Jets And Planes To Entertain Crowds At Pensacola Beach Air Show

Otto The Helicopter Clowns Around

The stirring notes of the National Anthem will occupy the air space over Casino Beach to kick off the Pensacola Beach Air Show, Saturday, July 12-13 at 1 p.m. All eyes turn skyward for the Team AeroDynamix flyover in a missing man formation. Not all the Air Show acts are so serious. Otto the helicopter will appear mid-show with his special brand of comedy, acrobatics and antics orchestrated by pilot Roger Buis.

Gary Ward and Skip Stewart will follow the opening ceremonies with aerial acrobatics. Ward puts his MX2 aircraft through one of the most exciting performances you will ever see. The entire sequence is jam packed with breathtaking gyrations that range from zero speed hovers to dives in excess of 250 miles per hour. They will yield the skies to the Lima Lima Flight Team's T-34 demonstration. The six airplanes will fly formation configurations, from the six ship wedge and double arrowhead, to the basic four and diamond maneuvers. The team has developed a series of formation aerobatics which demonstrate the full range of the T-34 performance envelope.

The show turns theatrical with two jet Warbirds battling in a dog fight. Red Star and The Dragon will duel in the skies with 800 mile per hour head-on merges, scripted like a Hollywood film.

"Visually stunning, our Viper-29 Red Star and BAC-167 Strikemaster create a battle of good versus evil," said Pilot Jerry Conley. "The crowds will love it."

After the old school dog fight is complete, one of the youngest air show celebrities in the world will fly across the skies above Pensacola Beach. Kevin Coleman, 21, flies the one-of-a-kind Extra 300SHP.

Coleman balances his air show appearance schedule with his studies at Louisiana Tech where he is pursuing a degree in business and aviation.

Kids of all ages are prone to laughter when they see Otto the Helicopter, piloted by Roger Buis. During Otto's comedy show he entertains the crowds by blowing bubbles, playing with his yo-yo, shooting smoke in all directions, towing banners, all while interacting with the announcer.

The Air Show takes a twenty minute intermission for spectators to cool off in the Gulf, which is closed to swimmers while the planes are performing.

The second half of the show is equally as thrilling with Lima Lima, Gary Ward and Skip Stewart performing along with Team AeroDynamix, which brings eleven planes to the show. From the moment Flight Lead and Team Founder Mike "Kahuna" Stewart calls "smoke on" in the opening burst, Team AeroDynamix masterfully maneuvers its fleet through air show center to create an action adventure performance for spectators.

"No other air show act in the world puts as many aircraft before the crowd at one time as does Team AeroDynamix. The resulting nonstop action is one reason spectators rate this show among their favorites, said Stewart. "From the ground, people watch all of us flying into and out of difficult formations right in front of them, and they share the same sense of anticipation and exhilaration that we feel up in the air."

Friday's Air Show is a dress rehearsal for Saturday's event. The fan experience is comparable on both days with the same vendors, displays, activities and thrills. Show Central will include a Guy Harvey kiosk to sell t-shirts and posters. A portion of the proceeds will be donated to the USO. Refreshments will be for sale under the Beach Chamber's big tent. Look for Hemingway's, Bamboo Wilie's, Repicis Italian Ice, Relay for Life and the Santa Rosa Kid's House booths to quench

your thirst or fill your picnic basket. If you forget your sunscreen, Ocean Potion will be on the beach handing out free sunscreen to Air Show spectators.

For the first time, the Pensacola Beach Air Show will include a free concert, Saturday evening at the Gulfside Pavil-

ion. The Tams, a show band from Atlanta, Georgia, will take the stage at 7 p.m. Spectators are encouraged to bring chairs and blankets. Coolers are allowed but leave pets at home. There is no charge for the concert which is compliments of the Santa Rosa Island Authority.

~ Tips for Air Show Weekend ~

Your Arrival Maneuver:

Come early. Plan to stay all day. Parking is free in the public areas and fills up fast. Residents will tell you, ride the trolley, bike or walk to the show site. Good advice. Free Trolley service begins at 7 a.m. on Friday and Saturday. Trolleys will whisk you where you need to go. After the air show traffic abates, there will be two trolleys running until midnight.

What To Bring:

A load of patience and a cooler full of water. Sunscreen and snacks. Beach chairs and umbrellas. Beach businesses will be open and serving before, during and after the show.

Keep Your Cool:

The Gulf is open for swimming under the watchful eye of the Pensacola Beach lifeguards except during the air show performances. All other water remains available for swimming—after all, this is an island. There will be a giant water mister set up at the Casino Beach.

Stay hydrated. Officials stress the importance of water all day long.

Helpers:

If you feel the effects of the heat such as dizziness, headache or worse, trained staff is on site to help. Pensacola Beach Lifeguards and emergency medical personnel are plentiful and will know just what to do.

Hear ye, Hear ye:

Bonnie and David McDonald bring the power of Boogie, Inc. to the Air Show. Everything from weather announcements, lost children and the official Air Show narration will be broadcast to the spectators through their speakers. They let you know when the Gulf closes to swimming and give the all-clear to get back in

Friday Only:

The Baptist Hospital sponsored skin cancer check station, affectionately referred to as The Mole Patrol, will operate on Friday, July 12 from 8 a.m. to noon. Stop by and let them look you over.

Show Central:

The Pensacola Beach Chamber coordinates a minimarketplace under the oversized white tent. Shop. Sip. Grab a bite to eat. Ocean Potion and BP, who are sponsors this year, will have tents on site, too.

Float My Boat

The waterways around the island are packed with vessels. Notice this year the U.S. Coast Guard won't be the focal point in the Gulf. Boaters should look for the buoys in the Gulf cordoning off the no boat zone. As always, it's worth walking over to see the flotilla in the Sound and Little Sabine Bay. Swimmers should use caution near the hundreds of pleasure craft.

Exit Strategy:

Chill out. If you don't have to rush, don't. Walk to a nearby beach restaurant. Get in the air conditioning. Go shopping. Go swimming.

If you are compelled to leave immediately, use care. Be patient. Be sober. Deputies will direct traffic.

If you are on your bicycle or on foot, the same things apply.

Remember the free concert begins at 7 p.m. so stick around or return.

"That's my Great Uncle Lester Anderson," she wrote. "Did I win?"



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Committee Seeks Funding For Iconic Trolleys

A vision of double decker trolleys traveling along island avenues prompted Santa Rosa Island Authority Administrative Committee members Ed Guernsev and Dave Pavlock to vote in favor of adding that item to the RESTORE Act project funding requests. The discussion during the June 26 meeting included increasing the number of days trolley service is offered and adding two double decker trolleys along with a request to stabilize the shoulders on State Road 399 to allow for parking from Portofino to Park East.

The ongoing challenge of how to accommodate the increasing number of vehicles clogging beach streets and overburdening parking lots was a recurring theme during the Committee's discussion. The free trolley system, which currently operates from Memorial Day Weekend to Labor Day from 4 p.m. to midnight, is funded by the Santa Rosa Island Authority.

'We have a finite number of parking places," said Pavlock. "We can add more, but we are a small beach. At some point you will always be full. Let's make it as pleasant as possible and be as hospitable as we can to those who get here.'

In November 2012, a letter was sent to the Escambia County Commissioner Grover Robinson,

whose district includes Pensacola Beach, outlining six projects the SRIA would like considered for RESTORE Act funding. The monies are part of the fines to be levied on BP as a result of the Deepwater Horizons Oil Spill. The Quietwater Beach Nourishment project and the Sabine Channel Dredging have already been completed, so the SRIA seeks to amend their request. The current requests are: Gulfside Beach Renourishment with dune walkover modifications, \$16 million; Gulfside Pavilion Improvements, \$1 million; Turtle Friendly Lighting and Pedestrian Safety Lighting in core area, \$2.6 million; and Pedestrian Boardwalks, \$3.2 million.

Dr. Thomas Campanella voted against, so the item will come before the Full Board on July 10.

The Committee also approved a request from Executive Director Buck Lee to seek a storage facility to rent or purchase in Gulf Breeze. The Santa Rosa Island Authority is required to maintain documents, equipment and seasonal items which need to be stored. In the case of a storm, this storage location would allow for evacuation of the additional items. Lee will bring a report to

Finance Director Dottie Ford presented the April financial statements noting that the \$599,694 in lease fee collections was 3.8 percent less than the previous year. She attributed the drop in revenues to foul weather. For the vear-to-date the revenues are up 3 percent.

The Architectural and Environmental Committee unanimously approved the timeline for the construction of a new Visitors Information Center with the project being advertised for bid in July. If approved by the full board, the construction would be slated to begin October 14. The building site is located at the northern point of the Casino Beach parking lot above a current retention pond area. The building will be a single story on pilings with a shaded porch. This design will create no impact to the current number of parking places in the lot.

The Development and Leas-Committee approved the operation of a Hertz Rental Car self service kiosk to be located in the Hilton lobby. According to SRIA Director of Administration Russ Scarritt the kiosk is similar to a vending machine and two to three cars would be parked at the Hilton for rent.

The Committee also received a report on a new landbased waterslide which will begin operation on the beach behind Castaway's. The slide, which will

be inflated on a daily basis, is 60 feet long and is owned by Don and Christie Robarts of Dockside Beach Rental Services.

Gulf Power may prove to be the Grinch who stole Christmas if an economical compromise cannot be reached for the Santa Rosa Island Authority's use of their power poles. For years, the SRIA has attached their holiday decorations to the power poles lining the core area, but Gulf Power now requires that an insurance policy be written to protect the company from any liability and damages. Scarritt reported that the least expensive policy is \$2,500. Director Lee is currently in discussion with the power company to seek alternatives. If none can be reached, the SRIA staff recommends discontinuing the use of power poles for decorating.

The SRIA Full Board meeting is Wednesday, July 10 at 5 p.m. at #1 Via de Luna. The meetings are open to the public. Agendas are available online at www.sria-fla.com.

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

But, I do have a great one to share and it can be made with any seafood, not just the scallops in its title. So, let's cook.......

Scallop Ceviche 1 pound sea scallops, chopped

1/3 Cup lime juice Zest and juice of one lemon 2 Large oranges

2 Tbsp. chopped cilantro 1 Tbsp. chopped jalapeno chile

½ tsp. salt 1/4 cup slivered red onion 1 Avocado, cubed

Mix scallops, lime juice, lemon zest with lemon juice in a bowl. Chill, stirring often until scallops turn opaque, about 20 minutes. Segment and chop one orange and juice the other. Add segments, juice and remaining ingredients to scallops and stir gently to combine. (The citrus juice "cooks" the seafood so you are not eating it raw.) Serve with tortilla chips - great cold dish for summer.

Chamber Members See Strong Summer, Stable Shoulder Season

The Chamber's lodging partners confirmed that occupancy levels are high and the Air Show weekend is nearly sold out.

"We have not had one cancellation for the July 12-14 weekend," said Judy Nicholson of Resort Quest Wyndham Resorts. "We notified our guests that the Blue Angels were not flying but the Pensacola Beach Air Show was scheduled with a great list of civilian acts."

Ron Wilson, Southern Resorts concurred. "We are full. The lack of Blue Angels did not drop our reservation numbers. We are ready for a great summer."

President Nicole Stacey welcomed three new businesses, Boogie Inc., Go Retro, and Gulf Coast Tents to the Chamber and shared a list of 89 renewing Chamber member's names. Included in her report were the Visitor's Center statistics for May which showed a 23 percent

increase in guests over the previous year. The Santa Rosa Island Authority contracts with the Chamber to manage the Visitor's Information Center.

Pensacola Beach Advocates President Jim Cox updated the business group on the turtle lighting ordinance noting that it has been approved by the SRIA and the Planning Board and will go before the Board of County Commissioners July 11.

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Beach School Growing, Campus Additions Needed

The demographics of the Beach are changing according the Pensacola Beach Elementary School Principal Jeff Castleberry, who announced that there are 22 pre-registered kindergarteners. Each is a Pensacola Beach resident. His announcement came during the School's Board meeting, June 24. Pensacola Beach Elementary is a charter school which will allow students from other areas to enroll, provided the enrollment cap has not been met. In recent years, there have been a few slots available to off-island students through a lottery process.

Although Beach residents are paying ad valorem taxes, half of which go to the Escambia County School system, the Beach School does not receive this funding. The state and donations from the community support the nationally recognized Blue Ribbon School.

The Board authorized a number of improvements to the school to be complete prior to the August 19 opening day.

"New textbooks, awning repair and annual testing are reflected in this month's financials," said Board President Todd Mc-Curdy. "Repairs to the classrooms are set to begin this week."

In an effort to accommodate the students' needs, the Board voted to begin the process of adding two new classrooms to the campus. The Board tasked McCurdy with contacting an architect and the company who provided the modular buildings currently in use. The Board will execute a fundraising campaign after cost estimates are obtained.

A unanimous vote approved the renewal of Principal Jeff Castleberry's contract along with his staff. The teaching staff is Jennifer Neal, kindergarten, Sarah Farej, first grade, Debbie Campanella, second grade, Joy McLaurine, third grade, Erin Olson, fourth grade, and Tara Turk, fifth grade. Jennifer Magee is the School office manager. Shelby Smith coordinates testing and Monika Springer is the technology coordinator. Returning instructors include Mary Holway, music, Ginny Baynes, Physical Education and Stephany Heath, art. Bruce Mays is the bus driver.

Beach School teachers become students during July according to Shelby Smith. The staff will attend common core courses and

software training workshops.

The Board approved the annual Back-To-School luncheon for teachers which will be at The Grand Marlin Friday, August 16.

"It's a great time for the teachers to socialize and get

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ready for a successful school year," said Smith.

The Board meets on Monday,

July 22 at 7 a.m. at the Hilton's H2O. The meetings are open to the public.



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

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

The finals will take place at the Taste of the Beach, September 14 at 3 p.m. Celebrity Chef Andrew Zimmern will serve as one of the judges.







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

It's Like Riding A Bike

I am often asked a series of questions about bicycles by new triathletes. First, there's "what kind of bike should I get?" That is usually followed by "how much does it cost?"? And, finally, there's the inevitable "will an expensive bike make me faster?" These are all very good questions and merit thoughtful answers.

If you've watched the Tour de France, you have seen amazing athletes riding fantastic bicycles at high speeds over difficult terrain. These machines are not the Schwinns or Huffys your Dad rode "14 miles in a driving snowstorm" to get to school. They are the lightest, most advanced, fastest bikes ever made. Formed of space-age materials that are incredibly light and strong, they are engineering and aerodynamic marvels. They are tested in wind tunnels repeatedly with constant tweaking until they cut through the wind with minimal drag. If you are inclined to spend a lot of money you can ride a copy of any of the bikes you see on

Let's review the basics to begin to address the questions referred to earlier. First, there are "hybrid" and "mountain" bikes. These are lumped into the "fat tire" category, although they can be quite different. They are usually made of steel or aluminum. Hybrids have upright handlebars, a thicker seat, multiple gears and wide, smooth tires. They are made for paved surfaces. The mountain bike is more rugged, has straight handlebars, many gears and knobby tires. It is used for off-road cycling and is seen on television shows where guys ride into trees or off high things (like buildings or monstrous ramps) that they shouldn't. Both of these bicycles weigh more, sometimes have suspension systems and are not really built for straightaway speed. Can you ride one in a triathlon? I completed ten triathlons riding on a hybrid bicycle and each of those races was a lot of work. You can do it, but I wouldn't.

The "road" bike is the allpurpose bicycle used by most cyclists and triathletes. It's what was called a "10 speed" way back in the day. It has thin tires, curved handlebars, many gears (21 is pretty standard) that you can shift into and usually has this thin seat that looks uncomfortable, because it is. The cyclist is bent forward toward the front tire for most of the ride. It's made for smooth paved surfaces and is the bike you'll see for most of the Tour de France. It's usually made of aluminum or carbon fiber or a combination of both.

If you watched the Team Time Trial in the Tour or the Ironman World Championship at Kona, you saw a "time trial" or "triathlon" bicycle. The geometry of the bike is more extreme, the riders are hunched over more severely into "aerobars" and the bikes look even more aerodynamic. They are built to give the rider an advantage by severely decreasing his wind resistance. They're usually made of carbon fiber although many have metal

So, I would try out different road bikes at a bicycle store (or borrow a friend's) before I bought one. The most important thing is to get a bike that fits you and doesn't make your back, neck and shoulders ache. You do not have to pay a lot of money for your new machine. There are good, brandnew, entry road bikes for less than \$1000. However, you do not have to buy a new bicycle - Craigslist (among many sources) often has great bikes being sold by those looking to move up to a more advanced model. Later, when you are really, really hooked on triathlon and you really, really want to buy that \$10,000 bike, we can talk again.

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After the two record-breaking sea turtle nesting seasons we had in 2011 and 2012, it's somewhat discouraging to have fewer nests so far this year. Nest numbers are down by 50 percent compared to this time last year, but we are still hoping for an uptick any day now.

There is a possibility that the cooler air and water temps this spring may have contributed to a later arrival of our sea turtles since we have noticed a few other delays. Birds such as Black Skimmers and endangered Least Terns, which nest in colonies, have been more skittish and unsettled this year, and even taken longer settling into nesting sites. A few Black Skimmers broke away from their colony to set up solitary nests here and there and, if disturbed, abruptly abandoned a site for another which was apparently more desirable to them. I've asked bio-techs about the behavior I've seen, but they could only offer conjecture. Whatever the cause, I'm really missing those little skimmer chicks.

I may be the only person who noticed the absence of ghost crabs on the beach when patrol started on May I, but I hardly saw any at all during the first three weeks of sea turtle season this year. Their absence didn't bother me since the ornery little critters make a regular habit of raiding our sea turtle nests, devouring the eggs, or even munching on

the hatchlings as they emerge. Nature can indeed be cruel. By the first part of June, however, ghost crabs began to emerge with their alien-like eye stalks popping up from holes across the beach like prairie dogs in the desert, skittering here and there, populous as ever.

Cownose Rays, frequently called "May rays," which appear in our area on their northern migration by Memorial Day, didn't appear in large numbers until a few weeks later. Scientists say the rays' northern migration may be triggered by water temperatures and their southern migration by sun orientation. My stepdaughter and her family generally visit Pensacola Beach each year for a couple of weeks near the end of June through the first week of July, so it was the first time they had seen large schools of "May rays" in anything other than a YouTube video. What an experience for them! Though fearful at first of the odd-looking creatures with their cow-like noses and wide-winged bodies, the family was amazed at the large groups of rays which swam past, artfully gliding around them like a soft sea breeze.

This brings us back to our sea turtles. Will we finally have a surge of nesters in the next two


