The following weekend ShakerFest celebrates the island's fifth anniversary of rebuilding from Hurricane Ivan. The fun continues as the Pensacola Beach Chamber of Commerce showcases Island chefs' signature dishes at Taste of the Beach, September 19-20. Hey Mon, Come Dance to the Music of the Island

Beach Reggae Rules, Sauce Boss Rocks

Come to the Island. Sip the rum. Dance to the steel drums. Where are you? In Jamaica? On Saint Lucia? At the Bahamian Goombay? No, you may think you have been transported to some exotic island this weekend, but you are on Pensacola Beach where Bamboo Willie's is hosting its annual Jamaican Festival beginning at 4 p.m. on Friday, September 4. There will be three stages of great entertainment throughout the weekend.

All the Boardwalk merchants will hold a sidewalk sale and there will be booths serving authentic Jamaican delicacies. The popular Kid's Zone at the family festival will be open on Friday, Saturday and Sunday featuring Rainbow the Clown and Face Painters.

All this leads to Sunday when Bamboo Willie's presents its wildest, loudest and wackiest events, The Annual Bath Tub Races and Anything That Floats competitions. Anybody can star in these two reality events. If you sign up for the Bath Tub races, you will very likely win one of the many prizes offered and you will be contributing your entry fee to the Pensacola Beach Chamber of Commerce. There will be two paddlers per boat, paddling a prescribed course. Top prizes will be the coveted beer steins which have been featured as trophies for a number of years. The entry fee, all of which goes to the Chamber, is \$30. Bamboo Willie's provides the tubs and the races start at 2 p.m.

The hilarious contest that follows the tub races is Anything That Floats. And Robert Gleim, Bamboo Willie's general manager

says they mean that. Any kind of floating contraption is eligible. There is a prize for the most creative boat.

In addition to most creative, champions in the costume category will be named and even a Best Sinker trophy will be given.

"There's no better place to celebrate Labor Day weekend than at Bamboo Willie's," Gleim said. "There will be plenty of fun for everyone as we say goodbye to summer and welcome the beginning of fall."

The full schedule for the festival is on page 13.

You will have time to catch your breath between events when you make the trip to Casino Beach for the Chamber of Commerce's presentation of Taste of the Beach on September 19 and 20.

"The Beach's Chamber of Commerce businesses are very excited about the second annual Taste of the Beach," Jeff Elbert, president said. "Restaurants are offering their signature foods at very low prices. There will be free entertainment and give aways, Corvette Show and Chrome Zone on Sunday, even a children's game area at no charge."

The Chamber's goal to bring quality family events in the temperate fall months was the impetus for this festival.

"Those who attended this event last year had a blast. I'm certain they will all be back," said Nan Harper, Chamber events chairman.

New on this year's schedule will be the appearance of the fa-

mous Sauce Boss, Bill Wharton. He has cooked gumbo on stage from more than 150,000 people. He mixes his own spicy original music and adds his famous liquid Summer Hot Sauce right into every cooking demonstration. His website says, "It's a multi sensory soul shouting picnic of rock and roll brotherhood."

Also new this year is the opportunity to rate the restaurants. You can vote for the best food and the best booth. Ballots will be available at the Chamber's Hospitality Tent. Awards will be presented on Sunday, September 20 at 4 p.m.

The Chamber is going green at its festival and will partner with the Pensacola Beach Advocates to offer colorful aluminum water bottles for sale at the festival.

"This is an effort to reduce the number of plastic bottles which are clogging our landfills," Dr. Lila Cox, PBA said.

Sponsors of the program are Innisfree Hotels, Sandshaker Lounge, Emerald Coast Rentals and H2O Water in Gulf Breeze.

Guests may eat at the Casino location or take the food to-go. All dishes will be offered for \$5 or less, so gourmants may choose a variety of the best of the Beach. Food will be served from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. each day. Dig in.

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Barefoot on the Beach

A bath tub is a bath tub and a race is a race. If you put the two together, you come up with a rather bizarre sporting event, the annual Bath Tub Races which happen every Labor Day weekend on Pensacola Beach.

The Gulf Breeze Jaycees sponsored this event on the water at Ft. Pickens gate with bleachers and vendors dotting the sandy shore. The Tub Races were always the very last hurrah of summer, bringing down the final curtain of the season. What a splash it was!

The racing craft were real cast iron bath tubs with floating supports built from railroad ties. If you are wondering how in the heck that contraption ever floated, so am I. But they did.

My daughters, who loved all sports regardless of whatever kind, joined the feared but small group of paddlers who could maneuver the tubs to reach the winner's circle.

My kids had won a couple of years in a row when they tried a

new "pusher." The pusher was usually a young guy, muscular and sober, sometimes hard to find on the beach. But Liz and Shelley found one. A perfect specimen of a man. I wish I could remember his name.

My team had survived preliminary rounds, in spite of the ladies from a Gulf Breeze bank, hitting the side of their boat with their paddles. Now, they were poised to line up for the championship, fighting this same regarded bank twosome.

The moment was at hand. The boats were manned. Well, womanned at this point. The two pushers were in the water at the edge of the shore, proud of their participation in the race. Often as not, the pusher was instrumental in the final outcome of the race. The starter yelled, "Go" and the pusher pushed. Our pusher, in his eagerness to win, heaved a mighty shove against the back of the boat. The other guy did the same thing. There was only one prob-

lem as far as our pusher was concerned. His start was too much, way too much. The boat took an upturn and suddenly sank. Bow up and stern down. My contenders lost that year because our pusher pushed too hard.

In later years, Liz and Shelley continued to win even after the races were moved to Quietwater Beach. The pusher with Mr. America abs did not go with them.

Liz and Shelley had a method in their success. They went home and slept between the preliminary rounds and finals. Most of the other finalists went to a local bar to rest. So my kids won. What can I say?

This Sunday, the time honored races will continue. The boats will be fiberglass tubs supported by space age plastic. They will have pushers, just as in the early days, but everything is more sophisticated than it was back then. And the competitors? Where do they go between rounds? Probably ordering orange juice on the

rocks.

If you have never entered the tub races, go to Bamboo Willie's and sign up. You may win one of the many prizes they award. Mostly, they are the same beautiful ceramic beer mugs; the same kind they have offered for years.

There will be other new twists and turns. The Jaycees always held a Miss Pensacola Beach Contest after the races. Ten or twelve beach beauties would enter, enticed at least in part, by the first place prize, a diamond ring. And it was always pretty nice to go through the year knowing you were "Miss Pensacola Beach," chosen by a panel of very discerning Jaycees.

Now, Bamboo Willie's hosts a

bikini contest, no less appealing than the Miss Pensacola Beach contests and a whole lot more sophisticated. They win money. They can buy their own diamonds.

The tub races do not end the day. A contest among novice boat designers called Anything That Floats is an added attraction.

Prizes are awarded for the best boat, the best sinker, and the best costumes. This whole celebration which is the final day of the Jamaican festival is a great place to say goodbye to summer and hello to fall. Do we still see the tourists leaving and the tourist flies arriving? A time honored tradition of departures and arrivals on and after Labor Day.

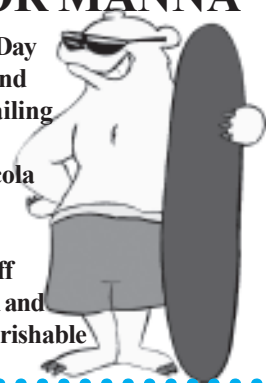

Wine Talk

GOOD ENOUGH TO EAT

Some people wrongly believe that it is not worthwhile to use a good wine as a cooking ingredient because the alcohol is eliminated through evaporation. Research shows, however, that when wine is added to boiling liquid and the mixture is immediately removed from the heat, 85% of the alcohol remains. After 15 minutes, 40% remains. As a basic ingredient in stews, stocks, and marinades, wine adds more layers and richness than water can, even though the wine itself cannot be tasted. On the other hand, when used to finish sauces, meats, and vegetable dishes, the goal is to have the flavor of the wine come through. In either case, cooking with wine calls for better quality wines.

HINT: If a wine is not good enough to drink, it is not good enough to use in cooking.

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Green Grass May Grow At Casino Beach

Casino Beach may be going green. It's just not the kind of green that most people are seeking. The Santa Rosa Island Authority Development and Leasing Committee members were presented with a plan to plant grass at Casino Beach at their August 26 meeting.

Matt Mooneyham, SRIA director of Developmental Services, said, "The sand blows on top of the parking lot and creates a constant maintenance issue. If it blows out of the area, it undermines the concrete and that jeopardizes the structural integrity of the sidewalk."

The sod would be placed on the small areas near the Public Safety building and a larger parcel just west of the Gulfside Pavilion.

Board member Dave Pavlock questioned the irrigation of the grass and was told the lifeguards would water the small areas and a sprinkler system could take care of the larger area. The cost for the project would run about \$5,000. The matter will be brought to the full board meeting.

In a special meeting which preceded the committee meetings, the Board voted 5 to 1 to accept the higher priced scope of work from the master land planning firm EDSA. The more expensive plan, which includes the use of a number of specialized sub consultants, is priced at \$234,500. The lower cost plan was \$169,250.

"This is our opportunity to do it right," Board Member Ed Guernsey said.

Dr. Thomas Campanella, selected Board member, who cast the lone dissenting vote, said he felt the added benefits of the second plan were not worth the extra costs. He noted that one of the items, public meetings, costs were higher in the second plan.

"What could possibly be the difference in one public meeting compared to another?" he asked.

The composition of the Steering Committee which will work with the land planning firm was discussed. The final consensus was that an eleven member com-

mittee should be formed.

"This committee is a great start," Vernon Prather, board member said. "We have a balance of residents, hotel owners, developers, representatives from the Beach Chamber of Commerce and the Pensacola Beach Advocates. Two members of the SRIA board should be added."

Members of the community who have offered to serve on the committee include attorney Jim Reeves, Kenny Morgan, contractor; JJ Waters, sales manager at CAT Country; Scott Carlson, owner Fast Eddie's Fun Center; Dave Kelley, owner The Islander Lounge and the Break; and Michael Foley, owner Surf Burger.

The Steering Committee appointments will be made in upcoming weeks.

The Development and Leasing Committee favors working with the bank which is foreclosing on The Palace lease which is in default. The bank has agreed to pay the past due lease fees, attorney's fees and the liquidated damages would be held in abeyance until the foreclosure has been completed. The committee voted to accept the bank's offer and hold the liquidated damages in abeyance.

The Committee rejected an offer of \$3,500 from the Regency Cabanas homeowners for a lot adjacent to their property. The parcel was appraised at \$65,000 years ago. After rejecting the bid, the committee asked Buck Lee, SRIA executive director, to work with the leaseholders in creating an agreement to lease the property. Representatives of the Regency Cabanas said the public has been using the area to access their condo's swimming pool.

In an effort to keep motorists from parking on the right-of-ways, the SRIA staff had installed yellow poles, but members of the Board objected to the poles, saying they were not in sync with the Island beautification initiative. As of now, the poles have been removed and the concrete curbs have been painted bright red and

labeled with "No Parking."

Planting native grasses in the right-of-ways had been discussed. Staff will bring this item back to the board along with additional information on plans, plants, and the cost of the project. Fred Gant, Board chairman, suggested that the Island Times remind residents and guests that the No Parking areas will be enforced.

The Administrative Committee heard good news from Dottie Ford, Director of Finance when she announced that the revenues are now up more than \$165,000 over projections.

"This report is for June," Ed Guernsey said. "We still have a strong July and August to review. Actual income was greater than actual expenditures. Spending was well below budget, so I would like to compliment the staff and Mr. Lee for controlling expenses."

A request for a potential ordinance giving safety personnel authority to enforce rules and regulations for public safety was made at the Administrative Committee meeting.

Bob West, SRIA Public Safety director said, "This includes allowing the Executive Director, Safety Director, Water Safety Supervisor, and senior lifeguards to ask beach goers to comply with laws."

Dave Pavlock moved the acceptance of creating an ordinance which will have to go to the County Commission to be considered as an addition to Section 74 of the Parks and Recreational Areas ordinances.

A bid of \$109,500 from Deep and Wide Dredging of Navarre, was approved for the Little Sabine Bay project. The dredging will begin in September or October and will be complete in about ninety days after that.

Dr. Thomas Campanella asked about the Little Sabine Recirculation project. Mike Langston, Baskerville Donovan, said the recirculation will begin well after the dredging is complete. Dave Pavlock credited former board member, Dr. Andy

Gygi for starting the care of Little Sabine Bay ten years ago. Buck Lee noted that a thank you should go to State Rep. Dave Murzin who assisted the Authority in getting the grants to carry these important projects to completion.

Pensacola Beach will get national exposure through a documentary about the Gulf Islands National Seashore and Santa Rosa Island, produced by public television. It will begin airing in October, and Lee said the Island Authority voted to become a sponsor of the project and will now be recognized each time the production airs.

Lee told the committee that he

is working with regard to the SRIA's two websites. They currently host a tourism website www.visitpensacolabeach.com and a government website www.sria-fla.com

The budget workshop commenced after the meetings, Buck Lee said. "We have a leaner budget and more revenue."

The 2009-2010 budget was adopted and will now go to the County for approval.

The next meeting of the Authority will be the Full Board on Wednesday, September 9 at 5 p.m. at the SRIA offices, #1 Via de Luna. All meetings are open to the public.

Nan Harper of Island Realty said that real estate is alive and well. Her remarks were backed by Diane Tyson

who added, "Compared to this time last year, real estate is looking up. Walk in customers are up, too."

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TDC Awards Advertising Funds To Beach For Festival Marketing

It's been almost thirty years since the businesses on Pensacola Beach made their first request to the Tourist Development Council asking for funds to promote tourism. Year after year, representatives from the Beach Chamber of Commerce continued to make requests and give presentations, mainly pointing out to the TDC in recent years that the Beach hotels supplied a third of the TDC's total funds in bed taxes.

Last year the Chamber finally received \$25,000 from the TDC and this year they made a bold request for \$100,000 and they were granted half that amount \$50,000.

Representing the Beach at the August 25 meeting were Jeff Elbert, Chamber president, and Maureen LaMar, Chamber Executive Director. Also the following business representatives were in attendance: Buck Lee, SRIA Executive Director, Shelley Johnson, Mario Roberts, Karen

Cook Cowen, Diane Tyson, Beverly Boswell, Ron Wilson, Mike Nixon, Robert Gleim, JJ Waters, Tom Barron, Rick Cantin, DJ and Carl Zemenick, Lila Cox, Christy Manderson and Jayne Bell. Nan Harper is a member of the Council's board.

"The beach loses ground in the off season. We are pleased to be able to market off season events with this money," said Elbert.

Statutorily, the TDC has to provide a large portion of its funds to the Pensacola Civic Center. Others who were allocated money include: Pensacola Convention and Visitors Bureau, \$1,541,250; Pensacola Sports Association, \$225,000; Perdido Key Chamber \$175,000; and the Beach Chamber, \$50,000.

The Council voted 7 to 1 to allocate the monies as outlined above with Commissioner Grover Robinson casting the opposing vote.

"I have a philosophical issue

with carving up the allocations," Robinson said. "I think we should all work together as one to get people to come to our community. Why splinter the money?"

Board member Nan Harper, Pensacola Beach Realtor, said,

"We're asking for this grant to bring heads to beds. Each area knows best how to present their own story to bring visitors to the beaches and historic venues."

The Tourist Development Council's budget, including grant

allocations, must be approved by the Escambia County Board of Commissioners.

The Council's next meeting will be October 20 at 3:30 p.m. The meeting location is yet to be announced.

Comfort & Joy

There are good pillows and bad pillows. A good pillow, essential to long-term health, gives you comfort and automatically puts you in a healthy sleep posture. ► Sleeping on your stomach or with your head elevated can give you aches and pains. To give your body the proper rest and to ensure the health of your neck, sleep only in two positions: on your side or on your back. Both these positions keep your spine in natural alignment and prevent misalignment of the neck. You will prevent neck aches, backaches, pinched nerves, and general health problems caused by wear on your vertebrae and spinal column.

► Look for pillows that fluff and squish to fit your unique contours, shape, and sleeping posture. Your pillow should be a "fit" just like shoes. Natural-fill pillows such as down and feather give you the most comfort, long-term performance, and adjustability of any pillow. They gently support your head, providing tactile softness, eliminating pressure

points, and increasing facial circulation to reduce face squashing, or "sleep wrinkles." Down pillows offer you the optimum in comfort, luxury, and performance.

Since everyone is back in school, give your pillow a test!

1) Examine the covering fabric: Is it stained or leaking filling? If so, time for a new one.

2) To test the support of down and feather pillows, lay the fluffed pillow on a flat, hard surface. Fold the pillow in half and squeeze out the air. Release the pillow: one with support will unfold and return to its original shape. A broken pillow will remain folded.

3) To test a polyester pillow, place a ten-ounce weight on the pillows (such as tennis shoes). A pillow with support will throw the shoe and unfold itself.

The comfort lifetime of a pillow is the length of time you can expect it to retain its original support and adjustability. With normal use and care, the lifetime of feather pillows is 5-10 years, and polyester is 6 months to 2 years. Use your head when it comes to getting the right pillow!

ner at the event.

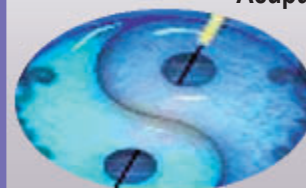

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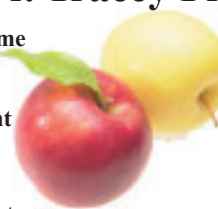
