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Lawton Scholars thriving amid COVID challenges

The Lawton Scholarship grows each spring with awards going to successful students from our area high schools.

Currently, there are 10 active scholars. Kenvatta Hutchinson and Maria Moreno will graduate in May 2021 from the University of Georgia (UGA). Eli Ramsey is a junior at Auburn University; Will Mc-Commons and Kristian Magee are sophomores at UGA, and Destiny Arwood is in her second

year at Athens Technical College. Three of the four most recently announced Lawton Scholars began their college pursuits this fall: Jessica Patino at Georgia Tech; Zach Tolleson at Covenant College; and Ricquaria Griggs at the Savannah College of Arts and Design (SCAD). McGinnis Bryan will begin at UGA in January 2021.

The pandemic has brought with it some interesting challenges to all students, and the Lawton Scholars are no exception. Greg and Anna Lawton used a Zoom call recently to check in, and six of the 10 scholars were able to join the call and talk about how things are going for them. All indicated that they were doing well and staying safe. Most of their classes are online with the exception of some labs they must attend in person. All the Scholars said they missed actually going to a class and interacting with others,

but they said their professors had been accessible and helpful. Most of them indicated that their exams would be online and that some would be project-based rather than typical tests.

The students are using their experiences to discover things about college and about themselves, some of which is surprising to them. Sophomore Kristian Magee is studying to be an educator, and she referred to this fall as a "self-discovery semester." She said she had thought she wanted to teach math but has discovered that she is better at teaching language arts. Freshman Ricquaria Griggs said she had learned that in college, "they really do treat you like an adult." She has had to schedule all her own classes and figure out how to manage things on her own. But she said it had been a positive experience. Others also said their career focus may shift because of something they had done for a project or learned from their class work.

As for campus life, they all said there isn't much of it. UGA senior Kenvatta Hutchinson said it is really strange walking on campus and not seeing a lot of students. Ricquaria Griggs said that at SCAD, they have temperature kiosks at the entry to the cafeteria, so everyone has to stop there before entering. The measures taken on campuses are being done to protect students and faculty alike, but it makes for a strange

learning environment and a very limited social life.

Several students are involved in campus organization even though they are having to meet virtually and not do as many activities. UGA senior Maria Moreno is tutoring elementary school students at an on-campus location and completing her application to graduate school, which she hopes to start next fall. Freshman Jessi Patino is part of a Residence Hall Association that meets virtually and plans activities for students living in the dorms. She is also working part time near Georgia Tech's campus. But even with these additional things, the Scholars are keeping up with their classes. All expressed confidence that they will finish well at the end of the fall semester.

One of the most unique parts of the Lawton Scholarship is the mentoring the students receive from the Lawton family. Founders Greg and Anna Lawton stay in touch through email, phone calls and now, Zoom conferences, and they support the Scholars in all phases of their college experience. From the newest freshmen to the most seasoned seniors, these students achieve success through dedication to and discipline in their work. They are strong role models for Greene County and are excellent representatives of the vision the Lawton familv has for the Scholars.







December is a great time to build fish attractors

any anglers are sitting at home thinking the fish are not biting due to the cold weather. Many have just hung up their fishing gear waiting for springtime. However, there is one activity that can greatly help your year-round fishing.

That activity is building fish attractors. One of the top subjects that I receive emails about are fish attractors. It is not until after Christmas that I see trucks and trailers headed to the lakes loaded with discarded Christmas trees that will be placed in the lakes as fish attractors.

Placement of the Christmas trees or any other type of material to attract fish is a good idea but one major consideration is the current produced by the Georgia Power pump-back in lakes Oconee and Sinclair. Without properly weighting the trees or other materials, the current will move your hard work overnight.

I had to learn that hard lesson when I initially began placing fish attractors in the lakes. Fish attractors placed in the main lake are especially vulnerable to water current that is so strong that it can easily move a single cinder block holding an attractor. Attractors placed in coves are not as likely to be moved by the current, but they also need to be adequately weighted.

Almost any object placed in the water



can attract baitfish and game fish but the type of material, the size of the material and where that material is placed can mean the difference between success and failure. It can mean the difference between a pretty good place for an angler to catch an occasional fish or it can an excellent place where an angler is almost assured of catching good numbers of fish regularly.

I love to build and place structures in lakes to improve my opportunity to catch fish. Why would I be excited about the activity of building and placing fish attractors? After all it is hard work especially as I have gotten older and it can be done in the most unpleasant of weather conditions. Nothing is more rewarding than to construct a fish attractor, place it in the lake in a good location and then return to that fish attractor and catch fish.

I have over the years had both success and failure from my building and placement of fish attractors but I have learned from my failures. Other than current consideration and proper weighting, one of the most important aspects of building and placing fish attractors in the lake is the material used to construct the attractor.

You need to consider the type of structure material that is best suited for building a fish attractor and do not get carried away and assume you need to create an underwater forest. Sometimes less material is better.

You want to use materials that will last for some time and will not require you to redo the structure every year. I have found that old Christmas trees will last at the most two years (some varieties will last longer) where some hardwood trees will last two to six years. Unfortunately, beavers can be a problem when using hardwoods and overnight the beavers can eat away your hardwood attractor if placed in shallow water.

However, structures made from PVC pipe, vinyl and other manmade materials

will last just about forever. One problem with some materials like PVC and vinyl is that they can be hard to detect on your fish finder. I have several structures that I have placed in the lake that are made from hardwood trees. I try to improve or add to those structures about every two to three years.

One problem with many woody products is density. Most Christmas trees are evergreens that have limbs and foliage that are too dense. They will attract small baitfish because baitfish can hide in the dense foliage. However, larger fish will find it difficult to hide and maneuver within the tree.


The density problem with evergreens is what lead me to initially using hardwoods and then lead me to using wild bamboo. I now use wild bamboo because it will last a long time in the water and beavers do not like it.

The bamboo is readily available along many local roadways, easy to work with and comes in lengths from five to 35 feet. That makes it suitable for almost any depth of water. It weighs much less than evergreens and hardwoods and is not nearly as dense.

Next week I will discuss some ways you can build your own attractors and look at some of the best locations for those attractors. I will provide an update on the latest attractors placed in Oconee and Sinclair by the Georgia Wildlife Resources Division.

Lake Oconee Fishing Forecast

Lake Conditions - The lake is stained above the Interstate 20 and clear in the rest of the lake.

Water Temperature - 58-60 degrees

Largemouth Bass -GOOD - The shad are in the creeks, coves and small pockets and the fishing for largemouth is good on a variety of lures. Jigs are catching bigger fish around boat docks. Soft plastics fished on jig heads and Shaky head rigs are producing shallow fish around boat docks and seawalls. Small crankbaits and spinnerbaits are working well. Jigging spoons will take some largemouth that are mixed in with striped/hybrid bass around schools of shad at 17-30 feet of water. Crappie - VERY GOOD - Longlining jigs over brushpiles, treetops and in the large coves and creeks is very good now.

Striped Bass/White Bass/Hybrid Bass - The striped/hybrid bass can be found from Sugar Creek all the way to the dam. Find schools of striped/hybrids and drop minnows or shad into schools. A good jigging spoon bite is occurring for the deeper fish. Look for a mixed bag of striped/hybrid and largemouth on the jigging spoon at 17-30 feet.

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



More costs than just the purchase price

ell, you found the perfect home, you have put in the offer and it has been accepted. Everything is going smoothly, but now you want to know if there are other expenses that you will have to take out of your pocket to close.

Some expenses will fall upon the seller, others you will split, and others will be your sole responsibility.

- Appraisal
- Survey and title search
- Inspection
- Earnest money
- Transfer taxes
- Deed and mortgage recording fees
- Escrow
- Title insurance

DOWN PAYMENT: A down payment is the cash you pay upfront to get a home loan. It is deducted from the total amount of your mortgage



and represents the beginning equity — your ownership stake — in a house and property.

LOAN ORGINATION FEE: Personal loan companies can charge origination fees to cover the cost of processing your loan application and paying out the funds. Instead of a flat fee you can expect to pay a percentage of your total loan amount.

MORTGAGE PROTECTION IN-SURANCE: PMI is designed to protect the lender, not the homeowner. Mortgage protection insurance, on the other hand, will cover your mortgage payment if you lose your job or become disable, or it will pay off the mortgage when you die.

APPRAISAL: An appraisal fee covers the cost of having a professional appraiser evaluate a home and estimate the market value of the home.

SURVEY & TITLE SEARCH: While not required, surveys are another means for lender to verify the soundness of a property as a loan security. Title search, or an investigation into a property's ownership, mortgage surveys examine land and structure boundaries against their descriptions on legal documents.

INSPECTION: We always recommend a buyer has an inspection. It only makes good sense to know the condition of the home. You may want to have a termite inspection and a lead paint inspection (if the home was built before 1978). Many of our clients will have someone inspect the roof and heat and air conditioning unit.

EARNEST MONEY: When you sign a contract, you'll also pay a deposit called earnest money, also known as

good faith money. This money is required to show you're serious about wanting to buy the house. The earnest money is applied toward the purchase price if the deal goes through.

TRANSFER TAXES: A transfer tax is the city, county or state's tax on any change in ownership of real estate. A recording is normally a small flat amount while mortgage recording taxes are a percentage of the sale price, like transfer taxes.

DEED AND MORTGAGE RECORD-ING FEES: Deed as well as mortgage recording fees are also due at closing which depending on the state, could be arranged by either an attorney or title company.

ESCROW: Set up at closing, escrow accounts hold funds for property taxes.

TITLE INSURANCE: Insurance which shields you and the lender in case disputes about the house's ownership arise.

The expenses mentioned above can vary depending on attorneys, title companies, inspectors, appraisers and taxes depending on your state.






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
