DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- I. The United States' most northeasterly and northwesterly states names mean the same thing: "the mainland." What are these two states? (*Maine, Alaska*.)
- 2. Canada has two provinces named after the word "strait" in different Indian languages. The more easterly has a long strait leading to its capital city, and the westerly one has a long lake with the same name as the province. Using the map, can you figure out which two provinces these are? (Québec, Manitoba)
- 3. Two U.S. states border eight other states. Using the map, can you identify them? (*Tennessee*, *Missouri*)
- 4. The largest bay in the U.S. is not in the state nicknamed "the Bay State." Can you find the state with the bay, and do you know which state is the "Bay State?" (Maryland, Massachusetts)
- 5. One Canadian province has no land at all on Canada's mainland. Can you find it? (*Prince Edward Island*)
- 6. Canada's newest territory is largely inhabited by the Inuit people (sometimes called Eskimos). Despite the fact it is the largest territory in Canada, it shares land borders with only two others. What is its name, and which territories does it border? (Nunavut; Northwest. Territories and Manitoba)
- 7. One state was annexed to the U.S. under a treaty that provides for it to be divided into up to four states any time it wishes, which would add several new borders between Louisiana and New Mexico. What state is this? (*Texas*)

- 8. Churchill, Manitoba, is a tiny northern town that yearly receives an influx of polar bears who wait around town for the ice to freeze on a nearby, large body of water so they can hunt seals. Can you name this huge, shallow body of water? (*Hudson Bay*)
- 9. There are two Canadian provinces and nine U.S. states bearing an individual person's name or nickname. Using the map, can you name them? (Alberta, Prince Edward Island; Washington, Louisiana, Georgia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Virginia, Maryland, Pennsylvania, Delaware. See each entry for what each territory's name means.)
- 10. There are five Great Lakes in North America. Can you name them? (Superior, Michigan, Huron, Erie, Ontario) Can you find them all on the map?. What is the largest lake near where you live? In your country? On your continent? (Africa, L. Victoria; Asia, Caspian Sea; Australia, L. Eyre; Europe, L. Ladoga; North America, L. Superior; S. America, L. Titicaca.) In the world? (The Caspian Sea.)
- II. At 20,320 feet, Mount McKinley in Alaska is the highest mountain in the North America. What is the highest mountain on your continent? (Asia, Mt. Everest [Nepal]; Europe, Mt. Elbrus [Russian Caucasus] or Mont Blanc [France/Switzerland]; N. America, Mt. McKinley/Mt. Denali [U.S.A.]; S. America, Mt. Aconcagua [Argentina].) In the world? (Mt. Everest.)
