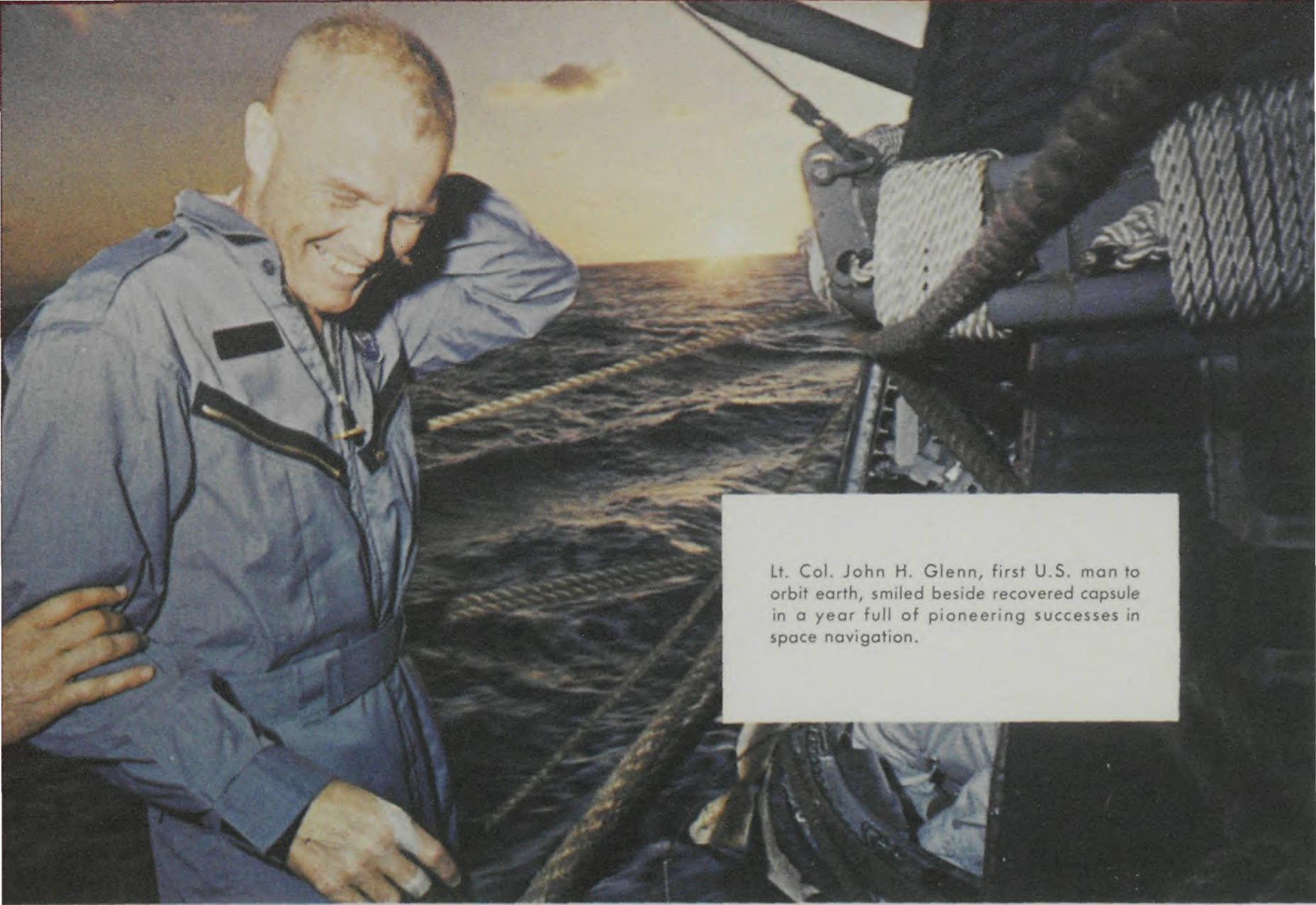

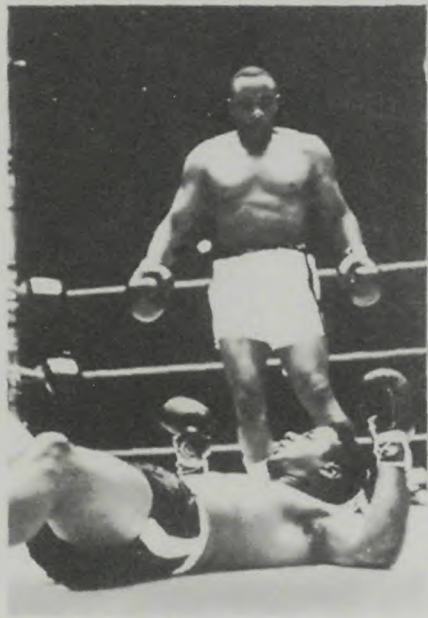


Lt. Col. John H. Glenn, first U.S. man to orbit earth, smiled beside recovered capsule in a year full of pioneering successes in space navigation.

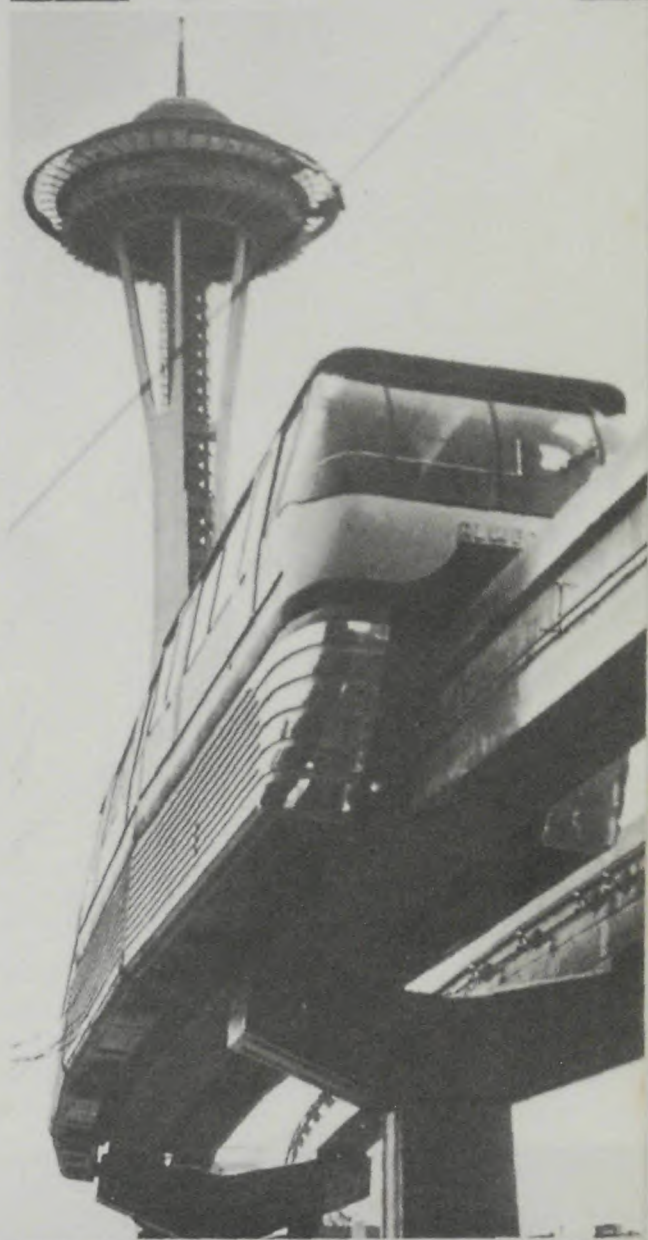

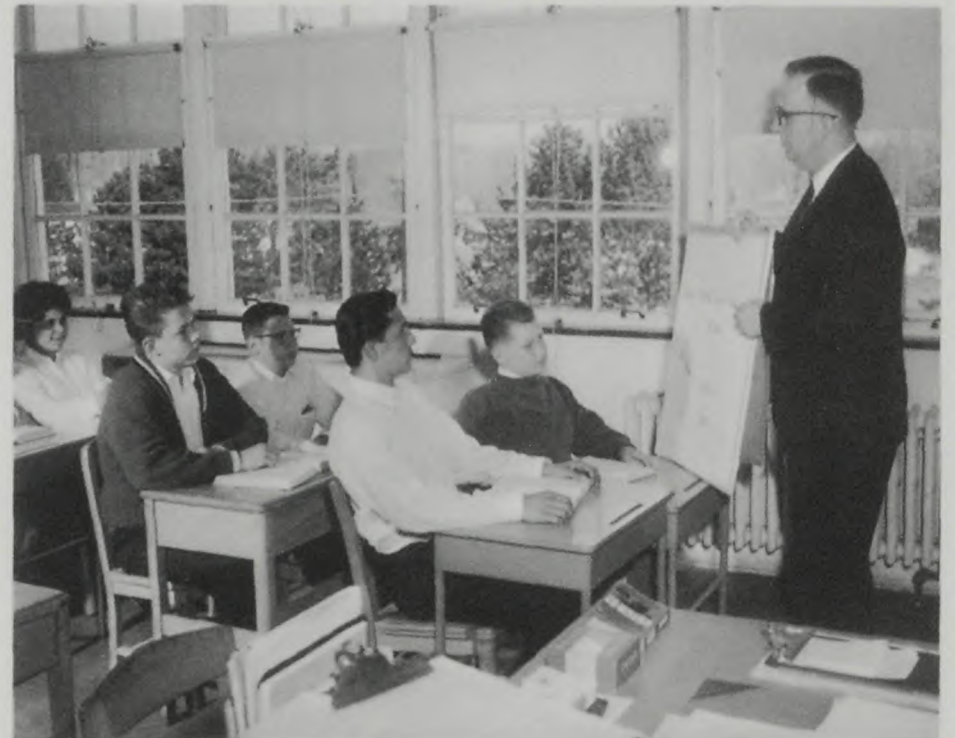

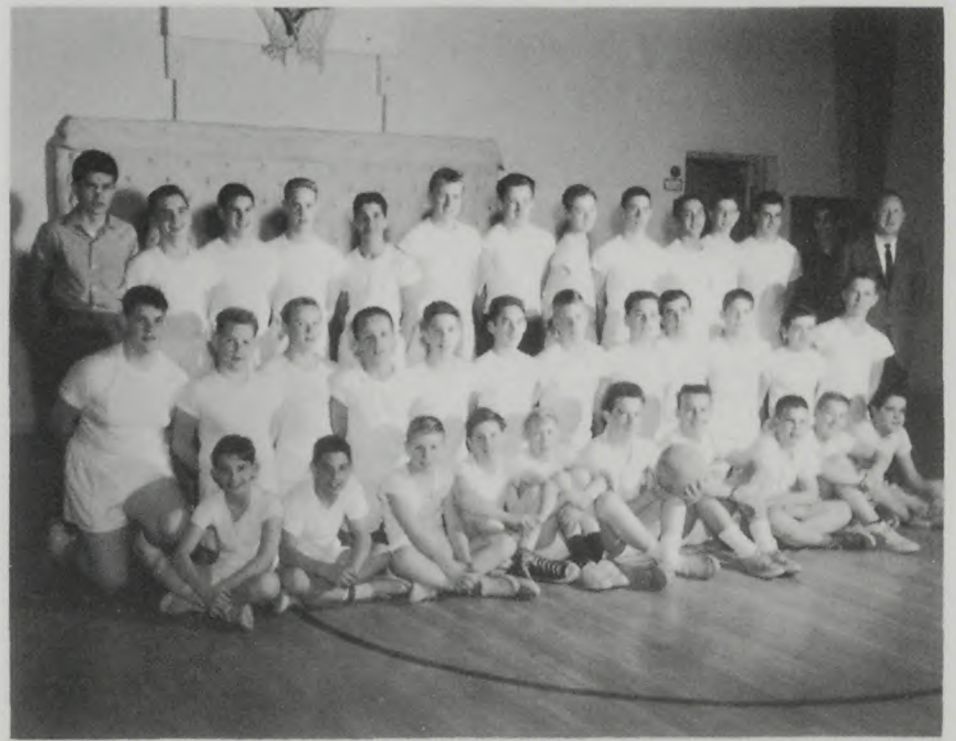

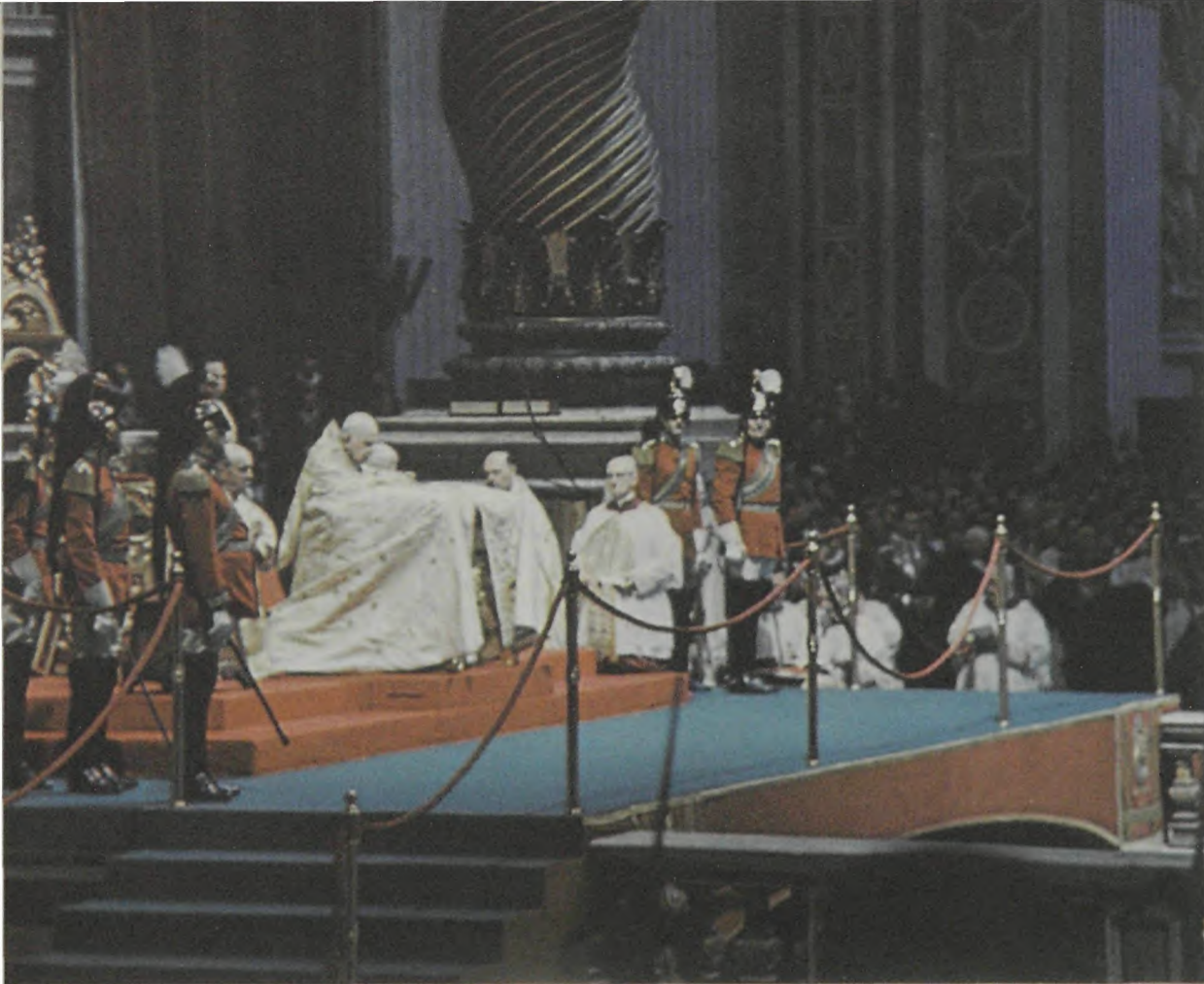

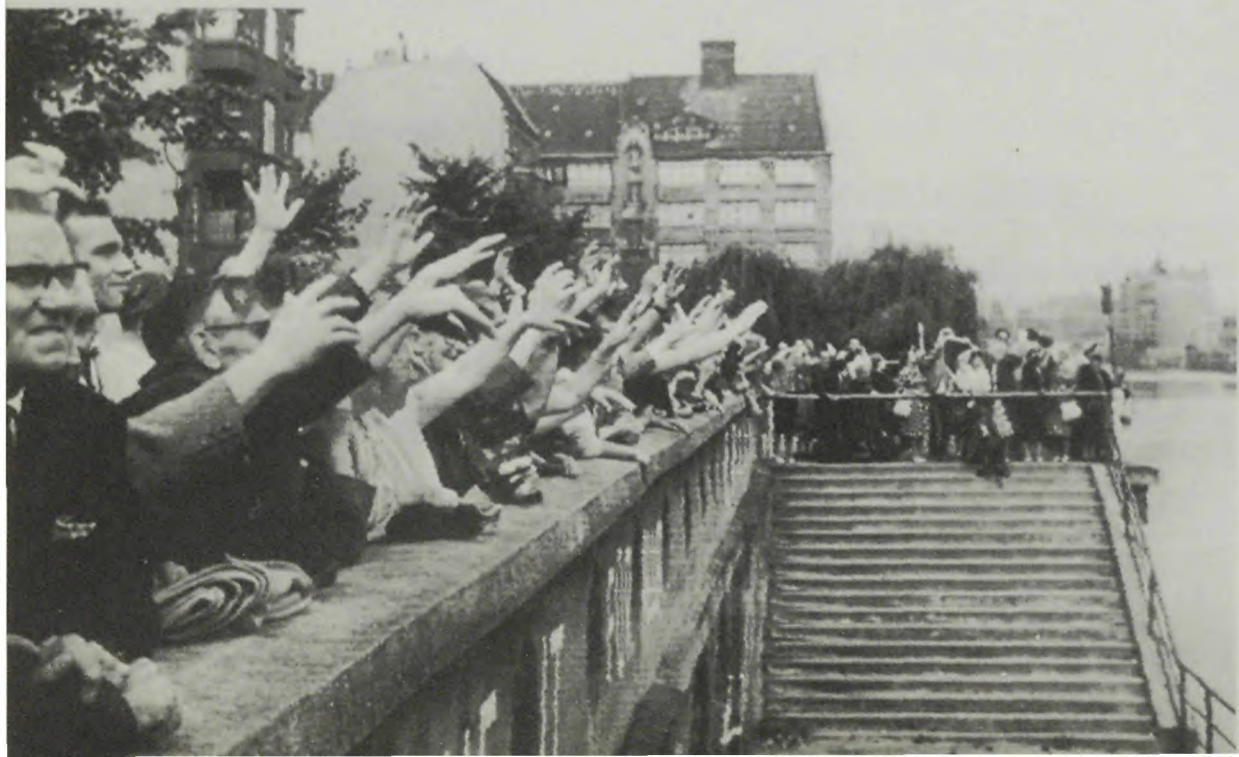

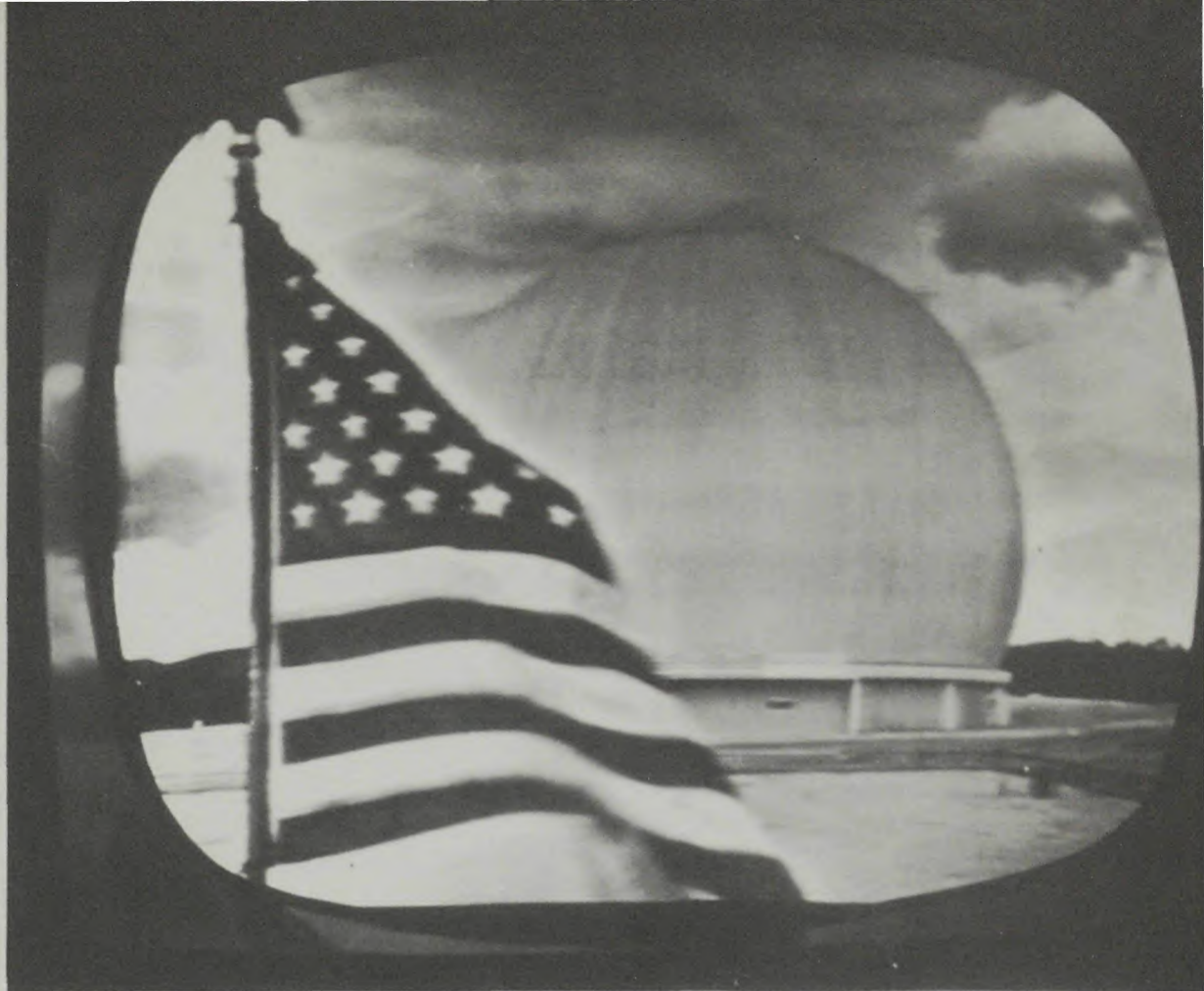
