Darrell Green, former Javelina football player, was in town to take part in Friday events at the Douglass Center.

He spoke to the Javelina football players Thursday afternoon in Javelina Stadium.

Green is one of the three Javelinas in the Pro Football Hall of Fame, and is in numerous halls of fame including the Javelina Hall of Fame.

Thursday night, an overflow crowd attended the annual Javelina barbecue, hosted and sponsored by the Villarreal family and Big House Burgers & BBQ at Rancho Cielito Lindo in Bishop. The popular event had to be cancelled last year because of the pandemic.

Javelina athletes and coaches took part in the BBQ and the Douglass Center activities.

On a sad note, members of the Javelina family gathered Friday at noon on campus for a memorial for Joseph Fillmore, who was to have enrolled at TAMUK this fall.

He passed away after a bicycle accident last week in Corpus Christi.

He is the nephew of Cheryl Fillmore, former Javelina basketball player and athletic director at Corpus Christi West Oso High School, and the cousin of Creighton Avery, son of Cheryl and member of the Javelina basketball team.

Athletic activity picks up this weekend when the indoor volleyball team hosts its first Block Party Saturday at 6 p.m. in the Steinke Center. Doors open at 5 p.m. and the first 200 will receive pizza and t-shirts.

The Javelinas are one of the squads and the other four are Angelo State, Texas-Tyler, Arkansas-Fort Smith and West Texas A&M. ASU is No. 1 and Tyler No. 20, and UAFS and WTAM received votes.

The Javelinas will have to face the four on the road. They take on Angelo State Oct. 1 in San Angelo, Texas-Tyler Oct. 15 in Tyler, Arkansas-Fort Smith Nov. 13 in Fort Smith and West Texas Oct. 29 in Canyon.

NCAA.COM RAN a list of five things to watch for in Division II indoor volleyball this fall and No. 1 on the list was, "Angelo State looks to build on impressive spring DII volleyball season".

"Now, to be fair, there was an AVCA spring national champion crowned. The 17-2 Rambelles first won the Lone Star Conference and then the national championship in the AVCA spring tournament. They did so by beating Tampa, a powerhouse program that won two national championships in the past decade.

"Angelo State should be set up nicely for another successful season and a run at the DII title. A large reason is the return of Kailyn Gilbreath. Gilbreath has already been tabbed the LSC preseason offensive player of the year, just months after earning the regular season honors this spring for the second straight season. We'll see the Belles back in action at their own invitational beginning Sept. 3."

The Javelina indoor team won the LSC South Division in the spring with a 12-0 and didn't take part in the AVCA national indoor meet. The AVCA national beach tournament was at the same time and the Javelinas took part in that meet. The Javelinas had several players on the indoor and beach squads. Tanya Allen is head coach of both teams.

The Javelinas were semifinalists in the beach competition after winning the 2018 meet and finishing runnersup in 2019.

ST. MARY'S WILL add STUNT to its intercollegiate program beginning in 2022-23.

The Rattlers become the fourth Lone Star Conference school to have the program, the others being Dallas Baptist, Texas-Tyler and Texas Woman's.

STUNT includes technical and athletic components of cheer and features several elements such as partner stunts, pyramids, basket tosses, group jumps and tumbling.

Each game is comprised of two teams facing off on the floor at the same time. When each element is finished, the winning side takes the round and point and has the chance to select which routine will be performed next.

St. Mary's is currently seeking a head coach for the sport.

In 2020, there were 47 schools with STUNT, including seven in Texas.

Along with the four LSC members, they are Austin College, Texas Tech and the University of Texas-Austin.

California has the most teams with 15.

WESTERN OREGON HAD 125 players report for the start of preseason football workouts.

The Javelinas will host Western Sept. 11 in the home opener in Javelina Stadium.

The Wolves didn't compete against opponents last fall and in the spring.

Western opens Sept. 2 with Colorado Mines in Golden, Colo., before coming to Kingsville for the second game.

It plays four consecutive road games before getting its first home appearance Oct. 2 with West Texas A&M of the Lone Star Conference.

KRIS KOCUREK IS in his third season as the San Francisco 49ers defensive line coach.

He was the defensive line coach for the Miami Dolphins in 2018 and spent nine years with the Detroit Lions, the first as an assistant defensive line coach and defensive line coach for eight seasons.

From Rockdale, he was a graduate assistant for the Javelinas in 2004-05. He received his master's degree from TAMUK.

He was on the staffs at Texas A&M-Commerce in 2006 and West Texas A&M in 2007.

Krohley started her career as an assistant coach at a high school in Connecticut.

She was on the team at Southern Connecticut and received her bachelor's degree from the school.

She is a native of Bethany, Conn.

...Kelsey Castillo, who has been a runner for Oklahoma Christian for the past five seasons, will be a graduate assistant coach for the Eagles this fall.

From Edmond, Okla., she has a bachelor's degree in nursing. ...The Texas-Tyler men's and women's golf teams have a new fundraising campaign. It is the Birdie Club.

NCAA DIVISION II news:

...Missouri S&T is adding men's volleyball to its intercollegiate program. It will begin competition in 2022-23.

The women's volleyball coach will also be head of the men's program.

It becomes the fifth men's program in the Great Lakes Valley Conference.

...Saint Rose (N.Y.) has opened its Golden Knights Conference room.

The \$33,000 project was financed by private fundraising.

... The NCAA Division II Coaches Connection Program has been expanded to include all National Collegiate Championship sports in the program.

The Coaches Connection Program was created to provide coaches a forum for sharing information and sharing their voice in the governance of Division II athletics.

The Coaches Connection Program enhances coaches' engagement and fortifies their role as advocates for the value of Division II athletics, and it more actively engages coaches associations in the process.

Each Division II sport has a connector, usually a retired or former coach, who oversees a "coaches circle" that includes a representative from every conference sponsoring that sport.

The connector conducts monthly teleconferences with the Coaches Circle to update current issues impacting that sport and legislative proposals or policy recommendations being considered within the Division II governance structure.

The program has successfully engaged coaches in all Division II sports and increased the opportunity for them to make recommendations and voice concerns.

...Thomas Moore (Ky.) has gained provincial membership into the Great Midwest Athletic Conference.

It is currently moving from the NAIA to NCAA Division II.

The University will remain in the NAIA through the 2022-23 academic year.

...Boeing has signed a three-year agreement to sponsor the Red Tails Classic in honor of the Tuskegee Airmen's service during World War II.

Witt averaged 3.68 digs a set and had a .242 attack percentage.

SPORTS NEWS FROM other Texas colleges:

...Don Coryell is the new athletic director at Texas State (formerly Southwest Texas State).

He has been the associate athletic director for external operations at Texas State since 2004.

He replaces Larry Teis.

Coryell has been on the TSU staff since its move from NCAA Division I-AA to Division I and from the Southland Conference to the Western Athletic Conference to the Sun Belt Conference.

The football program has been 28-68 since moving to NCAA Division I.

An official said that a significant part of the internal promotion was the turbulence in college football with Texas and Oklahoma heading to the Southeastern Conference and the other conferences preparing for potential impact.

... Texas-San Antonio unveiled its Roadrunner Athletics Center of Excellence last week.

The \$40.4 million athletic training facility was made possible by philanthropic gifts, support from the City of San Antonio's 2017 bond referendum and financing from the Roadrunner Foundation.

The 95,000 square-foot building includes academic spaces, a sports medicine center, strength and conditioning facilities, locker rooms, meeting rooms, staff and coaches' offices, an equipment room and practice fields.

With the center complete, UTSA will now focus on the second phase of its athletic facilities project which is the addition of a covered pavilion over the synthetic turf practice field and the construction of a facility at the school's Park West campus.

... The Southland Conference has added Maryland-Eastern Shore as a women's golf affiliate beginning this year.

The school joins Southland members Houston Baptist, Incarnate Word and Texas A&M-Corpus Christi as well as affiliates Augusta (Ga.) and Delaware State as members of the league in women's golf.

... The Southland Conference will not reschedule league competitions due to COVID-19 impacts during the 2021-22 school year.

A team unable to participate due to COVID-19 issues will be subject to forfeiture reflected in conference results, standings and tournament seedings.

This policy is subject to change based on national, state and local medical conditions as well as directives from the NCAA and institutional leaders.



WTAM, DBU Favored in LSC X-Country

The West Texas A&M men and Dallas Baptist women have been picked to win the 2021 Lone Star Conference cross country championships in a poll conducted by the LSC office.

The conference head coaches, sports information directors and media representatives voted in the poll.

The West Texas men are the choice to win their ninth consecutive conference title.

The Buffaloes received 34 of the 36 first-place votes and 536 points.

They return four of the five runners who were All-LSC last fall. Oklahoma Christian was

picked second with 457 points. Texas A&M-Kingsville was

The 2021 Javelina squad will open its schedule next week at a meet in San Angelo where it will face four opponents.



2021 Javelina Tailgating Guidelines

PURPOSE: Texas A&M University-Kingsville tailgating compliments the Javelina gameday experience by providing a social gathering area prior to home football games. Javelina alumni, students, fans and supporters can enjoy the tailgating traditions of food, fellowship and fun as a prelude to home games and all Lone Star Conference and NCAA playoff games.

The University alcohol policy prohibits the possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages on campus except in designated areas. Tailgating activities are permitted in Lot G (Southeast corner). To ensure our tailgating tradition provides a safe and positive game environment, the following guidelines will be enforced by the University Police Department and Home Events Staff.

1. One tailgate space per group.

2. Tailgating spaces **CAN NO LONGER BE PRE-MARKED**. Marking of any spaces with spray paint, stakes, rope, ribbon, etc. **IS PROHIBITED**. Setup starts at 7 a.m. Saturday, the day of the game.

3. Tailgate areas must be completely setup on **GAME DAY ONLY**. Your area **CANNOT BE LEFT UNATTENDED AFTER SETUP.** Tailgate spaces are available on a first-come, firstserved basis and must be consistent with the lane markings and other signage. Please honor and be respectful of the reserved areas. Tailgate spaces marked or setup prior to 7 p.m. on Satuday or any unattaended areas are subject to removel by authorized University representatives and will not be replaced.

4. IMPORTANT...The Department of Athletics does not guarantee tailgate spaces and is now responsible for any spaces at any time.

5. Javelina athletics and TAMUK are not responsible for any lost, stolen or damaged personal property.

6. Parked vehicles are not allowed in the tailgate area. **ONLY DROP OFF** of your tailgate items is allowed by vehicle—**NO EXCEPTIONS!** No non-University golf carts or ATV vehicles are allowed in the tailgate area or adjacent game-day areas. Entrance by vehicles will be through Avenue C and exit will be by the electronic marquee.

7. **Pets are NOT allowed!** Service animals are an exception to these guidelines.

8. The possession and use of alcoholic beverages must be in compliance with all state, county, city, Board of Regents and University laws and ordinances. Individuals of legal age—21 or older—may consume alcoholic beverages in the tailgating area. It is also illegal to provide alcohol to minors. Alcohol is not permitted outside the tailgating area.

9. All beverages must be in cans or plastic containers. Alcohol drinking games, funneling or any other games are prohibited. *Alcohol drinking game apparatus, kegs, beer pong balls or other common source containers* are prohibited. **NO GLASS BOTTLES ALLOWED!**

10. If alcoholic beverages are served, tailgateres must also serve an adequate amount of food or alternative beverages in the same location as alcoholic beverages.

11. Individuals are encourages to have designated drivers who do not drink alcoholic beverages to monitor their tailgating party throughout its duration.

12. **Disruptive behavior:** Individuals who interfere with the rights of others by the use of loud, abusive language, music and/or behavior, or who may prevent others from enjoying tailgating will be asked to cease and desist and may be directed to leave the event if necessary.

13. ALL tailgate parties will CONCLUDE 15 minutes prior to kickoff and all participants will depart the tailgate area no later than 15 minutes after kickoff.

14. Tailgate parties may not resume at halftime.

15. Advertising banners or corporate sponsor signage are not allowed without prior written approval from the Texas A&M University-Kingsville athletic department. No distribution of advertising flyers/promotional materials allowed.

16. Participants and organizations are prohibted from selling food, products and/or raffle tickets, campaigning for office, distributing petitions and/or lobbying for votes.

17. No live bands or loud speaker systems are permitted on the premises. All music must cease whenever the live entertainment at the Javelina Main Stage area begins.

18. All trash, equipment and debris must be removed from the tailgate area by the tailgating members prior to post-game departure and no later than 45 minutes following the completion of that game. Please deposit all aluminum items in the recycling containers.

19. No open pit fires are allowed. Fire must be contained to a grill.

20. Violation of any of these guidelilnes may result in immediate termination of tailgating privileges, criminal prosecution and/or disciplinary action.

21. RV owners need to make prior arrangements by calling (361) 593-2493.
