Rabbi's Ruminations

TRIENNIAL CYCLE

No, it's not a new Olympic endurance event. Nor is it a Peloton competitor.

The triennial cycle for Torah reading is a variation of the more customary, and familiar, annual chanting of the entire Torah. Instead of the usual 54 sedarim/portions, Torah is sectioned into 154 parts that are read over the course of three years, hence "triennial." It was a Shabbat practice in ancient Israel, mentioned in the Talmud (roughly 600 CE).

Most scholarly and rabbinic consideration of the triennial cycle focuses on "how," e.g., the number of sections or where the breaks (aliyot) occur, rather than on "why." In our day, the "how" is fairly well settled; the "why" is likewise generally accepted. As Rabbi Karen Medved writes in The Observant Life, "Many modern [Conservative] synagogues have adopted this system in order to shorten the service or to allow for more time for discussion and study."

Why am I writing about this?

The pandemic precipitated change in many aspects of our lives, including our experience of synagogue worship. Services, spirituality and socializing via Zoom may be less than optimal, but, given the circumstances, we can be grateful for the technology. When considered safe, in-person (face-masked) attendance presents a challenge:

Our typical pre-Covid Shabbat morning service of often more than 2.5 hours exceeds reasonable tolerance limits for watching a computer monitor or wearing a face mask. Initially, with attendance only via Zoom (i.e., with no physical minyan present), we sought to keep the service to a more tenable two hours by:

- truncating the "preliminaries" (p'sukei d'zimra) and the Torah opening/closing service;
- suspending the chanting of haftara except for special occasions;
- trimming the Torah reading from seven to three or four sections;
- eliminating the aliya, inviting people to Torah;
- putting repetition of the amida on hiatus;
- reciting only one kaddish, the mourner's kaddish at the end of services.

Now, thanks to vaccinations, a minyan is more likely to be in shul on Shabbat mornings, with any number of others attending via Zoom. (We expect to offer Zoom access to services and more well beyond the pandemic.) A physically present minyan means restoring many of the accommodations made for the pandemic. Even with maintaining the "heiche kedusha" — praying the opening part of the amida together, then continuing privately — this will lead to a longer service.

Benefits of adopting the triennial Torah reading cycle include a more time-sensitive service, increasing opportunities for congregants to participate by chanting an aliya or two from Torah, and making space for me to continue offering "Torah moments" between aliyot and to teach a bit about the haftara.

We have opted to give the triennial cycle a trial run. I face this challenge with an admittedly heavy heart, having long been a supporter of



the full reading, i.e., the annual cycle. Our current and foreseeable circumstances convinced me of the need for change.

Please attend our Shabbat morning services — in person (vaccinated) or on Zoom — and share with me your reactions to the changes. I hope you will find them beneficial and I certainly would like to know if I'm right or wrong on that! (Friday evening services continue unchanged; an hour of sweet music and prayer.)

Looking forward to seeing you soon — in person or on Zoom! *l'hitra'ot!*

At a time of personal loss or transition, one of the most profound comforts provided by Jewish tradition is its recognition of the marking of time and the consistent presence of ritual, law, and customs which provide structure and sense of purpose to our lives.

But what happens when a loss or life transition doesn't fit neatly into the rabbinic concept and the ritual structure for mourning or *mikveh*? How do we acknowledge or grieve when certain traditional prayers are "off limits" by Jewish tradition? Have you ever experienced a

known as hidden grief or sorrow, refers to any grief that goes unacknowledged or unvalidated by social norms. This kind of grief is often minimized or not understood by others, which makes it particularly hard to process and work through." *C. Ray pole, Healthline*

Additionally, when one is seeking guidance, validation, or a ritual found within Jewish tradition, a deeper layer of disenfranchisement may occur when those sources either don't exist or support the mourner. Unrecognized relationships, societally considered "less significant"

Cantor Wolbransky's Message

SHAVUOT 2021

The days between Pesach and Shavuot are of cantorial significance. This period is referred to as Sefirat Ha'omarthe Counting of the Omer. An omer was an ancient unit of volume for grain. The festival of Shavuot has no specific biblical date. We are instructed to count the days from the bringing of the Omer offering in the Temple, beginning on the first day of Chol Hamo'ed Pesach and continuing for a period of seven weeks. It is on day fifty that the Jewish people celebrate the holiday of Shavuot.

The prayer that introduces the counting is chanted as a mitzvah and must be done using the proper nusach. The mitzvah begins with the phrase *heneini*

muchon
umzuman
(behold I am
ready and
prepared to do
the following
mitzvah of
counting of
the Omer.)
The prayer

before the counting starts with the words *Ribbono shel Olam* (Master of the Universe). "Hopefully, we will be capable of repairing all things wrong that exist in both the physical and spiritual dimensions of our existence." In years past Cantors have set the counting of the Omer to music.

When we pray the daily Yishtabach prayer (praising G-D's name), we address Hashem as the One who selects songs of praise. Leading the congregation in prayer is an important role of the Cantor and is viewed as a privilege.

Shavuot is the time that we received the Torah. The Torah is not read, it is chanted as song. Shavuot marks the Yahrzeit of King David, the "sweet singer of Israel." The approaching festival of Shavuot with its songs and music is an example of the power to elevate the soul.

Wishing everyone a Chag Sameach and a delightful, enjoyable, and relaxing summer.



relationships, non-death loss, losses surrounded by stigma, or grieving while being excluded from mourning are all examples of a disenfranchised grief - or loss that may be minimized or dismissed by society.

Fundamental to my work over the past decade has been creating authentically Jewish ways to express and process grief as well as the marking positive and challenging moments of transition in our lives. To this end there has been an explosion of newly created rituals and prayers that are grounded in Jewish text and practice to help during these times.

If you would like to learn more about new Jewish rituals and liturgies that can help navigate the loss and grief process, as well as, Jewishly inspired rituals for moments of joyful life transitions, please join me on May 11 and 25 for an introduction to these practices at the next Connect with Cantor Jacki series.

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
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



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
