They are due on the dates shown on the syllabus. Essays must be submitted via **Turnitin** (link on my website) by 10:00 PM, as well as a printed copy IN CLASS.</u>

<u>Discussion Cards</u>: Make two identical 3x5 cards: on each write a question or comment that could lead to class discussion about the reserve reading assigned for that class. On the other side write a question or comment about the class material or film of the preceding class. Turn in <u>one</u> card and keep the other. Put your NAME and CARD NUMBER on the card, so I can mark it on my sheet.
