2021 FALL TRI-LEVEL DOUBLES

LOCAL LEAGUE REGULATIONS

All captains and players are responsible for following these rules & regulations.

GOVERNING RULES:

Captains and players are expected to be familiar with the 2021 National/Eastern Regulations found on the Eastern website at <https://www.usta.com/en/home/play/play-as-a-member/eastern/RegulationsandGrievances.html>.

Where an issue is not addressed in these local rules, refer to the 2021 National/Eastern regulations for guidance. Captains will be notified of any changes to local regulations when the 2022 Eastern/National Rules are posted.

FORMAT AND GENERAL INFORMATION:

Trilevel Leagues:

Women's and Men's Teams: 1st doubles: 4.5; 2nd doubles: 4.0; 3rd doubles: 3.5

Women's and Men's Teams: 1st doubles: 4.0; 2nd doubles: 3.5; 3rd doubles: 3.0

Women's and Men's Teams: 1st doubles: 5.0; 2nd doubles: 4.5; 3rd doubles: 4.0

- Each team shall have a minimum of six (6) registered players (1 at each level is required).
- Each team must have use of three courts for home matches; a minimum of 2 hours should be reserved.
- Match fee is \$30 per player.
- Each match will consist of three doubles matches, one at each level.
- 3rd Set – 10 point Match Tiebreak (1st to 10, win by 2). COMAN rotation for all set & match tie-breaks.
- Lower-rated players are permitted to “play up” one court. (For example: a 4.0 may play up to 4.5 or a 3.0 player may play up to 3.5). Players may not play on a court below their rating.
- This league will use a points system (1 point per individual court) to determine standings.

REGISTRATION / NTRP RATING:

- **Self-rated players may play in the local season of the 4.5/4.0/3.5 W/R league. Further information regarding eligibility for post-season play can be found in the 2021/2022 USTA Eastern Trilevel League Regulations.**
- For all trilevel leagues, players will register with their 2019 year-end rating. Self-rated players WILL BE permitted to play in these local leagues. Please be sure to use all the guidelines for self-rating (self-rated players may be subject to self-rate grievance disqualification if the correct player background information is not provided).
- Registration remains open through the completion of the regular season.

TEAM MEMBERS' RESPONSIBILITIES:

- All players must register through Tennis Link at www.tennislink.usta.com/leagues. All participating team members must be registered prior to playing in a match. If an unregistered player participates in a match, all point(s) won on that court shall be reversed.

- Players are permitted to play on more than one team in the same area, provided the teams are not at the same tri-level. (Example – a 4.0 may compete in the 4.0 on a 3.0/3.5/4.0 team AND a 3.5/4.0/4.5 team).
- Be members of the USTA through May 2022.
- Any registration transfers or credits must be requested before the end of the regular season and prior to post-season play.

TEAM CAPTAINS' RESPONSIBILITIES:

- Make sure all players are registered through TennisLink and listed on an official roster.
- Contact the visiting captain at least five days prior to the match to confirm the site, availability of courts, time of matches and confirm that there are no forfeits.
- Cancellations of less than 24 hours will be subject to payment of court fees if the home club requires. Your team may be subject to a forfeit of the next match unless required payments settled.
- Be present at every match or assign someone in to be the acting captain. Collect all fees required to pay the facility for the match. (\$180 each team = \$30 per player)
- Exchange lineups simultaneously, prior to starting play, and record scores of each match.
- The home team is responsible for providing match balls.
- Both team captains are responsible for entering & confirming scores through TennisLink, within 48 hours!

MATCH REGULATIONS:

- A 10-minute warm-up, including serves, is permitted before the match begins.
- Play must be continuous throughout the match.
- The 15-minute default period begins with the scheduled starting time of the match. Enforcing a default is at the discretion of the captains. If court time and players are available to accommodate the late start, the match can be played.
- If, after the scorecards have been exchanged but prior to the first point of an individual match being played, a player becomes unable or unavailable to play; a substitution may be made using a rostered player.
- If 1st or 2nd doubles must be defaulted, the lower court is not required to play the higher level match. Simply default the appropriate court.
- All matches will be best of three sets, with regular scoring and a match tiebreak in lieu of a third set.
- Captains should discuss prior to the start if the courts must be vacated at the 2 hour mark. If so, please play right up until the 2 hour match end time and use the timed match procedure to determine the winner of the match.
- If a match is timed out before completion, please select “timed match” instead of “completed.”

RESCHEDULING MATCHES:

It is important for the sake of league standings and fairness for all teams that all matches be completed. For a match to be considered valid, at least 2 courts must be played. Every effort should be made to keep the matches as scheduled.

- Matches can only be rescheduled with the prior approval of the local league coordinator, and only two courts need to be rescheduled to constitute a valid match. The team requesting the reschedule will default one individual match. The team that has been asked to reschedule will choose the defaulted court. All three courts may be rescheduled if both captains agree.

If reschedules cannot be accomplished, the team that causes an illegal match to occur may have their matches removed to calculate final standings. A team that has caused an illegal match & not played all of their matches may not advance to playoffs, even if they have the higher standing. That team may also be restricted from participating in the league the following year.

TIMED MATCH PROCEDURE:

Both teams must agree on which clock will be used to determine the end of the match before play starts.

Play should continue right up to the end time of the match. In the event the match has not been completed at the 2 hour mark, **end the match** and allocate the points according to the following guidelines.

(Use the "timed match" option when entering the scores for this court):

- **A game in progress should not be completed and does not count.**
- If the teams have split sets, with no time left to start the match tiebreak – **The individual match ends in a tie.**
- If the team that won the first set is on serve, tied, or ahead by 1 break or more in the 2nd set - **That team wins the individual match.**
- If the team that won the first set is losing the 2nd set by 1 break or more – **The individual match ends in a tie.**

If the teams have split sets and are in the middle of a match tiebreak (in lieu of a third set), the match is decided according to the following guidelines:

- If the match tiebreak is tied or on serve – **the individual match ends in a tie.**
- If a team is up by one break point or more in the tiebreak: **that team wins the individual match.**
- ***If the teams are in a second set tiebreak, the team that is up by one or more break points in that tiebreak wins the set (and it can then be decided if there is a match winner or if the match ends in a tie). If the score in the second set tiebreak is even or on serve, the second set is deemed a tie and the winner of the match is the team that won the first set.***

SCORING:

- One point is awarded to the winner of each individual match. In the case of a tie, each pairing will receive .5 point.
- In case of a default, the non-defaulting party shall be credited with a 6-0, 6-0 win.

CHAMPIONSHIPS:

Local Championship Format

- In leagues with only one division and where only one full round robin is played, the top two teams will advance to a local championship final.
- In leagues with only one division and where two full round robins are played, the team that comes first in the standings will advance. There will be no local championship match.
- In leagues with two divisions, the winner of each division will play in a local championship final.

Details regarding advancement to Championship play, including Local, Regional and Sectional Championships, will be communicated to captains in a timely manner.

To be eligible to advance to Regionals, Sectionals and the National Invitational Tournament a player must have a valid "C" rating after 2021 Year End Ratings have been published. Please see 2021/2022 Eastern Trilevel League Regulations for the definition of a valid "C" rating, and for number of matches required for regional and sectionals.

MATCH GRIEVANCE PROCEDURES:

All grievances must be submitted in writing by the team captain prior to the commencement of whichever occurs first: (a) the involved team's next match in that flight, whether or not the player participates or (b) within 24 hours after the end of the local league season, except for Administrative, Eligibility or NTRP grievances. See national rule 3.03B

2021/2022 USTA EASTERN TRI-LEVEL DOUBLES REGULATIONS

All Eastern Tri-Level Leagues shall follow these regulations and the USTA Eastern Adult League Play Regulations as documented herein and follow “The Code”.

- Women’s and Men’s team, any three adjacent levels (i.e., 4.5-4.0-3.5, 4.0-3.5-3.0, 3.5-3.0-2.5).
- Lower rated players are permitted to “play up” one court. (For example: a 4.0 may play up to 4.5 or a 3.0 player may play up to 3.5 but not to 4.0). Players may not play on a court below their rating.
- Each team shall have a minimum of six (6) registered players but are encouraged have additional players.
- Each match will consist of three doubles matches, one at each level. Format is order of strength – e.g., 1st doubles 4.5, 2nd doubles 4.0, 3rd doubles 3.5. If there is a default, players are not required to move up to a higher level court.
- A Match Tiebreak will be used in lieu of a third set (1st to 10 by 2)
- To qualify for Regional or Sectional Championships a player must have played a minimum of 1 match (defaults do not count)
- Winning teams may advance to a Sectional Championship for the 4.5-4.0-3.5 level and 4.0-3.5-3.0 level. Sectional winners may be eligible to participate in a national invitational tournament; eligibility criteria for the invitational tournament are at the discretion of the National Tournament Director and not the Eastern Section.
- **Ratings:**
Players shall start local league play using their 2019 year end rating or a valid self rating.

4.5-4.0-3.5 level: To advance to the National Invitational Tournament a player must have a valid “C” rating after 2021 Year End Ratings have been published. More specific details of rating are outlined below under “Accepted Rating Types for 2022 National Invitational.” The same eligibility requirements will apply for participation in Regionals and Sectionals.

- 2019 Computer rated players (C ratings only) may continue to play at their 2019 C rating for Regionals and Sectionals unless the player is bumped up two levels when 2021 year end ratings are published. If a player is bumped up two levels they shall play at their 2021 year end C rating.
- 2019 S, M, A and T players shall only advance to regionals and sectionals if they receive a 2021 year end C rating, and then they shall play at their 2021 year end C rating.
- Players who appeal their 2021 year end rating are not eligible to play at their appealed level. Players are only eligible to play at the C rating initially received when 2021 year end ratings were published.

All other levels: self-rated players may play, and at the 4.0-3.5-3.0 level, are allowed to advance to Sectional Championships.

Note: National Regulations supercede Eastern regulations and shall be followed. For Regionals and Sectional Championships, Eastern will follow the player eligibility, including any future changes, for the National Invitational Tournament

Accepted Rating Types for 2022 National Invitational

Computer "C" Rated Players: Players must have a valid "C" rating after 2021 Year End Ratings have been published in order to participate in the Tri Level National Invitational to be held in 2022.

Question: If a "C" Computer generated player who competes in 2021 gets bumped up when Year End ratings are released, can they still participate at the NTRP level they played at in 2021?

Example: 3.5 "C" Computer rated player gets bumped up to 4.0 "C". Can they still play in the invitational at 3.5 "C"?

Answer: Yes, as a "C" Computer generated player, this player MAY play in the Tri-Level National Invitational held in 2022 at the NTRP level they played at in 2021.

However, SHOULD A PLAYER MOVE UP TWO LEVELS AT YEAR END THEY MUST PLAY AT THEIR NEW HIGHEST LEVEL INSTEAD OF THEIR ORIGINAL ROSTERED LEVEL.

Example a 3.5C rated player earns a 4.5C rating with 2021 Year End Ratings they must play at the 4.5 level.

Question: If a "C" rated player appeals their 2021 Year End Rating Down and is now showing as an "A" appealed player, are they able to play at their lower appealed rating?

Answer: No. If a player earned a "C" year end rating in 2021 and they appealed their rating down through tennislink and now have a valid "A" rating, they will be allowed to play but at the "C" rating level they earned in 2021.

For example if a player earned a 4.0 C rating and they appeal their rating down to a 3.5 A, they **may** play at the Tri Level invitational as a 4.0 rated player.

"S" Self rated, "A" Appealed, "M" Mixed, or "T" Tournament players may only play if they earn a "C" Computer year-end rating when 2021 Year End Rating are published and they must play at the "C" rating level that they earned with the 2021 Year End Ratings.

Question: If a "S" Self rated, "A" Appealed, "M" Mixed, or "T" Tournament player who competed in 2021 gets bumped up at 2021 Year End Ratings, can they still participate at the NTRP level they played at in 2021?

Example: A 3.5 S" Self rated, "A" Appealed, "M" Mixed, or "T" Tournament player gets bumped up to 4.0 "C". Can they still play in the 2022 event at the 3.5 level?

Answer: No. A "S" Self rated, "A" Appealed, "M" Mixed, or "T" Tournament player MAY ONLY PLAY IF THEY EARNED A "C" COMPUTER YEAR-END RATING IN 2021 AND THEY MUST PLAY AT THE "C" COMPUTER RATING LEVEL THAT THEY EARNED DURING 2021 YEAR END RATINGS.

Example: A "S" Self rated, "A" Appealed, "M" Mixed, or "T" Tournament player gets bumped up to 4.0 "C" they must play at the 4.0 NTRP level at the Tri Level Invitational held in 2022. Please note that a "S" Self rated, "A" Appealed, "M" Mixed, or "T" Tournament 4.5 player who got bumped up to 5.0 "C" WOULD NOT be eligible to play in the event held in 2022,
