STAC RECEIVES \$25,000 DONATION FROM 0&R UTILITIES, INC. IN SUPPORT OF SCIENCE STUDY LOUNGE



St. Thomas Aquinas College has received a \$25,000 donation from Orange and Rockland Utilities, Inc. (O&R) to

refurbish a multi-use general study area adjacent to the College's advanced science research laboratories, announced Dr. Margaret M. Fitzpatrick, S.C., President of the College.

"O&R's generous gift will help enhance the collaborative nature of the important scientific study conducted here by our students and faculty," said Dr. Fitzpatrick. "But most of all, this gift carves out for us another venue where we can pursue learning, develop understanding and share knowledge," she added.

The "Meeting Lounge for the Sciences," located in Costello Hall, is the primary

gathering spot for students, faculty and the public immediately adjacent to the Chemistry, Physics and Biology research labs. Costello Hall is a second home for many of the College's science students who spend a majority of their academic time in class and labs.

St. Thomas Aquinas College's School of Arts & Sciences offers a variety of science based program including: majors in Biochemistry, Biology, Forensic Science, Natural Sciences (with Biology, Chemistry and Physics); dual degree programs in Biomedical Engineering, Chiropractic Medicine, Physical Therapy, and Podiatric Medicine; and minors in Biology, Biotechnology, Chemistry, and Physics. Student can also opt for a pre-medical or pre-dental track. The School of Education offers options for students to pursue teaching science at the childhood and adolescent levels. In recent months, St. Thomas Aquinas College has been recognized for our overall and financial strength, our value as an investment, and our dedication to our military community and communities in need. Most notable of the College's accolades is our being named as a Top-Tier Regional University (North) by *U.S. News & World Report* in their 2014 Best Colleges annual report. The rankings include over 1,400 schools nationwide and are based on survey information collected and by peer ratings conducted by *U.S. News & World Report*.

"We have been ranked highly by multiple external reporting agencies over the years. FIRST NIAGARA FOUNDATION AWARDS \$5,000 GRANT TO ST. THOMAS AQUINAS COLLEGE

IN SUPPORT OF "ENHANCING AND ENRICHING LITERACY ACROSS THE CURRICULUM" EVENTS

First Niagara Foundation recently awarded St. Thomas Aquinas College a \$5,000 grant in support of the "Enhancing and Enriching Literacy Across the Curriculum" series of events for students, teachers, and community members. The series included three events during the months of September, October and November 2013.

The first event was held on September 28th and was a wonderful success. Over 100 people attended the First Annual Campaign for Artful Resistance: A Celebration of the Arts, an initiative designed to recognize and restore arts education in the curriculum. The Celebration included a showcase of visiting artists who perform in schools. The foundation supported The 18th Annual Rockland Literacy Extravaganza on Saturday, October 19, 2013, which was a professional conference for practicing teachers and administrators, along with graduate and pre-service students. It focused on teaching researchbased best practices for achieving Common Core State Standards success in reading and writing across the curriculum, Pre-K through Grade 12.

The third event the foundation will support is The 18th Annual Rockland Storytelling Festival on Sunday, November 17, 2013 at Haverstraw King's Daughters Public Library, which is a free event to support the joys of storytelling including presentations from recognized storytellers and hands-on arts and crafts projects for participants.

"Literacy skills can be improved, but not without the proper staff development," said Sara Tucker, First Vice President, Regional Team Leader, First Niagara. "First Niagara is proud to support a program that is putting professional development at the heart of its efforts through training teachers, as well as helping children through their literacy challenges." Dr. Michael Shaw, Professor of Education and coordinator of the series, thanked the First Niagara Foundation by saying, "I am so grateful that First Niagara is supporting our St. Thomas Aquinas College initiatives to 'Enhance and Enrich Literacy Across the Curriculum. These events enable us to provide the highest quality of professional development to teachers and pre-service teachers to enable students to successfully learn methods for teaching close reading and academic writing that will enable students to achieve Common Core State

Standards success. The grant also enables us to focus on the importance of restoring arts education in schools that has been significantly cut back because of the overarching focus on year-long test preparation, including the joys of storytelling. First Niagara is making a very strong commitment to support enhancing and enriching literacy across the curriculum".

First Niagara Bank has nine branches in Rockland County, and their Foundation believes in supporting educational initiatives in the local communities they serve. One of their Foundation's focus areas is Youth and Education, which ties into the three St. Thomas Aguinas College events this grant will support.



EXPANDING TEACHING OFFERINGS TO MEET NEEDS OF A CHANGING POPULATION

St. Thomas Aquinas College recently expanded its graduate degree offerings to include a Masters in Special Education with a specialization in Autism and an Advanced Certificate in Autism.

"Media reports over the last decade have highlighted the growing incidence in autism spectrum disorders amongst children. Students with autism find social interaction and communication difficult. In the classroom these students find it challenging to recognize non-verbal cues that teachers might use during instruction. They may also find working in groups and co-operative learning problematic. More than ever it is important for classroom teachers to understand the needs of these children in order to teach them effectively," Dr. Meenakshi Gajria, Dean of the School of Education at the College, said.

Jill Sheridan, a Math Resource Teacher at Ramapo High School (Franklin Lakes, NJ), started the Advanced Certificate in Autism this fall. Sheridan, a Rockland County native, completed her B.S. in Math with Grades 7-12 Certification and her M.S.Ed. in Special Education at St. Thomas. She was drawn to the Advanced Certificate in Autism at her alma mater as she looked to start her 'plus credits'. St. Thomas' convenient class offerings for working teachers and its noted reputation as a National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE) school, only made the decision to return easier.

"It has become more common for students to be diagnosed with autism. I currently work as a Special Education teacher and work with students who are on the spectrum. I feel that the Autism Certificate program will increase my knowledge on autism as well as help me to be better able to teach students in my class with autism," said Sheridan.

Coursework in these programs will cover Applied Behavior Analysis, Curriculum

and Instruction for students with Autism Spectrum Disorders, and Language and Social Communication development in students with Autism Spectrum Disorders. The degree programs which are offered at both the Elementary level (Grades 1-6) and the Secondary level (Grades 7-12) are 36 credits. The certificate program is 12 credits. Upon completion of the programs, candidates will be able to apply for teaching certification in special education with an annotation in severe and multiple disabilities. Candidates will be able to teach in a range of classroom including co-taught general education classrooms, resource room and selfcontained specialized classrooms.

St. Thomas Aquinas College also offers graduate education programs in Literacy, Special Education, Educational Leadership, and Teacher Leadership, as well as a program for individuals seeking teacher certification for the first time. For more information visit www.stac.edu/graded.

SUMMER "LITERACY CAMP" MAKES A HUGE IMPACT

The Graduate Literacy Program capstone Practicum in July implemented a "Literacy Camp" model to once again make a huge impact on motivation, engagement, and reading and writing achievement for struggling readers and writers, grades 1-8, including students from diverse backgrounds. Using research-based best methods, we implemented a paradigm of authentic reading and writing instead of skills/drill; accelerated/enrichment instruction rather than remediation; integrated instruction and active inquiry instead of isolated instruction; and ongoing authentic assessments with positive, constructive feedback rather than scoring correct answers on tests.

The camp model centers on linking reading, writing, and research with student interests and creating special enrichment activities that culminate with a celebration for families and guests. The celebration includes Power Point or dramatic presentations that highlight inquiry projects and also includes musical reader's theater performances coordinated by Associate

Professor of Music Dr. Evan Matthews where students dramatize stories and poems using a variety of instruments. Other enrichment activities include raising money to support the Urifiki Center School in Tanzania highlighted by a lemonade stand (Students raised \$174.00), collaborating with Biology Professor Dr.Jon Rosko to collect fish samples for study and learn about protecting the environment, a family reading party to show parents how they can help their children at home, a celebration of National Ice Cream Day, a pajama party to celebrate reading, a celebration of pizza, a lesson on bullying by Director of Security Jim Nawoichyk, and podcasting. All enrichment activities are directly linked with reading and writing.

In final evaluations, all 20 parents "strongly agreed" that their child had a "positive learning experience" that motivated their child to learn and increased reading achievement. All parents also "strongly agreed" that their child had a "knowledgeable, caring, dedicated professional teacher." One parent noted,

"You embrace children with all types of needs, and your kindness and love for them shines through all that you do."

Another wrote, "We don't know what we would have done this summer without this program."

STAC's 60th Anniversary Raffle Winners!



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
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2013 HONORS CONVOCATION AND COMMENCEMENT EXERCISES
