Students were encouraged to complete an Arts Week passport as a record of their participation and, we hope, enjoyment!





Mr Enright's colourful contribution was of particular interest to students visiting the Exhibition, with one discerning future art critic commenting, 'I've seen worse...'!





















## Ogden Trust Schools Physicist of the Year Award

Two Year 13 students, Virtue Igbokwuwe and Louise Wiener, were each awarded the Ogden Trust Schools' Physicist of the Year Award by Royal Holloway, University of London, in recognition for their attainment in A Level Physics in Year 12.

The Ogden Trust is a charitable trust that exists to promote the teaching and learning of physics and to maximise the opportunities available to young people. This includes offering scholarships to talented undergraduates.

The Award was made at a presentation evening at the University, where guests were also given a talk highlighting some of the world-class research being carried out at Royal Holloway. The students were also able to chat with some of the research staff and students to find out more about studying Physics at university.

In addition to the award each student received a £25 book token and are registered as Ogden Trust alumni.



#### **Maths Challenge Update**

Following on from the news in the last edition of Piotr Gnap's qualification for this year's Pink Kangaroo (the follow-on round to the UK Intermediate Maths Challenge ) we are delighted to say that he achieved a top 500 score from the c.6500 students who sat the PK, his score also putting him in the top 0.2% of this year's c.220,000 UKIMC entrants nationwide.

At the end of April, 123 of our Year 7 and 8 Mathematicians took on the 2017 UK Junior Challenge, with over 43% of them earning an Award Certificate.

Special mention goes to Saulius Ceckevisius and Hugo Dawson of Year 8 for their Gold Awards and to Kathryn Buchan of Year 7 whose score earns her a Gold Award, a Best (Junior) in School Award and the right to sit the Junior Kangaroo follow-on round to the JMC.

Her score puts her in the top 2% of the c.307, 000 JMC entrants nationwide.

Congratulations also go to our 11 Silver and 39 Bronze Award winners, and to the 22 who were within 1 correct answer of a Bronze Award!


#### **Sixth Form Charity Walk**

Through our community efforts we have been able to donate £1500 to each of these charities.

Other events throughout the school year have included a Year 7 Christmas card competition; a Soup Lunch to raise funds for CAFOD; Cupid's Day, which raised money for the charity Smile Train. The Year 12 Faith in Action students also raised extra funds for The Mulberry Centre and for the annual Senior Citizens Christmas Party and the party for students from Oakland Special School.

Finally, in response to the tragedy at Grenfell Tower, the school raised over £2,000 from a collection at the Choir Festival on June 15 and an Own Clothes Day for students on June 22. The money will be used to help victims through the offices of the Catholic Children's Society.
