WELCOME TO BRAHMALAND



he NYTEX Sports Centre, located in North Richland Hills, is the home of the Lone Star Brahmas. North Richland Hills is a beautiful suburb that sits in northeast Tarrant County, just minutes away from the Dallas/Fort Worth Metroplex.


NYTEX is a 2,500 seat multi-purpose arena with five public suites, an owner's suite, and three party suites. The 140,000 square foot facility also includes a second ice rink that converts into an indoor turf arena during the summer. The Sports Centre also contains a 30,000 foot multi-purpose arena for volleyball and other events.

Formerly the Blue Line Ice Complex, the Centre was the original home of the NAHL Texas Tornado. In the Spring of 2007, several years after the Tornado had moved to Frisco, Texas, the building came under new ownership

and was restored to its current state and dubbed "Brahmaland." Soon, it became the home of a professional hockey team as well as the Texas Brahmas Youth Hockey Association and youth and adult house leagues, giving a home to ice hockey players of all ages and levels of play.

After the professional team ceased operation in 2013, it was decided that the NYTEX Sports Centre's focus should return to its original purpose of developing young hockey players.

In late Fall 2013, the North American Hockey League (the only USA Hockey Sanctioned Tier II league in the country) approved the purchase of the Texas Tornado and the subsequent move to NYTEX, where they were rebranded as the Lone Star Brahmas.



THE NAHL: AN OVERVIEW



Celebrating its 45th season in 2020-21, the NAHL is the only USA Hockey-sanctioned Tier II Junior league boasting 25 teams in 14 states from across North America.

The NAHL offers junior hockey players the opportunity to develop, learn, train, grow and succeed, while playing for free. The NAHL is unique in the fact that a vast majority of players begin their NAHL careers without an NCAA opportunity, but earn one through the course of their development in the league.

The NAHL's dedication to player development is demonstrated by the league's high-profile annual exposure events like the NAHL Showcase in September, the NAHL Top Prospects Tournament in February and the NAHL Robertson Cup Championship in May, which have all evolved into hockey's most prominent and popular of its kind and are a must-see for NCAA programs and NHL teams alike.

During the 2019-20 season, the NAHL set a new single-season record with 361 NCAA commitments, with 70% of those being NCAA Division I commitments.

Over the course of the last five seasons, over 1,200 NAHL players have made NCAA commitments and 17 have been drafted into the NHL, and others have been invited to NHL Development Camps.

DOWNTOWN LIFESTYLE



NAHL TOURNAMENTS

As a player in the North American Hockey League, you will be exposed to scouts and recruiters from other leagues, Division I & III colleges, and the NHL at league-hosted events like the Showcase Tournament and the Top Prospects Tournament. These tournaments allow coaches and scouts to view players from all over the league in one location. Over 300 college and professional scouts attended last year's events.

PLAYER ADVANCEMENTS


The goal of the Lone Star Brahmas and the North American Hockey League is to provide a competitive atmosphere for players to learn, develop, and grow their skills. The Brahmas coaching staff is committed to assisting players in progressing their careers. At least twice a month, the Brahmas will set up in-person or Skype conference calls with collegiate scouts, coaches, and professional hockey players. The goal is to provide the Brahmas with advice on how to advance their hockey career and balance their daily routine.

To date, the Lone Star Brahmas have 89 alumni committed to NCAA programs at the Division I and Division III levels. Two players have been selected in the NHL Draft, and nine players have received invites to NHL Development Camps.

Goaltender Jake Kupsky (pictured right) was drafted by the San Jose Sharks and has been to three Sharks Development Camps. Kupsky is currently playing NCAA Division I hockey at Union College, where he is teammates with fellow former Brahmas Sebastian Vidmar, Brandon Estes, and Darion Hanson.



THE BRAHMA FOOTPRINT IN COLLEGE HOCKEY



hrough seven full seasons in the NAHL, the Lone Star Brahmas have done a tremendous job moving their players on to the next level. Sure, that means there's a very high turnover rate with this team, as players age out, progress with their own careers, and go on to play in college, but such is the nature of junior hockey. It's what you like to see at this level.

As of February 2021, the Brahmas have had 87 former or current players commit to play hockey for NCAA Division I programs, with even more participating in Divison III programs.

On the next page, you can find a chart with every Brahmas commitment from the past seven years and the list of our current roster's commitments. As mentioned, some players may not be at their

schools yet, and others may not be there anymore. However, it's encouraging to see the footprint the Brahmas organization is leaving on the NCAA hockey landscape.

This season, the Brahmas are hoping to continue to advance their players, and there's no doubt that there will be more commitments to come.



DAN WILDFONG



fter winning his first Robertson Cup Championship, Dan Wildfong returns behind the Brahmas bench after a season cut short. Wildfong is especially trying to build upon the Brahmas record 16 Division I NCAA commitments in 2019-2020 season.

In thirteen full seasons with the franchise, teams led by Wildfong have a record of 474-288-79 (.590 win percentage). In the midst of this record, Dan also was awarded NAHL Coach of the year at the conclusion of the 2014-15 and 2019-20 seasons, and NAHL General Manager of the Year in 2019-20 as well. Over the course of Wildfong's 18 professional seasons as a coach and player, he has failed to make the playoffs just three times. A well-respected leader on and off the ice, it's safe to say Coach Wildfong knows his hockey.

Revered as one of the most intense coaches in the NAHL, Wildfong is known to get the most out of his players through leading by example. His passion for the game and resilient efforts towards ensuring his players' progression year in and year out prove his worthiness as being the best candidate to lead the Brahmas. Furthermore, his experience in the NCAA directly assists players who choose to follow that path as well. During the offseason, Wildfong saw one of his very own products selected to the show in Cam Clarke, who was picked by the Boston Bruins in the 2016 NHL Draft. Under Wildfong's leadership, the Brahmas areapproaching 100 players to commit to Division I or Division III college hockey programs.

Wildfong's resources have also allowed players to participate in the Dallas Stars' NHL Development Camp. In recent years, Brahmas alumni Ludvig Larsson, Jacob Nehama, Will White, and Alexey Solovyev have attended the event.

Prior to his coaching career, Dan played four years at Colgate University, followed by eight years in the Western Professional Hockey League and Central Hockey League. Through eight seasons (488 games) in Shreveport with the Mudbugs, Wildfong recorded 216 goals and 341 assists for a total of 557 points. He stands as the franchise's all-time leading scorer and helped lead his team to playoffs seven times while in Louisiana. Additionally, Wildfong finished second in league penalty minutes with a combined 1,970 career PIM. In his last three seasons he was selected as the "Best Leader" of his team. His number 10 jersey has been retired by the Mudbugs and his jersey hangs from the rafters of George's Pond at Hirsch Coliseum.

Dan is a native of Clinton, Ontario and he currently resides in North Richland Hills, TX with his wife Meagan, son Nolan, and daughter Riley.

ANDREW WHITESIDE



Andrew Whiteside was named the Assistant Coach prior to the 2020-21 season. A veteran in the NAHL, Whiteside comes to the Brahmas after serving as the Director of Scouting and an assistant coach for the Wilkes-Barre/Scranton Knights for the past four seasons, where he was in charge of recruiting, coaching the Knights defensemen, assisting in the planning & running of practices, penalty kill, and video analysis.

Prior to being behind the bench for the Knights, Whiteside also spent time on the staff of the Kenai River Brown Bears as an assistant coach.

In addition, he was selected by USA Hockey as a video coach for the gold medal-winning 2013 Boys Select U17 Five Nations Tournament in Trnava, Slovakia. In the summer, Whiteside serves on the coaching staff for USA Hockey's Boys Select 16 Player Development Camp in Amherst, N.Y. – comprised of the top youth & junior hockey players in the nation.

A native of Philadelphia, Pa., the coach attended Niagra University where he earned his bachelor's degree in Sports Management in 2015. On top of completing his studies, Whiteside was a four-year letter winner as a part of the NCAA Division I Men's Hockey coaching staff.

SUPPORT STAFF =



In addition to an excellent coaching staff, the Brahmas also have a top-notch support staff there to assist the team and provide the players and coaches with the help they need to maintain the highest level of performance possible.

The Brahmas head equipment manager is responsible for handling all the Brahmas equipment needs, including laundry, skate sharpening, stick ordering, and locker room maintenance.

An athletic trainer attends practices and is on hand ev-

ery day the team meets, so players can receive the treatment they need to stay in top physical shape. The trainer is also on the bench during every game, ready to respond to any situations that may arise.

While some organizations do not have a full-time staff that travels with the team, the Brahmas' equipment manager and athletic trainer join them on the road to ensure that wherever the team is, they'll be set up for success.

EDUCATION IS FUNDAMENTAL

The North American Hockey League and the Lone Star Brahmas are committed to giving young players every opportunity to continue their education while still progressing in their hockey career.

HIGH SCHOOL

The NYTEX Sports Centre, home of the Brahmas, is situated directly across the road from Birdville High School. This gives players the ability to attend a brick-and-mortar school should they choose to do so.

If students would prefer to attend an online high school, The North American Hockey League and the Lone Star Brahmas also work with Texas Virtual Academy, K12.com, and Franklin Virtual High School.

COLLEGE

Continuing education beyond high school is important to many players. The NYTEX Sports Centre is just minutes away from several colleges and Universities, which makes taking classes extremely convenient.

SAT / ACT TUTORING

In addition to tutoring for high school courses, the Lone Star Brahmas also provide assistance in preparing for the SAT and ACT standardized tests. Tom Sauvlet, our tutor, has been working with the team for several years and has seen very favorable results. Most players who work with Tom see a 15-20% increase in their testing scores.

In addition to group sessions, Tom also offers one-on-one tutoring, which players are encouraged to take advantage of.

As a member of the Lone Star Brahmas, you will be a proven player who is dedicated, passionate, committed to hard work, and possess the attitude of a champion.
