

4th Quarter Report

The Preceptory of Balantrodoch had a busy 4th quarter, filled with food, fellowship, service, and the Spirit of Christmas. Knights and Dames volunteered together in early December, packing meals to go to Haiti at Feed My Starving Children. With the other teams present, 131 boxes were packed, providing 28,296 meals, which will feed 78 children for one year.

Of note, our 3rd quarter charity was selected in memory of Katrina Faith Gibson, the daughter of postulants Doug and Robin Childs, who died of complications of her bat-

tle with cancer this past June. The charity is the Four Diamonds Fund, which funds pe-

diatric cancer research at Penn State, but also makes up the difference insurance does not cover, providing free cancer care to all children with cancer it serves, as well as supporting families' travel expenses, lodging, etc. The charity is named for the tale of a knight, written in 1969 by 11 year old Christopher Millard during his cancer journey, and his quest for the four dia-

monds of courage, wisdom, honesty, and strength, to which we all aspire.

We also celebrated with our annual St. John's Dinner on December 27th, a formal black tie holiday celebration.

We are looking forward to our Vigil at Arms in March, to be held at Preceptor Chevalier TJ and Dame Nicole Smith's home, to be followed by the pilgrimage to Missouri for the Investiture in April.

Priory of Robert the Bruce - Athlit Commandry Story of Veterans Village by Chev. Patrick Pat McConnaughay, KTJ, Commander

About a year ago Athlit Commandry took on a new quest. We began to look into charities which had meaning to our mission as a religious military order. After some extensive research, we came up with V.V.S.D., Veterans Village of San Diego. V.V.S.D. is a very unique program to help homeless veterans get back on their feet. With five locations throughout San Diego County, VVSD is the only program of its kind in the United States.

Each year VVSD provides services to more than 2,000 military veterans, men and women, who have served and sacrificed for our country.

VVSD provides a Continuum of Care with a full range of comprehensive and innovative services for military veterans for

- Prevention
- Intervention
- Rehabilitation
- Aftercare

VVSD extends assistance to veterans in need and their families by providing:

History of V.V.S.D.

Veterans Village of San Diego was founded in 1981 as the Vietnam Veterans of San Diego.

In 1981, five Vietnam veterans, Jack Lyon, Bill Mahedy, Randy Waite, Paul Grasso, and Russ Kelly were struggling with the traumas of war and looking to enhance services from the VA that were available to them at that time. They were sitting around in a group counseling session talking seriously about mounting a combat assault on the VA. They knew they would probably get arrested, but they were desperate to shine a spotlight on the lack of medical and psychological care for Vietnam veterans.

As luck would have it, the facilitator of the counseling session was Father William Mahedy, who served as an Army chaplain in Vietnam. Mahedy made a suggestion to the group. "Why don't you take this energy and do something that will really make a difference?"

The group took the suggestion to heart and formed Vietnam Veterans of San Diego to help their comrades who were sleeping on the streets, under bridges and in parks. From this modest beginning, VVSD changed their name to Veterans Village of San Diego (2005) and have evolved over the past three decades into a nationally-recognized, non-governmental organization known for delivering innovative services to veterans.

Over the last year Athlit has contributed to VVSD, volunteered at "Stand Down", and toured their main facility. Chev. James Owen and Chev. Patrick McConnaughay were invited to their first annual appreciation luncheon this past year. The luncheon was well attended and a very rewarding experience. They met the President and C.E.O. of V.V.S.D. Kim Mitchell. Ms. Mitchell served in the United States Navy for 17 years as a Surface Warfare Officer on board surface ships and at shore command. She achieved the rank of Lieutenant Commander. She was hand selected by the Secretary of the Navy and White house to serve as a White House Military Social Aide. During her last 2 years of active duty she served as the Deputy Director of the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff Office of Warrior and Family Support. Ms. Mitchell was President and Co-founder of Dixon Center for Veterans and Military Services for the five years prior to becoming Chief Executive Officer of VVSD in 2017.

The main campus of VVSD is a beautiful facility, a reflection of the commitment to their mission. Athlit commandry is honored and proud to have a brick placed in their patio in support of such a worthwhile organization. Below is a picture of the patio and our brick.

Heilan coo) are a Scottish cattle breed.
They have long horns and long wavy coats.

They are a hardy breed due to their native environment, the Highlands of Scotland. This results in long hair, giving the breed its ability to overwinter. Bulls can weigh up to 800 kilograms (1,800 pounds) and cows up to 500 kilograms (1,100 pounds). Their milk generally has a very high butterfat content, and their meat, regarded as of the highest quality, is gaining mainstream acceptance as it is lower in cholesterol than other varieties of beef.
