# Vaccine exemptions

As BGSU continues to prepare for its COVID-19 vaccine mandate to come into effect, one key aspect of the policy is that of vaccine exemptions.

As of Nov. 3, 2207 individuals had applied for exemption to the spring semester's vaccine requirement. This makes up roughly 10% of BGSU's total 22,000 students, faculty and staff. Of the requests, 1769 have currently been approved, with no information on how many have been denied or are still pending.

Among those applying for exemption were 37 faculty members. Unvaccinated class instructors will still be conducting their classes in person, with contingency plans in place should contact tracing and quarantining need to occur.

While the deadline to file a request was announced as being Nov. 1, BGSU Chief Health Officer Ben Batey said they are still accepting new requests from students who may have missed the deadline, or students who are enrolling in the spring semester.

Batey said some requests require additional information from students who may have not provided enough details in their initial form.

"An example would be sometimes people have filed for religious exemption, but they didn't really give us any information about their personal religion," he said.

Batey also told WBGU's "The Morning Show" that about half of the requests did

cite religious reasons, with the remainder mostly noting either personal conscience or medical reasons.

The university's announced policy currently only affects students attending in the spring semester of 2022. Requirements for future semesters currently remain unclear.

Batey said there has been no decision made regarding the fall semester of 2022 yet.

If an individual has their request denied, they will work with the Division of Health and Wellness to figure out what they need to do, including the possibility of having those individuals take their classes remotely.

On-campus housing is expected to follow policies similar to those currently in place, with no separation between vaccinated and unvaccinated students. It is not currently known if unvaccinated students denied exemption will see a change in their access to on-campus housing. ■

# No More ACTs or SATs

## Admissions' optional test score policy continues

BGSU's Office of Admissions has chosen to extend a policy that no longer requires new students to submit an ACT or SAT score to be admitted. This means that students applying to attend in the fall semester of 2022 may choose not to provide a score from their standardized tests.

The policy began during the fall semester 2020, as COVID-19 prevented many high school students from being able to take either exam.

Students may still submit a score if they choose, and may find certain benefits. One benefit listed by Admissions is mathematics placement, which may help a student begin their math courses in a more suitable place.

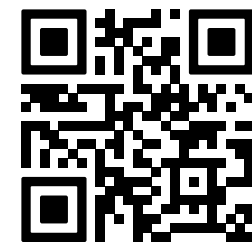
While independent scholarships may require a test score, BGSU's academic scholarships can be awarded to students who applied through test-optional. It is recommended that students have a 3.0 GPA or higher to be eligible for these academic scholarships, and new students have until Jan. 15 to apply.

Of those that do submit scores, Admissions currently reports that the average ACT score of applicants ranges from 20 to 25, and SAT scores from 1020 to 1190.

BGSU is one of many schools that engages in superscoring, where a student's overall test score is aggregated from their best section scores across multiple attempts of the exam, to the benefit of the student.

BGSU's test-optional policy is not unique in Ohio, as many major public universities in the state have independently waived their ACT/SAT requirement during the pandemic.

While the policy will go into its third year, the Office of Admissions has stated that it is not an indefinite policy, and that it will be re-evaluated for future years. ■

# USG unanimously supports HB 371

The Undergraduate Student Government unanimously passed Senate Resolution 06 to have BGSU create accessible and affordable breast cancer screenings for students.

S.R. 06 is titled "A Resolution Formally Supporting Ohio House Bill 371 and Advocating for Accessible and Affordable Breast Cancer Screenings."

HB 371 supports more cost-efficient and advanced screening options for Ohio citizens.

USG is calling for BGSU to "advocate and support those battling breast cancer by making resources like early detection mammograms available to students on campus and creating programs on campus

that educate students about how to conduct physical self-examinations."

Director of Student Safety and Wellness Abby Nichols is currently creating a webpage — to be attached to the USG webpage — designed to inform students of the Accessibility Services on campus and raise disability awareness.

Nichols explained that the website will clarify that Accessibility Services is "not limited to one type of disability" and "disability is not definable."

# Caring for your car in the winter

As winter approaches, the snow, sleet, ice and other inclement weather predicaments follow. Tireman General Service Technician Cody Dietrich explains why it is important to prepare your car for these winter months. Dietrich is 21 years old and has been working in the field for about two years. He has worked at Tireman for 10 months.

**What do you do?**

My position is more doing fluid top-off and oil changes and stuff like that.

**Why is winter car care important?**

Your car is more vulnerable to the cold. Like for instance your battery, cold temperature can cause the battery to not work properly; you won't be able to start your car.

**What should you keep in your trunk for winter?**

Definitely keep a blanket or a coat. There are winter packs you can get from the store too; they've got, I believe flashlights, they probably have a blanket and something possibly for your tires.

**Why is it important to have good tire tread for the winter?**

Well, there are actually specific snow tires you can get, so those are just designed for better traction in the snow, or the ice as well. But you can also get all-season tires, which would work well in all conditions.

**Why is it important to check tire tread and have your tires rotated?**

You want to get your tires rotated probably every 5,000 miles you put on your car because they wear differently from the front to the back. It's measured in 32nds of an inch and you have eight 32nds in the front and seven in the rear so it's probably a rear-wheel drive, so you want to rotate them to even them out.

**Are there any myths you can dispel about cars in the winter?**

I was actually just reading about that (pouring boiling water on a car to melt ice) today. If you put that on your car to melt the ice it could potentially break the windows, possibly crack your windshield.

**What kind of issues can arise if you don't prepare your car for winter?**

The worst-case scenario is, you could get stuck in the middle of a snowstorm on the side of the road, and the simplest thing is probably just sliding around on the road if you don't have good enough tires.



**“Really, just before all the snow hits, just take it in for an inspection and get everything checked over. Get your tires checked over and get your oil changed.”**

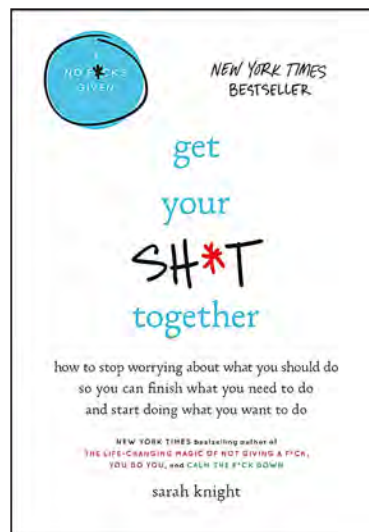


## Book:

## House Special Election Results

A special election was held on Nov. 2 for Ohio's 11th and 15th Congressional District seats in the U.S. House of Representatives. Special elections, also known as by-elections, are used to fill major offices left vacant between general elections.

The special election for the 11th Congressional District seat was called with the confirmation of Marcia Fudge as secretary of housing and urban development in President Biden's administration. The seat was won by Democratic candidate Shontel Brown, winning a large majority of 81.7% of votes cast against Republican candidate Laverne Gore.

The 15th Congressional District's special election was called after the resignation of Steve Stivers, who left the position to become president and CEO of the Ohio Chamber of Commerce. Republican candidate Mike Carey won the seat from Democratic candidate Allison Russo with 58.3% of the vote.

## Astroworld casualties

On Nov. 8, eight people were killed and many more were injured in a mass stage rush at Travis Scott's Astroworld at NRG Park in Houston, Texas. All victims identified so far are under 30 years old, with two being minors. Among the injured is a 9-year-old boy, who is now in a medically-induced coma at Texas Children's Hospital. Concertgoers recalled being pushed, falling, passing out and being trampled amidst the panic in their accounts to Houston authorities. Many are not shocked at the violent event as in 2019 three people were hospitalized after being trampled at Astroworld.

The official Astroworld Festival's put out a statement on Twitter the night of the incident, canceling the Saturday lineup and sending condolences to the families of the victims. The organizers of the festival, Live Nation Entertainment and Scoremore holdings, are being sued along with Travis Scott, Drake and NRG Park's management.

## Wood County local election results

This year's election came to a close and in Wood County 23.32% of registered voters casted their vote. There are just about 92,300 registered voters in this county, exactly 21,520 votes were cast.

On Nov. 15 the Board of Election will meet to certify provisional ballots and meet again, two days later on Nov. 17 they will meet for election certification. Meetings are held in the Board of Elections Offices conference room at 8:30 a.m.

Absentee Ballots that are received as the polls close, will be included in the results of the election.

Results posted thus far are un-official and do not include provisional ballots cast. These ballots will be included in the final count and will be accepted up to 21 days after the election. Write-in votes are only countable for those who are registered to be write-in candidates.

## Thousands of migrants at Poland-Belarus border

Tensions have been rising at the Belarusian-Polish border between Belarusian migrants and Polish border guards for months. Over 9,000 Polish troops mobilized to the border as more and more Belarusians seek to illegally cross into the country. Over 16,000 illegal attempts to cross the border have been made since August, and a third of those were made in the last month, according to CNN and Poland's border patrol. The situation continues to escalate as more than 1,000 migrants have been directly escorted to the Belarusian-Polish border by Belarusian authorities.

European officials from nations bordering Belarus, like the prime ministers of Poland and Lithuania, have accused Belarusian President Alexander Lukashenko of manufacturing the migrant crisis by pushing Middle Eastern and African refugees to other European countries.

This comes after the installment of economic sanctions on Belarus by the European Union amongst accusations against Lukashenko of stealing the presidential election and multiple human rights violations.

## Women's soccer wins 4th straight MAC Championship, gets NCAA bid

For the fourth consecutive season, the Mid-American Conference Tournament was held in Bowling Green. The semifinal round took place on Nov. 4 at Cochrane Stadium. This would be followed by the championship on Nov. 7.

In the first match of the day, top-seeded Bowling Green took down four-seeded Buffalo by a score of 1-0 to secure a spot in the championship. The 2021 championship marks the fifth consecutive appearance in the feature event for the Falcons.

In the nightcap of the semifinal round, a high-scoring match between Kent State and Ohio ended in a 3-2 victory for Kent State. This would mark the Golden Flashes return to the feature for the first time since their tournament championship in 2016. However, late in the contest goalkeeper Sarah Melén was issued a red card, disqualifying her from the remainder of the contest and the Golden Flashes' next game which would be

the MAC Championship.

In the regular season matchup, Bowling Green defeated Kent State 3-2 at Nix Stadium in Kent, Ohio. That contest featured goals from BGSU's Audrey Shea, Lacey Bethea and Madi Wolfbauer with KSU goals coming from Karly Hellstrom and Cameron Shedenhelm, who would end as the MAC's highest scoring duo for the 2021 season.

The championship match was off to a quick start as Bowling Green's Nikki Cox put the Falcons on the board first with a goal just six and

a half minutes into the game. The Falcons would continue to control a large portion of time of possession in the first half although Kent State's Cameron Shedenhelm did have opportunities to score.

In the second half the Falcons got off to a slow start but that all changed when Audrey Shea scored a header off a corner kick 69 minutes into the match. Shortly following Shea's goal, Lacey Bethea scored what would prove to be the final goal of the match sealing a 3-0 victory for Bowling Green.

Bowling Green Head Coach Jimmy Walker talked about his team following the victory.

“We’re a good team, we’ve got good players, they work hard and we just gotta keep doing what we’re doing as we get ready for the NCAA Tournament,” Walker said.

Following the match, the conference tournament team was announced and awards presented. The team consisted of four Falcons: Nikki Cox, Audrey Shea, Madi

Wolbauer and Lacey Bethea. Bethea also earned Tournament MVP honors after registering a goal in both the semifinal and final matches.

The win marked Bowling Green's fourth consecutive season of winning both the regular season and tournament championship. It is also the Falcons sixth MAC tournament victory which is the highest total of any team in the conference.

Along with the Conference title, is an automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament, which will kick off this Friday. The Falcons had to wait until the selection show Monday evening to find out who their opponent would be.

The selection show on NCAA.com revealed that the Falcons would head to Ann Arbor to take on the Michigan Wolverines whom they have already played once this season. In the first matchup the Wolverines topped the Falcons 2-1, but a lot has changed for both sides since non-conference play in August.

BGSU sixth year senior, Rachel Muller gave her thoughts on the Falcons Tournament matchup being just up the road in Ann Arbor.

"Being so close, it's gonna be great to have all the support, family, friends, alumni, fellow student-athletes. It's really exciting to know what kind of support we're gonna get," she said.

Kickoff for the first round match is set for 6pm EST on Friday, November 12th. Tickets for the game can be purchased on the University of Michigan Athletics website, or at the gate on Friday.

## 87TH BATTLE OF I-75 Falcons look to tie series against Toledo

The BGSU Falcons football team looks to keep their shot at bowl eligibility alive on Nov. 10, as they take on rival Toledo in the Battle of I-75.

The Falcons (3-6) are fresh off a bye week, following a surprise upset victory over Buffalo on Oct. 30. The Rockets (4-5) have been reeling lately, losing three out of their last four games including a heartbreaking 52-49 loss at Eastern Michigan last Tuesday, Nov. 2.

This will be the 87th meeting in the series history, with Toledo holding the slimmest of edges with a 41-40-4 series record over the Falcons, who have the opportunity to re-tie the series with a victory.

Toledo has dominated the rivalry since 2010, as they have won ten out of the last eleven meetings, and trounced the Falcons in the Glass Bowl last year by a score of 38-3.

Bowling Green hopes to stay alive for bowl eligibility, as they sit at 3-6 and need a minimum of six wins to qualify for a bowl game. Getting there would mean a win over Toledo, a win at Miami on Nov. 16 and a win over Ohio at home on Nov. 26. The Falcons sit at the bottom of the MAC as well at 1-4 overall, but the win over Buffalo was a step in the right direction, as it was their first conference win since 2019.

As for Toledo, this season has been fairly disappointing as Jason Candle's squad was expected to win the Mid-American Conference's West Division, but sit at just 4-5 (2-3 MAC). They need to win two more games to get to a bowl game, but it shouldn't be too tough of a task as they travel to Bowling Green before heading to Athens to take on Ohio, on Nov. 16, and then host Akron Nov. 27, to cap off the year. All three of those squads have a combined seven wins on the year.

Bowling Green's offense, which had been fairly stagnant all year, turned the page against Buffalo and scored 56 points, and Falcon fans hope that is signs of things to come. Falcon quarterback Matt McDonald threw for 263 yards and scored five total touchdowns against Buffalo. On the year McDonald sits at over 2000 yards and a 10-7 touchdown to interception ratio. When going to the air, Austin Osborne (48 receptions, 393 yards, one touchdown), Christian Sims (34-367-2) and Tyrone Broden (31-543-5) have represented solid targets. Broden in particular was a huge part of the win over Buffalo hauling in passes for over 100 yards and two scores. Expect the Falcons to throw early and often against a solid Rocket defense.

Toledo might have a losing record, but they have had one of the better offenses in the country. Carter Bradley began the year as the quarterback, and while he wasn't bad by any stretch, the Rockets switched over to DeQuan Finn in Oct. and he has been a good dual-threat quarterback for Toledo (1200 yards passing, 8-1 touchdown to interception ratio, 348 yards rushing, six touchdowns). Bryant Koback is probably the Rockets biggest weapon as the running back has racked up over 800 yards and the ground and almost 250 yards receiving with nine total touchdowns. Devin Maddox is the go-to guy for Finn, as he has hauled in 31 passes for 478 yards and three touchdowns.

The Falcons defense started off very strong, including a great performance against Minnesota, but they have been back on their heels lately. They rank 103rd in the country in scoring defense and 87th in yards per play. They also have been brutally bad on third down (100th in the country) and red zone defense (115th in the country). Linebacker Darren Anders has been a breakout star for the Falcons on defense, recording a MAC-best 91 tackles with 8.5 for loss and three sacks.

After over 100 years of rivalry, BGSU takes on the University of Toledo tonight, at 7pm to carry on the Battle of I-75 tradition at the Doyt.

### 2011

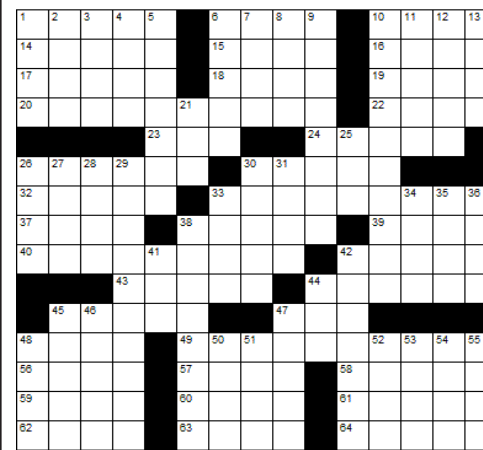
