
PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

SERAPHINE (2008)(2010)(Rated NR) The true story of Séraphine Louis, a simple, devout housekeeper who in 1905, at the age of 41, began painting brilliantly colorful canvases. In 1912, a German art critic discovered her paintings while she was working as his maid. The film tells the story of the relationship between the avant-garde dealer and the visionary cleaning lady, forging a testament to the mysteries of creativity and the resilience of one woman's spirit.

MOZART'S SISTER (2010)(2012)(Rated NR) A reimagined account of the early life of Maria Anna 'Nannerl' Mozart, five years older than Wolfgang and a musical prodigy in her own right. Originally the featured performer, Nannerl has given way to Wolfgang as the main attraction, as their father Leopold tours his talented offspring in front of the royal courts of pre-French revolution Europe.

"Far from grand costume drama or a modernist jab, Féret trades in slice-of-life realities (the Mozart family's itinerant existence, court eccentricities) and character nuance, keeping [Marie] Féret's observant, quietly radiant turn a sort of bittersweet, unfulfilled anchor. The object isn't to stir you into what-if outrage so much as to let a culturally magnificent era's societal inequalities act as a dissonant countermelody to a famous artist's biography."-Robert Abele, LA Times.
