A meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Methuen, qualified to vote in elections and in town affairs was held at the Town Hall in said Town on Saturday, Jan. fourteenth A.D. 1911 at two o'clock P.M. pursuant to Warrant No. 16 File 14. The meeting was called to order at the time appointed by Granville E. Foss, Moderator. The Warrant was read by the Town Clerk, and the meeting was opened for business.

The Selectmen made the following report.

Article 1 Precinct 3

“To Joseph S. Howe, Esq. Town Clerk,

According to a vote of the Town of Methuen directing the Selectmen to change the voting precincts, we would make the following recommendation: In the east part of the town, beginning at a stone bound, near the Merrimack river at the Lawrence line, thence following the Lawrence line to the centre of Berkley Street through Berkley street across East street to Brook Street, through Brook Street to Jackson Street, through Jackson Street to Marston Corner, thence westerly in a straight line to a stone bound at the New Hampshire state line, following said state line to the Haverhill line, thence following the Haverhill line to the Merrimack river, thence following the Merrimack River to the Lawrence line. Said precinct to be known as precinct three; and has three hundred and sixty (360) registered voters.

To William J. Oliver, one of the Constables of the Town of Methuen in said County:

Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Methuen, qualified to vote in elections and Town affairs to meet and assemble at the designated polling places of precinct one, two and three – Namely the town hall in voting precinct one, the basement of the Arlington school house in voting precinct two, and the Boylston street club house in voting precinct three, on Monday, the sixth of March next, at 5:45 o'clock in the forenoon, to bring in to the election officers their votes for Town Clerk, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Selectmen, Overseers of the Poor, and one Assessor to serve three years in place of Samuel Rushton, resigned; Highway Surveyor, one School Committeeman, to serve three years in place of Albion G. Peirce, one Water Commissioner to serve three years in place of Albert J. Richardson, one Trustee of Nevins Memorial to serve two years in place of Lewis E. Barnes, one Tree Warden to serve one year in place of Alfred H. Wagland, one Cemetery Commissioner, to serve three years in place of Willard R. Whitney, one Moderator, to serve for one year, one Auditor, Constable, Fence Viewers, and Yes or No in answer to the question:

“Shall license be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in the Town.” To see if the Town will vote to accept Chapter 476 of the acts of 1908, an act relating to the excusing from duty the members of the Police department one day in every thirty without loss of pay. All to be voted for on one ballot.

The polls may be closed at 4 o'clock, P.M. Also to meet at the Town hall in said Town on Saturday, the eleventh day of March next, at 10 o'clock in the afternoon, then and there to act on the following articles, viz.:-

- Article 1 To elect all Town officers not required to be chosen by ballot.
- Article 2 To hear the annual report of the Selectmen and act thereon.
- Article 3 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.
- Article 4 To determine the manner for collecting taxes the ensuing years and act thereon as the Town may think proper.
- Article 5 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, or a majority thereof, to borrow during the municipal year beginning January first 1911, in anticipation of the collection of taxes of said year such sums of money as may be necessary for the current expenses of the Town, but not exceeding the total tax levy for said year, giving the notes of the Town therefor, payable within one year from the dates thereof. All debts incurred under authority of this vote shall be paid from the taxes of the present municipal year.
- Article 6 To hear the reports of committees and act thereon.
- Article 7 To determine the manner of appropriating the amount received from Dog Taxes in accordance with Chapter 102, Section 163 of the Revised Laws.
- Article 8 To determine what compensation the Town will grant the members of the Fire Department for

their services the ensuing year.

- Article 9 By request of Col. Wm. B Greene Post. No. 100 G. A. R., to see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for decorating the graves of our soldiers and sailors on Memorial day, May 30th, 1911. Said money to be expended under the direction of the above Post.
- Article 10 By request of Edward A. Bower and others to see if the Town will vote to accept the provision of Section 37, Chapter 19, of the Revised Laws, in so far as it relates to the regular and permanent police force.
- Article 11 By request of Robert W. Dow to see if the Town will vote to purchase a new stone crusher and appropriate \$1700.00 for the same.
- Article 12 By request of Alfred H. Wagland and others to see if the Town will vote to purchase a power spraying machine and appropriate \$550.00 for the same.
- Article 13 By request of the Board of Fire Engineers, to see if the Town will vote to purchase a combination chemical, and hose automobile and necessary fixtures and appropriate \$6,000.00 for the same.
- Article 14 By request of George C. Oliver and others, to see if the Town will vote to buy a tract of land and build and equip a two-room school building at Hampshire Roads and appropriate the sum of \$6500.00 for the same.
- Article 15 By request of Abraham Warburton and others, to see if the Town will vote to buy a tract of land and build and equip a one-room school house on Tyler street and appropriate the sum of \$3,500 for the same.
- Article 16 By request of A. S. Huntress and others, to see if the Town will vote to buy a tract of land for school purposes on Milk Street and appropriate the sum of \$6000.00 for the same.
- Article 17 To see if the Town will vote to borrow money to pay for the land voted to be purchased for school houses, and also the school houses voted to be built thereon, and authorize the issue of votes of the Town therefor.
- Article 18 By request of the School Committee, to see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$4000.00 for the purchase of two portable school houses for the use of the schools.
- Article 19 By request of William J. Olivers and others, to see if the Town will vote to increase the pay of the regular Police Officers twenty-five cents per day for their services, the same to be taken from the regular appropriation for Police.
- Article 20 By request of the West End Improvement club and others, to see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$300.00 to drain 1000 feet of land on Lowell road now a Town thoroughfare and to lay twelve-inch pipes for same and drain water into Sawyer's brook.

- Article 22 By request of the Water Board, to see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$3,000.00 for hydrants, public buildings, and drinking fountains.
- Article 23 By request of the Playground Commission, to see if Town will appropriate \$300.00 for maintenance and improvement of the Playsteads and public grounds belonging to the Town and appoint a commission to have charge of the same for the ensuing year.
- Article 24 To see if the Town will vote the sum of \$1,000.00 to be used to continue and finish the work as planned by the Commissioners of Elmwood Cemetery.
- Article 25 To see if the Town will vote to pay the Sealer of Weights and Measures a salary and make an appropriation for the same.
- Article 26 By request of A. W. Phippen and others, that the salary of the Street Commissioner shall be \$1,200.00 per year.
- Article 27 By request of Albert Hodgson and others to see if the Town will vote to extend the water system of the Town from the property of Mr. John Kelly, 19 Maplewood avenue, to the property of Mr. William Pullen, 35 Maplewood avenue, a distance of about 400 feet and appropriate \$350.00 for the same.
- Article 28 By request of Frank Kreiling and others to see if the town will vote to extend the water pipes of its system from their present termination on Hampstead street along said Hampstead street in a northerly direction to the intersection of Maple street and appropriate \$3,500.00 for the same.
- Article 29 By request of Morris S. Hill and others, to see if the Town will vote to lay water pipes from D. L. Knightley's farm to Hill Bros, and appropriate \$4,000.00 for the same.
- Article 30 By request of F. J. Perry and others, to see if the Town will vote for a Police officer to patrol nights in the vicinity of Lowell street and Oakland avenue, and appropriate money for the same.

Article 2 Selectmen's Report

Mr. Millard F. Emerson reported verbally for the Selectmen that their report was in print and in the hands of the voters.

The report was accepted.

Voted, that the same persons be requested to serve on the on the Finance Committee, as served on it the past year.

Article 3 Regular Appropriations

The Finance Committee reported through their Secretary Perley D. Smith Esq. and the report was accepted.

The estimates recommended by the Selectmen were then considered together. It was voted to increase the sum for support of Poor to \$3600.⁰⁰ and the Police appropriation to \$8500.⁰⁰

With these amendments the estimates were voted as they were recommended and are as follows:-

Report of Arbitrators

Lawrence, Mass., April 15th 1911

Henry F. Lea Esq., Methuen Water Board
Methuen, Mass.

Dear Sir:-

In accordance with your request as authorized by the Methuen Water Board by its vote of August 5th, 1910, we beg to submit the following report in relation to the damages sustained by the Methuen Company in consequence of the diversion of a portion of waters of the Spicket River for a domestic supply for the Town of Methuen. There were two questions to be settled. The first was the period from the date of the writ, April 1st 1907, to the present time, and second the amount which should be paid for the rights for future use.

From the data furnished by the Superintendent of the Water Board relating to the amount of water pumped at the station, we find that the loss, from date of writ, April 1st, 1907, to July 31st, 1910 to be \$324.00.

For the second question regarding the compensation in settlement for future use, we have considered that from a study of the growth of population, and increase in the use of water it was reasonable to provide for an amount of 1 cubic foot per second or 236,000,000 gallons per year. The population is about 11,500 by the last official census in 1910 and the amount provided for may be sufficient for 30 years or possibly the amount may be reached at an earlier date. The consumption in July, which is a dry month, reached nearly 19,000,000 gallons which at this rate would nearly reach the limit. The other months indicated a much less amount of use.

In considering the loss of power sustained by Methuen Company we conclude that as compensation for the right to draw 1 cubic foot per second throughout the year or 236,000,000 gallons total yearly, the Town of Methuen should pay the Methuen Company the sum of \$1950.⁰⁰ and that when the limit of this quantity is reached a new agreement, and if necessary, readjustment of rates, should be made for this increased quantity. In the proposed agreement it has been provided that a quantity not exceeding 50 per cent in excess of the average quantity per month may be drawn during any one month, to allow a flexibility in its use which is liable to vary at different seasons of the year.

It is also understood that in the event of such condition as a large conflagration, requiring a large amount of water, that this amount of 50 per cent may be exceeded if necessary. To avoid any misunderstanding it is recommended that an Indenture between the two parties be executed and recorded in the Registry of Deeds for this district.

Such a form is presented which embraces the various provisions and defines the conditions which should be carried out.
