BASIC HISTORY

1. COMMAND ORGANIZATION

Captain Wm. M. RUSSELL commanded CAMDEN from 19 August 1970 until 6 November 1971 when he was relieved by Captain Reid STRINGFELLOW, CAMDEN's present Commanding Officer.

While in EASTPAC, CAMDEN is assigned administratively to Commander Service Group ONE and Commander Task Force THIRTEEN. When deployed to the Seventh Fleet west of 160° East, CAMDEN remains in the COMSERVGRU ONE administrative chain-of-command but reports also to Commander Service Group THREE for administrative purposes and to Commander Task Force SEVENTY-SEVEN operationally.

As of 31 December 1971, CAMDEN's on board count included 29 officers and 502 enlisted men.



b. Narrative Summary

CAMDEN completed her mid-deployment upkeep in Sasebo, Japan on 30 December 1970 and proceeded to Subic Bay for loadout, arriving 2 January. On 13 January, CAMDEN departed Subic Bay for Yankee Station for her first underway replenishment of the new year.

On 14 January about 30 miles north of the uninhabited Paracel Island in the South China Sea, CAMDEN rescued 11 Taiwanese who had been





adrift in a lift raft for 11 days. The survivors, including the master of the Taiwan vessel HO CHING ENG Number ONE, reported they had been enroute from Penang, Malaysia to Kaohsiung, Taiwan when the vessel sank as a result of a fire on 3 January. The survivors were treated in CAMDEN's sickbay where they were given appropriate medical attention and fed. Clothing, which they had carried with them in the raft, was laundered in the ship's laundry and other clothing and personal items were provided them. On 15 January the survivors were taken by CAMDEN's helicopter detachment to DaNang for further transportation to Taiwan.

The first day on Yankee Station, CAMDEN replenished nine Seventh Fleet ships and before the line period was over, 84 ships had been alongside for either replenishment or consolidation of fuel, ammunition and stores. During one consolidation with the USS HALEAKALA (AE 25) CAMDEN transferred what is believed to be a record amount of tonnage, over 1200 tons in less than five hours. This transfer was even more spectacular in that it was accomplished under adverse conditions brought about by heavy weather and rough seas.

On 24 January, while attempting to replenish the USS HAMNER (DD 718) in the Tonkin Gulf, HAMNER collided with the starboard side of CAMDEN causing some structual damage to both ships. No personnel injuries were substained and CAMDEN completed her line swing with necessary repairs scheduled to be made during her ROH in Long Beach. CAMDEN completed her first line period of the new year and arrived in Subic on 10 February.

After a final loadout and a short 5-day stay in Subic, CAMDEN departed on 15 February for Yankee Station and her last line period of the 1970-1971 deployment. After successfully completing her line period, CAMDEN returned to Subic on 2 March to off-load her service ammunition and load ammunition and 2 LCVP's for delivery to Guam. On 4 March, Explosive Ordnance Disposal Team 02 consisting of 1 officer and 2 enlisted men debarked CAMDEN. The expertise and capabilities of EOD Team 02 were well appreciated by CAMDEN's crew during the entire deployment. On 6 March, CAMDEN departed Subic for her homeport of Long Beach via Guam and a 5-day, well earned stopover in Sydney, Australia.

On arrival in Guam on 9 March, Commander Richard H. ENGELBRECHT relieved Commander Raymond E. HELMS, Jr., as Executive Officer. After off-loading ammunition and the LCVP's, CAMDEN departed Guam for the "Land Down Under" on 10 March.

After seven stormy and rough days at sea, CAMDEN arrived in Sydney and moored port side to Kirribilli Dolphins below the Harbor Bridge in Sydney Harbor, which was by far the most picturesque site which she enjoyed during the cruise. Ship's boats made liberty runs

to Garden Island Landing. On 21 March, CAMDEN departed Sydney for Long Beach. Six days out of Sydney, on 27 March, CAMDEN crossed the Equator and initiated approximately 175 Pollywogs into the "Solemn Mysteries of the Ancient Order of the Deep" as trusty Shellbacks.

Helicopter Combat Support Squadron THREE, Detachment 103, homeported at Naval Air Station, Imperial Beach, California debarked off the coast of San Diego on the morning of 3 April. CAMDEN proceeded on to Long Beach and a thunderous welcome home. Tug boats, spouting streams of water from their hoses, came out to meet her in the harbor and, as the ship approached Pier Echo, Naval Station, Long Beach, she was greeted by a military band, baton-twirling majorettes from a local high school, and several hundred dependents and friends waving flags, carrying banners and wondering why a ship that could travel almost 7000 miles in two weeks took so long to travel the last few hundred yards. After customs, CAMDEN's brow was lowered and the guests and dependents streamed aboard.

Because the commencement of overhaul was imminent, it was necessary to postpone the normal 30-day standdown period until after all ammunition and fuel has been off-loaded. On 6 April, CAMDEN moved to anchorage off the Naval Weapons Station, Seal Beach and commenced ammunition off-load. On 10 April, CAMDEN shifted to the Navy Fuel Depot, San Pedro where it was necessary not only to pump off all fuel but to "muck" or clean cargo tanks. On 19 April, with all pre-overhaul tasks completed, CAMDEN commenced her 30-day standdown at Pier Echo, Naval Station, Long Beach.

On 23 May, CAMDEN commenced her first regular overhaul since being commissioned in 1967. All electronics, ordnance, material handling equipment, RAS/FAS stations and main propulsion machinery were completely redone and reworked. After a 3-month, \$3.5 million dollar overhaul turned into a 6-month, \$6.4 million dollar overhaul, CAMDEN emerged from the shipyard on 23 October ready for her upcoming deployment to WESTPAC and her role as the "Floating Supermarket of the Tonkin Gulf".

On 30 October, Commander James R. POOLE relieved Commander Richard H. ENGELBRECHT as Executive Officer.

On 5 November, a dependents Cruise was conducted for over 500 dependents and friends of CAMDEN off the Southern California coast. CAMDEN also played host to her sponsoring Navy League Council, the Palm Springs Council of the Navy League, plus over 20 members of the Malibu Council of the Navy League. On 6 November Captain Reid STRINGFELLOW relieved Captain Wm. M. RUSSELL as Commanding Officer.





Between 15 November and 3 December CAMDEN operated in the Southern California operations area off San Diego where she underwent Refresher Training in preparation for the next WESTPAC deployment. From 13-15 December, CAMDEN again went to sea for her first underway replenishment since coming out of overhaul with USS HANCOCK (CVA-19). Upon return to Long Beach on 15 December, CAMDEN moored at Navy Fuel Depot, San Pedro to off-load fuel. On 20 December she again shifted to anchorage off Seal Beach and off-loaded her ammunition in preparation for the upcoming holiday cold-iron status in the Naval Shipyard Long Beach. On 20 December CAMDEN berthed at Pier 3, Naval Shipyard Long Beach where she remained through the end of the year.

3. SPECIAL TOPICS

a. Awards and Commendations

SA Roy Allen FISHER, USN, was presented with a CAMDEN Letter of Commendation for his alertness and subsequent action in the performance of his duties as lookout on board CAMDEN which resulted in the recovery of 11 survivors of the HO CHING ENG Number ONE.

Nine officers and men were awarded the Navy Commendation Medal, 35 were awarded the Navy Achievement Medal and 13 received SEVENTHFLT Letters of Commendations:

In an awards ceremony held aboard CAMDEN on 11 June, Mr. Kenneth Ferrer, President of the Palm Springs Navy League Council, presented each man with a handsome plaque honoring him as a CAMDEN Sailor of the Month. Those honored were SH2 J. L. SLOSS, YN3 J. G. WHEELER, SN M. S. CHRISTENSEN, MR2 R. D. FELTS, GMG1 J. L. GOLSTON, SD1 A. F. ROSETE, BM3 D. L. OLSON and PN2 J. D. MacDONALD.

Captain Wm. M. RUSSELL received the Bronze Star Medal for meritorious service as CAMDEN's Commanding Officer during her WESTPAC deployment from 6 September 1970 to 21 March 1971.

CAMDEN received the Battle Efficiency "E" for Fiscal Year 1971 as top ship of her class. Competition was based one-fourth upon completion of required training exercises and three-fourth upon day-to-day performance.

CAMDEN's Supply Department received the Supply Corps Blue "E" in recognition for outstanding performance during Fiscal Year 1971. Out of 45 Pacific Fleet Service Force ships, only five Blue "E's" were awarded to shipboard Supply Departments.

b. Communications

Communications recorded a total of 2397 outgoing messages and 9555 incoming messages for 1971.

c. Helicopter Combat Support Squadron THREE

Helicopter Combat Support Squadron THREE homeported in Imperial Beach, California provided the helicopter detachment for CAMDEN during 1971. The Detachment was formed in July 1970 with LCDR M. D. McCLELLAND as Officer-in-Charge. Five officers and 19 enlisted men flew and provided maintenance on two UH-46D helicopters.

In two line periods, during the months of January through March, 2571 short tons of cargo and 368 passengers were transferred to ships on Yankee Station. During this period, aircraft availability averaged 92.8 per cent. HC-3, Detachment 103 returned to her homeport on CAMDEN's arrival in CONUS on 3 April 1971.
