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Settlement Finally Reached With Centex Homes

ver the past several years the Board has worked through legal channels, mediation and many hours of negotiations with the goal of having our roads repaired. A settlement agreement with Centex Homes was finally reached in July of this year. On November 3, 2011 barring weather delays, Ruston Paving Company will begin repairs on Hermitage and parts of Sandpiper Bay Drive, Dunbar Drive and Balmore Drive. The entire process will take approximately two weeks. A schedule will be provided soon so that residents can determine the impact it will have on them individually.

A special meeting was called at the Calabash Presbyterian Church by our Board of Directors October 25th to discuss whether to spend monies in reserve and to possibly take a 4-year loan to repair the remainder of the roads that were not included in the lawsuit. According to our Secretary, Judi Ballweg, the board took all opinions expressed at the meeting and through e-mails, and the overwhelming response was in favor of resurfacing all roads at this time. She further states that the Board voted to go forward with this project and a schedule of work pertaining to resurfacing will be forthcoming.

The Sandpiper Bay Board of Directors has worked tirelessly for the last few years to bring these repairs become a reality! Mike Spinelli, Ray Cooksey, Mary Ard, Judi Ballweg, Tom Goldsmith and residents who were previously on the Board ... Pat Sheridan, Margaret Niland, Bob Schenck, and Dick Eby... to all of you, the residents of Sandpiper Bay say THANK YOU for all your hard work!!



BULBS

paperwhites, daylilies, gladiolus and daffodils

SPRING BLOOMERS

sweetpeas, poppies, wildflowers, coneflowers

GROUNDCOVERS

juniper, liriope, jasmine, ajuga

HOW TO STORE SUMMER BULBS

Air dry for several days

Remove all foliage

Pack in peat moss

Store in a cool location

caladium, tuberous begonia

PRUNE PERENNIALS

Cut back late summer and early fall blooming plants.

They should be cut back to just above ground level after the first frost

asters, mums, salvias, bachelor button

SPRING FLOWERING SHRUBS

Do not prune as they have already set their flowerbuds. Pruning now would remove next year's blooms

azaleas, spireas, quince, forsythias



DECEMBER- WHAT TO PLANT THIS MONTH

ANNUALS

petunias, snapdragons, pansies, violas and ornamental kale and cabbage.

BULBS

Pre-refrigerated tulips and hyacinths are ready to plant in December.

PERENNIALS

mums, lantana, coneflower, Mexican bush sage as soon as the frost has killed their foliage.



Spring bloomers like phlox, daylilies, and bearded iris may still be divided.

PRUNE PERENNIALS

Cut back mums, salvias, Mexican mint, asters, and marigolds after the first hard frost; leave 1 to 2 inch stems above the ground.

The Sandpiper Holiday Angels to date have raised \$1500 in funds. We will be holding our final raffle of the year at the Halloween Party on October 29, 2011. (*editor's note: This party has been cancelled*) These funds will be included in our 2011 fund raisers. Anna Blizzard is the committee leader of selling luminarias for Christmas Eve. Since it is so late in the year, and we must have all our gifts wrapped and delivered to Brunswick Assistance by December 5th, the sale of these luminarias will kick off the 2012 Holiday Angels funds.

The Angels have already received the families we are "helping" this year. The first family is a recently widowed single mom with 2 girls, ages 3 and 7. Two weeks ago she gave birth to twin girls and is obviously struggling financially. She does work, but is out on maternity leave and is surviving on her husband's small disability check and the help of Brunswick Assistance. The second family consists of a single mom with three children: 2 girls and 1 boy ranging in age from 4 to 11 years. She is undergoing open heart surgery in the next few weeks and needs help.

We also are providing gifts to one senior, a 75 yearold woman as well as one 16 year-old girl who is merely asking for a pair of jeans, shoes and a shirt from her wish list. We expect to spend about \$100/child/senior in addition to supplying holiday dinners for two families mentioned above and the senior citizen. Additionally, we hope to have enough funds to buy BEMC gift certificates for these families. BEMC runs a program called, "Warm Hearts, Warm Homes." For every dollar we donate, they will match us 100%. In addition to the toys the children have requested (each child get 3 wishes), we hope to have enough funds to purchase either a pair of PJ's or an outfit per child. The twins are in need of everything from double stroller, 2 swings, 2 walkers, diapers, wipes to name a few, and we are in the process of seeing what we can do for this family.

Driver Beware: 7 Ways To Prevent A Collision With A Deer A Crash Course On Deer Collisions

Deer mating season can be a dangerous time for drivers, deer and car hoods. According to the Insurance Information Institute, 1.6 million deer-vehicle collisions occur each year, resulting in 200 fatalities, tens of thousands of injuries and over \$3.6 billion in vehicle damage.

Being prepared can help prevent you from adding to these statistics. When driving this fall, you should:

- 1. Watch for the rest of the gang. Deer are pack animals, and rarely travel alone. If a deer crosses in front of you, chances are there are more nearby. Slow down and keep an eye out for more deer darting across the road.
- 2. **Timing is everything.** Deer are most active at dusk and dawn: periods when your vision is most compromised. To add to their terrible timing, deer are on the move during mating season (between October and January) when you're more likely to travel after the sun sets. Slow down and stay alert, especially after dark.
- 3. Wear your seatbelt. It may not prevent a collision, but if the inevitable happens a seatbelt can reduce injuries. This is especially true if you lose control and collide with something bigger and more stationary than a deer.
- 4. Take a moment to reflect. First, look for the road signs. The yellow diamonds with the deer on it are placed in high-traffic areas for deer. You may also spot a deer because their eyes will brightly reflect a car's headlights, making them easier to spot.
- 5. **Stay Center.** On a multi-lane road, the center lane is your safest bet for avoiding a deer collision, as long as your local traffic laws permit it. This gives deer plenty of space; and in case your vehicle does startle them, it gives you more time to react if one darts onto the road.
- 6. **Stay the course.** If you see a deer, brake firmly and calmly, and stay in your lane. Swerving could make you lose control of your vehicle and turn a bad situation much worse. Not to mention, deer are unpredictable, and you could swerve directly into their changed path.
- 7. Honk! Some experts recommend that one long blast of the horn will scare deer out of the road. Do not rely on hood whistles or other devices designed to scare off deer studies have shown them to be largely ineffective at minimizing accidents.

We hope you'll never need this section.

If the above 7 step plan fails (and it happens to the best drivers), you should take the following steps in the deer collision aftermath.

- I. Pull to the side of the road as soon as it is safe to do so.
- 2. Turn on your hazard lights and remain in the vehicle until you are sure it is safe.
- 3. Call emergency services if injuries are involved or the local police for property damage.
- 4. Stay away from the deer. If it is still alive, it could be confused, injured and dangerous if approached. When contacting the authorities, let them know if the deer is in a dangerous spot on the road so that it can be removed.
- 5. Contact your insurance company as quickly as possible to report any damage to your vehicle. Knowing what to do when you encounter a deer on the highway can be a life-saver.

As we all know, Clint and Arlene Rose took a cruise around the world in 2009. They have been so gracious as to share their trip with us through a series of stories and pictures over the last two years. This is part fifteen of Clint and Arlene's world tour. Enjoy!

It is now April 9, 2009 and we have sailed 31,170 nautical miles and are heading for Kusadasi, Turkey.

It is a resort town on Turkey's Aegean Coast and the centre of the seaside district. Kusadasi has a residential population of 50,000 rising to over a half a million during the summer season which means the economy thrives on tourism. They bring in thousands of workers to work the area at that time.

From Kusadasi we traveled north to Ephesus, a 2,000 year old city, of which only a small portion has been discovered. Entering Ephesus through the Magnesia Gate we began a slow downhill walk into the ruins of this Roman Provincial Capital. The route took us past the Celsus Library, the Temple of Hadrian, the Fountain of Trajan and the Great theater which had a seating capacity of 24,000. It is believed that St. Paul preached to the Ephesians here.

We then visited the House of the Virgin Mary which has been recog-




nized by the Vatical as her final Resting Place. The small shrine was found when the ruins of the House were



first discovered. From there we went to where the Basilica of St. John the Apostle's tomb was located but was transferred to the Vatican.



Seeing Ephesus was one of the highlights of the trip and I would strongly recommend that you visit this great city if you ever get the chance.



Later in the day we set sail westward before changing to northward towards our next port of call which will be Istanbul, Turkey which was formerly known as Constantinople.

Recipes by Jackie

Orange Crisp Cookies

2 sticks of un-salted butter 1/2 tsp orange extract 1 egg, slightly beaten

- 1 cup sugar
- 11/2 cup flour



Cream butter with salt, gradually adding sugar. Add egg and continue beating. Blend in extract and then flour. Pre-heat oven to 375 degrees. Drop by rounded teaspoon of dough onto un-greased cookie sheet (or use parchment paper) approximately 2 inches apart.

Bake 10 minutes or until edges are slightly brown. Sprinkle with additional sugar while hot. Let stand 1 to 2 minutes. Remove to wire rack. Makes 4-5 dozen

Black Bean Quesadilla

2 burrito-size flour tortillas 1 (14 1/2 ounce) can refried low-fat black beans

1 cup chunky salsa

1 1/2 cups Mexican-style shredded cheese

1/2 cup prepared guacamole (from the refrigerated section)

2 tablespoons sour cream

Preheat oven to 400 degrees F

Lay 1 tortilla on a clean work surface. Spread the beans evenly over the tortilla. Spoon 3/4 cup of salsa over the beans, then sprinkle with the cheese. Top with the second tortilla. Place the quesadilla on a foil-covered cookie sheet.

Bake for approximately 15 minutes, or until the cheese is melted and the top is crisp and brown. Meanwhile, swirl the guacamole and sour cream together in a small bowl. Cut the quesadilla into 4 equal portions and transfer to a plate. Serve with the guacamole mixture and remaining 1/4 cup of salsa.

Yield: 2 servings
