THE EMPTY CHAIR

"When You Wish Upon a Star"

"When You Wish Upon a Star" is a song that most of us have heard and even sung. Walt Disney made the tune famous along with many other artists who have recorded it. The first words of the tune go like this:

> "When you wish upon a star, Makes no difference who you are, Anything your heart desires Will come to you."

Every time I am with a group of twins who have lost their twin, I hear them say things like, "I wish he hadn't died" or "I wish I had her back." If life were only as simple as wishing on a star to make our dreams come true.

Another wish I often hear in a Twinless Twins group is "I wish my friends (or church, or synagogue or neighbors, or relatives) understood what I am going through and were more supportive." This is a wish that has some possibility of coming true if those of us who have lost a twin are able to be honest with the people around us and help them understand how we are feeling. What do we wish others understood about our loss? Here is a partial list of our wishes:

- 1. I wish you would not be afraid to speak my twin's name. They lived and were so special to me. It helps me to know that you remember them too.
- If I cry or get emotional if we talk about my twin loss, I wish you knew that it isn't because you have hurt me; the fact that my twin died has caused my tears. You have allowed me to cry and I thank you. Crying is healing.

- 3. I will have emotional highs and lows, ups and downs. I wish you wouldn't think that if I have a good day my grief is all over, or that if I have a bad day I need psychiatric counseling.
- 4. Being bereaved is not contagious, so I wish you wouldn't shy away from me.
- I wish you wouldn't expect my grief to be over in six months. The first few years are going to be exceedingly traumatic for me. As with alcoholics, I will never be "cured", but will forevermore be recovering.
- 6. Our birthday, the anniversary of their death, and holidays are hard times for me. I wish you would tell me that you are thinking about my twin on one of these days, and if I get quiet and withdrawn, just know that I am thinking about them.
- 7. It is normal that most of us will reexamine our faith, values, and beliefs after losing a twin. We will question things we have been taught all our lives and hopefully come to some new understanding with our God. I wish you would let me tangle with my questions without making me feel guilty.
- 8. I wish you understood that the only way I can get through this grief is to experience it. I have to hurt before I can begin to heal.

For those of us who have lost a twin, instead of sitting around and waiting for our wishes to come true, we have a chance to teach people some of the things we have learned about our grief. We can teach these lessons with great kindness, believing that people have good intentions and want to do what is right, but just don't know what to do with us, or we can sit and wait. But, I believe our twins would want us to help the world understand.

The Fall Edition will focus on the first one:

Once A Twin, Always A Twin – The twin or multiple birth experience, whether it is experienced exclusively in utero or continued for any period of time following birth, is a profoundly important human experience, differing in major respects from all other forms of human interaction. Twin loss can be experienced in deep and unique ways. This special "twinship" experience of loss is recognized, valued, and honored by TTSGI.

The next two stories show what the principle of Once a Twin, Always a Twin means.

"Once a Twin, Always a Twin: My first TTSGI Conference" By Lea Eriksen, twin to Eve

I lost my twin, Eve to a rare form of bone cancer on September 18, 2003. I found TTSGI a couple of months after Eve died. I was feeling particularly sad one day, and I realized I can't be the only twin in the whole wide world who has lost a twin. So I googled the phrase "twin loss" and found the group. I immediately joined the Twinless Twins email group that existed at the time, and found twins who truly understood my loss. They gave me great advice like just remember to breathe. I wasn't ready to go and face my grief at the TTSGI conference that year in Chicago, but by 2005 I was ready and went to the conference in San Francisco. It was a transformative experience for me. I found the email that I wrote to the email group in the year after the conference, and I have included it below.

Sat Apr 29, 2006. It has been 2 1/2 years for me since I lost Eve. I wear a bracelet in Eve's honor that says "We are never

far apart" and lately I have been getting inquiries as to what does that mean... So even though it is difficult, I reply that my twin sister died from cancer and this bracelet was sent to me with a poem, and I wear it every day. When I say this, I am totally composed and the reactions I get are mostly awkward in nature. But I want to be honest and I want people to know what the bracelet is about despite the awkwardness. I find that overall talking about Eve with singletons is awkward. And I will tell you that with the exception of my mom, there is no one I would rather talk to about losing Eve than my twinless twin friends.

I went to the conference in SF last year and it was such a meaningful experience for me (and for my mom and little sister who also went). It was cathartic and emotional and uplifting and reassuring. The level of warmth and compassion in the room was overwhelming. I knew then that I can't let excuses get in the way, and that I have to go to the conference every year. Even though life gets busy and I neglect to write here or keep in touch. I know that this group is important to me. I'll never forget meeting Bob during the second day at the conference and he had such a kind face and he said "hi I am Bob", and I started to speak and just burst into tears. I couldn't stop crying, because I needed to get it out. He was so understanding and just held me while I cried. And then there is Joseph who took me and my family under his wing the entire conference. Also, it was such a joy spending time with Kevy and his mom too. These are but a few of the twins who I met at the conference who touched mv soul.

Anyway, to all the twins out there who find comfort on this list, just know that there is even more comfort when you meet one another in person. It is simply amazing. I hope to meet more of you in Del Ray Beach this year.

I kept the promise to myself and haven't let excuses get in the way. I have attended every single conference since San Francisco in 2005. Baltimore was my 10th conference. I honor my twinship by attending and every conference has helped me in my healing journey. I hope to see you all in Nashville next year! Trail Keeps Memories Alive

Twins Debra (Debbie) Bledsoe and Dana Bridges shared a lifetime of memories, many of them right here in Butler. "Our family ran Harry's Dari King—that's what we were known for," Dana recalls.

A s adults, the twins were the best of friends and even lived next door to one another. Debbie worked in the Butler school cafeteria and loved visiting South Padre Island.

So when Debbie was diagnosed with breast cancer at age 34, Dana was right there at her side. "Debbie was always the strongest twin," Dana says. "She fought breast cancer fiercely for 18 years, but lost her battle at age 51. When she passed, it was like losing half of myself."

Shortly after Debbie's death, Dana and her husband, Eddy, were visiting South Padre Island when they noticed a memorial trail near the city's convention center. "Debbie loved it there, so we immediately purchased a tree in her memory," Dana explains.

For most people, that's where the story might have ended, but not for Dana. When she returned to Butler, she began to think, "Why can't we have our own memorial trail right here?"

After gathering advice from friends and family, Dana presented a plan for a walking trail lined with trees to the Butler Parks and Recreation Board. "The idea was met with open arms," she says.

In April 2007, Dana's dream for a "Trail of Memories" to honor her sister took shape. With the help of Ed Orstadt, a master gardner from Adrian, family and friends laid out the first phase of the trail. It included 60 flowering trees—Cleveland pears, purple leaf plums, dogwoods and two types of redbuds. The original trail is located on the west side of the Aquatic Park, south of the Butler City Park.

"Many hours of hard work planting, mulching and watering have helped make this dream come true," Dana says. Today, the trail is part of the Bates County Community Health Foundation. Nearly 200 trees wind through the City Park and across High Street to the Bates County Memorial Hospital (BCMH) campus. The expansion allows patients, visitors and employees to use the trail near the hospital.

"Anyone can dedicate a tree to the memory of their departed loved ones," Dana says. "The trail allows us to share our pain and grief with others who have lost someone, and helps us remember how special they were to our own lives and to our community."

Though most of the trees are dedicated to people who are connected to the area, Dana says the trail has touched people worldwide. "We even had one memorial from a twin who lost her twin in the Czech Republic," she says. Memorial benches also dot the landscape so walkers can stop to enjoy the peaceful beauty of the trail.

"There are so many people and organizations who have helped make this trail possible," Dana says. "I just want to thank my husband who helps maintain the trees, the City of Butler, the Parks and Recreation Department, the BCMH maintenance crew and the Bates County Community Health Foundation for all their support. Debbie would be so proud of all we've accomplished!"

Plant a Tree, Plant a Memory!

You can adopt a tree or bench in memory of your loved one too. Flowering trees and a memorial plaque are available for a \$75 contribution. Benches are available for a \$150 donation. All contributions are tax deductible through the Bates County Community Health Foundation.

Funds also can be donated to the Debra Bledsoe Trail of Memories \$500 Health Care Scholarship. This scholarship is awarded each year at the community's Relay For Life event to an individual in the health care field pursuing advanced education.

The first time in my life that I felt lonely, I celebrated! My twin brother has just left our Queens home for college in Tuscon, Arizona while I went to Upstate New York.

I was alone. I felt loneliness. Never had I in my life experienced what all those childhood authors moaned about: loneliness. Their hearts plopped out on the page leaving purple blood (and prose) in between the periods.

Finally I knew what writers from dysfunctional families were feeling. Some were lonely because they had lost a girlfriend at twelve years old. Some because of acne. Some were lonely because they had lousy friends, cold relatives, bad neighborhoods; some went to schools inhabited by bad teachers, some were lonely because they were miserable louts. Anybody could see that, except the authors. Nobody even invited them to their table at the school cafeteria. Nobody called them.

Well, I tried feeling those feelings for myself. In the cold of Endicott, I walked along the river Sunday morning alone. I ate at my own table. I stayed home studying for six days straight without going out for a beer. I didn't write my summer sweetheart who I had met busing dishes at a Catskill mountain hotel. I didn't make one attempt to join a Fraternity.

I had to develop the emotional skills of sadness and writing skills of self-pity. Now I could write a literary masterpiece and get published. I went beyond whining and complaining with my classmates. I cried in my room, alone of course, when my Lebanese roommate was out with his olive skinned girlfriend.

I did have a few slips from tragedy to melodrama, like the time I wrote my mother

to send toothpaste. She wrote back snippingly, they sold it in drugstores.

I always walked alone to school classes helped in my loneliness by the cold. Endicott was always one degree about the necessary temperature to kill you. The thrill of loneliness like most new experiences, sex, drunkenness, and my first school grade above a "C," lasted only a few intense months.

I wrote a letter to my twin brother in Arizona baring my gashes. I wrote that I wished that I had chosen Arizona and could now be on campus in a tee-shirt. He didn't write back. Possibly he was too busy being lonely or he didn't feel like breaking up a good depression. Or he wasn't into English Literature and moping authors like I am.

The poor man transferred out of Arizona after a year. He cited bad grades and not fitting in with the wealthy classmates from the West. I'm sure, from my perspective, that our family gene pool and all the western diet of whole-cow steak and iceberg lettuce didn't help either.

Now in my adulthood from all the loneliness I have felt in between wives and with them, I know the subject. Still, I have not been overwhelmed by the drowning floods of loneliness until eight months ago when he died.

It is not my job I have lost or a partner or anything I could call conscious. It is my unconscious. I am not suffering from "What will I do?" or "Who will I do it with" or "Who will e-mail me on Valentine's day."

It's simply, "Who am I" without the physical proof that I exist.

The one I was welded to is gone.

I am a flat frame where once there was a mirror.




KEVIN'S CORNER

The third and final appearance comes a week or so later, at a similar time and place. But this time his flickering path of light comes directly towards me, not to the tree. So ever so carefully I extend out my arm, my hand and fingers in a greeting gesture, and waited. But no, he did not alight, not on the tip of my fingers or any physical part of me. I looked to both sides and even behind me, but all that greeted me was darkness and silence. He simply had disappeared from sight again. A calmness surrounded me. I realized he was not gone because I could feel him inside of me. We are still "one", my brother. You wrote me knowing you would probably go first. "I will be everywhere for you always". And my last written words to you were, "we'll be together forever, always connected no matter what comes". And so, you are always with me, my beloved brother.

John has volunteered his time and efforts to forward the cause of TTSGI and mentor those new twinless twins and encourage them to become members.



Brien and I grew up, much of our lives, in a secluded Ranger Station in the middle of the Rocky Mountains as our dad was a wildlife biologist for the U.S. Forest Service. We grew to love our many experiences in nature.

Brien and I went our separate ways in our 20s. Around this same time, he developed schizophrenia, cancer of the brain (as it is referred to), causing him to have a shortened life. I lost him at age 54.

I was his twin, but there were many times I felt maternal towards him as we aged. He could remember the cutest tales of our childhood, many of which I had forgotten; and each one made him give a smile and a hearty laugh. He would recall when we, as young hikers, wore sheep bells so as mom could keep better track of us; we found a baby rabbit in an old rusted trash can out in the woods and fought over which one of us could keep it (neither of us got to); we spent many a day arrow point hunting, a favorite family hobby. I was glad Brien had such memories to sustain him through his dreary days.

He was my gift, not only as a twin, but as a person for whom I could shower love and compassion.

I feel it is very important, as twinless twins, to come up with ways to feel that connection and bond as we live on without our twins beside us. One way Brien and I 'connected' and remained close during the years we lived apart was to plan to look up at the moon at the same time on the same night (especially during phenomena such as lunar eclipses). It was our own unique way to not feel so far apart. So today, I do the same; I know Brien is there too looking at our moon.

We each, as twinless twins, can find such ways to help us along and not feel very far from our twin. My hope is that each can and will share his or her ideas with others.


"BEGINNING WITH THE END"






"LIVING WITHOUT YOUR TWIN"
