Dear Friends

One of the most popular books of the late 1990's was entitled 'What They Didn't Teach You At Harvard Business School'. This is now regarded as a classic in the business fraternity. The book proposed that there are three things you are not taught that you desperately need to say:

- 1. I'm wrong.
- 2. I'm sorry
- 3. Please help me

Unless you say (1) you'll never move on in business, the book said. Unless you say (2) you'll be arrogant. Unless you say (3) your self-sufficiency will be your downfall.

These are lessons that are not just applicable to business but also to our whole lives. The Easter story is full of meaningful little cameos on life. One that I find quite profound is the story of the two criminals who were crucified alongside Jesus. You can find this story in Luke 23:32-33, 39-43.

Once they are hanging in agony on the three crosses one of the criminals

begins to insult Jesus and says; If you're the Christ, save yourself and us! The other criminal rebukes him – Don't you fear God? We are punished justly; we are getting what our deeds deserve. But this man has done nothing wrong. Then he turns to Jesus and says; Jesus, remember me when you come into you kingdom. Jesus responds to him; Today you will be with me in paradise!

The first man was stuck on his cross, his arrogance making him blind to the person on the cross beside him. But the second criminal seems to have learnt the lessons identified above in his dying moments. He recognises that he is in the wrong and justly punished. Then he turns to Jesus and asks for help – the result? Paradise!

The Easter story brings two aspects of God's love for his world into reality – forgiveness and new life. The cross brings us forgiveness and the resurrection brings us new life. One without the other is meaningless. If there was to be no resurrection than Jesus' promise to the criminal would have been an empty one. If Jesus did not die on the cross then neither the



criminal nor we would ever hope to attain new life with him.

This Easter are you ready to learn these three simple lessons of life:

We are in the wrong – We need to say sorry – We need God's help

Then like the second criminal on the cross you will know that you have a place in paradise with Jesus.

EASTER ON HOLY ISLAND

It was Easter Sunday 2015 when I travelled to the edge of Britain to celebrate at St Cybi's church (pronounced St Cuby's), in Holyhead (pronounced *Holly*head), on Holy Island (pronounced Holy)! With me so far?



The town centre is built around the church which *itself* is built inside an old Roman fort. St Cybi was a 6th Century Cornish bishop, saint and first cousin of St David. Raised as a Christian he made a pilgrimage to Rome and Jerusalem and soon became a travelling

priest. The original monastery he founded in AD 540 was sacked by Viking raiders in the 10th Century. The present church was built in the 13th Century.

The Easter Sunday service at the medieval church was moving and I had my first experience of a sermon, choir and hymn singing in Welsh. My lip-syncing reached new levels of

performance! 52% of the Holyhead population speak the ancient language.

Lots of ornamental figures and stained glass which had upon one of its panels our "very own" St Michael.



I took Communion with the faithful and then bade farewell. I was assured by the Reverend that a welcome in the gritty harbour town would be mine should I return. I shook his hand and smiled graciously.
