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



Rooted in God's peace, we live out of a spirit of joy that is not dependent on our circumstances.

TIPS FOR THE BEST COOKIES:

Choose Your Cookies: You want sturdy cookies that can handle the long-distance travel. The best choices are chocolate chip, oatmeal, peanut butter, gingersnaps, and snickerdoodles. Use a fool-proof recipe found on the chocolate chip packaging. Nothing crumbly, sticky, or requires refrigeration.

Bake Your Cookies: Use a small scoop to make the cookies uniform. The cookies will bake evenly and be easier to pack into the zip lock bag, once they have cooled completely.

Pack Your Cookies: Separate cookie layers with parchment paper to keep them from sticking. Remove all the air from the zip lock bag and seal tightly.

No Guessing Games: Clearly label the package as to type of cookie and if it contains nuts or peanut butter.

Send it with Love: Enclose a personal letter and/or card for the recipient offering encouragement.

OUR HISTORIC CHURCH DISPLAYS ITS COLORFUL HISTORY WITH THE BOB AND BILLIE LIDDELL FAMILY MEMORIAL HISTORIC

Several years ago, the City of Arlington and the Texas Historical Commission compiled a Tour of Historic Arlington. First United Methodist Church, established in 1878, is an important stop on that city tour. It was the first church

established in the Original Township of Arlington, and will be 140 years old next year. It is a beautiful, traditional church with stained glass windows, some that survived a sanctuary fire in 1918. Property for the church was purchased from the railroad in 1884 and later from the Kooken Estate. The church remains on the original site. Now FUMC of Arlington will have its very own tour!

To celebrate our church's long and colorful history, a Historic walk around the block where First United Methodist Church stands is now

becoming a reality. For several years, planning has been going on to place bronze plaques in the sidewalk to tell the story of First Church's history. The Bob & Billie Liddell Family Historic Walkway is under construction and will be unveiled in the near

future. The walkway honors the history of our church and is in memory of Bob Liddell who passed away April 19, 2016.

When completed, the ten stops on the tour will begin at the church's entrance on Center Street. A plaque that marks the sanctuary, built in 1956, is imbedded in the walkway and marks the first stop.

Walking South on Center, stop #2 is the Memorial Plaque. Also, at this stop, the plaque awarded by the Arlington Landmark Commission tells the history of this church. Stop #3 is the Methodist Education Building built in 1949. It is the oldest building remaining on the block. The Vandergriff Chapel built in 1965 was a gift of the Vandergriff family and included furnishings and the contemporary stained glass windows. Three different churches were built at different times around the corner of Center and Division. The first church, white frame with a spire and bell tower built in 1885, was moved over for the first brick church to be built in 1907. After a fire destroyed

this church in 1918, a second brick church was built on the same foundation. This church was graced with art glass windows and Arlington's first pipe organ, a gift of the R.A. Covingtons. The J.P. Fielders financed the organ pipe room and the choir loft. In 1954, another fire consumed the 1918 church. The present sanctuary was built after this fire. Stop #8, further around on Division, was the 1897 Revival Tabernacle which was financed




and used by several of the town's churches. Revivals and other large gatherings were held there. On Mesquite Street, a plaque will be embedded in front of the Family Life Center, our latest addition in 1996. Stop #10 is at the North Street Entrance to the church. Here two prominent brass plaques on columns, already installed, tell the history of the church and list our 47 past ministers, our "keepers of the faith." Throughout the history, names of prominent Arlington families filled the church's membership rolls: J.D. Cooper, Mike Ditto, James Preston and Delia Rose, C.B. Berry, J.P. Fielder, John Yates, Martin and Alexin Shults, Carrie Coleman Rogers and Mattie Goodwin among others.

The Historical Committee is preparing a Tour Guide for use in walking the tour. The history of each stop will be expanded along with photos of the different structures. This will be a self directed guide available from the church office and from hallway locations. You can also download the tour guide at arlingtonmethodist.org/HistoricWalkway.

Watch for announcements of the completion of this Memorial Historic Walkway! Our church family and Arlington historians will soon be celebrating the history of our church in a new and different way--by taking a walk through the history of the first church built in the Original Township of Arlington.

No hard math problems or tutoring. Just one hour a week, eating lunch, playing games, and building a relationship with a pretty cool kid that's looking forward to hanging out with you.

Webb Elementary (a little over a mile northwest of our church), has many students who are considered "at-risk" of failing academically or dropping out of school in the future. There are a number of reasons for this: they may have tough home lives, may not be getting the attention and care that they need to thrive academically or socially, and/or may be struggling with self-esteem and confidence. These are kids who need a little extra support and encouragement to help them stay on the right track in life and realize their full potential. That's where you, a Big Hope mentor, come in!

Big Hope is a combination of Kids Hope USA and Big Brothers Big Sisters. It's a faith-based program where a mentor is matched with a "Little", but instead of meeting outside of school and going places, you meet with your Little one day a week, during lunch, at their school (Webb Elementary, in our church's case). As a mentor, you have access to all of the support resources offered by Big Brothers, Big Sisters. If you're worried that you don't have enough experience with children, or wouldn't know how to respond to certain situations, there are trained

professionals available to help you, as well a dedicated match support specialist, who checks in with you and your Little on a regular basis.

This is a program that can make an enormous difference in the life of a child, and all it takes is a little regular commitment and support on your part. Kids in the Big Hope program are there because they want to be. Many say that it's their favorite day of the week - it's a special time that's all about them, when they might otherwise get lost in a busy home or classroom. As a mentor, you don't have to spend your time tutoring them, or working on homework. You can play games, read together, do arts and crafts, or just simply eat lunch and talk about what's going on in your lives. The fact that you're there for them each week is the most important part, and your dedication to them is what they'll appreciate the most about your time together.

There is a long list of children waiting to be paired with their perfect match, which could be you! If you're a member of the church and have an hour to spare, this is a great opportunity to help make a hands-on difference in a child's life.

When and where does your small group meet?

We meet every Wednesday evening at 7:00 pm at Johnnie Sue & Mike Bucek's home in Central Arlington. Most of our members are from the neighborhood (76013). We try to keep our group time to one hour, but we have dessert and socialize a little before and after.

Who is your small group geared towards?

We don't have a particular focus in terms of the make-up of the group, all are welcome. We are a very diverse group, including singles and married couples, young career people and retirees, men and women. Our focus is to share our walk with Christ together, grow in our faith, and pray together.



How many people are in your small group community?

We have 14 members, we meet weekly and usually have 8 or so in attendance.

What has your group been studying recently?

We use a modified Lectio Divina protocol to study and meditate on a selected passage from the week's lectionary. The leader usually picks it out and sends it to members before our gathering. One of the most meaningful parts of our sequence, according to one member, is comparing the wording in the different versions of the Bible that everyone brings. We are always amazed how this simple structure is used by the Holy Spirit to give us some important and helpful insights about our everyday lives.

For example, in our last meeting we read Matthew 22:34-46 about the time Jesus silenced the Jewish leaders after they had been trying to trip him up, and we got a new appreciation with how learned and astute Jesus was in handling naysayers,



and also got into a pretty deep discussion about what he meant by loving God "with all our hearts" and our neighbors as ourselves. We were bold enough to discuss the LGBT issue, even though we have strong opinions on both sides!

Is your group involved with One Mile Mission or other mission work?

When it was recommended that our small groups take on a project, we discussed it and decided we were all involved in various volunteer work, so our best approach would be to support each others' endeavors as the need arises. Most of our members have such busy lives they do well to come every week!

The greatest strength of your small group is:

Learning from each other through respectful listening and sharing. As one member said, "I like that we're a very diverse group, yet we still can listen to each other without getting mad or defensive." Another member commented, "I think our group is about nurture. When we hear someone telling about what bothers them, we identify with that feeling and try to build them up".

Describe your small group in three words:

Diverse, supportive, insightful

Anything else you'd like to share:

The prayer time at the end is particularly rich, in that we go around the circle twice and everyone has an opportunity to participate, first with praise and thanksgiving, then with petitions. We don't "share prayer requests" first, we just dive in and spend the time in group prayer.


