PULPIT COMMITTEE



SISTER TENAYA PRINCE WINS TWO PRESTIGIOUS RESEARCH AWARDS



Mechanical engineering student, Tenaya Prince, has recently been named the Region 2 First Place Winner of the Undergraduate Students in Technical Research Regional Showcase (URRS) award and the Second Place

Winner of the Focus Research on Entrepreneurial Empowerment (FREE) award. Prince has done extensive research on embedded resistors and has won these honors based on her paper, "Trimming of Embedded Resistors: 3 D Electrical Modeling."

As first place winner of the URRS award, Prince presented her research at the National Society of Black Engineers (NSBE) national convention in March. Of the six national regions, Prince is the winner for Region 2, which is comprised of over 2,400 collegiate student members. These members represent chapters throughout Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, Washington, D.C., West Virginia, Virginia, North Carolina and South Carolina.

Sponsored by NSBE, this first place tribute consists of a trophy and a \$200 monetary award. As a result of expanding her research to include its entrepreneurial potential, Prince is also honored with the FREE award, sponsored by the University of Maryland Black Graduate Student Association (NBGSA) and the Black Engineers Society (BES). As a second place winner, Prince has received a certificate of participation and a \$200 monetary award.

Currently, Prince is the PCI Co-Chair for the National Society of Black Engineers and is involved with many volunteer activities including Operation Caring Spirits--an Air Force volunteer program, Christmas in April and Walk for Education. She has won other awards including several academic awards and the Michael L. Cherry Scholarship award, "for community service and being an inspiration to others." As a mechanical engineering senior, she is looking forward to her upcoming graduation in Fall 2009. Post graduation, she plans to pursue a career with General Electric Transportation in their Edison Engineering Development Program, after which she plans to enroll in graduate school.

At one point, two underclasswomen were recognized for having arranged two African-American spirituals ("Go Down, Moses" and "Rock-a My Soul"); an impressive accomplishment for even a seasoned musician.

The young women only added to their allure and charm as they warmly embraced the MHBC family and friends after the concert at a reception. They welcomed questions about both the Glee Club and the College, as well as about their individual experiences as student-musicians. The choir's director, Dr. Kevin P. Johnson, was on hand to meet and greet the crowd and offer wisdom and advice to aspiring Spelmanites. After the formalities, the women enjoyed a hearty meal prepared by the Church and several alumnae joined them to "roast" the director and reflect fondly on their days at Spelman and/or in the Glee Club. But Spring Tour is a job like any other, so immediately after dinner, the women were rehearsing for the next day's performance before calling it a night. 

~~EVANGELISM NEWS~~

The second training session of the series on Evangelism for 2009 was held in the Christian Education Building. Reverend Wallace led the session describing Relational Evangelism and Peer Evangelism and giving examples.



The overall objective of the training session was to learn strategies to mentor, train, nurture and evangelize disadvantaged, at risk youth from the foster care system, using relational and peer evangelism, called "Nurturing and Evangelizing Children of Promise."

Foster children are God's children, and He loves them. They have been gifted with God-given purposes, but many times the gifts have been smothered and therefore hidden.

Evangelizing these children is important in the context of a relationship. Nurturing first, because you must meet the children where they are. Evangelism second because many of these youth have issues around trust.

Historical data shows that approximately 78% of all conversions come out of the context of a family or a personal relationship.

Because friends can influence friends, discussions were around ways to develop friendships with this lost population. Develop a personal relationship, build trust, then evangelize was the poignant strategy shared. This is relational or lifestyle evangelism. Peer evangelism, as discussed, is a subset of relational evangelism, primarily as a way for the youth of Mount Horeb to be engaged in evangelism. This is where peers, those either by age, school or social friends, or by persons who have been in at risk situations and have come through and are now serving God. Therefore, it is important to first develop a relationship, build trust, then present the Gospel.

The session closed with a real life talk from a former foster child who is now an adult and is serving God. She came to the Lord in the context of a relationship through the foster family who raised her. This is an excellent example of God using the foster care system to reach a soul and showing His love.

Sister Dixon has a very interesting story detailing what drew her to Mount Horeb. One Sunday while walking down Bladensburg Road, she met and started a conversation with a lady who asked where she was going. She replied that she was searching for a neighborhood church home. The stranger said she was going to Mount Horeb and invited Sister Dixon to join her. Once inside the Church, the stranger introduced her to lots of people, all of whom were extremely friendly. Sister Dixon felt at home and responded positively to the call to "come back as often as you like." What makes this so amazing is that Sister Dixon has not seen the stranger since that first encounter.

DAY OF SERVICE



On Saturday evening, January 17th, I settled down to read my daily Washington Post. I saw an article announcing that for the first time a new incoming President was opening the White House to visitors the day after his Inauguration. The article provided a web site where you could apply for admission. Even though I knew thousands of people had probably already applied by that time of the day and that my chance of getting admitted was slim to none, I submitted an application anyway. Once I hit the submit button, I was led into another web site set up by Mayor Adrian Fenty. This one asked you to volunteer for a day of service in honor of the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Holiday. Not trying to put a White House visit (and possibly meeting President Barack Obama) above honoring Dr. King by serving others, I applied to work at RFK Stadium. I chose the first shift, 10:30 a.m.-12:00 noon, because I'm a morning person.

Monday morning I got up and out early, caught the Metro train to the Stadium and proceeded to wait in line - wait to fill out another form; wait to circle around outside; wait to pass through scanners; wait inside the stadium. Patiently waiting, I met people from all over the country who were in Washington for the Inauguration of the first African-American President, and who decided to volunteer their time and service also. Finally, when the group that I was part of finished our orientation explaining how we were needed to stuff care packages for soldiers serving in Iraq and Afghanistan, we were led to a huge heated tent in the middle of the field. There we picked up a plastic bag, moved from table to table, allowing other workers to drop items in the bag, and at the end of the line zip-locked it and started the process over again. The aim was to fill a total of 3,000 bags per hour, 100,000 for the day.

On my second round, folks started shouting and music started playing (Chuck Brown's "I Feel Like Busting Loose"), getting louder and louder. People were saying, "they're here, they're here." I asked, "who's here?" Someone said "Michelle Obama". It seemed like everyone in the tent rushed to our section (B) to where Mrs. Obama was led in by black suited Secret Service persons, followed by media crews and cameras. Everyone instantly pulled out cell phones and cameras to take pictures, and so did I. I was able to get three pictures before we were "encouraged" to move on down the line. After I zip- locked my bag, I picked up another to reenter the line. By this time Secret Service had taken charge and gotten things back in order. We were allowed to pass through the line five or six at a time, and were told not to pull out anything (cameras). At this time Michelle Obama was at the table passing out supplies. She dropped her item in my bag and when I offered my hand for a handshake, she took my hand in both of her's and kindly shook it. In a most warm and gracious manner, she said, "How are you? It's nice to meet you." I replied, "Fine, it is a pleasure to meet you." She did not rush to let go, but someone (Secret Service) said "MOVE ON!" Volunteers had been encouraged to write letters to soldiers when we left the tent. On stationary provided, I wrote thanking a soldier for serving our country and wishing God's blessings while on foreign ground and for a safe return home to a new Administration - an Administration that has brought hope back to this country.

Oh, another dignitary was there with Mrs. Obama, Mrs. Biden. Honestly, I can't remember whether or not she put items in my bag as I passed through.

TRUSTEES' REPORT



During our November Church meeting, Chairman Joyce Williams informed us of the kiosk problem resulting in our loss of \$62,000. Our bank allowed United Leasing to withdraw that amount from our checking account. Your first question is, "why the bank didn't stop this?" Buried in the bank's policy is a statement which allows such withdrawals and protects Wachovia from liability. When it was learned that the money was taken from our account, we knew checks needed to be covered so one of the trustees withdrew \$50,000 from a home equity plan to deposit in the church's checking account to prevent outstanding checks from being returned.

\$200 each or any portion of that amount and mark the envelope "Emergency Loan" to repay the trustee's loan very quickly. To those persons who have contributed, we say thank you; and we hope others will give to the "Emergency Loan."

Representatives from the District of Columbia Attorney General's Office of Consumer Protection came to Mount Horeb and talked with several trustees, a deacon, Reverend Nathaniel Thomas and Henry Gaston of the D.C. Ministerial Association, regarding the kiosk situation and our loss. At that time the representatives promised to do what they could to find out more about the matter.

Now that the issue has been thoroughly investigated by the OAG's Office, Attorney General Peter Nickles has announced that the District has filed a suit against several individuals and companies including the Urban Interfaith Network (Mr. Perkins and Mr. Morris) and five or six leasing companies (including United Leasing) for having engaged in a nationwide scam to defraud African-American churches of hundreds of thousands of dollars. The scam targeted up to fifty predominantly African-American churches in the District, Maryland, Michigan, Wisconsin, Tennessee, California and other states.

The District's suit alleges that the defendants approached numerous congregations offering "free" computer equipment. As part of the agreement to receive the equipment, congregation officials were required to unwittingly sign documents that obligated the groups to long-term lease payments that amounted to \$50,000 or more. The computer equipment was valued at no more than a few thousand dollars, and at times, did not function properly.

"While it is not surprising that in tough economic times we see an increase in financial scams, what is unconscionable is that these Defendants allegedly targeted their scheme at religious congregations - groups whose funds are often used to feed the poor, assist people with housing, and otherwise benefit those in need in their community," said Attorney General Nickles. "The community is outraged at this egregious behavior, and I intend to aggressively pursue recovery on behalf of these congregations, many of which have been severely impacted by this scam."

Once this suit was released to television and other media outlets, Mount Horeb was contacted because we were the lead church to contact the DC OAG's Office for assistance in this scam.

On April 10, Mayor Fenty and Attorney General Nickles held a news conference in front of Mount Horeb to show their support for our plight and all area churches involved.

In the meantime, Reverend Nathaniel Thomas, Pastor of New Redeemer Baptist Church, Forestville, Maryland, who was familiar with our loss had begun to call together other churches which lost money or are paying leasing companies for kiosks that are not working. A group of churches have organized "Churches United for Justice, Inc." which represents about 30 churches in the DC Metropolitan Area. The attorney for the group is Fred Cooke, former D.C. Corporation Counsel under the Barry Administration. A class action suit is being considered by this group.

Articles in the Washington Post on April 10 and 11 also summarized this issue as a means of calling attention to fraud and scam artists.

ANNUAL SCHOLARSHIP WORKSHOP



The Mount Horeb Baptist Church Tenth Annual Scholarship Workshop was held on Saturday, February 7, 2009. The purpose of the workshop is to provide information and resources to parents and high school students seeking financial assistance to further their educational needs. This workshop is open to all Mount Horeb Baptist

Church high school students and parents as well as students and parents from surrounding communities and churches.

This year we were fortunate again to have four excellent speakers: Dr. Robert L. Kight, Ed.D., Managing Partner, The Kight Group, LLC.; Mr. Charles Gibbs, Interim Vice Provost for Student Affairs, Howard University; Brother Dwight Datcher, Director of Athletics, Howard University; and Brother Nicholas Austin, Georgetown University Law Student.

All stressed the need to be aware of an ever-changing society/world. Situations are shifting, and we are looking at a world we've never seen before. Therefore students entering college need to prepare for this ever-changing society.

Dr. Kight stated that there are two types of scholarships: Need Based and Merit. He indicated that 60% of scholarships available are merit scholarships. Marketing yourself makes you competitive for a merit scholarship. This means listing your accomplishments, talents and abilities. It's a good idea to start as early as Junior High School or Middle School. He suggested two Websites to research: shifthappens.com and change.com.

Mr. Gibbs emphasized building good character as a tool for getting a scholarship and keeping it. This takes responsibility. Students need to take Core Classes (Math, Science, etc.). Put a blueprint together for post-secondary education. Be a good citizen. Ask the right questions and expand their thinking. Students will need a mentor-someone who can help them get ahead. Know that character and GPA (grade point average) are your tools.

Brother Datcher stressed the need to set goals and find out how you accomplish them. Start by knowing who you are and what you want. Never stop learning and never give up on your dreams. Stay focused, have good character and good judgment.

Brother Austin suggested that students must first learn to make sound decisions, process information, and expand their knowledge. Have fun at college, but "handle business" first-go to class and do homework. After graduating from college, continue to seek mentors; know how to carry yourself, and give back to the Church.
