

Basic Obedience Group Training Information

Welcome to Basic Obedience

Congratulations on your decision to train your dog! Proper training creates happy, well-mannered dogs and fosters effective communication. Whether you have a new dog or a dog who could use a brush-up on manners, a basic dog obedience class is a great way to build a foundation of skills that will benefit both you and your dog in the long run.

Our Basic Obedience classes are intended to introduce you and your dog to the most common (and most needed) commands. Training also provides an opportunity for you to learn how to communicate effectively with your dog, strengthens the bond, and allows your pup to exercise both mind and body.

You and your dog will meet once per week with the group for a period of seven weeks. The size of the group varies, but is limited to a maximum of 10 dogs in order to allow the time and attention necessary for each and every pet (and owner) in the group. This class follows a structured plan for teaching and reinforcing the basic commands.

Please note that there is a required time commitment outside of class to ensure a successful training program. Please be advised that you need to work with your dog for brief training periods throughout the week – totaling at least 30 minutes per day – in order to have a successful training experience.

Basic obedience classes are not meant to resolve larger behavioral issues. If you have behavioral concerns aside from basic obedience and manners, you may need a private consultation and additional training.

Objectives

- Learning basic commands like sit, stay, down, and heel
- Loose leash walking
- Proper socialization and manners
- Focusing and listening while ignoring distractions
- Have fun!

Class Courtesies

- Please be on time. Our class time is limited and should be used efficiently.
- Please bring all required equipment with you to all class sessions.
- Please keep your dog leashed at all times.
- Please be respectful of other people's training space.
- Please DO NOT let dogs interact with each other! This only creates frustration and tension in the
 dogs and is asking for trouble. If every handler focuses on their own dog and maintaining their
 dog's attention, the class will go smoother. If this is a difficult task for you and your dog, don't
 worry that is what class is for. Just keep your space from other dogs until you get the hang of
 things.
- Family members over the age of 8 years are always welcome to come to class, but please have a supervisor for all children. Training a dog to be a part of the family takes the effort of the whole family.

• Proof of current vaccine records

- Once you have created your account in PetExec, you will need to provide proof of current Rabies, Bordetella, and DHPP/DA2PP vaccines for your dog
 - If you don't have your records handy, you should be able to contact your vet and have them sent to you via email
 - You can upload them directly into PetExec or you can email them to us at info@adogsworldsouth.com
- We need to receive these records no less than 48 hours prior to your first scheduled class
- For existing ADW customers, we may already have this information on file. Please check your PetExec account and provide updated information as needed.

Obedience and Safety Equipment


These items must be brought with you to every training session.

Six-foot long leather or nylon leash

- Thickness of leash should correspond to the size of the dog
- o Retractable leashes are NOT recommended for training

Training collar fitted to the individual dog

- Head collars are typically recommended for dogs that pull on the leash
 - A head collar has a strap that goes around the dog's neck right behind the ears and has a loop or strap that goes over the nose. The leash is attached where these two straps come together usually at the base of the dog's lower jaw near the neck, as shown in image.



Nylon training lead

- o Fifteen-foot lead for dogs 10 pounds and under
- o <u>Twenty-foot lead</u> for dogs over 10 pounds
- The training lead is used for long distance work during class
- o The lead must be in good condition

Treats

- Bring approximately <u>150 pea-sized treats</u> that your dog really likes
- You will need a treat pouch or pant/shirt pocket to house the treats
- Make sure your dog has a good appetite for class
 - Food should be withheld for approximately six to eight hours before class depending on the age of your puppy or dog

Identification

- ALL dogs should have identification, which can include:
 - Microchipping
 - Tattooing
 - A simple-to-read ID tag stating the owner's name and phone number should be attached to each dog's collar

Human Stuff

Comfortable Clothing

- No open-toed shoes or sandals
- Wear clothing appropriate for outdoors

Children

Must be supervised by an adult that is NOT participating in the class

Training Services Agreement

Client's Dog (hereinafter referred to as	"Dog"):

TRAINING FEES: Client agrees to pay Trainer a fee in the amount of \$200.00 for each private session (approximate length of 2 hours per session) OR \$200.00 for a package of seven (7) group training sessions (approximate length of 1 hour each), payable upon registration for class. All sessions must be completed within two months from the date of commencement of contract or they will be forfeited.

PAYMENT: Full payment is required to confirm your registration and reserve your place in class. Registrations are not transferrable to another class or another dog.

SERVICES: Trainer agrees to provide private and/or group lessons for Client and Dog on a lesson-by-lesson basis, the goal being to teach Client how to train and work with their Dog using positive-reinforcement methods. Trainer will make every reasonable effort to help Client achieve training and behavior modification goals, but makes no guarantee of Dog's performance or behavior as a result of providing professional animal behavior consultation. Client understands that he/she and members of the household must follow Trainer's instructions without modification, work with the Dog daily as recommended, and constantly reinforce training being given to Dog. Client agrees to avoid using the following types of tools during full contract period with trainer: pinch or choker collars, electric or shock collars, retractable leads, and other aversive methods/tools.

CANCELLATION POLICY: For private sessions, if Client fails to give at least 24 hours cancellation notice, or is not present at time of scheduled appointment, the session is forfeited and should be rescheduled for another date and paid in full at agreed upon rate. For no-show situations, Trainers will wait 15 minutes and make a reasonable effort to contact client. If client arrives late to session, that time is waived and the remaining time for the session will be finished. For group classes, missed sessions will be forfeited and Trainer will provide the customer with coursework for that session. Trainers reserve the right to cancel without 24-hour notice, though they will make their best efforts to cancel as far in advance as possible. Sessions for which the Trainer has cancelled will be rescheduled at no additional cost to Client.

REFUND POLICY: Any cancellation received at least 7 calendar days prior to the class start date is eligible for 100% refund of fees paid. Cancellations received fewer than 7 calendar days prior to the start date of class are eligible for a 50% refund of fees paid. All refunds will be credited to the original form of payment within 10 business days.

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DOG HEALTH AND VACCINATIONS: Client warrants that Dog is physically fit and in good health, and free of fleas, parasites and infectious diseases. Client must provide proof of vaccines prior to participating in group classes.

REMOVAL FROM TRAINING: A Dog's World reserves the right to terminate the training Agreement at any time before or during its term if Trainer determines that a danger exists to the health and safety of the public, Trainer, Client, or Dog. Should the Trainer or Client terminate the training Agreement at any time prior to completion, all fees are non-refundable and non-transferrable.

Further, be it understood that if Client fails to comply with the recommendations provided by Trainer, and if, in the judgment of Trainer, Dog poses a risk to any human or other animal, then Trainer has sole discretion to provide a copy of behavior report to any animal control, public safety, or other agency of jurisdiction, or as required by law.

VIDEO AND PHOTO RELEASE: Client grants to Trainer, and/or its representatives and employees, the right to take photographs and/or videos of Client, Client's family, and/or Dog, and to copyright, use and publish the same in print and/or electronically. Client agrees that Trainer may use such photographs of Client, Client's family, and/or Dog with or without name(s) and for any lawful purpose, including, for example, such purposes as publicity, illustration, advertising, and Web or social media content. All video and photos are the property of A Dog's World.

PROPRIETARY CONTENT NOTICE: A Dog's World training content is proprietary information and remains the sole property of A Dog's World (ADW). Training class clients, class participants, and/or their representatives are not permitted to record, copy, distribute, or share any ADW training instructions, handouts, audio, video, online or other content, without written consent of ADW and the Trainer. This includes, but is not limited to, sharing proprietary content on social media, sharing with third parties, or sharing for promotional purposes. Clients may record and share photos or video of their own dogs during sessions, but not of dogs belonging to other clients or class participants.

ON TIME START - We strive to start and end our classes on time. Safety and a good experience is our goal; please be on time for your scheduled class as late arrivals cause unnecessary distraction for the class that is in session as well as safety concerns if doors or gates are opened mid-class.

MISSED CLASSES: A Dog's World group training classes are designed to build on skills progressively each week, with a review of the prior week's material AND new material being introduced every week. If Client must miss a class, Trainer agrees to provide handouts for your reference. Client must request these via email. There are no make-up lessons provided for classes that the Client and/or Dog did not participate in. If Client and/or Dog misses two classes, Client will forfeit spot in class and be required to re-register and begin again. Missed classes would require substantial one-on-one trainer instruction to catch-up Client and Dog on missed material, which is unfair to the other class participants.

RELEASE OF LIABILITY AND INDEMNIFICATION: Client expressly acknowledges and understands that Trainer's services will be provided in an environment where certain hazards may exist, including, but not limited to, debris in the training area, other animals and their owners, training equipment, water, and other natural hazards. Client expressly agrees to indemnify and hold harmless Trainer and Trainer's agents and to pay all losses and damages suffered or incurred, and to defend and indemnify Trainer and Trainer's



agents from any claims, demands, lawsuits, losses, costs or expenses, including attorney fees, arising out of or in connection with the provision of Trainer's services to Client and/or Dog.

If Dog causes property damage, or bites or injures any dog, animal or person (including but not limited to Trainer and Trainer's agents), during or after the term of this Agreement, then Client agrees to pay all resulting losses and damages suffered or incurred, and to defend and indemnify Trainer and Trainer's agents from any resulting claims, demands, lawsuits, losses, costs or expenses, including attorney fees.

If Dog is injured in a fight or in any other manner during or after the term of the Agreement, Client assumes the risk and agrees that Trainer should not be held responsible for any resulting injuries, losses, damages, costs or expenses. At Trainer's sole election, Trainer's duties hereunder shall terminate if (a) in Trainer's sole judgment Dog is dangerous or vicious to Trainer or any other person or animal, or interferes with the training of other dogs, or (b) Client breaches any term or condition of this Agreement. Upon termination in accordance with the foregoing, Trainer's duties shall terminate but all other provisions of this Agreement shall continue in full force and effect.

THIS AGREEMENT is binding upon Client, spouse of Client, and children of Client. This Agreement supersedes all prior discussions, representations, warranties and agreements of the parties, and expresses the entire agreement between Client and Trainer regarding the matters described above. The parties confirm that, except for that which is specifically written in this Agreement, no promises, representations or oral understandings have been made with regard to Dog or anything else. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, Client acknowledges that Trainer has not represented, promised, guaranteed or warranted that Dog will never bite, that Dog will not be dangerous or vicious in the future, that Dog will not exhibit other behavioral problems, or that the results of the training will last for any particular amount of time. This Agreement may be amended only by a written instrument signed by both Client and Trainer.
