Remember when... The Maiden Cruise by Randy Groen

It was on June 8, 1975 when the USS THOMAS C HART set sail for her first major cruise. She had been on cruises before. Two trips to GTMO, some shake down cruises, training exercises etc., but until that date, she had not been on a trip that was longer then a month or so. She started this voyage by sailing across the Atlantic to the Azores for refueling. She then sailed to Norfolk England, Stavanger Norway. In Norway, the ship was visited by former US Vice President Hubert H Humphrey. She then sailed onto the Mediterranean Sea. Since this cruise took place during a world fuel crisis, the ship spent a lot of time in port in Naples, but she still managed to visit Palma De Majorca, Bizerte Tunisia, and Athens Greece. She also spent time in Taranto Italy and also Catania and Messina in Sicily. Upon completing her time on the Med the ship sopped in Gibraltar, and sailed across the Atlantic to Gibraltar with fuel stops in the Azores and Bermuda. She arrived to her home port of Norfolk on December 22, 1975.

The Hart established herself as a first class warship on this cruise. She was one of the few ships that survived both of the two war games that she participated in during this cruise. This was a remarkable feat, especially when you consider that close to 90% of the ships

participating were deemed out of commission within the first two hours of the start of these exercises. She gained a reputation as being very capable in anti-submarine warfare. She was credited with sinking a sub during one of the war games and actually detected a real Russian nuclear sub while cruising in the Med. This sub had gotten away from its U.S. surveillance and was traveling freely around the Med until the crew of the Hart detected it.

After the aircraft carrier USS JOHN F. KENNEDY had ran into the USS BELKNAP, the Hart was one of the first ships to give assistance to her. The Crew from the Hart helped the Belknap crew to fight the fires on board. A large medical emergency room was improvised aboard the Hart to treat the 26 injured sailors that our boats evacuated from the Belknap. Ten of the most critically injured Belknap sailors were then evacuated from the Hart to the Kennedy by the ships helicopter.

All in all, this was a pretty eventful and impressive maiden voyage for the Hart. Her crew performed admirably and provided a great start for the Hart. In future editions of this newsletter, I will offer some of my recollections of this ships first extended cruise.

The Board has approved the following incentives:

1. We will track the number of new members who list the name of the shipmate who told them about TCHVA. I've added a line on the membership form that asks for the name of the person who told the shipmate about TCHVA. If we get a minimum of 25 new members we intend on offering a nice prize.

Dirt Sailors By Todd Black

You might not be aware of it but today nearly 10,000 United States Navy sailors are either serving in, or in training to fill positions in Iraq and Afghanistan in the Global War on Terrorism. These are significantly different missions for our sailors, providing administrative and logistics support for primarily Army units overseas.

Some of the missions our shipmates are serving in are familiar; river patrols, explosive ordnance disposal, maritime port security. Others are more diverse such as an Information Technology ("Radioman" for those of you who missed the rating name change a few years ago!) Chief Petty Officer who served under me. He volunteered for one of these "Individual Augmentations" (IA) missions and found himself running the communications system for the Afghan President.

Of course we all go where the orders tell us to go, but perhaps some of us aren't always aware of the sacrifices sailors are making today in this unusual war. For those of you who might live outside a military community, it is important to remember those on "Dirt Sailor" patrol and remind our friends and fam-

ily who might not be familiar with what we all do, and of the sacrifices that our entire military makes every day.

Today I have five sailors serving in or training for an IA. Their orders take them away from their assigned command for anywhere from 8-15 months. Even afloat units are giving up sailors to serve on IA when required.

So I ask you as the holiday season approaches, please remember that our shipmates continue to serve around the world, and even in some places that we never thought we'd sail. Afghanistan (June 15, 2006) - U.S. Navy Culinary Specialist Matthew P. Julian from Greece, Rochester, New York, is promoted to Second Class Petty Officer in a ceremony held at Afghanistan Provincial Reconstruction Team (PRT) Sharana, Paktika Province. Petty Officer Julian is assigned to the Los Angeles-class submarine USS San Francisco (SSN 711), but is currently one of thousands of Navy Individual Augmentees (IA), providing a vital support role on the ground in Afghanistan and Iraq. Julian is also the first Sailor serving in boots-on-the-ground billets to be meritoriously promoted through the Navy's Command Advancement Program (CAP). Under CAP, commanding officers at sea are allowed to promote just one of their Sailors to the next paygrade each year.
