ARTISTRY

We believe that being a successful and well-rounded musician requires a wide range of skills. Principal study lessons are your primary means of preparing for a professional career, and you will need to master technique and cultivate musical artistry. Recent opportunities for BMus students have included:

- Masterclasses with distinguished artists including Jeroen Berwaerts, Lucy Crowe, James Ehnes and Stephen Hough.
- Workshops with composers Hans Abrahamsen, Sir Harrison Birtwistle and Mark-Anthony Turnage.
- Chamber music coaching with the Doric Quartet.
- The possibility of placements and side-by-side projects with the London Symphony Orchestra, Philharmonia Orchestra, London Sinfonietta, Knussen Chamber Orchestra, Nash Ensemble and Riot Ensemble.
- Sessions with principals from the Czech Philharmonic, Berlin Philharmonic, Royal Concertgebouw Orchestra and Lucerne Festival Orchestra.
- The chance to perform in concerts under high-profile conductors – recent visitors include Semyon Bychkov, Sir Mark Elder, Edward Gardner, Trevor Pinnock, Ryan Wigglesworth and John Wilson.

With a vibrant mix of students from more than 60 countries, the Academy is a truly cosmopolitan place to study. We are deeply committed to our identity as a global community and value everyone equally, regardless of background. As the UK's oldest conservatoire, the Academy also has an extraordinary heritage. ARTIST DEVELOPMENT

Prepare practically, creatively and strategically for a sustainable career in the music profession

We know how competitive the music business is for our graduates. That's why the focus of our Artist Development provision is to empower you - the next generation of professional musicians – to make the most of your individual skills when you leave. Since the Covid-19 crisis, it has become more important than ever to have the most up-to-date industry knowledge and know-how. With specialisms and contacts across the music world, our team has the expertise to ensure that you leave here as a fully rounded, creative and adaptable musician, with the tools to gain employment even in unpredictable times.

Our talks and seminars are designed to develop your core artist skills, self-knowledge and professional awareness. They cover a comprehensive range of practical



subjects, including preparing professional documents, auditioning well, how to get funding, working with online content, personal recording techniques, self-employed finances and how to practise effectively. We also consider all your creative and career options, with talks and workshops on effective programming, orchestral life, working with promoters, and producing and creating your own projects. Alongside our lectures and events, there are one-off sessions throughout the year focusing on more specialised areas, such as West End work, writing for video games, TV and film, and the improvising musician. Our events are run by Academy specialists and invited experts from all fields of music, including established solo artists, orchestral fixers, agents and festival directors. We engage with health and wellbeing concerns for musicians, too, inviting speakers who are experts on injury prevention and psychological resilience.

One-to-one career coaching is available to help you hone your artistic goals and objectives, and there are dedicated Artist Development Days for all students.

By the end of your time at the Academy, you should feel confident to make bold artistic choices, and to make your career in music whatever you want it to be.
