Clemson Moves to No. 4 in AP; FSU Ranked 10th; Miami 24th in USA Today

Virginia Hosts 2nd-ranked Oregon; Hurricanes Host No. 12 Florida

Syracuse Travels to No. 19 Northwestern; Wake and BC Tangle in a Nationally Televised Friday Night Game

The Atlantic Coast Conference heads into Week Two with the momentum from a 9-3 non-conference record in the season's first week... The nine non-conference victories is the second highest number of wins on a weekend and eight ACC teams scored 30 or more points, which is also the most in league history... Six league teams are also ranked among the Top 22 nationally in total defense, led by Wake Forest, which ranks No.1 after one week... Three ACC teams are ranked in this week's USA Today Coaches poll, with two of them in the Top Ten in No. 5 Clemson and No. 10 Florida State... The league's third nationally-ranked team, No. 24 Miami, begins the second weekend of Top 10 tests for the conference when **Al Golden's** Hurricanes host in-state rival and 9th-ranked Florida (USA Today) Saturday at Sun Life Stadium in Miami Gardens (Noon, ESPN)... The 'Canes are led by the tandem of **QB Stephen Morris** and explosive **RB Duke John-**

son in a once-annual series which has been played just five times in the last 30 years... Johnson ran for a career-high 186 yards against FAU and is averaging 181 a game in his last two contests... The other Top 10 match-up occurs in Charlottesville, Va., where the Cavaliers of Coach **Mike London** host 2nd-ranked (AP) Oregon at Scott Stadium (3:30 pm, ABC/ESPN2)... Virginia took a defensive struggle with BYU last week as **S Anthony Harris** was named the Walter Camp National Player of the Week... The Ducks feature the nation's leading offense, which piled up 772 yards last weekend and also rank No. 2 in rushing (500.0) and 4th in scoring offense (66.0)... Syracuse, coached by **Scott Shafer** and led by ACC Defensive Lineman of the Week **DE Robert Welsh**, also faces a nationally-ranked test when the Orange travel to face 19th-ranked Northwestern at Ryan Field in Evanston, Ill. (6 pm, Big Ten

Network)... Syracuse is facing its second straight Big Ten opponent after dropping a close contest to Penn State last week... The weekend actually begins with the second ACC clash of the year when Wake Forest, coached by **Jim Grobe** and led by **QB Tanner Price**, travels to Chestnut Hill to face Boston College, coached by **Steve Addazio** and led by **WR Alex Amidon** at Alumni Stadium in a nationally-televised game on Friday (8 pm, ESPN2)... Clemson, which moved all the way to No. 4 this week in AP, is coming off unprecedented back-to-back wins over Top 10 SEC teams after its season-opening win over then No. 5 Georgia, hosts another set of Bulldogs in in-state rival South Carolina State at Memorial Stadium in Clemson (12:30 pm, ACC Network)... The Tigers of coach **Dabo Swinney** are led by **QB Tajh Boyd**, who

moved into 2nd place on the ACC TDR list last week....At the same time, North Carolina, coached by **Larry Fedora** and led by **QB Bryn Renner**, looks to get into the win column in its home opener after a tough loss to No. 6 South Carolina, hosting always-dangerous Middle Tennessee at Kenan Stadium in Chapel Hill, N.C. (12:30 pm, RSN)...An hour later and several miles to the northwest, Virginia Tech looks to do the same thing as the Hokies, coached by **Frank Beamer**, host Western Carolina at Lane Stadium in Blacksburg (ESPN3, 1:30 pm)... Tech dropped its season-opener to No. 1 Alabama despite a stellar defensive effort and is looking to **QB Logan Thomas** and **TB Trey Edmunds** to get its offense going against the Catamounts... Maryland, coached by **Randy Edsall** and led by **QB C.J. Brown**, faces its second straight non-conference foe in Old Dominion at Capital One Field at Byrd Stadium (4 p.m., ESPNNews)...The Terps also boast the pass-catching tandem of **WRs Deon Long** and **Stefon Diggs** who accounted for 208 receiving yards last week...The Blue Devils of Duke and coach **David Cutcliffe** take to the road this weekend when they meet Memphis in Liberty Bowl Stadium in Memphis, Tenn. (4:30 pm, ESPN3)...The game will be the season-opener for the Tigers, while the Blue Devils are led by **WR Jamison Crowder**, who earned ACC Specialist of the Week honors last week with a 75-yard punt return for a touchdown in Duke's season-opening win over North Carolina Central...NC State concludes Saturday's games, hosting Richmond at Carter-Finley Stadium (6 pm, ESPN3)...The Wolfpack, coached by **Dave Doeren**, will be fielding their second new starting signal caller in as many weeks, as junior **QB Pete Thomas** takes over for **Brandon Mitchell**, who suffered a foot injury after an impressive first quarter in State's opener...Thomas threw for 212 yards in leading the Pack the rest of the way to a 40-14 triumph over Louisiana Tech.

ACC News & Notes

ACC Stands Alone Nationally

The ACC, which posted a 9-3 non-conference record on the first weekend of the season, is the only conference in the nation whose losses were only to teams from either the SEC or Big Ten Conferences (Penn State) with two of the three losses to teams ranked 6th nationally or better (#1 Alabama, #6 South Carolina).

ACC/ABC/ESPN Garner Big TV Ratings

The ACC was involved in the two highest-rated football games for ABC/ESPN on the opening weekend of the college football season. Clemson's dramatic 38-35 win over 5th-ranked Georgia drew a weekend-best 5.0 rating for ABC, while Virginia Tech's game with No. 1-ranked Alabama on Saturday night, drew a strong 3.1 rating.

Tigers Down Second Straight SEC Top 10

Clemson became the only non-SEC team in the nation to have beaten Top 10 teams from the SEC in back-to-back games. The Tigers downed No. 9 LSU, 25-24, in last year's Chick-fil-A Bowl and stopped No. 5 Georgia, 38-35, in their season opener this year.

ACC Gains Nine Non-Conference Wins

The nine non-conference wins by the ACC on the first weekend of the season are the second-most non-conference wins for the league on any weekend.

UVa's Harris Named National DB of Week

Virginia S Anthony Harris was named the National Defensive Player of the Week by the **Walter Camp Foundation** in leading the Cavaliers to a 19-16 win over BYU by making 11 tackles, one interception, a blocked punt, a quarterback sack and a pass deflection.

Boyd Vaults In Heisman Attention

After his 312-yard, 5 TDR performance against 5th-ranked Georgia, Clemson senior **QB Taj Boyd** ranked first in the initial **HeismanPundit.com** Heisman Straw Poll of the season. Boyd had three first-place votes and 16 points to finish ahead of Louisville's Teddy Bridgewater (10 points). Florida State freshman **QB Jameis Winston**, after just one college game, was tied for 8th with Christian Jones of Alabama and Jadeveon Clowney of South Carolina.

Sade Named Groza Kicking Star

N.C State junior **PK Niklas Sade** was named one of the three **Lou Groza Award** Kicking Stars of the Week after his career-best four field goal performance in the Wolfpack's season-opening win over Louisiana Tech. Sade outscored the Rajun Cajuns by himself, totaling 16 points.

Boyd, Winston Named National Players of Week by Athlon

Clemson QB Tajh Boyd was named National Player of the Week in leading Clemson to a 38-35 win over 5th-ranked Georgia and Florida State QB Jameis Winston was honored as the National Freshman of the Week for his play in FSU's 41-13 win over Pitt by **Athlon Publications**.

Tajh Boyd leads HeismanPundit.com Heisman Straw Poll after first week of play

Clemson quarterback Tajh Boyd used a stellar performance against Georgia over the weekend to grab the top spot in the first HeismanPundit.com Heisman Straw Poll of the season released on Tuesday. The weekly panel of Heisman voters gave Boyd three first-place votes and 16 total points, ahead of Louisville quarterback Teddy Bridgewater, who was second with 10 points and two first-place votes. Florida State freshman QB Jameis Winston was tied for 8th. Twelve players appeared on ballots, reflecting how wide-open the race is in the early going. Now in its eighth season, the HeismanPundit.com Heisman Straw Poll is the college football world's most trusted gauge of Heisman voter sentiment. It has been the most accurate Heisman poll in the country during the past seven seasons, with the final 2012 poll correctly picking the top five finishers and the final 2011 poll picking the top seven. This year's poll is made up of 9 anonymous Heisman voters from across the country. Each week during the season they will pick three players. 2013 ACC FB Game Summaries -- Aug. 29-Sep. 2

Florida State 41, Pitt 13

Redshirt freshman QB Jameis Winston completed 25-of-27 passes for 356 yards with four touchdowns and one rushing score on Monday night to lead the 11th-ranked Seminoles to a season-opening win at Pitt in the Panthers' first ever ACC game. TE Nick O'Leary was on the receiving end of three of Winston's scoring tosses. WR Rashad Greene added eight catches for 126 yards and one score for FSU (1-0, 1-0). CB Jalen Ramsey and S Terrence Brooks each picked off passes to key the Seminoles defensively. Pitt (0-1, 0-1) grabbed an early 7-0 lead when QB Tom Savage's 4-yard scoring pass to TE Manasseh Garner capped a 9-play opening drive. Pitt WR Devin Street finished with 141 yards on six catches.

Clemson 38, Georgia 35

Senior QB Tajh Boyd threw for three touchdowns -- including a 77-yard scoring strike to WR Sammy Watkins -- and ran for two more scores as the No. 8 Tigers turned back the No. 5 Bulldogs before a crowd of 83,830 at Clemson's Memorial Stadium. Watkins finished the game with six receptions for 127 receiving yards. It was the eighth 100-yard receiving game of Watkins' career. TB Roderrick McDowell rushed for 132 yards on 20 carries in his first collegiate start. DE Vic Beasley recorded two of Clemson's four quarterback sacks. Clemson's became the first non-Southeastern Conference team to score two consecutive wins over Top-10 ranked SEC opponents (Saturday's game and 2012 Chick-Fil-A Bowl victory over LSU).

Boston College 24, Villanova 14

WR Alex Amidon had 13 catches for 146 yards and a touchdown as Boston College beat Villanova in the debut of Eagles first-year head coach Steve Addazio. Senior QB Chase Rettig completed 23 of 30 passes for 285 yards and two touchdowns, and RB Andre Williams ran for 114 yards on 23 carries for the Eagles.

Georgia Tech 70, Elon 0

QB Vad Lee threw for two touchdowns and ran for one more as Georgia Tech set an ACC record for margin of victory against the visiting Phoenix in its sixth season opener under head coach Paul Johnson. The defense also got into the scoring act, as LB Tyler Marcordes returned an interception 95 yards for a touchdown, and safety Chris Milton had a 54-yard interception runback for another score.

Virginia 19, BYU 16

RB Kevin Park's 13-yard touchdown run with 2:36 remaining lifted the Cavaliers past the visiting Cougars on Saturday in a game that was delayed for over two hours due to severe weather conditions. Junior S Anthony Harris posted 11 tackles, including three solo stops, recorded one quarterback sack, blocked a punt and intercepted a pass. Harris' blocked punt in the third quarter set up Virginia's first touchdown as UVa became the first ACC team since at least 1999 to win a game while punting 13 times.

Duke 45, NC Central 0

The Blue Devils blanked the crosstown Eagles in Saturday's season opener, Duke's first shutout victory since a 41-0 win at North Carolina in the 1989 regular-season finale. WR Jamison Crowder returned a punt 76 yards for a first-quarter touchdown, while QB Brandon Connette passed 3 yards to TE Braxton Deaver for one score, 19 yards to WR Issac Blakeney for another, and scored one TD himself on a 1-yard keeper. Duke QB Anthony Boone made his second college start completing 16 of 20 passes for 176 yards.

Miami 34, Florida Atlantic 6

Sophomore Duke Johnson rushed for a career-high 186 yards and a touchdown and Miami's defense limited FAU to just 250 total yards to lead the Hurricanes' to a season-opening win on Friday night. QB Stephen Morris passed for 160 yards and a rushing touchdown for Miami on a night in which it honored members of the 1983 National Championship squad.

Maryland 43, Florida International 10

QB C.J. Brown, who missed all of last season with a knee injury, returned in grand style with 5 TDR as the Terrapins won big in their season opener. Brown completed 20-of-23 passes for 281 yards and ran for 105 yards on 11 carries before being removed in the third quarter. His touchdown runs were 29 and 11 yards, and he threw for scores of 25, 17 and 66 yards. WR's Deon Long and Stefan Diggs combined for 14 catches for 208 yards and 2 scores.

NC State 40, Louisiana Tech 14

The Wolfpack got off to a winning start under first-year head coach Dave Doeren, as freshman RB Matt Dayes rushed for 84 yards and three touchdowns. The Wolfpack lost starting QB Brandon Mitchell, who left the game with a broken foot after directing two first-quarter scoring drives. Pete Thomas replaced Mitchell and completed 15 of 27 passes for 212 yards and PK Niklas Sade booted a career-best four field goals.

Wake Forest 31, Presbyterian 7

The Demon Deacons limited the visiting Blue Hose to just two first downs in Thursday night's season-opening win. The Wake Forest defense also forced six Presbyterian turnovers on the night. LB Brandon Chubb, LB Mike Olson and CB Kevin Johnson all intercepted a pass, and Chubb ran his back 29 yards for a touchdown. Wake Forest QB Tanner Price threw for one score and ran for another.

South Carolina 27, North Carolina 10

QB Connor Shaw connected with WR Shaq Roland with a 65-yard touchdown pass on the third play of the game, and RB Mike Davis broke a 75-yard run for a third-quarter score to key the sixth-ranked Gamecocks in the Thursday night ESPN contest, which was delayed one hour and 44 minutes by a thunderstorm midway through the fourth quarter. QB Bryn Renner passed 6 yards to WR Quinshad Davis for UNC's touchdown late in the first half, and PK Thomas Moore added a 20-yard field goal in the third quarter.

Penn State 23, Syracuse 17

The Orange saw its comeback bid come up short in Scott Schafer's first game as head coach and Syracuse's first as an ACC member. QB Christian Hackenberg threw two touchdown passes in his first college game to lead Penn State. RB Jerome Smith rushed for 72 yards and a pair of touchdowns for the Orange and Syracuse' defense, led by LB Cameron Lynch and CB Robert Welsh, limited the Nittany Lions to just 57 yards rushing.

Alabama 35, Virginia Tech 10

Virginia Tech RB Trey Edmunds rushed for 132 yards on 20 carries in his collegiate debut, but two returns for touchdowns on special teams by Christian Jones and an interception return for a touchdown propelled No.-1 ranked Alabama past the Hokies 35-10 on Saturday night in the Chick-fil-A Kickoff Game at the Georgia Dome. The Hokies came out on the losing end despite limiting the Crimson Tide to 206 yards total offense.

.889 - The winning percentage for Clemson at home against ACC competition under its current head coach, **Dabo Swinney**. In his time as head of the Tigers, Clemson is 16-2 against ACC foes in Clemson's Memorial Stadium.

.964 - Clemson **PK Chris Catanzaro** has made 27 of his last 28 field goal attempts, a .964 percentage. He had a school-record string of 20 field goal attempts without a miss in 2012.

1st - **Clemson** became the first non-SEC team in history to defeat Top 10 SEC teams in back-to-back games with its 38-35 win over 5th-ranked Georgia. The Tigers downed 9th-ranked LSU in the Chick-fil-A Bowl, their final game of the 2012 season prior to Saturday's win.

3 - The number of **ACC quarterbacks** who rang up five TDR on the first weekend of the 2013 football season. Florida State redshirt freshman **QB Jameis Winston** had four TD passes and one run in the 'Noles 41-13 win over Pitt. Clemson senior **QB Tajh Boyd** had 3 TDs passing and 2 rushing in the Tigers' 38-35 win over 5th-ranked Georgia and Maryland senior **QB C.J. Brown** had 3 TDs passing and 2 rushing in the Terrapins' 43-10 win over FIU.

Also 3 - The number of TD receptions for Florida State junior **TE Nick O'Leary** in the Seminoles' 41-13 win over Pitt. O'Leary tied his entire 2012 season's total in the 'Noles first game of 2013.

4 - The number of field goals made by NC State **PK Niklas Sade** in a career-best performance against Louisiana Tech. The Wolfpack junior outscored the entire Louisiana Tech team, 16-14. Sade made consecutive three-pointers from 38, 22, 45 and 24 yards in the Pack's season-opening victory. Sade was named one of three Lou Groza Award Kicking Stars of the Week for his play.

5 - The number of tacklers in double figures for **Virginia's defense** in the Cavaliers' 19-16 win over BYU. CB Maurice Canady had a game-high 13 tackles followed by S Daquan Romero with 12 and S Anthony Harris, LB Henry Coley and DE Eli Harold with 11 hits each.

5.0 - The overnight rating on ABC for 8th-ranked **Clemson's** dramatic, 38-35 win over 5th-ranked Georgia. The rating was the highest of the weekend for ABC/ESPN in college football.

6 - The number of ACC teams that are ranked among the Top 22 teams in the country in total defense after just one game of the season. Wake Forest leads the nation in total defense this week after allowing just 151 yards in its season opener. The Deacons are followed

by Maryland (3), Duke (5), Virginia Tech (8), Miami (20) and Georgia Tech (22).

7.17 - The career per-carry average for Miami sophomore **RB Duke Johnson**. In only 13 games, Johnson has totalled 1,133 yards on only 158 carries, a 7.17 average and the 5th-best mark by an ACC player who has rushed for 1,000 or more yards in his career.

8 - The number of non-conference games which **ACC teams** will play against teams ranked in the pre-season Top 10 of the Associated Press, the most of any conference nationally. ACC teams will face No. 1 Alabama (Virginia Tech), No. 3 Oregon (Virginia), No. 5 Georgia (Clemson, Georgia Tech), No. 6 South Carolina (North Carolina, Clemson) and No. 10 Florida (Miami, Florida State). ACC schools will play six games against Top Six teams and a total of 11 games against teams ranked in the AP preseason Top 25.

9-3 - The record against non-conference foes for the **ACC** in the first weekend of the 2013 football season. The nine wins are the second-most for a weekend in league history and two of the ACC's three losses were to Top 10 teams and all three defeats came against teams from either the SEC or Big Ten.

11 - The number of tackles for Virginia **S Anthony Harris** in the Cavaliers' 19-16 win over BYU. Harris, who also had a blocked punt, a pass interception, a pass deflection and a quarterback sack, was named the National Defensive Player of the Week by the Walter Camp Foundation for his play against the Cougars.

13 - The number of pass receptions for Boston College senior **WR Alex Amidon** in the Eagles' 24-14 win over Villanova. The reception total gives Amidon 91 catches in his last 13 games, an average of 7 grabs a contest. Amidon also recorded the 8th 100-yard game of his career with 146 reception yards.

31 - In his first three seasons as Florida State's head coach, **Jimbo Fisher** has guided the Seminoles to 31 victories and a 31-10 overall record. Only Fisher's predecessor at FSU, Bobby Bowden (33) won more games in his first three seasons in the league, though Virginia Tech's Frank Beamer and Maryland's Ralph Friedgen also won 31 games each in their first three ACC seasons.

53 - The distance of Virginia **PK Ian Frye's** career-long field goal against BYU. Frye's FG is the longest to date in the nation and ties for the 4th longest field goal in the ACC since 2009.

67 - When **Virginia Tech** held top-ranked Alabama to just 208 yards of total offense last Saturday, the Hokies held the nation's defending champions to their 2nd lowest offensive output in the Nick Saban era and

their lowest offensive total in 67 games or since Tulane held the Crimson Tide to just 162 yards in a loss early in the 2008 season.

70 - **Georgia Tech** set an ACC record for margin of victory with its 70-0 win over Elon in its season-opener. Florida State held the previous mark with a 69-0 win over Western Carolina in 2008.

77 - The length of a catch-and-run reception for a touchdown for Clemson's **Sammy Watkins** against 5th-ranked Georgia. The pass play was the longest of Watkins' career.

82.25 - Boston College senior **PK Nate Freese** leads all ACC kickers in career accuracy. Freese, who has made 51 of 62 career three-point attempts, has made 82.25 percent of his field goal attempts and ranks 6th nationally among all active kickers in the NCAA's FBS.

94 - Just beginning his 3rd season as a starter, Clemson **QB Tajh Boyd** has passed and run for 94 touchdowns, the 2nd-best career mark in ACC history, trailing only Philip Rivers of NC State (112, 2000-03). With 5 TDR against 5th-ranked Georgia, Boyd passed former Wolfpack standout Russell Wilson for second-place on the ACC Career TDR list.

141 - Pitt senior **WR Devin Street** made his first ACC game one to remember as the Bethlehem, Pa., senior had 6 receptions for 141 yards (23.5 avg.) against 12th-ranked Florida State. Street was one of six ACC receivers to top the 100-yard mark, including Boston College's Alex Amidon (146), Wake Forest's Jonathan Williams (143), Clemson's Sammy Watkins (127), Florida State's Rashad Greene (126) and Maryland's Deon Long (110).

152.15 - The career pass efficiency rating for North Carolina junior **QB Bryn Renner**. Renner has completed 542 of 817 passes (.663) for 55 TDs and only 20 interceptions. His pass efficiency rating would be an ACC record if maintained through the 2013 season. The current record is 151.15, set by Florida State's Chris Weinke.

252.2 - The pass efficiency rating for Florida State redshirt freshman **QB Jameis Winston** in his collegiate debut against Pitt. Winston's rating is the best by any quarterback, with a minimum of 25 completions, in a game since at least 2000. Winston's 356 passing yards were topped only NC State's Philip Rivers (397) as a freshman starting the first game of his collegiate career.

258 - Virginia Tech head coach **Frank Beamer** has a total of 258 coaching victories in his career and leads all active NCAA FBS head coaches. With the Hokies' win over Rutgers in the 2012 Russell Athletic Bowl, Beamer passed former BYU head coach LaVell Edwards for 6th place on the NCAA FBS all-time wins list. The late Joe Paterno (298) is next on the list.

Tajh Boyd leads four Clemson honorees following Tigers' win over No. 5 Georgia

GREENSBORO, N.C. – Clemson senior quarterback Tajh Boyd, who accounted for five touchdowns in leading the eighth-ranked Tigers to a 38-35 win over fifth-ranked Georgia in Saturday night's nationally-televvised college football season opener, has been named the Atlantic Coast Conference Offensive Back of the Week. Boyd headlines a list of nine honorees announced by the conference on Tuesday. Others recognized include Virginia strong safety Anthony Harris as the ACC Defensive Back of the Week. Harris was also named the Walter Camp Foundation National Defensive Player of the Week for his role in Cavaliers' win over BYU. Florida State freshman quarterback Jameis Winston, who threw for 356 yards and four touchdowns in Monday night's ACC win over Pitt, was named the ACC Rookie of the Week. Boyd, who passed for three touchdowns and ran for two scores in the Georgia game, is one of four Clemson players receiving ACC weekly honors. Wideout Sammy Watkins, whose six receptions against the Bulldogs included a 77-yard touchdown, earned ACC Receiver of the Week honors. Center Ryan Norton, who led an offensive line effort that produced 467 yards and 38 points, was named Co-Offensive Lineman of the Week. Spencer Shuey, who led the Tigers with 12 tackles and a key fumble recovery, is the ACC Linebacker of the Week. Other honorees include Syracuse's Robert Welsh (a key quarterback sack and interception vs. Penn State) as ACC Defensive Lineman of the Week. Miami right guard Brandon Linder, who graded out at 94 percent in the Hurricanes' 34-6 win over Florida Atlantic, shares Offensive Lineman of the Week honors with Clemson's Norton. Duke wide receiver Jamison Crowder (113 yards and a touchdown on five punt returns vs. North Carolina Central) earned the nod as specialist of the week.

OFFENSIVE BACK – Tajh Boyd, Sr., QB, 6-1, 225 Hampton, Va.

Boyd completed 18 of 30 passes for 270 yards and three touchdowns with no interceptions in Clemson's 38-35 win over fifth-ranked Georgia. He also had 13 rushes for 42 yards and two scores, giving him 312 yards of total offense. He finished the game with five total touchdowns rushing and passing. It was the seventh win for Boyd against a top 25 team as the starting quarterback, tying the school record.

CO-OFFENSIVE LINEMAN – Ryan Norton, Clemson, So., C, 6-3, 270, Simpsonville, S.C.

Norton, the only first-year starter in Clemson's veteran offensive line, played all but one snap (78 total) at center in his first career start and was Clemson's highest graded offensive lineman at 91 percent with four knockdown blocks. He was a big reason Clemson gained 467 yards and scored 38 points on offense and controlled the clock for 9:08 of the fourth quarter.

CO-OFFENSIVE LINEMAN – Brandon Linder, Miami, Sr., RG, 6-6, 317, Southwest Ranches, Fla.

Linder, a preseason All-ACC selection, anchored Miami's offensive line that paved the way for 303 yards rushing – 8.0 yards per carry – and three rushing TDs in the Hurricanes' 34-6 win over Florida Atlantic. Linder led an offensive line that produced 503 yards of total offense, the Hurricanes' third consecutive game with 500-plus yards of total offense dating back to the 2012 season. Linder graded out at 94 percent with five cut blocks, three pancakes and no sacks allowed.

RECEIVER – Sammy Watkins, Clemson, Jr., WR, 6-1, 205, Fort Myers, Fla.

Watkins had six receptions for 127 yards and a touchdown in Clemson's win over fifth-ranked Georgia. That performance included a 77-yard touchdown reception from Tajh Boyd in the first quarter that gave Clemson a 14-7 lead. It was the longest reception of Watkins' career. The play took place on Clemson's first play after Georgia had scored on a 75-yard run by Todd Gurley and provided an important momentum swing. Watkins finished the game with 154 all-purpose yards.

DEFENSIVE LINEMAN – Robert Welsh, Syracuse, Jr., DE, 6-3, 259 Bay Shore, N.Y.

Against Penn State, Welsh recorded six tackles, including four solo and a sack for a loss of four yards, and added an interception in his first career start. Welsh returned the interception 31 yards to the Penn State 1-yard line, setting up Syracuse's touchdown that brought the Orange to within six, 23-17, with just less than seven minutes to play. His first tackle during the Nittany Lions' first offensive series was on a 3rd-and-1 play on which he stopped the ball-carrier for no gain.

LINEBACKER – Spencer Shuey, Clemson, Sr., LB, 6-3, 230, Charlotte, N.C.

Shuey's 12 tackles were a team-high and five more than any other defender as he led the Clemson defense in the win over Georgia. He also had a key fumble recovery that led to a Clemson touchdown. Shuey's tackles were important during a 10-possession stretch from the second quarter to the fourth period, when the Bulldogs scored just one touchdown and had six possessions of four plays or less.

DEFENSIVE BACK – Anthony Harris, Virginia, Jr., SS, 6-1, 185, Chesterfield, Va.

Harris was named the Walter Camp Football Foundation Defensive Player of the Week after recording 11 tackles, including three solo stops, one quarterback sack (first in his career), a blocked punt and an intercepted pass in Virginia's season-opening 19-16 victory over visiting BYU. Harris' blocked punt in the third quarter set up Virginia's first touchdown. Then, with the Cavaliers trailing 16-12 and three minutes left to play, Harris picked off a third-down BYU pass, returned it 10 yards and then pitched the ball to linebacker Henry Coley, who ran another 23 yards. Virginia scored the winning touchdown on the next play.

SPECIALIST – Jamison Crowder, Duke, Jr., WR, 5-9, 175, Monroe, N.C.

Crowder sparked the Blue Devils in Saturday's 45-0 win over North Carolina Central with 113 yards on five punt returns, including a 76-yarder for a touchdown. The 76-yard runback was the seventh-longest punt return in Duke history. Crowder also logged a 25-yard punt return to set up Duke's first scoring drive. The 113 punt return yards marked the fourth-highest total in Duke school history and the highest Week 1 total in 2013 NCAA action. Crowder's 22.6 yards per punt return average was the sixth-highest single-game mark in school history. Crowder also registered team-highs of six pass receptions and 62 receiving yards for 175 all-purpose yards on the day.

ROOKIE – Jameis Winston, Florida State, Fr., QB, 6-4, 225, Hueytown, Ala.

Winston delivered a school-record setting performance as the 11th-ranked Seminoles opened their season with a 41-13 ACC road win at Pitt on Monday night. Winston completed 25 of 27 passes for a 92.6 completion percentage, topping the previous Florida State single-game record of 87.5 posted by Danny Kannell against NC State in 1995. Winston finished the game with 356 passing yards while throwing for four touchdowns and running for one more.

ACC ATLANTIC DIVISION TEAM NOTES ACC



With a career-high 13 receptions in Saturday's 24-14 win over Villanova, **WR Alex Amidon** moved into 10th all-time in BC career receptions with 127 ... With 146 reception yards, Amidon also moved into 11th all-time on BC's career chart in that category with 1,919 yards ... **RB Andre Williams** rushed for over 100 yards in a game (114) for the sixth time in his career ... Williams rushed for over 100 yards twice last season, including a career-high 191-yard performance at Army on Oct. 6 ... He moved into 22nd place in school history for career rushing yards with 1,691 ... Senior **LB Kevin Pierre-Louis** recorded his 11th career double-digit tackle game (12) ... Pierre-Louis had four games with double digit tackles last season ... Sophomore **DB Bryce Jones** recorded his first career interception in the second quarter vs. the Wildcats ... Junior **DBs Manuel Asprilla** and **Sean Sylvia** each recorded their third career interceptions in the fourth quarter.



With last Saturday night's 38-35 win over fifth-ranked Georgia, Clemson is the first non-SEC team in NCAA history to defeat two top-10 SEC opponents in back-to-back games (LSU in the Chick-Fil-A Bowl last Dec. 31 and this season's opener vs. the Bulldogs) ... Georgia is the third-highest ranked team that Clemson has defeated in its history ... Clemson has now won back-to-back openers against ranked opponents and four of the last five season openers against ranked foes ... **QB Tajh Boyd** passed for three touchdowns and rushed for two touchdowns to give him 94 touchdowns accounted for in his career, moving him into second place on the ACC's career list past NC State's Russell Wilson ... **RB Roderick McDowell** had 22 carries for a career-high 132 rushing yards vs. Georgia in his first career start ... **WR Sammy Watkins'** 77-yard touchdown reception from Boyd in the first quarter was the longest reception of Watkins's career and the longest pass of Boyd's career.



With his 25-of-27 passing performance vs. Pitt in Monday night's 41-13 ACC season-opening win, redshirt freshman **QB Jameis Winston's** 92.6-percent completion percentage set a school record, breaking the 87.5-percent mark that Danny Kanell posted against NC State in 1995 ... FSU actually finished with a team completion percentage of 93.1 percent in the game (27-of-29), as backup **QB Jacob Coker** completed both of his passing attempts ... Winston finished with 356 yards through the air while passing for four touchdowns and running for another score ... **TE Nick O'Leary's** three touchdown catches vs. the Panthers matched his season total for all of last season ... O'Leary became the first Seminoles tight end to haul in more than one score in a single game since Marvin Pearsall in 1994 ... After allowing an 80-yard scoring drive in the first series against the Panthers, Florida State's defense allowed just 217 yards the remainder of the night ... In seven of its last eight ACC contests away from home, Florida State's defense has held opponents to 20 or fewer points.



After missing the 2012 season with an ACL injury, **QB C.J. Brown** completed 20-of-23 passes for 281 yards and three touchdowns and rushed 105 yards and two scores in last Saturday's 43-10 win over FIU ... The five TDR for were the most by a Maryland player since Scott McBrien accounted for six against North Carolina on Nov. 1, 2003 ... Brown led the team in passing and rushing ... After a record-setting freshman season, sophomore **WR Stefon Diggs** picked up where he left off in the 2013 season opener with five catches for 98 yards, including a career long-tying 66-yard touchdown reception ... **LB L.A. Gore** led Maryland in tackles vs. FIU with 10, marking the sfourth straight game dating back to last season that he led or tied for the team high in tackles ... Maryland scored on its first four possessions of the game in Saturday's opener ... The last time the Terps accomplished the feat came at home against Wake Forest on Oct. 30, 2010.



Freshman **RB Matt Dayes** found the end zone three times in last Saturday's 40-14 win over visiting Louisiana Tech, the second-most touchdowns in a single game for an NC State freshman running back (T.A. McLendon had 5 at Texas Tech in 2002) ... Dayes became only the 10th player in school history to rush for three or more TDs in a game ... NC State's 542 total yards of offense were the most in a season opener for the Wolfpack since it had 592 against Western Carolina in 1990 ... First-year head coach **Dave Doeren** saw his offense score 40 points, the most points in the debut game of a Wolfpack coach since Monte Kiffin's 1980 squad downed William & Mary 42-0 ... Junior **PK Niklas Sade** was a perfect 4-of-4 on field goals, hitting from 38, 22, 45, and 24 yards. Sade set a new career-high, as his previous was three against Clemson in 2011 and Wake Forest in 2012 ... The four field goals made ties for the second-most in school history.



WR Jarrod West has caught a pass in 15 consecutive games ... West had three receptions in last Saturday's season opener vs. Penn State ... The last game in which West did not catch a pass was the 2011 season finale at Pitt ... Senior **K Ross Krautman** moved into a tie with Nate Trout (1996-99) for third on Syracuse's career list for the most made field goals ... Krautman's 32-yarder against Penn State gave the Orange a 3-0 lead in the second quarter and was the 49th field goal of his career ... Senior **LB Marquis Spruill** now has 27.5 tackles for loss, which is ninth on the Orange's career list ... Spruill passed former Orange defensive end and current New England Patriot Chandler Jones ... The Orange allowed the Nitany Lions to convert just one third down in 16 attempts (6.3 percent) during Saturday's game ... **LB Cameron Lynch's** 10 tackles against Penn State (seven solo) were a career high...Senior **QB Drew Allen** made the first start of his career, completing 16 of 37 passes for 189 yards.



With 74 wins in 12-plus seasons as head coach at Wake Forest, **Jim Grobe** is three victories shy of tying "Peahead" Walker for the school record of 77 career victories ... Entering the 2013 season, Grobe had never played more than three true freshmen in a season and a total of just 22 true freshmen in his first 12 seasons ... Ten true freshmen saw action in last Thursday night's 31-7 season-opening win over visiting Presbyterian ... Redshirt-freshman **WR Jonathan Williams** had five receptions for 143 yards vs. Presbyterian ... That is the most receiving yards for a Demon Deacon in his first career game ... **ILB Brandon Chubb** tied his career-high with seven total tackles and also returned an interception 29 yards for a touchdown in the opener ... **CB Kevin Johnson** recorded his fourth-career interception and a pair of pass breakups against Presbyterian .

The Blue Devils' 45-0 win over N.C. Central last Saturday marked the program's first shutout since a 41-0 win over rival North Carolina in the 1980 regular-season finale and Duke's first at Wallace Wade Stadium since a 3-0 win over Wake Forest on Nov. 11, 1978 ... The 184 yards allowed by the Duke defense vs. N.C. Central were the fifth-fewest yards allowed during **David Cutcliffe's** tenure as a head coach (beginning with the 2008 season) ... Duke held N.C. Central to just nine first downs, tying the second-fewest first downs allowed total during the Cutcliffe era in Durham ... **WR Jamison Crowder's** 76-yard punt return for a touchdown marked the seventh-longest punt return in Duke history and the program's 39th punt return for a TD ... Crowder's 113 total punt return yards were the fourth-most in a single game in school history ... **QB Brandon Connette** accounted for a career-high three touchdowns Saturday



With last Saturday's 70-0 win over visiting Elon, Georgia Tech is 84-33-3 all-time record in season openers, including a 66-13-3 mark when opening the season with a home game ... the 70-point win set an ACC record for margin of victory ... The Tech record for margin of victory, though, is a bit more (222-0 vs. Cumberland)...Georgia Tech's 173 interception return yards smashed the school record of 139 yards set vs. Tulane back on Oct. 22, 1966, breaking a school single-game record that had stood 47 years ... Tech tied a school record with two interceptions returned for a touchdown in one game (a 95-yard return by **LB Tyler Marcordes** and a 54-yarder by **S Chris Milton**) ... It was only the third time in modern history that the Yellow Jackets have had two interception returns for TDs in a game (also vs. Samford in 2006 and vs. Tulane in 1966) ... The Yellow Jackets also posted their first shutout since blanking Duke 28-0 at home on Oct. 4, 2008.



With last Friday night's 34-6 series-opening win over Florida Atlantic tonight, Miami has now beaten every FBS team in Florida in its first attempt ... Miami has scored at least 16 points in five straight first halves ... **RB Duke Johnson** recorded career highs with 186 rushing yards and 19 carries, surpassing his previous highs of 176 yards vs. Duke and 16 carries vs. Duke and Virginia ... Johnson was one yard shy of cracking Miami's top 10 individual rushing performances list, as James Jackson and Willis McGahee share the No. 10 spot with 187 yards ... The Hurricanes' 303 rushing yards vs. FAU were the most for a UM team since Nov. 3, 2007 vs. NC State, when they racked up 314 yards but lost 19-16 in OT ... Last year's team high was 248 rushing yards vs. Duke. The 303 yards are the most Miami has rushed for since moving to Sun Life Stadium ... Miami allowed its fewest points (6) since 2011 vs. USF, when the Bulls only had a field goal (3 points).



Senior **QB Bryn Renner** has not thrown an interception in his last 135 attempts, dating to last season, the 15th lonest streak in ACC history ... Renner needs three touchdown passes to tie T.J. Yates (2007-10) for second on the all-time UNC career chart with 58 ... Darian Durant (2001-04) is the UNC career leader with 68 ... UNC has posted five consecutive winning seasons, the most since the 1990s, when the Tar Heels had nine straight winning seasons from 1990 through 1998 ... With four receptions for 39 yards (including a 6-yard catch for a touchdown in last Thursday night's season opener at South Carolina, sophomore **WR Quinshad Davis** now has 65 catches for 815 yards in 13 career collegiate games ... UNC has made 177 consecutive extra points, including a school record 126 by Casey Barth and 51 by current kicker **Thomas Moore** ... The last miss came in the second quarter of the season opener vs. The Citadel in 2009 (Barth).



WR Devin Street set a career high with 141 receiving yards in Monday night's ACC debut game against 11th-ranked Florida State, breaking his previous mark of 140 yards set against Temple on Oct. 27, 2012 ... With his 4-yard TD pass in the opening quarter, **QB Tom Savage** became the first player to throw a touchdown pass for and against Pitt in his collegiate career ... Before transferring from Rutgers, Savage passed for a touchdown against the Panthers on Oct. 23, 2010 ... Pitt freshman PK **Chris Blewitt** had a perfect debut in Monday night's game, converting both of his field goal attempts from 28 and 39 yards and making his only PAT ... A sellout crowd of 65,000 at Heinz Field watched the Panthers in their first game as an ACC member ... It was the first sellout for a Pitt game at Heinz Field since Sept. 24, 2011, against Notre Dame ... Senior **P Matt Yoklic** averaged a career-high 54.3 yards on three punts vs. the Seminoles.



With Saturday's 19-16 victory over BYU, Virginia has won 17 of its last 20 openers in Scott Stadium ... **S Anthony Harris** was named the Walter Camp Foundation National Defensive Player of the Week ... Harris posted 11 tackles against BYU, including three solo stops, recorded one quarterback sack, blocked a punt and intercepted a pass ... Harris' blocked punt set up Virginia's first touchdown ... Redshirt sophomore **QB David Watford** made his first career start on Saturday and established career bests in completions (18) and attempts (32) ... **WR Dominique Terrell** has caught a pass in 15 consecutive games, currently the longest active streak on the team ... Virginia Tech's Frank Beamer Is NCAA FBS Active Career Leader in Wins

Virginia Tech's Frank Beamer is now the leading active head coach in the NCAA's FBS in career victories with a total of 258 triumphs in his 32-year coaching career. With a win over Rutgers in last year's Russell Athletics Bowl, Beamer passed former BYU head coach LaVell Edwards for 6th place on the all-time NCAA FBS coaching victory list. Penn State's Joe Paterno, who's NCAA adjusted total of 298, is next on the list in 5th place. Georgia Tech head coach Paul Johnson ranks 13th on the active FBS list with 148 career wins. Former Florida State head coach Bobby Bowden, who retired after the 2009 season, is now the NCAA FBS all-time leader with 377 victories.

Johnson, Beamer, London Among Top 20 Active Coaches in Wins Per Season

The ACC has four coaches who rank among the Top 25 active football coaches in the NCAA in wins per season with five or more seasons as a head coach. Georgia Tech's **Paul Johnson** leads the way among ACC coaches, currently averaging 9.19 wins per full season. Johnson's record puts him in 8th place nationally among active head coaches with five or more years of experience. Virginia Tech's **Frank Beamer** (17th, 8.06), Virginia's **Mike London** (tied for 18th, 8.00) and Clemson's **Dabo Swinney** (tied for 18th, 8.00) joins Johnson among the Top 25 coaches in the nation in the NCAA's FBS. Florida State's **Jimbo Fisher** is off to an impressive start in his career as well, averaging 10.33 wins a year in his first three seasons at the helm at Florida State. NC State's new head coach **Dave Doeren** is also off to a strong start, averaging 11.5 wins a year in his first two seasons at Northern Illinois.

After Just Three Seasons Florida State's Jimbo Fisher Joining Select Company



Having completed only three seasons as head coach at Florida State, head coach **Jimbo Fisher** has already joined some select company among ACC football coaches. Fisher has compiled a 31-10 record (.756). His winning percentage has him in 5th place among all ACC head coaches after three seasons, ahead of such prominent figures as NC State's Lou Holtz, Clemson's Danny Ford, Maryland's Ralph Friedgen and Georgia Tech's Bobby Ross. The best mark recorded by an ACC head coach in his first three years in the league was by Fisher's predecessor at FSU, Bobby Bowden, who posted a 33-3-1 record. Maryland's Jim Tatum was 27-4-1 (.859) in his first three years with Virginia Tech's Frank Beamer third at 31-8-0 (.795).

Clemson's Memorial Stadium Is Home Sweet Home for Tiger's Dabo Swinney



Clemson head coach Dabo Swinney has enjoyed coaching in the cozy and imposing confines of the Tigers' home field, also known as Death Valley. In his first four seasons as head coach of the Tigers, Swinney's teams have won 16 of the first 18 home ACC games, a winning percentage of .889. That stacks up pretty well with some of the great names in ACC coaching. Swinney's winning percentage has him 2nd among ACC head coaches. Another former Tiger coach, Ken Hatfield, has the highest percentage, posting a 12-1-1 mark in four seasons (.893). Legendary Florida State coach Bobby Bowden won more ACC home games than any other coach, with 62 triumphs in his 18 years in the league. His winning percentage of .861, is third-best. Bowden's successor at Florida State, Jimbo Fisher is on a pretty good pace himself, having won 10 of his first 12 ACC home games. Four Clemson coaches rank in the Top 10 including Hatfield (1st), Swinney (2nd), Danny Ford (8th) and the legendary Frank Howard (tied for 9th).

North Carolina Sets Offensive Records In First Year Under Larry Fedora

North Carolina Head Coach **Larry Fedora's** fast-paced offense had his team scoring at a school-record pace in his first year in Chapel Hill. Ranked 8th nationally in scoring offense, averaging 40.6 points a game while also ranked 14th nationally in total offense, the Tar Heels:



- Scored a school-record 66 points against Idaho on Sept. 29.

- Topped the 60-point mark on two occasions for the first time in school history

- Scored 48 points against Virginia Tech on Oct. 6, the most points for UNC against the Hokies in the 35 meetings between the two teams in football.

- Set school records for most points, highest scoring average and highest average of total offense (485.6).

- UNC's 487 total points were the 7th-highest single-season total in ACC history.

- The Tar Heels' scoring average of 40.6 points per game was the 6th-best scoring average in ACC history.

- The Tar Heels' 62 offensive touchdowns were tied for the 7th-highest total in ACC history

NC State's New Head Coach Dave Doeren Among Nation's Winningest Coaches in 2011-12

New NC State Head Coach, **Dave Doeren**, who led the Wolfpack to a 40-14 win in his first game as State's head coach, has not wasted time in winning games in his first two years as a head coach at the FBS level. In fact, only one other coach in the Football Bowl Subdivision--Alabama's Nick Saban--has won more games than has Doeren in the past two seasons.



He guided Northern Illinois to a 23-4 mark in 2011 and 2012, including the school's first berth in the BCS bowl game, a slot in the 2013 Discover Orange Bowl this past January. Only Saban, among current FBS coaches, whose Crimson Tide teams have captured back-to-back national championships, posted more wins in the past two years than Doeren's teams at Northern Illinois. In all, three current ACC Coaches rank among the Top 11 coaches nationally in wins among current college coaches the past two years. Both Florida State's Jimbo Fisher and Clemson's Dabo Swinney have 21 wins in 2011 and 2012, tying Kansas State's Bill Snyder for the 8th.

Duke Experiencing Success Under ACC Coach of the Year David Cutcliffe

Though he's only just starting his sixth season as the head coach at Duke, David Cutcliffe, the ACC's 2012 Coach of the Year, has led the Blue Devils to 22 victories since coming to Durham in 2008.



That may not sound like a great record, except when you consider that it is more wins than the Blue Devils totalled in the 12 seasons before Cutcliffe came to Durham. Cutcliffe led the Blue Devils to a 6-7 mark in 2012, their first appearance in a bowl game since 1994 and came within a few yards of claiming the Blue Devils' first winning season in 18 years and their first bowl triumph since 1961.

- In one game more than five years, Cutcliffe has been in Durham, he has already mentored a pair of quarterbacks who finished their careers ranked in the ACC's top seven of career passing yardage. **Thaddeus Lewis** (2006-09) threw for 10,065 yards, the second-highest total in league history and **Sean Renfree** (2009-12), threw for 9,465 career yards, the 7th-best total by an ACC player.

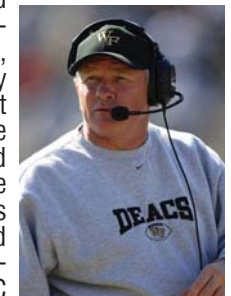
- Also, under his guidance, Duke **WR Conner Vernon** became the all-time leading pass receiver in ACC history setting conference career marks for pass receptions (283) and pass reception yardage (3,749).

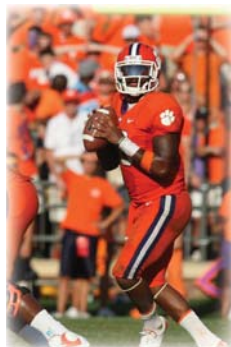

Clemson's Tajh Boyd: One of the Most Productive Players in ACC History

Despite having been a starter at quarterback for only two seasons, Clemson's **Tajh Boyd** is one of the most productive quarterbacks in ACC history and is within striking distance of most of the major career offensive records in the Conference, including TD passes, touchdown responsibility, total offense and passing yardage. With 5 TDR against 5th-ranked Georgia, Boyd moved into 2nd place on the career TDR list, passing NC State's Russell Wilson. He is tied for 3rd with Wilson in career TD passes and moved up 5 spaces to 15th in career total offense.

North Carolina QB **Bryn Renner** is one of the most accurate and most efficient quarterbacks in the NCAA's FBS. Renner is 2nd to Old Dominion's Taylor Heinicke among all returning QB's nationally in career completion percentage, having completed 542 of 817 passes or .663 percent in his career. That mark is just behind the ACC career record of .670 set by former Virginia standout Matt Schaub. ACC's Leading Returning Rusher Didn't Play in the ACC Last Year

The ACC's leading returning rusher for 2012 is still waiting for his first snap of an ACC football game. Syracuse junior **TB Jerome Smith**, who ran for 1,171 yards and an impressive 5.2 yards-per-carry average last fall for the Orange, ran for more yards in 2012 than any other ACC returnee. Next closest to Smith was Miami's Duke Johnson, who totaled 947 yards and a 6.8 per-carry average as a true freshman for the Miami Hurricanes. Smith combined with his teammate, sophomore Prince-Tyson Guley, who also ran for 830 yards, to accumulate 2,001 yards on 385 carries, a 5.2 average as 12 TDs. Had the Orange's potent duo been playing in the ACC, they would have been the 15th rushing tandem to top 2,000 yards in league history.

Clemson's Watkins Records 8th 100-Yard Receiving Game

Clemson junior **WR Sammy Watkins (Ft. Myers, Fla.)** recorded the 8 100-yard receiving game of his 24-game career last Saturday against 5th-ranked Georgia. Watkins had 6 catches for 127 yards and a 77-yard spectacular catch and run play for a TD. The play was the longest TD catch of his career. The productive day against the Bulldogs brings his career totals to 145 catches for 2,053 yards and 16 touchdowns. Watkins is the ACC active career leader in reception yardage and TDs and his per-game average of 85.5 yards per contest is one of the best in ACC history.

UM's Johnson Averaging 7.17 Yards A Carry

After rushing for a career-high 186 yards on only 19 carries against Florida Atlantic and averaging a sparkling 9.8 yard-per-carry Miami sophomore **RB Duke Johnson** moved into the ACC's career Top 10 List for best career per-carry average with a minimum of 1,000 career yards earned. Johnson's big day now gives him 1,033 career yards on just 158 career carries, a 7.17 per-play average. That norm is currently the 5th-best career average by an ACC player. Georgia Tech's Orwin Smith, who completed his career last fall, holds the record, averaging 9.28 with 1,839 career yards. In Johnson's last two games against Duke (176) last year and FAU, he has averaged 181.0 yards per contest.

Florida State's Winston Comes Up Big In Debut

Florida State redshirt freshman quarterback **Jameis Winston (Hueytown, Ala.)** enjoyed one of the best debuts by a first-time starter in Atlantic Coast Conference history. According to the research site of *USR College Football*, Winston's pass efficiency rating for the game of 252.24 is the best single game mark by any quarterback with 25 or more completions for a single game in this century. He completed 25 of 27 passes, a .926 completion percentage, which set a Florida State single-game record and he accounted for five touchdowns, four passing and one running. His passing yardage as a first-time starting freshman in a season opener was only exceeded by NC State's Philip Rivers of NC State against Arkansas State in 2000 (397).

ACC Football Kickoff Media Selects Clemson as 2013 Favorite

GREENSBORO, N.C. -- Clemson, seeking its 15th Atlantic Coast Conference football title and its second in three years, is the preseason choice to win the Atlantic Division and defeat Miami in the 9th Annual Dr Pepper ACC Football Championship Game, according to a poll of media members attending this week's ACC Football Kickoff at the Grandover Resort.

Clemson, which leads all ACC teams with 14 conference championships, finished atop the media preseason poll for the second time since 1991. The Tigers have been picked to finish first seven times overall since the ACC preseason poll began in 1976.

Clemson senior quarterback Tajh Boyd was the overwhelming choice to repeat as ACC Player of the Year. The senior from Hampton, Va., was named on 105 of 120 ballots after a 2012 season in which he broke his own ACC single-season marks for touchdown passes (36) and touchdown responsibility (46). Boyd enters the 2013 season with 8,053 career passing yards and 73 touchdown passes.

Miami running back Duke Johnson, with four votes, placed second to Boyd in the 2013 ACC Preseason Player of the Year voting. Virginia Tech quarterback Logan Thomas and Clemson wide receiver Sammy Watkins received three votes apiece.

Florida State, Clemson, UNC Headline 2013 All-ACC Preseason Football Team, Each With Four Players Selected

GREENSBORO, N.C. -- Reigning Atlantic Coast Conference Player of the Year Tajh Boyd of Clemson leads the 2013 Preseason All-ACC Football Team.

Boyd, who enters his senior season with 8,053 career passing yards and 73 career touchdown passes, was the overwhelming choice at quarterback in balloting by media in attendance at the 2013 ACC Football Kickoff.

Boyd is one of three players from ACC preseason favorite Clemson on the 25-member squad. Florida State led all schools with six players, and four from North Carolina were voted to the team.

Duke, Miami and Wake Forest followed with two selections apiece, while Boston College, Georgia Tech Maryland, Pittsburgh, Virginia and Virginia Tech each placed one player on the team.

Nine student-athletes named to the 2013 Preseason All-ACC Team were first- or second-team All-ACC offensive selections last season: Clemson's Boyd, Wake Forest wide receiver Michael Campanaro, North Carolina tight end Eric Ebron and tackle James Hurst, Florida State guard Tre' Jackson and center Bryan Stork, Miami running back Duke Johnson, Clemson placekicker Chandler Catanzaro and Maryland kick return specialist Stefon Diggs.

Seven members of the 2013 All-ACC Preseason defensive unit were first- or second-team All-ACC in 2012: Duke cornerback Ross Cockrell and punter Will Monday; Florida State cornerback Lamarcus Joyner and linebacker Christian Jones, North Carolina defensive end Kareem Martin, Wake Forest nose tackle Nikita Whitlock, and Virginia Tech linebacker Jack Tyler.

Boyd, who was named on 59 of the 65 ballots cast, joins his teammate, wide receiver Sammy Watkins and North Carolina's Hurst as repeat Preseason All-ACC selections from last season. Florida State's Joyner and Wake Forest's Whitlock are repeat Preseason All-ACC defensive selections from 2012.

Joyner, a former safety, was named to the 2013 Preseason All-ACC team at cornerback. Joyner received 43 total votes -- 32 at the corner and 11 at his former position.

Boyd is joined in the backfield of the Preseason All-ACC team by running backs Duke Johnson of Miami and James Wilder Jr. of Florida State.

Johnson, the 2012 ACC Rookie of the Year, placed third in the conference in rushing last season with 947 yards and ranked ninth nationally in all-purpose yardage at 171.67 per game. Wilder rushed for 635

yards and averaged 5.8 yards per carry. The pair placed 1-2 in the voting ahead of Syracuse's Jerome Smith, whose 1,171 yards last season ranks first among all returning conference team rushers in 2013. Smith and the Orange join Pitt in making their ACC debuts this fall.

The receiving corps includes Watkins, the 2011 ACC Rookie of the Year, and Wake Forest's Michael Campanaro, who leads all active ACC players with 162 catches. North Carolina's Eric Ebron received the nod at right end after hauling in 40 catches for 625 yards and four touchdowns in 2012.

Florida State's Jackson and UNC's Hurst are joined on the offensive line by FSU center Bryan Stork, Virginia tackle Morgan Moses and Miami guard Brandon Linder.

Clemson's Catanzaro enters the 2013 season having made good on 26 of his last 27 field goal attempts (.963), including a school-record streak of 20 straight three-pointers.

The defensive front features ends Martin of UNC and Georgia Tech's Jeremiah Attaochu, while Whitlock and Florida State's Timmy Jernigan man the tackle positions. Whitlock and Jernigan prevailed in a tight vote that also included Pitt's Aaron Donald, also a candidate for a number of preseason national awards.

The linebacking corps features Virginia Tech's Jack Tyler in addition to Florida State's Jones and Boston College's Kevin Pierre-Louis. Duke's Cockrell and FSU's Joyner are joined in the secondary by North Carolina's Tre Boston and Pitt's Jason Hendricks.

BC's Pierre-Louis ranked third among ACC players in tackles per game last season (9.4), while Virginia Tech's Tyler ranked fifth (9.2). Attaochu's 13 quarterback sacks tied for second among conference defenders. UNC's Martin tied for second in tackles for loss per game (1.29).

Pitt's Hendricks earned All-Big East honors in 2012 after registering 90 tackles and six interceptions. Duke's Cockrell tied for first in the ACC with five interceptions and third in passes defended (18). UNC's Boston was among a group of players with four interceptions in 2012.

Maryland's Diggs made a huge impact as a freshman last season, returning kickoffs 99 and 100 yards for touchdowns and piled up 172.36

Bowl Championship Series

The winner of the Dr Pepper ACC Football Championship Game will be selected to play in the Bowl Championship Series. Unless the winner of the Dr Pepper ACC Football Championship Game is ranked No.1 or No. 2 in the final BCS Standings and plays in the BCS National Championship Game, then the ACC Champion will serve as the host team of the Discover Orange Bowl in Miami, Fla. This year's Vizio BCS National Championship Game will be hosted by the Rose Bowl on Jan. 6 in Pasadena, Calif. The BCS may also select a second ACC team, if one is eligible for selection (Won at least nine regular season games and is ranked among the Top 14 in the final BCS Standings), and there is an At-Large berth available and the team is selected by one of the four BCS Bowl Games—Discover Orange (only if the ACC Champion is in the BCS National Championship Game), Allstate Sugar, Tostitos Fiesta and the Rose Bowl Game presented by Vizio.

Conditions:

1. The runner-up of the ACC Championship Game, provided, is guaranteed not to fall further than the Hyundai Sun Bowl. The Sun Bowl will select the ACC Championship Game runner-up in any year that team is available to them.
2. Otherwise, if the bowl does not select the team available with the best Conference record, then it must choose a team that is within one conference win of the team (The "One-Win Rule") with the best conference record (ie. 5-3 to 6-2), The bowl may take a team that has more than a one game difference, only if the team is ranked more than five spaces above the team with the best Conference record in the final BCS Standings.
3. If, after all bowl selections have been made, and the Kraft Fight Hunger Bowl has an opening due to the inability of either the Pac-12 Conference or BYU to provide a team, and the ACC has an available, eligible team, then the ACC will send a team to the Kraft Fight Hunger Bowl

ACC Divisional Tiebreaker

If more than one team in the same division is tied for the best winning percentage in its Conference games then, in order to determine the divisional champion, the procedures listed below will be followed.

A. Two-Team Tie

1. Head-to-head competition between the two tied teams.
2. Winning percentage of the tied teams within the division.
3. Head-to-head competition versus the team within the division with the best overall winning percentage (divisional and non-divisional), and proceeding through the division. Multiple ties within the division will be broken from first to last using the league's tie-breaking procedures.
4. Overall winning percentage versus all common non-divisional opponents.
5. Combined winning percentage versus all non-divisional opponents.
6. Winning percentage versus common non-divisional opponents based upon their order of finish (overall conference winning percentage) and proceeding through other common non-divisional opponents based upon their order of finish within the division.
7. The tied team with the higher ranking in the full Bowl Championship Series Standings following the conclusion of regular season games. If both tied teams are not ranked in the full Bowl Championship Series Standings, the computer ranking portion of the Standings will be used, eliminating the high and the low computer ranking, and averaging the remaining rankings.
8. The representative shall be chosen by a draw as administered by the Commissioner or Commissioner's designee.

B. Three (or More) Team Tie

(Three team (or more) tiebreaker procedure will be used to break all ties to identify the Championship game representative. Once a team is eliminated from the tie, the tie-breaking procedures restart for the remaining teams. If the three (or more) team tie can only be reduced to two teams, the two-team tiebreaking procedure will then be applied).

1. Combined head-to-head winning percentage among the tied teams.
2. Winning percentage of the tied teams within the division.
3. Head-to-head competition versus the team within the division with the best overall (divisional and non-divisional) Conference winning percentage, and proceeding through the division. Multiple ties within the division will be broken first to last, using the league's tie-breaking procedures.
4. Combined winning percentage versus all common non-divisional opponents.
5. Combined winning percentage versus all non-divisional opponents.
6. Winning percentage versus common non-divisional opponents based upon their order of finish (overall conference winning percentage) and proceeding through other common non-divisional opponents based upon their divisional order of finish.
7. The tied team with the highest ranking in the full Bowl Championship Series Standings following the conclusion of regular season games, unless the second of the tied teams is ranked within five-or-fewer places of the highest ranked tied team. In this case, the two-team tiebreaking procedure shall be applied between the top two ranked tied teams. If all tied teams are not ranked in the full Bowl Championship Series Standings, the computer ranking portion of the Standings will be used, eliminating the high and the low computer ranking, and averaging the remaining rankings.
8. The representative shall be chosen by a draw as administered by the Commissioner or Commissioner's designee.

Bowl Championship Series

Heading into its 16th and final year of determining the National Championship in college football, the **Bowl Championship Series (BCS)** is a five-game arrangement that is designed to match the two top-rated teams and to create competitive match ups among eight other highly regarded teams in four other games.

The bowl games participating are the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, the Discover Orange Bowl, the Rose Bowl Game presented by Vizio and the Allstate Sugar Bowl. In addition, the BCS National Championship Game is played at one of the bowl sites, this year at Rose Bowl Stadium in Pasadena, Calif., on January 6, 2014.

The term "BCS conference" frequently is used incorrectly. Actually, all 10 NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) conferences are "BCS conferences" because the BCS arrangement is managed by the commissioners of the 10 NCAA FBS conferences and the director of athletics at the University of Notre Dame. The conferences are Atlantic Coast, The American Athletic Conference, Big Ten, Big 12, Conference USA, Mid-American, Mountain West, Sun Belt, Pacific-12, and the Southeastern.

Six conferences (ACC, American, Big 12, Big

Ten, SEC and Pac-12) have earned annual automatic qualification for the 2010-13 seasons by virtue of contracts to host the bowl games, and/or by having met a four-year metric based on competitive results (The ACC champion plays in the Discover Orange Bowl, the Big Ten and Pac-12 champs in the Rose Bowl presented by Vizio, Big 12 in the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl and SEC in the Allstate Sugar Bowl). Additionally, the highest-ranked champion of Conference USA, Mid-American, Mountain West, or Sun Belt conferences will be guaranteed a slot in a BCS game if that team is ranked 12th or higher in the final BCS standings, 16th or higher if its ranking is higher than that of a champion from one of the six conferences with automatic qualification. Other teams are eligible to be selected at large by a bowl game if they finish among the top 14.

The champions of the Big Ten and the Pac-12 will play in the Rose Bowl if they do not qualify for the National Championship Game. Other "regional consideration" tie-ins include the SEC champion in the Sugar Bowl, the ACC champion in the Orange Bowl and the Big 12 champion in the Fiesta Bowl if those teams are not ranked No. 1 or No. 2 in the final BCS Standings.

BCS Standings

The BCS Standings are composed of three elements that are weighted equally: the USA Today Coaches poll, 2) the Harris poll, and 3) the average of six computer poll rankings. The highest and lowest computer ranking is discarded each week with the computer average based on the remaining four rankings. The BCS Standings are compiled and released by the National Football Foundation eight times during the season, beginning this year on Sunday, October 20 and ending on BCS Selection Sunday, December 8. The first Harris Poll will be released on Sunday, Oct. 13.



COLLEGE FOOTBALL PLAYOFF

Beginning with the 2014-15 season, college football will enter a new era when a postseason playoff will begin. The format is simple: top four teams, two semifinals played in bowl games, and a national championship game played in a different city each year. Each semifinal will be played during the New Year's holiday with the national championship game in prime time on a Monday night at least a week later. It will be the best of all worlds, and the biggest innovation to the sport in decades.

A selection committee will choose the four teams for the playoff based on their performance during the regular season, including, strength of schedule, head-to-head results, championships won, and other factors. The teams will be seeded so that #1 will play #4 in one semifinal and #2 will meet #3 in the other, with the winners advancing to the national championship game.

The semifinals will rotate among six different bowls, extending the experience to more fans. In the years when the bowls are not hosting semifinals, the bowls will feature eight other teams in four compelling matchups.

The ACC and the BCS

The Atlantic Coast Conference has been a member of the Bowl Championship Series (BCS) since its inception for the 1998 season. ACC Commissioner John Swofford, is the only Commissioner to twice serve as BCS Coordinator, having done so in the 2000 and 2001 seasons and again in the 2008 and 2009 campaigns, as the ACC successfully administered the BCS on two separate occasions. Swofford is also the last Commissioner to serve as BCS Coordinator. In 2009, the BCS group named longtime college administrator Bill Hancock to serve as the first Executive Director of the Bowl Championship Series. Hancock has since assumed the duties previously handled by the coordinator. Prior to being named Executive Director, Hancock served four years as the Administrator for the BCS.

Bowl Championship Series; College Football Playoff

Longtime athletics administrator Bill Hancock achieved a unique triple accomplishment at the upper echelon of intercollegiate athletics when he was named the first Executive Director of the of the College Football Playoff, which begins after the 2014 season. Previously, Hancock was named the first full-time director of the NCAA Final Four and then was named the first executive director of the Bowl Championship Series (BCS) in 2009, a role he continues in this year until the completion of the BCS with this year's national championship game. Hancock served for 13 years as director of the NCAA's Division I Men's Basketball Championship--the three-week March Madness event that culminates at the Final Four. After a family tragedy, he retired in 2002 and for three years was the tournament's media coordinator on a consulting basis before being named BCS administrator in October of 2005. He is a 1972 journalism graduate of the University of Oklahoma and worked in sports information at his alma mater and also on the staff of the Big Eight Conference before being named director of the Final Four in 1989.

The ACC & Overtime

When Virginia Tech and Rutgers ended regulation tied at 10-10 in the Russell Bowl, it marked the 62nd game featuring an ACC team that has had to go to extra sessions. Of the 62 overtime contests, a large portion of them--26--have been played in the month of September. Games have gone into overtime for ACC teams a total of 14 times in November, while 12 have been played in October, three in August, five in December and two in January (2006 FedEx Orange Bowl, 2012 Allstate Sugar Bowl). Of the 62 overtime contests, 31 have been ACC games while 31 nonconference games have gone into overtime. The home team has a 34-20 advantage in the 54 games played on campus. The team which wins the toss has a 32-30 record. Forty-nine of the games were decided in the first overtime with nine games in double overtime and four in triple overtime.
