Information Packet

Hello VPK Parents!

We are SUPER excited to begin this awesome school year with your (not so) little Bloom. Does attending VPK mean that your little one will be reading when they graduate? Most certainly not. Our goals for your children are very age appropriate and they will advance at a pace that is natural and comfortable for your child. Some children will begin entry level reading, while others will begin mastering their letter sounds. Literacy is only one component of our VPK curriculum, Frog Street Pre-K. Our curriculum is a comprehensive, research-based program that integrates instruction across developmental domains and early learning disciplines. The program is engaging for both teachers and children. While in VPK, children with cover topics including but not limited to literacy, math, self-help, self-discipline, social skills, science, and becoming a positive part of a community. I have included a brief list of kindergarten readiness expectations (below) that we use as our map to get your child to where they need to be for entry into kindergarten. Throughout this school year, our Blooms will learn through play. When you enter a pre-kindergarten classroom at Bloom, you will not see worksheets and required homework assignments. What you will see are children actively engaged in exploration through hands on experiences. Writing will be done on blank pages and will not be space confined. Whole group activities are very limited, instead children are involved in small group activities that allow them to maintain focus and move around. We follow the state of Florida standards for VPK and are very in tuned to the expectations for kindergarten. Voluntary homework assignments will be sent home as optional FUN practice. If your child is uninterested in doing this work at home, it can find it's way into the recycle bin. Again, extra practice through homework is available, but optional. As a parent, you may feel pressure from others about "what your child should be able to do?" and I want to reassure you that you are doing a great job and that ALL kids are DIFFERENT and UNIQUE in their academic progression, interests and behaviors.

Assessments are conducted at the beginning, middle and end of the school year. After each assessment, we will offer a parent conference to review progress and goals. If we feel your child is in need of intervention or additional support, we will be sure to keep you informed. In lieu of a night time meeting as we have done in the past to fill you in on all of the ins and outs of VPK, we are instead sending out this information packet. In previous years, we have found that many parents have a hard time making it to our quick orientation meeting and also we have found the majority of our families have been a part of Bloom for several years and our VPK program is very similar to our normal daily routines at Bloom. During the first two weeks of school, we will offer an open house/meet and greet for all of our VPK students & families, so stay tuned. Classroom assignments will be emailed out 1 week prior to your child's first day of VPK. I hope that you find the information below helpful and as always, please do not hesitate to call, email or stop into the office with any questions you may have.

1. Attendance is required during VPK hours. VPK hours depend upon your child's program selection.

Morning VPK: 8:30 a - 11:30 a Afternoon VPK: 12:30 p - 3:30 p

We also offer "wrap around" care for families needing full time preschool/child care.

- 2. Please refer to your enrollment option and reference page 3 of this packet for detailed information about enrollment options and drop off /pick up times.
- 3. VPK FEE STATEMENT: Bloom Academy will not issue any fees associated with the Voluntary Prekindergarten program. Fees will only be incurred by children voluntarily signed up to participate in preschool hours/programs outside of our Voluntary Prekindergarten program.
- 4. Depending on the schedule that you have chosen for your child, Bloom provides morning and afternoon snacks, as well as lunch (provided at PG, available for purchase at FS).
- 5. Children enrolled in <u>VPK only</u> can be dropped off no earlier than 15 minutes prior to the start of their VPK program (Morning Session 8:30 a, Afternoon Session 12:15 p) and must be picked up within 15 minutes of the VPK dismissal times.
- 6. During Non-VPK days or non- VPK weeks, VPK only children and Extended day children do not attend Bloom. For families enrolled in the Extended Day program, tuition will only be prorated for weeks with less than 3 VPK days. Extended Day Tuition will not be billed when VPK is not in session for breaks.
- 7. VPK is in session following the Year Round CCPS schedule (PG BLOOM) or BNS schedule(FS BLOOM). (attached). Bloom is open on Non-VPK days for children that are enrolled in wrap around care.
- 8. Children that miss more than 20% of scheduled VPK days each month will be subject to losing their VPK funding from the state. We will let you know if you are approaching an absence count that is too high. 20% of the entire program surmounts to 36 absences out of 180 total days. Children must not exceed a 20% absence count of the number of VPK days accrued as the program progresses. Children with excessive absences will be offered a self-pay preschool option that is not held to the attendance requirements set forth by the state VPK program.
- 9. As per statue 6M-8.305, FAC, the state requires Bloom to obtain parental signatures after the last date of attendance each month to provide parent verification that their child was in fact in attendance at Bloom during the previous month. Your child's VPK teachers will obtain these signatures from you as needed.
- 10. Closed toed shoes only. No sandals.
- 11. Paperwork and student work will be sent home every Friday in your child's "Mailbox". Please be sure to check it regularly.
- 12. All children must bring in a complete change of clothes in a gallon zipper bag labeled with their first and last name to be kept at school. This should be sent on the FIRST DAY OF SCHOOL.
- 13. <u>FULL DAY and EXTENDED DAY STUDENTS</u>- On Monday's please send a small bag or back pack that will fit in cubby without hanging out or hang nicely on a hook. Bags/Backpacks will be sent home on Friday each week. Toys from home are not allowed and will be kept at the front desk for pick up. Back pack should include the following items:
 - A small blanket and fitted crib sheet, these fit nicely on our cots (cots provided by Bloom).
 - A complete change of clothes in a gallon zipper bag labeled with their first and last name to be kept at school.
 - No sunscreen, chap stick, hand sanitizer or toys in back pack.
 - A small animal of lovey for nap time is encouraged.
- 14. With prior arrangements (email or ProCare Connect message) drop off can be extended until 10:30 am with documentation.
- 15. No jewelry.
- 16. VPK assessments will be completed at the beginning, middle & end of the year. Conference "Sign Up Sheets" will be set out after each assessment period. Results will be sent home in the "Friday folder/mailbox".
- 17. VPK officially starts on Monday, August 10th for Bloom PG and Monday, August 3rd for Founder's Square.

VOLUNTARY PRE-KINDERGARTEN PROGRAM OPTIONS

VPK ONLY

Voluntary Pre-Kindergarten is FREE of charge and is in offered Monday through Friday when public school is in session. Punta Gorda Bloom follows the CCPS Year Round School schedule. Founder's Square follows the Babcock Neighborhood School schedule. Any time these schools are closed for students, VPK only children DO NOT have class. Bloom offers a morning and an afternoon VPK session daily. Families in the VPK only program must choose one option for their child's VPK program.

VPK EXTENDED DAY

Add extra time before and after VPK time to allow for enrichment and added convenience. The extended day program is in session Mon-Fri when public school is in session. Punta Gorda Bloom follows the CCPS Year-Round School schedule. Founder's Square follows the Babcock Neighborhood School schedule. Any time these schools are closed for students, VPK extended day children DO NOT have class and tuition is pro-rated when the week is less than 3 days in length due to public school closures. Although students will attend daily for VPK, parents can choose to utilize the extended day times everyday, M-W-F or T-Th.

What do kids really need to know for kindergarten?!?

Preparing Your Child for Kindergarten

Let's face it: Kindergarten isn't what it used to be. Right or wrong, it is the world we live in. The following list is intended to help prepare your child in a variety of developmental areas to make the transition into kindergarten as smooth as possible. Believe it or not, just 15-20 minutes of playing and learning with your child can make a world of difference!

Social/Emotional Development

- Encourage your child to persist in tasks when encountering a problem by giving him tasks slightly above his current ability level. When your child cannot find a solution on his own, encourage him to calmly ask for help.
- Play board games to practice taking turns.
- Set up several play dates with friends of various ages.
- Allow your child to stay with other trusted adults for a few hours at a time prior to kindergarten (especially if she has rarely been in the care of someone other than
- Tell your child you expect her to clean up after play. You could implement a ransom box for toys left out like this one: www.madsmemories.blogspot.com/2009/08/moms-ransom-rubbage.html

Language Development

- Verbally give your child specific one-step and two-step directions and encourage him to follow through.
- Read to your child for a combined total of at least 20 minutes each day.
- While reading, point out how to hold a book (right-side up with the spine on the left) and the orientation in which we read the words and look at the pictures (left
- After reading, ask your child what happened in the beginning, middle, and end of
- Give your child plenty of opportunities to draw (without coloring books). Ask her to draw the things she sees around her.
- Teach your child the uppercase and lowercase letters and, most importantly, the sounds each letter makes through play and games. Need some ideas? Go here: www.icanteachmychild.com/alphabet

Cognitive Development

- o Have your child help you sort items according to color, size, and shape (laundry, blocks, silverware, toys, and other household items work well).
- Teach your child to make various patterns (red, blue, red, blue). Garage sale dot stickers or craft pom-poms are great for this purpose.
- Practice counting aloud to 20 while driving in the car.

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- Teach your child numerals 1-10. Need some suggestions on how to do this: Go here: www.icanteachmychild.com/numbers
- Count objects in your home. Have your child point to each object as she counts.
- Go on a shape hunt. Point out circles, triangles, squares, and rectangles to your child while you are taking or walk or grocery shopping.
- Talk about positional and directional concepts like up/down, over/under, in/out, behind/in front of, top/bottom, beside/between, off/on, stop/go.
- o Talk about opposite words (big/little, empty/full, slow/fast).

Physical Development (Gross & Fine Motor)

- Give your child plenty of opportunities for outdoor play: running, jumping, and climbing.
- Play catch on a regular basis.
- Practice skipping.
- Stack blocks together.
- Let your child use child-safe scissors to cut out a variety of shapes.
- Teach your child to write his name (capital for the first letter and lowercase for the remaining letters). To start, write his name using a highlighter and encourage him to trace over it. Be sure that he forms the letters from the top to the bottom.
- Ensure your child is holding her pencil correctly: www.icanteachmychild.com/2012/06/correct-pencil-grip/
- Play with playdough regularly. Roll, squish, stamp, and even cut it!
- Encourage your child to cut out various shapes using child-safe scissors.
- String large beads to make a necklace.
- Play with an interlocking puzzle together.

Creative Arts

- Always encourage pretend play...occasionally join your child in his fantasy world.
- Teach your child to recognize the following colors: red, orange, yellow, green, blue, purple, black, white, brown, and pink. For help, go to: www.icanteachmychild.com/colors
- Use a variety of materials to let your child paint, draw and explore!
