

## "We Can Do Better" Help Project Health, Help Them

We members of the Indianapolis Medical Society have much to be proud of in Project Health. I'm elated that 42 of our member physicians have so generously donated \$13,000 to Project Health. Thank you for stepping up to the plate! Opportunity remains for the 1958 other members to come to the financial aid of this remarkable program. We can also give hearty thanks to the hundreds of IMS members who have generously contributed their time and talent to care for Project Health patients.

Let me take this opportunity to remind you of what an impressive undertaking Project Health is along with a few examples of our successes.

Project Health has been in operation since 2003. The staff has achieved miracles. But they haven't been able to do this alone. We want to thank each and every one of the physicians who have volunteered to see Project Health patients, as well as the hospitals and labs that also donate their services. YOU have collectively donated **more than \$14 million** in services.

More than 10,000 appointments have been scheduled with over 25,000 procedures completed – some small, but many of them quite significant. Procedures include, but are not limited to: 11 open heart procedures, 5 corneal transplants, 2 brain surgeries, 3 spinal surgeries, 2 hip and 2 knee replacements, scores of gall-bladder and cataract removals, hernia repairs, colonoscopies, prostate surgeries and, unfortunately, too many cancer surgeries, accompanied by chemotherapy and radiation.

The most striking success has been that frivolous emergency room visits among the Project Health members patients have gone from an initial 77% to less than 1% for the past 4 years, *saving the emergency rooms an average of \$515,000 per year* in our population alone. This has been accomplished by personally counseling the patients on appropriate and inappropriate emergency room use and asking patients to sign a pact that they will not break the rules. Project Health works!

The incredible stories abound, i.e., the gentleman who had two egg-sized brain tumors, and thanks to the late Julius Goodman, MD, and Aaron Cohen-Gadol, MD, they were removed within 24 hours of the PH call. A woman with an aortic coarctation was seen and "fixed" by David Heimansohn, MD. She is now back working two jobs, trying to support her sons and get them into college. Another man had two cataracts that prevented him from doing just about everything, including driving or working. Thanks to Frank Price, MD, he can see again and has his old job back. These are just a few examples of thousands of appointments made. We've witnessed tears welling up in the eyes of patients as they relate their stories. They are so very grateful, as we all are.

Until now, Project Health never lacked for funding. The local foundations have been very generous. However, the economic downturn has adversely affected all endowments, and currently grant funding is nearly impossible to obtain. This is why we solicited your donations in December and asked for doctors to step up to the plate, make **tax deductible donations**, and **help Project Health remain financially sound**. Those donors who responded to our request are displayed on the front cover of this magazine.

Please, if you haven't already donated – get out your checkbook and make a donation to the Indianapolis Medical Society Foundation's Project Health. We need \$100,000 and so far have only \$13,000. Your hospitals (Clarian Health, Community Hospitals, and St. Vincent Hospitals) have stepped up to the plate for many years but those donations cover only about 1/3 of the total budget.

# Past President's Perspective

## "Doctors don't touch their patients."

One of the many advantages of having an old doctor for a dad (sorry about that, Dad ... I guess I could have said "chronologically challenged"), is all the great friends he has. Over Christmas, I had the pleasure, actually, honor, of talking with Dr. John Pittman.

For those of you too young to know Dr Pittman, he is a retired cardiovascular surgeon. You know, one of the BIG GUNS! He retired from Methodist Hospital. In fact, I have it on good authority that he is the reason that Methodist's Surgery Program became accredited.

When he was in Methodist's Surgery Program, it was a threeyear program. At that time, in order for surgery residents to sit

for their surgery boards, they had to graduate from a four-year program. After Dr. Pittman graduated from Methodist's program, he decided he wanted to go into that "new fangled" cardiovascular surgery. At that time, the top place in the US, for cardiovascular surgery, was Michigan.

Dr. Pittman applied, was accepted and excelled at Michigan. About halfway through his fellowship, Methodist Hospital's Director of Medical Education, Jack Hall, called the surgery director and inquired as to Dr. Pittman's progress. After hearing ten minutes of accolades about how Dr. Pittman was the best surgery resident they had ever had, Dad asked the director if he would be so kind as to put that in writing to the surgery accreditation board so Methodist could lengthen its program and become accredited.

Well, this director was flummoxed! His program had "never accepted a three-year resident," and he couldn't believe that Dr. Pittman was "just a threeyear graduate." Long story short, the letter was written to the Accrediting Board. It probably helped that the director at Michigan was ON that board; regardless, Methodist received its accreditation.

Dr. Pittman then came back to Methodist. According to my father, shortly after returning, Dr.

Many lives touched, many lives saved, and many years later Dr. Pittman and I were standing around discussing "what is wrong with medicine today." Funny, he did not talk about reimbursement; he did not talk about malpractice or even impending legislation. John Pittman told me that what he thought was wrong with medicine today was "doctors don't touch their patients." (Serious as a heart attack, that's what he said!) He went on to say, that he never ever did elective surgery on a patient without first sitting on the bed with them (boy, wouldn't

Infection Control like to get their hands on him) and talking to them. When he rounded on patients, he not only examined them, he would touch them to give them reassurance. WOW!!! You know what is weird? When I was a kid and would make rounds with my Dad (pre-HIPAA of course), I noticed that he always touched his patients, too.

In this world of "Good Touch Bad Touch" have we forgotten to touch our patients? Cripes, do we even teach "touching" in medical school? I remember when I taught history and physical taking at the University; I had to teach the kids to touch and then steady the patient's right shoulder while they were trying to listen to the heart. While I will admit it was humorous watching a nervous student trying to listen to a moving chest, it was satisfying watching the students learn to touch the patients.

As I thought about Dr. Pittman's analysis of the woes of medicine, it occurred to me that in these days of CT, MRI, DaVinci, and laparoscopy, we have eliminated a lot of touching, which makes the simple reassuring touch, conveying "I care" all the more important!







# What Is Doctors' Day?

The first Doctors' Day was observed on March 30th, 1933 at the request of Mrs. Eudora B. Almond, Barrow County (Georgia) Medical Society, to recognize the many contributions of local physicians. March 30th symbolizes Doctors' Day because on that day in 1842 Crawford W. Long, MD, a Georgian, became the first physician to successfully use ether anesthesia in surgery on James Venable in Jefferson, Georgia. William T. G. Morton conducted the first public demonstration of the use of ether as an anesthetic in October 1846. The Auxiliary of the Barrow County Medical Society suggested this day could be an "observance demanding some act of kindness, gift or tribute in remembrance of the doctors."

These mid-19<sup>th</sup> century developments are unusual in our history because the first successful administration of ether anesthesia was an American discovery rather than one originated in England, Germany or elsewhere. Following Morton's demonstration, the means and knowledge of administering ether and, later, other inhalation agents spread quickly to Western Europe and other parts of the world, revolutionizing the surgical treatment of diseases and trauma.

Since 1933, Doctors' Day has been celebrated in many communities across the country by diverse

activities that include the donation of medical equipment and furniture to hospitals and nursing homes, delivering meals to the elderly, blood donation drives, health fairs and the awarding of scholarships for studies in health-related fields. In 1958 the US Congress and in 1991, President George H.W. Bush designated March 30th as **National Doctors' Day**.

The traditional tribute for physicians on Doctors' Day has been a gift of red carnations. The spicy carnation fragrance at one time was used as a seasoning "to preserve the body of men, both in mind and spirit" and a wine made from its petals "did comfort the heart of man." The color red denotes charity, sacrifice and courage.

## Health Professionals Petition FTC for Relief from Red Flags Rule

In light of a recent federal court decision, four national organizations representing dentists, physicians and veterinarians called on the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) January 29, 2010 to exclude health professionals from controversial new regulation intended to combat identity theft.

A letter sent to FTC Chairman Jon Leibowitz by leaders of the American Dental Association (ADA), American Medical Association (AMA), American Osteopathic Association (AOA) and American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA) is the latest challenge to the so-called "red flags" rule. The FTC's interpretation of the regulation imposes an unjustified, unfunded mandate on health professionals for detecting and responding to identity theft.

The organizations asked the FTC to make it clear that the rule will not apply to their members given the result of recent litigation brought by the American Bar Association against the FTC. In that case, the U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia ruled that lawyers should be excluded from the requirements imposed by the red flags rule. The court decision follows wide criticism that the FTC's overly broad interpretation of the Fair and Accurate Credit Transactions Act of 2003 (FACT) led the commission to create a rule that oversteps its authority. In response to these concerns, the FTC postponed the rule's effective date to June 1, but it has never changed the position that the rule will apply to health professionals.

"Congress did not intend the original red flags legislation to apply to small businesses, but rather it was intended to encourage large businesses like banks, credit firms and national retailers to implement best practices to protect customers' from identity theft," said ADA President Ronald Tankersley, DDS.

In its ruling against the FTC, the court said that the application of this rule to attorneys "is both plainly erroneous and inconsistent with the purpose underlying enactment of the FACT Act." The court also stated that the FTC "not only seeks to extend its regulatory power beyond that authorized by Congress," but also "arbitrarily selects monthly invoice billing as the activity it seeks to regulate."

"The court ruling sends a clear signal that the FTC needs to re-evaluate the broad application of the red flags rule," said AMA President J. James Rohack, MD. "Our four organizations firmly believe that applying the rule to health professionals, but not to lawyers, would be unfair."

"Postponement of the rule's effective date is inadequate," said AOA President Larry A. Wickless, DO. "Our four organizations need a commitment from the FTC that it will not apply the red flags rules to health professionals if it is not applied to lawyers."

"The burdens of complying with this rule outweigh the benefits," said AVMA President Larry R. Corry, DVM "The FTC's interpretation of the FACT Act should be redefined to exclude health professionals."

#### Discovery of Enzyme Activation Process Could Lead to New Heart Attack Treatments

Researchers at the Indiana University and Stanford University schools of medicine have determined how a "chemical chaperone" does its job in the body, which could lead to a new class of drugs to help reduce the muscle damage caused by heart attacks.

Such drugs would work by restoring the activity of a mutated enzyme, rather than taking the more common approach of blocking the actions of a disease-related protein.

The team, led by Thomas Hurley, PhD, associate chair and professor of biochemistry and molecular biology at IU, and Daria Mochly-Rosen, PhD, professor of chemical and systems biology at Stanford, report in the journal *Nature Structural Biology* published online January 10 that the compound, called Alda-1, acts much like a shim to prop up a mutated form of a key enzyme, restoring the enzyme's function.

The enzyme, called ALDH2, plays an important role in metabolizing alcohol and other toxins, including those created by a lack of oxygen in the wake of a heart attack. It also is involved in the metabolism of nitroglycerin, which is used to prevent chest pain (angina) caused by restricted

blood flow and oxygen to the heart.

However some people, including about 40 percent of people of East Asian descent, carry a mutated form of the ALDH2 enzyme that does not carry out its intended functions well. People with the mutated form of the enzyme are at increased risk of cardiovascular damage.

The IU and Stanford team reported in 2008 in the journal *Science* that in laboratory tests Alda-1 bypassed the body's usual signaling system and activated the ALDH2 enzyme directly, reducing damage to heart muscle tissue. That finding raised the possibility of new treatments for heart attacks, methods to protect hearts during open heart surgery, organ transplants, stroke and other situations in which blood flow is interrupted.

Their current paper describes how Alda-1 activates the ALDH2 enzyme in a process that Dr. Hurley likens to a woodworking procedure in which Alda-1 attaches to the ALDH2 enzyme at a crucial spot and acts like a shim or wedge to prop it up.

Determining how the Alda-1 compound works will enable the researchers to begin working on alternative compounds that hold more promise as potential drugs. One primary improvement needed is the ability to give the drug orally, rather than by injection, Dr. Hurley said.

He predicted that alternative compounds could be available for testing by mid-2010.

The research was supported by grants from the National Institute of Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism at the National Institutes of Health.

## Thank you, Thomas J. Leipzig, MD



Thomas J. Leipzig, MD, Goodman Campbell Brain & Spine, is Project Health's doctor of the month of March. Dr. Leipzig was born and raised in Elkhart, Indiana and says he spent much more time in Chicago than Indianapolis. But he does remember one trip to Indy that was an "Eagle Scout type of thing" where they

came, met then Mayor Richard Lugar, and attended the state high school basketball championships. He thought Indianapolis was just a quiet little town back then. Dr. Leipzig's father was an organic research chemist for Miles Labs in Elkhart, which is where he acquired his interest in science.

Dr. Leipzig did his undergraduate work at Notre Dame and went on to the University of Chicago Pritzger School of Medicine, followed by an internship at the University of Chicago and residency in neurosurgery there as well. "There were only four faculty members in neurosurgery so they were all my mentors," he says.

"One of the faculty knew the late Julius Goodman, MD, and suggested I take a look at his group because I was thinking of staying in Chicago where there was always something exciting going on." When he met the physicians at Indianapolis Neurosurgical Group (now Goodman Campbell Brain & Spine) he realized it was something special and "my wife and I moved down here, where Richard Hudnut was then mayor and things were really starting to happen." Dr. Leipzig and his wife have three daughters; one 26-year-old in California; a 24-year-old who works here in Indianapolis with autistic children; and the 19-year-old who is attending Loyola, majoring in social work. In his spare time, he plays golf and is proud that he walks the course and carries his own bag.

Dr. Leipzig did take care of a Project Health patient who PH had sent to the emergency room. She ended up being admitted for two weeks after sustaining a head injury at work. "She had a headache that just wouldn't respond to any other treatment until we looked deeper. She had a hematoma that we had to drain which became infected. We ended up doing a craniotomy on her. It was a difficult case." While he remembers the case, he didn't know she was a Project Health patient until talking with us. "We don't pay much attention to what kind of insurance or whether they have insurance or not. It is different in neurosurgery than primary care. Most of the patient's we see don't have a choice – they need the care to save their lives and that's that."

"The struggle to keep patients alive in Haiti drives the point home that we take a lot for granted here with proper operating rooms and the best surgical equipment." We are indeed fortunate to have the best medicine in the world right at our fingertips and also fortunate to have Dr. Leipzig to turn to in times of need.




