WHAT CAN ICONIC BUILDINGS DO FOR EARTH HOUR 2014

WWF's Earth Hour in Scotland was another huge success in 2013. Thousands of people across Scotland joined hundreds of millions in a record 154 countries to switch off their lights and show their concern about the impact climate change is having on people and the natural world.

Simultaneously, over 100 national and local landmarks plunged into darkness, including Edinburgh Castle, Forth Rail Bridge, Clyde Arc, Falkirk Wheel and Inverness Castle along with international landmarks such as Sydney Opera House, Table Mountain, the Brandenburg Gate, Tokyo Tower and the Empire State Building.

Hundreds of schools, universities, businesses, local authorities and organisations also got involved and the event received cross-party political and Scottish Government support.

As an iconic building or landmark, you can play a vital role in showcasing Earth Hour, reducing carbon emissions, promoting sustainability and engaging with your community.

Switch Off:

 Turn off the lights in your buildings and offices for one hour on 29 March 2014 at 8.30pm.

Take Part:

 Promote WWF's Earth Hour to staff through emails and intranet, encouraging them to sign up as individuals at and take part in the event on a personal basis.

Engage:

- Make use of your website, newsletters, twitter and facebook to encourage members of the public to sign up, demonstrating your support for action on climate change.
- Organise your own Earth Hour event such as a countdown to the big switch off, a candlelit dinner, concert or ceilidh or even a historic or ghost tour of your building.

Promote the event

IDEAS FOR EARTH HOUR 2014

Just some of the many amazing activities that took place all across the country in 2013:

Edinburgh Castle

Edinburgh Castle played host to an WWF Scotland Earth Hour photo opportunity. This saw the creation of a LED globe and number 60 on the castle esplanade, created with the help of school pupils from Currie Community High School. Other participating Historic Scotland properties included Arbroath Abbey, Castle Campbell, Inverness Castle and Urqhuart Castle.

Isle of Skye

As well as switching of iconic castles including Eilean Donan and Inverness, Highland Council organised a nighttime walk. Highland Council Rangers led members of the public on a discovery of astronomy and nocturnal wildlife.

Falkirk Wheel

As well as switching off its striking lighting once again, the Falkirk Wheel team promoted Earth Hour to visitors social media and online and helped to find WWF's 'Hidden Heroes'.

Arbroath Old & Abbey Church

Arbroath's Old & Abbey Church have held several candlelit events for Earth Hour including concert recitals and film screenings.

Ayr Town Hall

South Ayrshire Council working with the Ayr Townscape Heritage initiative turned the centre of Ayr into a solar garden for the weekend with musical and glowing exhibits all created without the aid of electricty.
