went into lock down, and an intensive search began.

Gathering the Clues. We were notified immediately and asked to help. Our office in San Francisco set leads for offices nationwide to check for any records on the missing prisoners and on their previous escape attempts (all three had made them). We also interviewed relatives of the men and compiled all their identification records and asked boat operators in the Bay to be on the lookout for debris. Within two days, a packet of letters sealed in rubber and related to the men

was recovered. Later, some paddle-like pieces of wood and bits of rubber inner tube were found in the water. A homemade life-vest was also discovered washed up on Cronkhite Beach, but extensive searches did not turn up any other items in the area.

Piecing together the plan. As the days went by, the FBI, the Coast Guard, Bureau of Prison authorities, and others began to find more evidence and piece together the ingenious escape plan. We were aided by a fourth plotter who didn't make it out of his cell in time and began providing us with information. Here's what we learned.

The group had begun laying plans the previous December when one of them came across some old saw blades.

Using crude tools—including a homemade drill made from the motor of a broken vacuum cleaner—the plotters each loosened the air vents at the back of their cells by painstakingly drilling closely spaced holes around the cover so the entire section of the wall could be removed. Once through, they hid the holes with whatever they could—a suitcase, a piece of cardboard, etc.

Behind the cells was a common, unguarded utility corridor. They made their way down this corridor and climbed to the roof of their cell block inside the building, where they set up a secret workshop. There, taking turns keeping watch for the guards in the evening before the last count, they used a variety of stolen and donated materials to build and hide what they needed to escape. More than 50 raincoats that they stole or gathered were turned into makeshift life preservers and a 6x14 foot rubber raft, the seams carefully stitched together and "vulcanized" by the hot steam pipes in the prison (the idea came from magazines that were found in the prisoners' cells). They also built wooden paddles and converted a musical instrument into a tool to inflate the raft.

At the same time, they were looking for a way out of the building. The ceiling was a good 30 feet high, but using a network of pipes they climbed up and eventually pried open the ventilator

at the top of the shaft. They kept it in place temporarily by fashioning a fake bolt out of soap.

The escape. On the evening of June 11, they were ready to go. The prison informant, though, did not have his ventilator grill completely removed and was left behind. The three others got into the corridor, gathered their gear, climbed up and out through the ventilator, and got on to the prison roof. Then, they shimmied down the bakery smoke stack at the rear of the cell house, climbed over the fence, and snuck to the northeast shore of the island and launched their raft.

What happened next remains a mystery. Did they make it across the Bay, get to Angel Island, and then cross Raccoon Strait into Marin County as planned? Or did the wind and waves get the better of them?

Solving the mystery. Plenty of people have gone to great lengths to prove that the men COULD have survived, but the question remains: did they? Our investigation at the time concluded otherwise, for the following reasons.

Crossing the Bay. Yes, youngsters have made the more than mile-long swim from Alcatraz to Angel Island. But with the strong currents and frigid Bay water, the odds were clearly against these men.

Three if by land. The plan, according to our prison informant, was to steal clothes and a car once on land. But we never uncovered any thefts like this despite the high-profile nature of the case.

Family ties. If the escapees had help, we couldn't substantiate it. The families appeared unlikely to even have the financial means to provide any real support.

Missing in action. For the 17 years we worked on the case, no credible evidence emerged to suggest the men were still alive, either in the U.S. or overseas.

The mystery continues... We officially closed our case on December 31, 1979, and turned over responsibility to the U.S. Marshals Service, which continues to investigate in the unlikely event the trio is still alive. ## Today in History: May 8th

May 8, 1886-Atlanta pharmacist John Pemberton invents Coca Cola.

The first Coca Cola is sold at Jacob's pharmacy in Atlanta, Georgia.

Coca-Cola, or Coke, is a carbonated soft drink manufactured by The Coca-Cola Company. Originally marketed as a temperance drink and intended as a patent medicine, it was invented in the late 19th century by John Stith Pemberton and was bought out by businessman Asa Griggs Candler, whose marketing tactics led Coca-Cola to its dominance of the world soft-drink market throughout the 20th century. The drink's name refers to two of its original ingredients: coca leaves, and kola nuts (a source of caffeine). The current formula of Coca-Cola remains a trade secret, although a variety of reported recipes and experimental recreations have been published.

The Coca-Cola Company produces concentrate, which is then sold to licensed Coca-Cola bottlers throughout the world. The bottlers, who hold exclusive territory contracts with the company, produce the finished product in cans and bottles from the concentrate, in combination with filtered water and sweeteners. A typical 12-US-fluid-ounce can contains 38 grams

of sugar (usually in the form of high fructose corn syrup). The bottlers then sell, distribute, and merchandise Coca-Cola to retail stores, restaurants, and vending machines throughout the world. The Coca-Cola Company also sells concentrate for soda fountains of major restaurants and foodservice distributors.

The Coca-Cola Company has on occasion introduced other cola drinks under the Coke name. The most common of these is Diet Coke, along with others including Caffeine-Free Coca-Cola, Diet Coke Caffeine-Free, Coca-Cola Zero Sugar, Coca-Cola Cherry, Coca-Cola Vanilla, and special versions with lemon, lime, and coffee. Coca-Cola was called Coca-Cola Classic from July 1985 to 2009, to distinguish it from "New Coke". Based on Interbrand's "best global brand" study of 2015, Coca-Cola was the world's third most valuable brand, after Apple and Google. In 2013, Coke products were sold in over 200 countries worldwide, with consumers drinking more than 1.8 billion com-

pany beverage servings each day. Coca-Cola ranked No. 87 in the 2018 Fortune 500 list of the largest United States corporations by total revenue.

## TOMBSTONE DIARY

I am sitting in the gazebo at the City Park. It is 8 AM on a lovely warm May morning. My friends and I are easily spaced at least 6 feet apart on the circular wood benches. Sip my coffee, half-asleep, enjoying the morning sun, as three guys talk about music. They all know a great deal about that subject, and I learned, listening, that there are at least 75 chords. After that it gets complicated but still delightful to hear experts talking about the arts. Rare these days. Another fellow shows up and then we really start talking about art. He has been to Italy, and tells us about seeing Michelangelo's Pieta and David sculptures up close, the workmanship, the details, the beauty. And another friend allows as how he really loves Raphael's paintings. Tombstone is such a special place. So relaxed, so easy, if you allow that.

About 50 BC, Marcus Terentius Varro noted that "Divine Nature makes the fields, Man makes the cities." A quote carved above the entry to the Santa Barbara City Hall. Like other Romans of his time, Varro believed that since the only thing that made Man different from other animals was language, Man, lacking instincts, had created Law to ensure order. And from that, his belief that any man who defied the law was insane, and of less worth than even the least animal. He would have had a very hard time watching the recent protests against the Coronavirus stay-at-home orders. It is in-

## McSally Announces Project at Fort Huachuca Will Proceed with Full Funding

U.S. SENATE – U.S. Senator Martha McSally (R-AZ) announced Thursday that the U.S. Department of Defense will move forward with the Ground Transport Equipment Building at Fort Huachuca in calendar year 2020. The funding for the project was set to be awarded in FY2019, but was delayed due to an ongoing environmental cleanup. With the cleanup recently completed, the project has been fully refunded at \$30 million.

"During my time in Congress, I have tirelessly and continually advocated for Arizona's military and this project at Fort Huachuca was no exception," said McSally. "I pushed heavily on DoD to restore this funding upon completion of the environmental cleanup and I'm pleased to say they heard my call and are moving expeditiously to execute this project during this calendar year."

Michael Boardman, a retired Army colonel who now serves as president of the Fort Huachuca 50, the group of civic leaders who support the Fort: "We're very pleased with this news. This construction will replace the last World

War II-era wooden building on the Fort and will provide critical maintenance services for the highly specialized vehicles and test equipment of at the Electronic Proving Ground. On behalf of the Huachuca 50, I'd like to thank Sen. McSally and other members of the Arizona congressional delegation who made it happen."

Background:

-Funding for this project was set to be awarded in FY2019, but due to unforeseen environmental issues at the construction site, it was delayed. The Army had to complete a major environmental site cleanup before the actual construction project could be awarded. Therefore, the funding was subsequently used for border security.

-On September 4, 2019, McSally spoke with Acting Army Secretary Ryan McCarthy who gave his commitment that the project will be completed in a timely manner once the environmental cleanup was complete.

-Cleanup has recently concluded, and the project has been fully refunded at \$30 million.

## AZ Attorney Gen. Victory in Carter Oil Case Saves Arizona More Than a Hundred Million Dollars in Improper Refund Tax Claims

Attorney General Mark Brnovich announced today his office prevailed in a substantial lawsuit filed by Carter Oil, saving Arizona taxpayers and the State more than one hundred million dollars in improper refund tax claims.

Carter Oil was seeking refunds for the transaction privilege taxes it paid on the sale of dyed diesel fuel

to companies in Arizona. Carter argued the dyed diesel fuel qualified for a statutory exemption for "machinery or equipment" used directly in manufacturing or mining operations. The Court of Appeals agreed with the Attorney General's Office, reversing a lower tax court's decision, thereby recognizing that dyed diesel fuel is not machinery or equipment.

Carter Oil did not file a petition for the Arizona Supreme Court to review the decision by April 29, thereby concluding the lawsuit.

"The plaintiff's interpretation of the law would have needlessly exposed Arizona to hundreds of millions of dollars of claims from corporations at a time when the State is facing a massive shortfall in revenue," said Attorney General Brnovich. "I am pleased the plaintiff chose to end this litigation and applaud the Arizona Department of Revenue for assuring that the tax structure

for machinery and equipment continues to be administered as intended by the Arizona Legislature."

If Carter Oil's interpretation had been adopted, Arizona law would have been rewritten, upsetting longstanding precedent and thereby giving Carter Oil and other similar businesses a budget-busting windfall not contemplated or authorized by the Arizona Legislature.

Assistant Attorneys General Jerry Fries, Scot Teasdale, Nancy Case, Rusty Crandell, and Beau Roysden defended the State in this case.

## Weekly Movie Review:

### "Parasite"

This past February, the South Korean film "Parasite" did something that no other foreign-language, foreign-produced "international" film had ever done: win the Oscar for Best Picture at the Academy Awards. Whether this victory counts as an "upset" is a matter of debate (I personally thought "1917" would take it), but what isn't debatable is that the Academy made an unusually outside-the-box choice, perhaps to offset criticisms that they played it too safe the year before when they gave Best Picture to the pleasing-but-not-challenging "Green Book." Other than the theory that it was strictly a strategic move, what made the Academy buck the system and why for this film?

The story follows the impoverished Kim family – father Ki-taek (Song Kang-ho), mother Chung-sook (Jang Hye-jin), daughter Ki-jung

(Park So-dam), and son Ki-woo (Choi Woo-shik) as they worm their way into the lives of the wealthy Park family, the way a parasite does, I suppose. A friend needs the smart-but-unaccredited Ki-woo to fill in as an English tutor for the Parks' daughter Da-hye (Jung Ji-so). Ki-woo notices that dim-witted mother Yeon-gyo (Cho Yeon-jeong) thinks her bratty son Da-song (Jung Hyeon-jun) is an art genius and recommends Ki-jung to tutor him. Ki-jung creates a vacancy for Park family chauffeur and recommends Ki-taek to fill the position. Ki-taek goes for the grand slam and gets Chung-sook hired as the Park family's housekeeper, even though it means getting loyal housekeeper Moon-gwang (Lee Jung-eun) fired. The Kim family can now settle comfortably into roles adjacent to the high life. Heck, as long as the Park family doesn't find out about it, they can live the high life themselves. There's a bit of residual guilt over what they did to Moon-gwang, but there are plenty of lucrative jobs available to suddenly-unemployed older women, so she'll be okay, right?

It turns out that Moon-gwang is in fact not okay, though her reason has little to do with losing her income. There's a scene where she and the Kims go down into the Park family basement to retrieve something she left behind and the characters all walk through a dark patch. Somehow we know that once they come out of that dark patch, these characters and this movie will never be the same again. The film has been mostly lighthearted up to this point, with the Kims playing loveable scam artists to the snobby marks Parks. But this movie didn't win Best Picture on its merits as a scam-artist comedy, and it's about to go to some much darker places. Korean films are known for being merciless to their most likeable characters, and as much as this film prides itself on being original and different, it isn't necessarily about to break with that tradition.

What stands out most about "Parasite" is its ability to switch tones very quickly. I've already touched on its beginnings as a lighthearted comedy, but later director Bong Joon Ho whips the

viewer into scenes of devastating tragedy, disaster, even horror (and not the horror that's inherent to tragedy and disaster, but traditional horror). Thus this is an incredibly unpredictable film, one that clearly took Academy voters on a wild ride. I can't say I'm overly thrilled with it winning Best Picture, despite its gut-punch finale and the admittedly-inspirational story of it overcoming the language barrier. Some of the twists and complications seem to exist for the sake of adding twists and complications, and most of the film's much-lauded social commentary basically boils down to, "people who have suffered have more colorful personalities than people who haven't." But by all means watch this unique, critically-acclaimed film and see if you find it more affecting than I did.

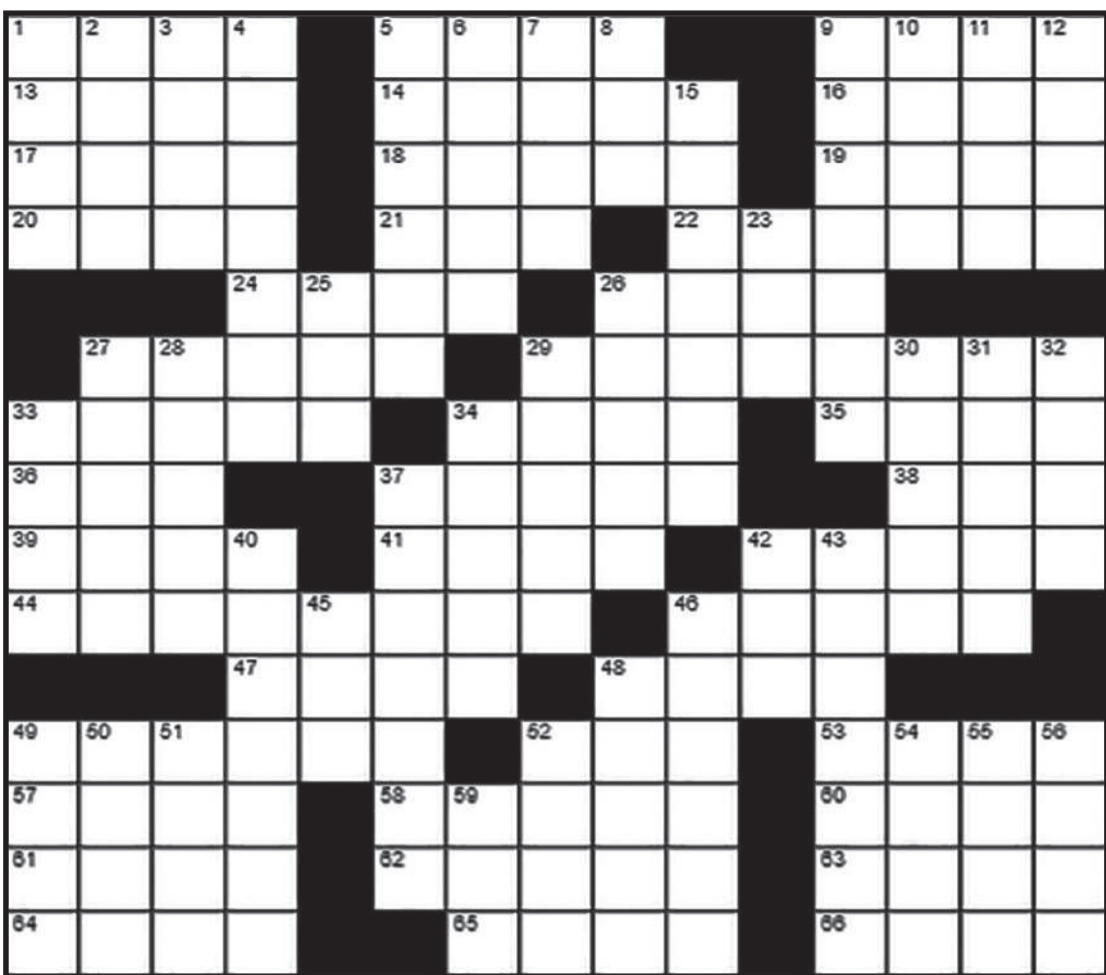

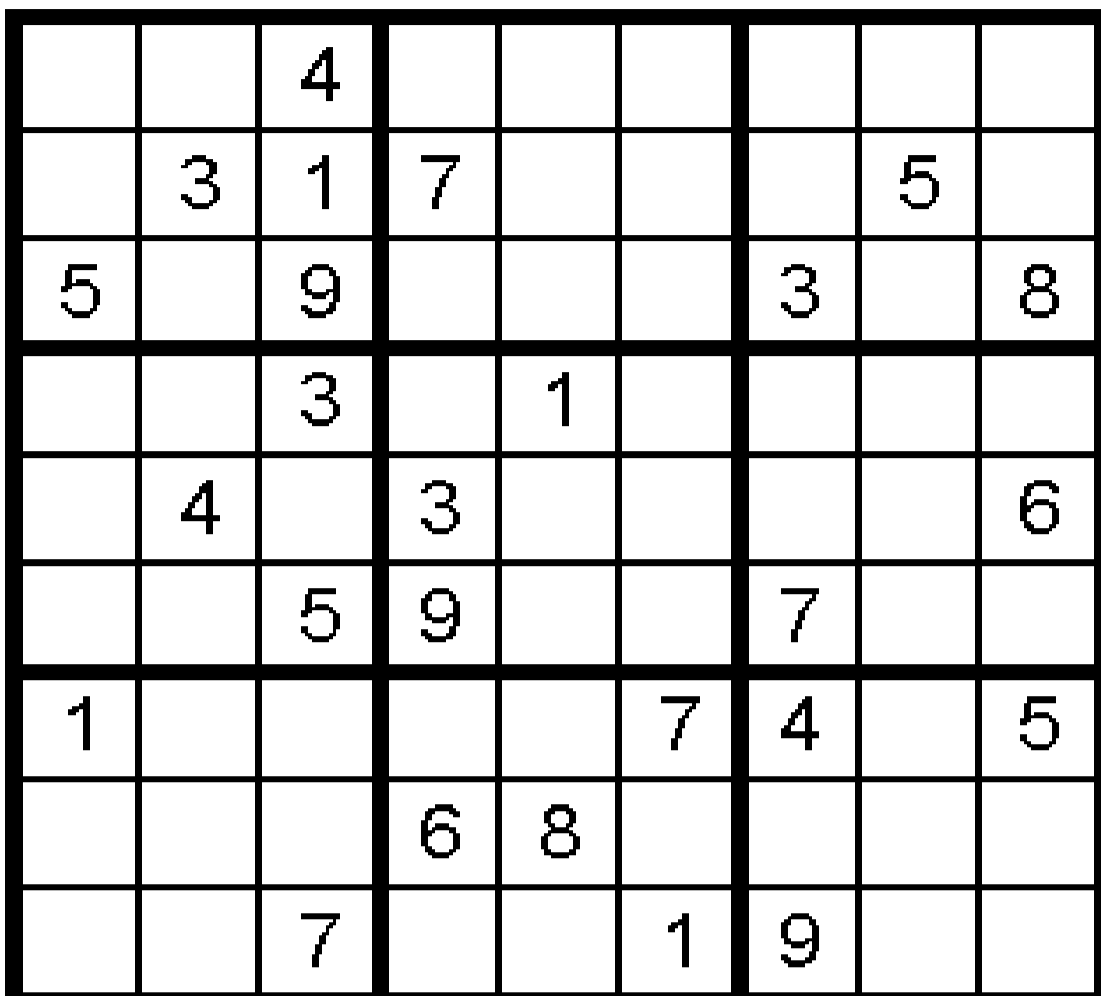

## Child Predator Jailed for Life

*The FBI Pursues Child Sexual Abuse Offenders with Tenacity*

### FBI

When FBI Indianapolis Special Agent Ryan Barrett was the newest member of the field office's Child Exploitation and Human Trafficking Task Force, a more seasoned agent wanted to show him what they were up against.

"We had a program that tracked the use of a file-sharing program popular with people trading images of child sex abuse," Barrett said. "The agent asked the database to show a dot for every user in the state of Indiana. The whole map lit up red."

Barrett stressed that those results are not unique to Indiana—any populated area in the United States and many other countries would show some number of people viewing and trading this content. "I could be working these cases 24 hours a day, seven days a week, every day of the year," Barrett said.

Though the scale is daunting, it doesn't stop task forces supported by the FBI from trying to put an end to child exploitation. "No one is going to rest until kids are safe," Barrett said.

Every case matters, but after 11 years on the task force, Barrett knows to prioritize cases that will make the greatest impact. That means pursuing large trading networks and groups, going after the people who are producing the materials, and tracking online predators engaged in sextortion.

It is work that often requires patience and tenacity.

Several years ago, Barrett got a tip from a Ukrainian citizen concerned about the activity of Charles Skaggs, Jr., an American who claimed to be running a non-profit for Ukrainian orphans. There wasn't much in the tip for the FBI to go on, but the name of Skaggs' organization raised immediate alarm.

The name of the so-called orphanage was the same as a widely circulated series of child abuse videos. "The fact that this guy names his orphanage after that—the second I saw it I was like, 'Oh no,'" Barrett recalls.

At the time, it was difficult for Ukrainian authorities to help the investigation because the country was consumed with a war. So Barrett asked for the support of Homeland Security Investigations and U.S. Customs and Border Protection in monitoring Skaggs' trips in and out of the country. It was then a matter of keeping tabs on Skaggs and waiting.

In December 2016, more than a year after the FBI received the tip, agents from Homeland Security Investigations and Customs and Border Protection stopped Skaggs for additional screening when he arrived at the Minneapolis-St. Paul International Airport from Ukraine. When asked if he had additional cell phones, electronics, computers, hard drives, thumb drives, or any

other computer equipment on him or in his luggage, Skaggs told agents he did not.

But in their search, the agents uncovered several thumb drives from his bag that were later found to contain child sexual abuse images, including videos Skaggs had made of a child who often stayed in his Indiana home.

While he was in detention awaiting trial, Skaggs asked his son to retrieve a hard drive he had hidden in the ceiling of his apartment building's laundry room. That hard drive also contained images of child sexual abuse.

Skaggs was tried in July 2019 and convicted of nine counts of sexual exploitation of a minor, two counts of possession of child pornography, and one count of concealment of evidence. He was sentenced to life in prison on January 30, 2020.

Barrett said judges in Indiana and across the country are recognizing the seriousness of these offenses and handing down lengthy sentences to offenders. He said that should be a warning to anyone who is hurting children or viewing the photos and videos that document their abuse.

Barrett's other warning is to parents and caregivers: Make sure you're talking to your children regularly as they spend time online. His plea carries even more urgency as children across the country are relying on the internet more as classes and assignments have moved online.

"The web is great for so many good things, but it's really bad for a few really bad things," Barrett said. One of the bad things, he said, is allowing child predators easy, immediate access to millions of children.

Remember all those dots on the map showing people using a file-sharing program to view abusive material? Each of those individuals has an internet connection, which is all a predator needs to reach out to young people who are also online.

Caregivers need to find age-appropriate ways to explain to children that the person who wants to chat with them on an app or game or who wants a picture of them could be a real danger. Barrett said most of the child exploitation cases he now sees have an online origin, and children can be harmed even if they never meet up with the predator.
