# EPA ARCHIVE DOCUMENT SN

## C O M P A R I S O N



- 1. Uses NIIMS ICS, whose principles can be applied to all types of incidents.
- 2. FOG was developed in 1995 predominanily for oil spill operations.
- 3. FOG was first published in 1996 and replaced in 2000.
- 4. FOG<sub>WOISST</sub> 00% f Oroi ISSpill Operations.

### IMH

- 1. Likewise, based on NIIMS ICS, for all types of incidents.
- 2. IMH was published in 2001 for more types of operations, and as a more comprehensive job aid.
- 3. 2001 IMH replaces the 2000 Oil Spill FOG currently in use.
- 4. IMH assumes that 80% of all response operations, that common principles and procedures; and that 20% of f response operations are unique to the type of incident.
