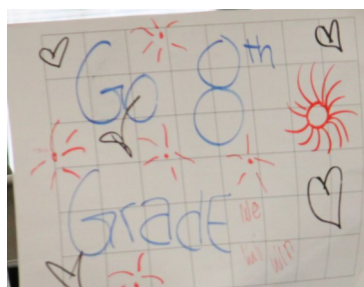

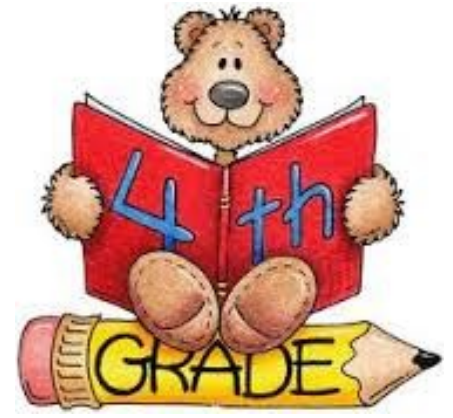

# Internet Safety

Did you know that out of the 56 seventh through eighth grade students surveyed at JFK 1.8% say they don't know what cyberbullying is? Cyberbullying is when bullying occurs online, not to a person's face. Cyberbullying is important and everyone should know about it, especially those using social media where they are able to see and post mean things online. Of the students who were surveyed about cyberbullying, 67.9% say that cyberbullying is the same as bullying in general. The truth is, it is not. There are many differences to cyberbullying versus bullying like the fact that when cyberbullying occurs the bully is unable to see the reaction of the victim whereas in bullying face to face you can see the hurt in someone's eyes or body language. Also another difference is cyberbullying can happen anytime of the day, but bullying only can happen when the bully and the victim are in contact of each other.

At JFK we are working to reduce cyberbullying and bullying behaviors. In classroom guidance lessons with Mrs. Schott, students learn about internet safety and etiquette. Also at parent nights, presenters share important information about internet safety for moms and dads. When asked if there are or have been problems with cyberbullying at JFK Mrs. Schott responded, "Sometimes, JFK is no different than any other place in the world." Mrs. Schott's advice regarding internet safety is to stay away from anonymous people and websites and to be open and honest with your parents about what you do online so they can help you make good choices. Also Mrs. Schott suggested a few resources for students and parents regarding internet safety such as <https://www.commonsensemedia.org/>, <http://www.netsmartz.org/Parents>, and <https://kidshealth.org/>. Furthermore, Mrs. Bauer's advice is to pause and review what is written or photographed before clicking the post, send, and submit buttons.

Thinking twice about posting words and pictures is an important step when online. Keeping that in mind is what can help stop cyberbullying from happening. When asked if should you always think twice about posting words and pictures online, 91.1% of seventh and eighth graders said yes, whereas 8.9% said no. Jessica S. in 8B said "You should always think twice about posting words and pictures online because it can come back to get you." Also in case you didn't know during a job interview the employer may look through your past online profiles and see what you have posted or said. What would your social media say about you?

# STOP cyberbullying

To keep students safe at JFK the Internet has a web-filter. This web-filtering is done by the Area Education Agency or the AEA. Also Ms. Siefers goes back into the web-filtering and edits it, by adding more websites to it because the AEA doesn't always catch everything. To help prevent cyberbullying Mrs. Schott tries to understand what happened and why it happened, and helps students repair any damage to their friends. Mr. Steimle and Mrs. Temming determine if disciplinary action is needed and the students who bullied must understand the consequences of their actions.

When you're on the internet and inappropriate things pop up some people don't know what to do. Tyler G. in 8K said when he was online and saw something disturbing or inappropriate that he just clicked off and blocked the page. When you're online and an anonymous person asks you a question do not respond and tell an adult. Report or block the person and never give out personal information such as your phone number, email, address, school, name, parent's name, age, and social security number. Never meet in person with a stranger you met online unless you have your parents permission and they come with you, for the reason that you might not know them and they could be different from who they say they are. Also never invite a stranger to come to your house or call you. In addition, use an online name that doesn't reveal your full identity.



Given these facts you should always be safe and cautious online and never interact with a stranger or someone you don't know. Remember that on social media once you post something it's there forever and can be retrieved. Be safe when posting things and never post something that gives away personal information to other people. Keep in mind that cyberbullying is hurtful and can lead to dangerous doings, so be kind online and think about what you say and post on the internet before officially posting it. Last but not least remember God loves you and wants you to be safe wherever you are, not only online, but anywhere. He trusts you'll make good choices not only online but in everyday activities.

## Advice from JFK Seventh and Eighth graders regarding Cyberbullying

Tell an adult or block the person on social media.

Seek help. Also, try not to fight back, over the internet is a lot more mean than real life (word wise). Screen shot the texts for proof to show someone to get help.

Stay strong and get through whatever their dealing with. Ask for help and support.

I would tell them go to an adult and tell them about what is happening, and I would tell them that they shouldn't take everyone's opinion about them to heart.

Delete the app.

Do not give out ANY private or personal information.

It doesn't matter. Be yourself. They are doing it to get to you, so if you don't show that you care, no matter how hard it is or how long it'll take, it will stop.

Just block and report the person who is doing it. Almost all social media apps have the options to do that. If you don't know the person doing it, just remember that person doesn't know the real you. They only know you by the things you post about yourself. That's not much to go by if it's someone you do know. Tell someone you trust and confront the person doing it.

Whoever is bullying you doesn't know who you really are so don't believe them because the ones who care about you know you're amazing.

Do not pay attention to the bad, you should always look at the good. Always look at the glass half full and not half empty. It is all about what you think of yourself so then you can prove them wrong and show them how awesome you really are!

I would say that it's probably best if you ignore/block the source of the cyberbullying. Also, never bully the other person back. It is 100 percent okay to defend yourself, but just make sure that you are aware of the difference between defending yourself and bullying. I would save the evidence of the cyberbullying (just in case) and also report the bully. Remember that the hurtful things they are saying about you aren't true. Know that you are an amazing child of God and the bully is not worth your time whatsoever.
