Reigning ACM and CMA Male Vocalist of the Year **Brad Paisley** recently took his *Paisley Party Tour* to Canada, continuing his string of sell-outs. Over 225,000 tickets on 24 dates have been sold thus far in the first quarter for the outing with special guest **Dierks Bentley** and **Darius Rucker** in January, and **Crystal Shawanda** in February. The tour has sold-out thirteen of the first fourteen tour dates on the final leg, and stops March 14 at Nashville's Sommet Center.

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Curb's **LeAnn Rimes** hit No. 1 this week on the *Billboard* Hot Dance Club Play Chart with her Grammy nominated single "What I Cannot Change." According to her label, this makes her the first artist who has had a No. 1 Country song to also have a No. 1 hit on the Dance chart. Rimes has sold nearly 40 million units worldwide since 1996, and will receive the ACM's Home Depot Humanitarian Award next month in Las Vegas.

Also setting records is the new single from rapper **Eminem**, which just broke the SoundScan record for debut week downloads.

"Crack a Bottle," featuring **Dr. Dre** and **50 Cent**, was purchased 418,000 times, beating the prior benchmark of 335,000 set by **T.I.** and **Rihanna**.

Mercury Nashville's Grammy-winning duo **Sugarland** will embark on their first European tour throughout the month of March. Playing at theaters and a few military bases, the pair will visit seven countries and perform in 11 cities in the UK, Italy, France, Netherlands, Germany, Scotland, and Ireland. Labelmate **Holly Williams** will open on select dates.

Hillary Scott, Charles Kelley and Dave Haywood of Lady Antebellum will emcee and perform at the Symphony Spring Fashion Show, taking place April 21 at the Schermerhorn Symphony Center. This year's event, co-chaired by **Lake Eakin** and **Lee Ann Ingram**, features the 2009 Fall Collection of internationally acclaimed fashion designer **Monique Lhuillier**, who will also be in attendance. Scott recently donned a Lhuillier gown at the GRAMMY® Awards. All proceeds from the Spring Fashion Show go to the Nashville Symphony and the Thor Johnson Scholarship Fund.

In related news, the *Tennessean* reports the Symphony, which is preparing for next week's release of 2-CD set *Abraham Lincoln Portraits*, has been hit by the slowing economy. About \$2.6 million has had to be cut from its \$30 million annual budget, and a few staffers have been let-go, but none of the full-time musicians have been affected. As the article goes on to say, a decline in donations, ticket sales, and endowment funds sinking

via the stock market, has hurt all of Nashville's arts organizations, as it has done nationwide. In response, groups like the Tennessee Repertory Theater are using new technologies for fundraising, such as e-mail blasts and a YouTube video.

The publishing industry is also suffering in current economic conditions. Today it was announced that The New York Times Co.'s board will suspend the quarterly dividend. The company, citing falling print readership and advertising, also experienced a 74% dividend cut in November.

All I have to say is, "wow." I can't remember the last time so many records deserved a **Disc of the Day** award. How to choose between Alan Jackson's sweet/sad acoustic ballad, The Zac Brown Band's groove-a-thon, Wynonna's celestial performance, Love and Theft's dizzy pop confection, Dierks Bentley's party platter and Jefferson Ross's brilliant songwriting?

In the end, I went with the one that moved me most emotionally, "Prayer of a Common Man" by the heart-tugging **Phil Vassar.** But let me hasten to add that all seven of these records deserve your attention and support.

Carolwood Records is the new Lyric Street imprint. It is also the home of our **DisCovery Award** winning group, **Love and Theft.** Who are these guys?

Our runners up for this honor, by the way, were Mr. Ross and the duo of Nathan Chance. You can't miss Chance when he's on Music Row. He stands over 6'6" tall.

DANIELLE REED/Kissing In The Rain

The song is a mid-tempo, plain-spoken rural romance. For an unknown, she sure has lined up a stellar support team. Produced by John Carter Cash, her debut disc features sidemen like Jamie Hartford, Bob Britt, Dave Roe and Hoot Hester.

DIERKS BENTLEY/Sideways

These dudes have audio charisma, and their stage show must be pretty good, too. They've opened for Chesney, Strait, Rascal Flatts, Martina and loads of other top headliners. And the rest of his *Azalea* collection is just as strong.

ZAC BROWN BAND/Whatever It Is

WYNONNA/Sing

Writer: Rodney Crowell; Producer: Brent Maher & Don Potter; Publisher: Sony-ATV Milene/J Only, ASCAP; Curb (track) —Wy's Sing Chapter 1 album is a collection of mostly covers of classics such as "Ain't No Sunshine," "Til I Get it Right," "Anyone Who Had a Heart," "I'm So Lonesome I Could Cry" and "When I Fall in Love." Not everything is a standard, however. The title tune and first single is a thrilling, inspirational melody from a Nashville Songwriters Hall of Fame member. She soars into the stratosphere on this fabulous performance. For a sassier side of her prowess, check out the swinging revival of The Boswell Sisters' 1932 gem "That's How Rhythm Was Born." This is Wy's strongest album in years. Buy it.

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
